GERMAN ATTACKS ON VERDUN REPULSED

THE HUNS CANNOT POSSIBLY SUCCEED -- BRITISH NAVY IS EAGERLY WATCHING

IMPOSSIBLE FOR HUNS TO CAPTURE VERDUN

London, March 9.—The French positions are improved all along the Verdun battle front and it is now regarded as impossible for the Germans to take Verdun, as they have been driven back with very heavy losses after very fierce assaults.

SOME PEOPLE STILL IGNORANT OF WAR

There are places which are actually in ignorance that one of the greatest wars in the world's history is raging. Tristan de Cunha, the lonely South Atlantic island, has not received a mail since the outbreak of war. It is entirely dependent on chance communications from the Cape, 1,500 miles away. Sometimes it is a year or more without its people hearing from the outside world. It is even a British possession.

Then there is Yquitos, in Eastern Peru, which has perhaps the most romantic mail service in the world. It is only a few hundred miles from Lima, the Pacific capital of Peru, but the wall of the Andes is an almost impassable barrier. The mail route from Yquitos to Lima is all the thousands of miles down the Amazon and across the Atlantic, and then "via Liverpool."—War Cry.

T. D. PATTULLO RETURNED FROM VICTORIA TODAY

Mr. T. D. Pattullo, who took a very active part in the recent campaigns against Bowserism in Vancouver and Victoria, returned on the Prince Rupert this morning. Interviewed by The Daily News this forenoon, Mr. Pattullo said:

"Yes, I am naturally pleased at the result of the elections in Vancouver and Victoria. I suppose that our friends, our opponents will not deny us some feelings of elation, yet the great value of the result is that the people generally of all shades of political thought, irrespective of party affiliation, have come to a thorough realization and determination that there must be a change in the conduct of our public affairs.

"Speaking entirely impersonally and of his office of the premiership, I may say that even Mr. Bowser's closest friends are disappointed in him. After the Vancouver election the Bowser government appeared to be in a frenzied panic and was ready to promise everybody anything if only it might retain the support which it had deservedly lost. And yet after all the verdict of the people was a manifestation of a lengthy dissatisfaction with the manner in which the affairs of the province have been conducted.

