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THE SITUATION AT VERDUN IS UNCHANGED

SUCCESSFUL FRENCH AIR RAID -- PORTUGAL IS NOW PREPARING FOR ACTION

FRENCH DENY HUN REPORT OF VICTORY

London, March 10.—The French officially deny the German report that the Germans have scored a victory on the French front. The situation at Verdun remains unchanged, with a violent artillery bombardment along the banks of the River Meuse.

Successful Air Raid.
Six French aeroplanes made a raid on the German transport and railway lines in Belgium, doing extensive damage and all returning safely to the base.

Portugal Mobilising.
Following upon the handing of his passports to the Portuguese Ambassador, Portugal is making ready for action all the naval reserves having been called up.

Distilleries Taken Over.
The Hon. David Lloyd George has intimated that it is the intention of the government to take over all British distilleries.

Russian Naval Base.
The captured harbor of Riga on the Black Sea has been made a naval base by the Russians.

Canadian Prisoners Well.
The United States ambassador, who recently paid a surprise visit to the Canadian prisoners in Germany says he found them all well.

DEVELOPMENT WORK AT SURF INLET MINE

F. W. Holler, superintendent of the Surf Inlet Mines, came in yesterday on the Full Moon. Mr. Holler says that there are at present 65 men at work and the blocking out of the ore is proceeding satisfactorily.

The company is putting in a power plant which will generate power enough for a city. The trams will be operated by electricity while the power will be utilised wherever possible in carrying out development work. Houses are being erected for the men and, once the snow goes, it is expected that Surf Inlet will be one of the busiest spots on the coast.

The Westholme Theatre was packed to the roof last night, on the occasion of the farewell concert to the men of the 102nd Regiment by the ladies of the committee of the Carnival of the Allies. The theatre was gaily decorated with the Union Jack and the Canadian flag, while the stage carried the flags of the Allies.

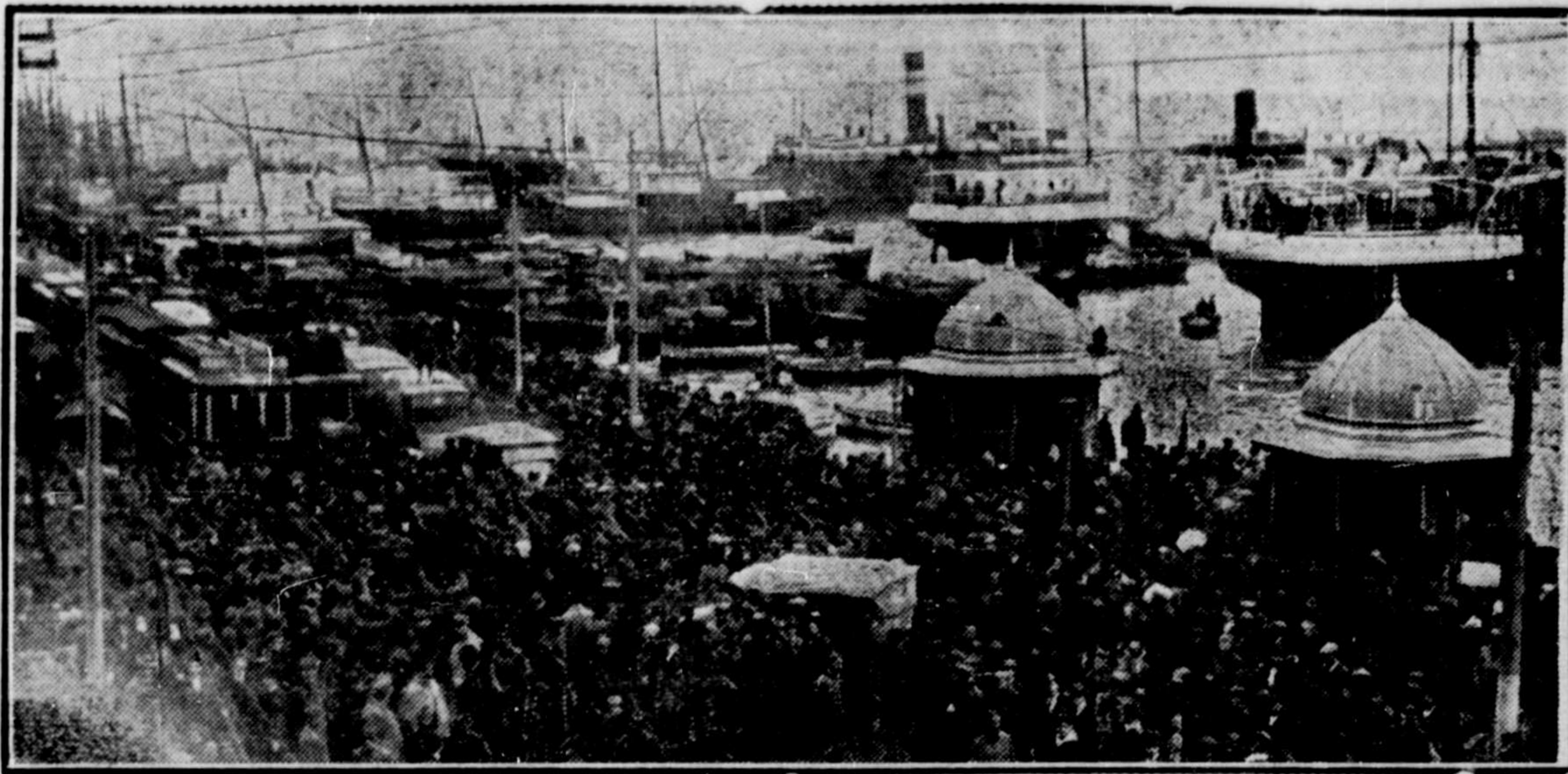
In the absence of Mayor McCaffery, Acting Mayor Nelson presided. He said that the citizens of Prince Rupert had gathered together a good many times to take farewell of contingents leaving for the front, and assured the men of the 102nd that the people felt that they would be well worthy of the gallant men who had gone before, and who had earned a great reputation in the trenches. In going out to form part of Kitchener's "contemptible little army," which term of the Kaiser's he characterised as one of the greatest compliments ever paid to our soldiers, the boys of the north were showing that, though our race had in recent times been inclined towards peace, there was still a good deal of the old fighting blood of our ancestors in our veins which called them forth to do battle for freedom and justice.

He dwelt upon the fact that our men were not professional soldiers but citizen soldiers, yet the men who had gone before had proven, and the boys who are going now will prove, that they are second to no soldiers in the world in courage and spirit. After dwelling upon the magnificent work done by our navy, he complimented Captain Brandt on the type of men he had at his command and hoped he would bring them back with honors.

After "Love in Armor," a most amusing comedy, had been shown, the bugle band of the Cadet Corps lined up on the stage and woke the echoes with their calls, which were so much appreciated that they had to give a repeat. The boys kept remarkably well together and showed good tone.

Mrs. William Millar sang "Bonnie Prince Charlie" so well that she was recalled, giving "Loch Lomond" as an encore. Private Korner of the 102nd sang "My Old New Hampshire Home," giving "Dublin Bay" as an encore. Miss King's violin solo also brought demands for more, the violinist responding with "Home, Sweet Home." Mrs. Jarvis McLeod made quite a hit with "Keep the Home Fires Burning," following with "Your King and Country Need You." Mr. Armstrong's rendering of "By Order of the King" had also to be repeated, while Piper Sturgeon's bagpipe selections were received in the same fashion. Pte. Brand sang "The Mighty Deep" in splendid voice, but could not be tempted to give an encore, though the audience wished another.

SEVERAL JAPS WERE WOUNDED IN SCRAP

Chief Gammon has returned from Oceanic cannery where he went to investigate the Japanese scrap which took place recently. He is waiting the recovery of the wounded man who is in hospital here before taking further steps. It seems that the Jap who is here had been the aggressor, as there are three Japs at the cannery all suffering from his attentions. One was injured by a thrown lamp, while another has seven cuts in his hand, sustained while trying to take the knife from his assailant, and the third has a knife wound in the back of his neck. Altogether it must have been a pretty lively fight, but it is not yet certain as to which was the guilty party.