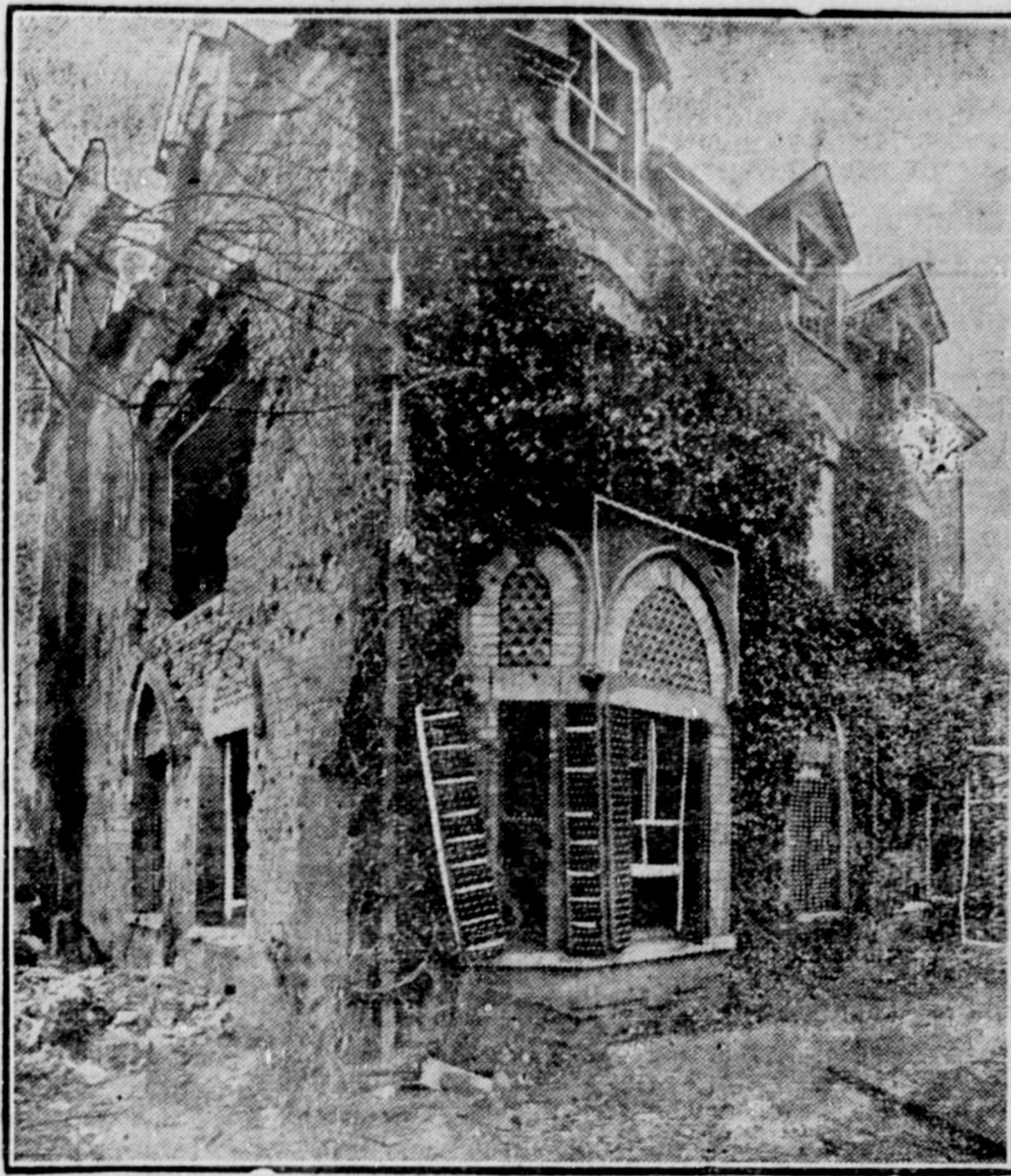
"Contrary to the attitude of the government during a contest of great excitement, the Liberals kept their feet on the ground. While forcefully attacking the government, both for corrupt practices and for dereliction of duty, they at the same time presented a constructive platform looking to the development of our resources.

"The people have come to a realization of the fact that our province is to be developed, not by the invocation of miracles, but by the exercise of common sense principles persistently and honestly applied.

"During my visit south I took occasion to impress upon the people there the resources of this portion of the province. I also had many interviews with the Liberal leader, Mr. Brewster, and the people of Northern B. C. may be assured that when a new administration takes office under Mr. Brewster, that all our varied resources will receive not only sympathetic consideration but immediate and tangible assistance towards their development.

"The Government must exercise a careful supervision and directing influence as to fisheries, mining, agriculture, lumbering, shipping, etc., so that with all these industries gradually developing our population may be made self-sustaining. With the resources which are ours, instead of our being, as at present, the most backward and least prosperous province of the Dominion, we shall before many years be the most progressive and the most prosperous of Canada."

Mr. Pattullo paid a hearty tribute to the splendid work accomplished for the province by Mr. Parker Williams.

AUSTRALIA PREVENTS SLACKERS FROM LEAVING

Although it has not been considered necessary as yet to adopt conscription in Australia, steps have been taken to prevent eligible men leaving the country. At a meeting of the Federal Executive Council, held in November last, a regulation under the War Precautions Act was passed to prohibit persons of military age from leaving the country without a passport. The regulation is as follows: "No male British subject whose age exceeds 17 years and does not exceed 45 years shall leave, or attempt to leave, the Commonwealth unless a passport has been issued to him by the Department of External Affairs. Any person authorised for the purpose by the competent naval or military authority, or any police constable or officer of Customs, may arrest without warrant any person who attempts to leave the Commonwealth in contravention of this regulation." It will be remembered that the Commonwealth recently decided to raise, within a few months, another 50,000 men for active service, in addition to the quota of 9,000 per month. It is proposed to raise these troops by voluntary enlistment, a direct personal appeal being made to the men of fighting age, and it is confidently expected that the appeal will not be made in vain.—United Empire Magazine.

BAGDAD THE CENTRE OF EASTERN OPERATIONS

That the British expedition in Mesopotamia is one of the most important units operating in the present war is evidenced by the following extract from an article in a British exchange dealing with the position at Kut-el-Amara.

If a line were drawn from Berlin through Vienna, Constantinople and Bagdad, and continued down the north shore of the Persian Gulf to Karachi, it would be nearly straight. That line marks the short cut from Europe to India. There is another route to India, the way our ships use, through the Suez Canal and Red Sea, but it is a sea, not a land route, and when the Bagdad railway is completed we shall be able to reach Karachi in eight instead of 15 days. If we want to secure our communications with India, Bagdad is as necessary to us as Cairo, and this is why we are trying to get there. If we could trust Germany there would be no possible objection to her carrying a railway through Asia Minor to the head of the Persian Gulf, but now we have found her out we know that commercial expansion with her is only a means to obtaining world power; or, in other words, to rob her neighbors by force of their possessions. If the Germans get through to the head of the Gulf they will establish themselves on the flank of our route to India, and be a standing menace to our Asiatic dominions. Bagdad is the objective of our army. The great Eastern city is at the junction of the high roads both into Persia and to India. Its occupation is a supreme military necessity for Great Britain.



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SUBMARINE FAILURE

That the new German submarine campaign is not any more effective than the former one is shown by the safe landing of the Third Canadian Division in France. This new campaign, like the earlier effort, is clearly a campaign of murder and piracy on the high seas. Had it been an effective naval measure, it would have proven a barrier to the safe transport of troops across the channel.

Germany's proud boast to the people of Berlin on the resumption of the submarine war with larger and more powerful vessels, was that it would be impossible for Britain to send reinforcements into France, while at the same time the people of Britain would be starved in three months, as traders would not be able to penetrate the blockade. They have succeeded in sinking a few defenceless steamers, but they have missed hundreds during the past week, and the scheme is not a whit more successful than it was before.

When the history of the great struggle comes to be written, one of the most remarkable phases of it will undoubtedly be the story of how Britain transported hundreds of thousands of soldiers across the channel and through the Mediterranean with the loss of the merest fraction of her men. The British navy has been apparently inactive, but it has most effectively ruled the seas and there can be little doubt that the safe transportation of our troops is largely due to the watchfulness of the "boys in blue."

Sam Hughes is keeping remarkably quiet these days. He hasn't said a word about his prospective trip to Berlin for over a week.

There is a rumor that Bowser will shortly name a commander-in-chief for the British Columbia merchant marine, and that William Manson is right in line for the job, having been raised near the sea. The new post will not necessitate a by-election.

The Victoria Colonist, in its desperate effort to help poor Plum last Saturday, gave the McBride government credit for spending about eight millions in Victoria in the past six years. Incidentally, most of the items detailed were Dominion affairs, but that is a mere detail when the Colonist is after votes.

What Vancouver and Victoria have recently said will be repeated throughout the province when the opportunity comes.

INTERESTING DISCUSSION AT FORTNIGHTLY CLUB

The Fortnightly Club spent a most interesting and instructive evening in the Presbyterian Hall last evening, when Mr. H. F. McRae and the Rev. H. R. Grant discussed "Psychology and Its Relation to Religion and the Various Psychic Cults of Modern Times."

In dealing with such a wide subject, both speakers wisely contented themselves with making a few observations which tended to create thought along the lines indicated by the subject.

Mr. McRae dealt in a most interesting manner with the control of matter by mind, explaining how the workings of the mind influenced the health of the individual by promoting or hindering the various functions of the body. He went on to deal with the transmission of thought, describing it as something akin to wireless telegraphy. He described the ideas around which new cults had grown up, explaining particularly the views of the "New Thought" cult. He thought it was a healthy thing for people to study psychology, but warned beginners against swallowing the views of faddists.

Rev. Mr. Grant took up the question of mind-healing and de-

scribed how he believed it possible that certain ailments, those of a nervous order, could be banished by the power of mind. He drew a sharp distinction, however, between such ailments and purely physical ills, which he described as a battle between the red corpuscles of the blood and disease germs. He did not agree with the New Thought idea that to think success was to succeed. It was physically impossible for all to succeed. New Thought was not a religion. There could be no real religion in a theory which left no room for pity for the unsuccessful or the diseased. Though the human intellect was of God, yet man had no real merit in himself. No man could work out his own salvation. Man did not reach the highest until his mind linked up with God, who is the measure of all things.