LAUNCH CASE

At the police court this morning, C. A. Phillips of Seal Cove, appeared on a charge of stealing his own launch, on which he had given a lien to S. B. Adams of Seal Cove, as security for a grocery bill of \$20.05. It seems that when Phillips failed to meet his note in thirty days, Adams seized the launch, and that the accused had afterwards taken possession of it. Phillips had paid \$4.00 on account leaving \$16.05 unpaid.

The magistrate dismissed the case. A. M. Manson appeared for accused and W. E. Fisher for the Plaintiff.

The lien was released yesterday by Phillips paying the \$16.05 into court.

BRISK BIDDING FOR HALIBUT CATCHES

Four more halibut schooners came in this morning. The Albacross had 35,000 pounds; the Tyee 40,000 and two smaller boats about 15,000 between them. Bidding started at 7 1/4 cents but no sale had been made at noon.

The boats coming in are remaining tied up at the wharf pending settlement of the dispute over the sharing of the cost of renewals of gear, and fish, which is especially in big demand at this season of the year, is liable to be dear for some time. Seattle is very hungry for halibut and there is brisk bidding amongst the various buyers for the catches which are arriving.

ALICE ARM DRAWS LOCAL BUSINESS MEN

Prince Rupert business men are showing increased interest in the development taking place at Alice Arm and several are laying plans to open up stores there at an early date. Charles Vaughan, of the Acme Importers Limited, has just returned from the mining camp and his report was so favorable that Mr. Scheinman intends to open a store without delay.

Ole Evindsen has got the construction of his hotel under way and hopes to be able to take care of a hundred men early next month.

Mr. Hannan, of Cavenaile and Hannan, is at present at Alice Arm looking over the situation and Mr. Bruggy, formerly of Stewart, is likely to open premises there before long.

North, south and east of Prince Rupert there are abundant signs of the most active mining season this district has ever experienced and a development which seems certain to lead to mining on a large scale for years to come. As Prince Rupert is the centre of this area, it is bound to benefit to no little extent from this activity.

"DON" YELF UNDERGOING TREATMENT IN VICTORIA

"Don" Yelf, who was expected to arrive in Prince Rupert on Tuesday night, has gone to Victoria along with other wounded soldiers from his battalion to undergo special treatment at the Military Convalescent Home at Esquimalt. The party was met at the wharf by the band of the 88th Regiment and a large crowd gave them a right warm welcome. "Don" was severely wounded in the back by shrapnel at Festubert on May 24th, the wound causing him to lose a lot of muscular tissue. He will stay at the convalescent home for three months, after which he will probably be discharged and will rank in class 2 on the pension list.

THRILLING DRAMA AT THE MAJESTIC THEATRE

"The Pitfall," the great four-act drama at the Majestic tonight, is a stirring play full of dramatic situations and lively action. It is the story of a girl who, to save her father from financial ruin, marries a professional gambler. MINING CASE

His Honor Judge Young will hear the case of E. P. Spaulding and A. M. Spaulding v. The Butte and Rocher de Boule Copper Company, represented by Messrs. F. C. McKinnon, W. S. Sargent and Colin C. Munro, at his home this afternoon. The plaintiffs ask for an injunction against the defendants' trespassing upon their property and interfering with their mining work on Rocher de Boule mountain.

DESPERATE FIGHT WITH VILLA'S BANDITS

Columbus, New Mexico, March 10.—Arthur McKinney, William Corbett and James O'Neill have been captured by Villa and hanged. Their bodies were afterwards burned.

Bandits and Troops Clash.

El Paso, Texas, March 10.—Five United States cavalymen were killed in a clash with 500 of Villa's bandits at Columbus, N.M. The Mexicans held the town for an hour and a half and were finally driven off by the 13th United States cavalry after inflicting great losses on the Mexicans. Hotels in the centre of the town were burned by the bandits and several guests lost their lives. The Mexicans shot down several people as they were fleeing from the flames.

Many bandits were killed in the streets. The attack started at midnight and Pablo Lopez, the second in command of Villa's men, was killed. Villa got successfully away.

CAPTAIN KANE OF PORT MOODY IS IN THE CITY

Captain W. J. Kane, of Port Moody, who has been on the coast for the past thirty years, is visiting in town on his way south from a visit to his brother, George T. Kane, of Telkwa. The captain who has seen long service on the lakes and coast of British Columbia, has volunteered for naval service and is under thirty days' notice to proceed to the Atlantic coast.

BAGDAD

It looks as if the ancient city of Bagdad, famous in Biblical history, and the romantic city of Haroun Al-Raschid and Sinbad the Sailor of Arabian Nights fame, will once more figure prominently in the history of the world. The very name of Bagdad conjures up visions of past glory and present mystery in the mind of a matter-of-fact westerner. Bagdad has dwindled from a magnificent city of two million people to a community of about 120,000, and is little more than the monument of a dead past. Travellers tell us that there is little that is romantic in its dirty, unpaved, irregular streets, and little that is imposing in its architecture, yet nothing will ever kill the fancy that surrounds this ancient pile.

Practically built of the bricks of ancient Babylon, Bagdad was at one time the commercial and social centre of an empire which has been dead for centuries. Bagdad was at one time the crossroads between the ancient India, Persia, Syria, Armenia and Arabia. A gathering place for armies, pilgrims and caravans from all parts. It was at the height of its prosperity and contained two million people years before King Alfred came to the throne of England.

Bagdad is still regarded as the capital of Islam, and, if the British expeditionary force, which is at present about one hundred miles from this great city, can bring about the fall of Bagdad, it will be a greater blow to Mohammedanism than the taking of Constantinople would be. It is interesting to note that General Townshend's army has passed through the region which is believed to have been the Garden of Eden.

though for centuries it has been a barren desert.

Mesopotamia might have been a British protectorate for the past century had not the British government, in order to remain on good terms with the Sultan, allowed the Turks to hold sway. With an eye on India and the East, Germany has in recent years become so friendly with the Turks that she has been allowed to carry out irrigation schemes along the Euphrates and the Tigris, with the result that this formerly fertile spot has once more blossomed forth. The Turks also allowed Germany to carry out her project of building a railroad from Berlin, through Vienna, Constantinople and Bagdad to the head of the Persian Gulf, making the trip from central Europe to India in half the time required by the sea trip.

When the war is over, and Britain controls Mesopotamia, there will be prosperous times in store once more for the ancient city of Bagdad. It will never, probably, attain to its ancient glory, but it will certainly become the big commercial centre of a New East and will enter upon an entirely new era of enterprise.

Red Cross Society here, was unable, through illness, to be present to deliver his address to the regiment, but thoughtfully sent a letter of appreciation to Captain Brandt, the non-commissioned officers and men of the 102nd, which the chairman read and presented to Captain Brandt. After expressing regret at his inability to be present, Judge Young said that Canada is recruiting men at the rate of one thousand per day and that, if necessary, a million and three-quarters of men would be sent from the Dominion to "defeat Germany, crush Prussia and save the world's civilisation." He congratulated the men of northern British Columbia on the way in which they had responded to the call and also reminded them of the noble way in which our women had done their duty. "We cannot but admire their courage, devotion and patriotism. Everywhere they are busy to aid and comfort those in need," said the Judge. He also referred to the great work being done by the Canadian Red Cross Society. In conclusion he wished the men Godspeed, with an earnest prayer for their safe return from a victorious campaign.

Captain Brandt, in reply, expressed thanks on behalf of the regiment for the kind words expressed in the letter, and took occasion to thank the citizens of Prince Rupert for the many kindnesses shown to himself and his men. They were going to do their duty and would not forget the people at home. He hoped that the Prince Rupert company would be brought up to full strength in the next few days.

Rev. H. R. Grant was called upon to say a few words to the men. In dwelling upon the war, he described it as a struggle between the forces of civilisation and barbarism. The people of

the British Empire must defeat forever a people who had shown an overbearing spirit which was contrary to the growth of true civilisation. He said it would be impossible to find men in our ranks who would mount in the air and drop bombs on women and children, and because the Germans had done this thing he wanted to see them crushed. The hydra-headed monster of Prussianism must never be allowed to rule the world. He said that to meet death in such a struggle was the greatest honor which could come to a Briton. In conclusion he said "I know that you will give as good an account of yourselves as the men who have gone before and, having fought a good fight, will return feeling that you have 'done your bit' for the Empire."