A most interesting discussion followed and all present thoroughly enjoyed the speeches.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. 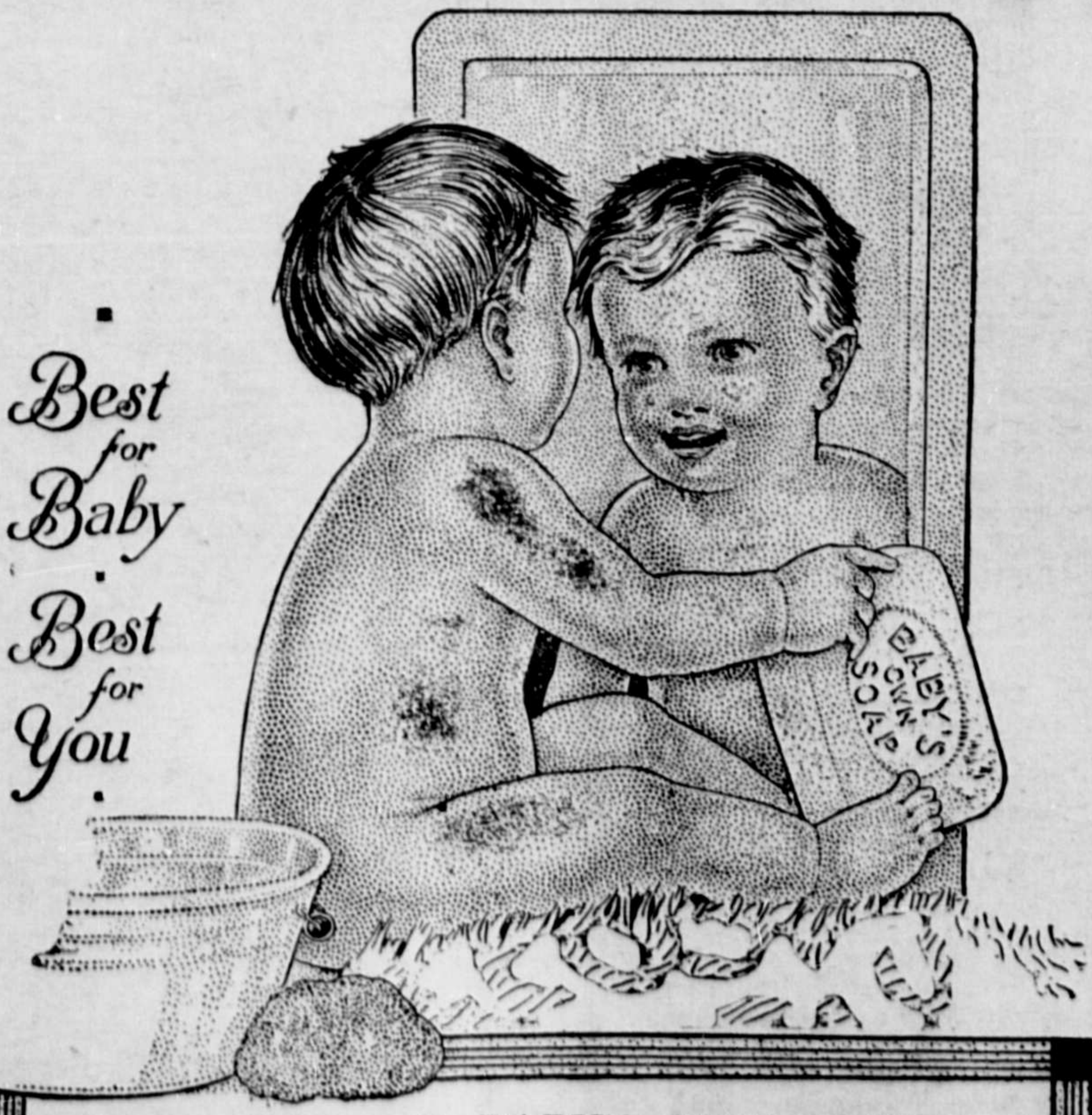
RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