George W. Morrow, on behalf of the ladies of the Red Cross Society, thanked those who had taken part in such an excellent program and also those who had attended. He said "Tell the boys over there that the same old spirit of patriotism remains in the citizens of Prince Rupert as was shown when they left."

After "The Voice in the Fog," a very fine five-act drama, had been screened, the audience sang "God Save the King," followed by three hearty cheers and a tiger for the 102nd Regiment.

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HARD TIMES SATISFIED WITH A SMALL PROFIT
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CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof;

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(6) To provide that securities to be issued under the following bylaws, under none of which any securities have as yet been issued, Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds may be issued and such bonds to be for the term here set forth, namely:

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

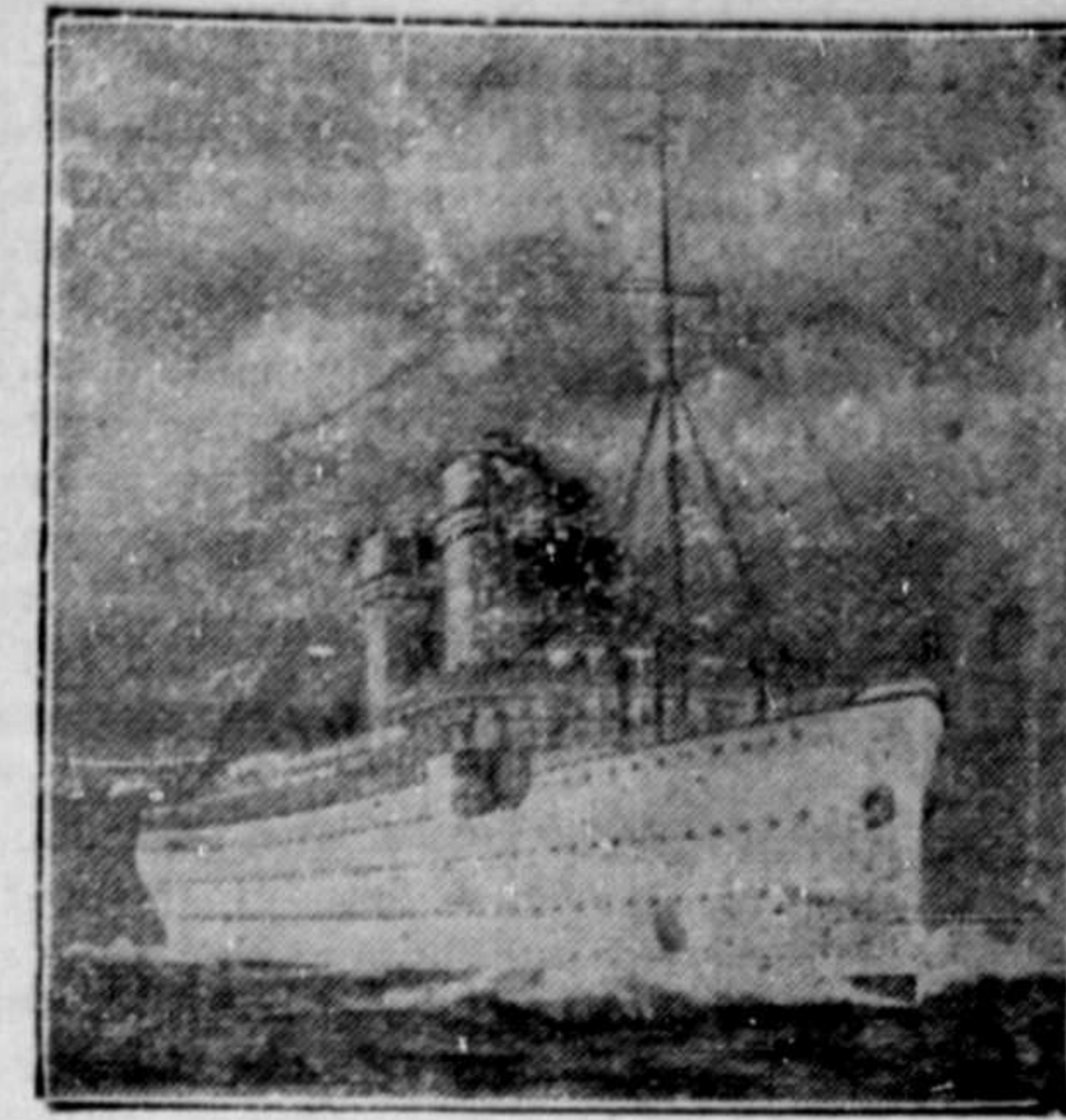
(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$4,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

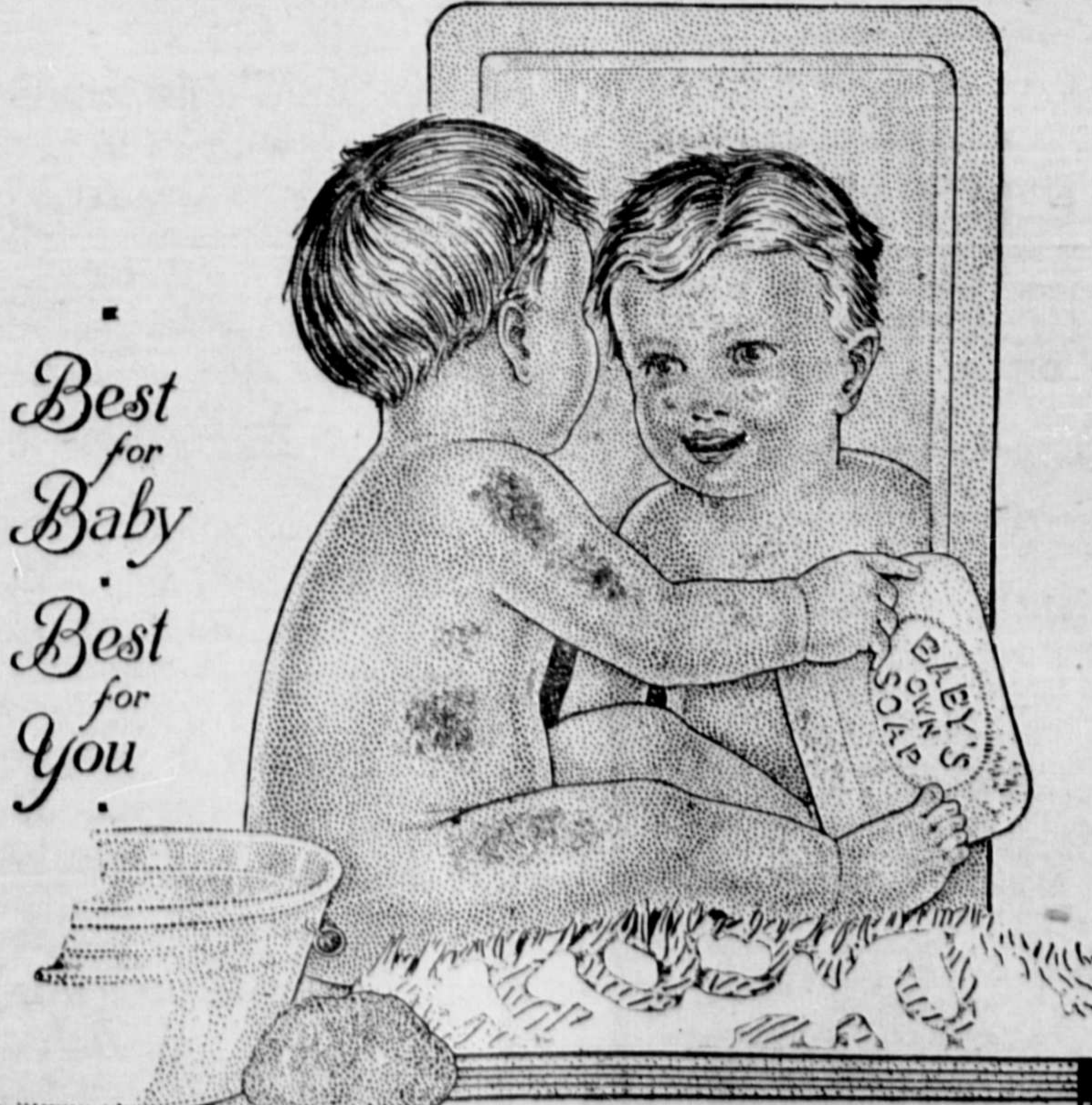
