## APPALLING HUN LOSSES AROUND VERDUN

### WHOLE BRIGADES WIPED OUT -- FEARFUL BAYONET WORK BY FRENCH TROOPS

#### GERMAN LOSSES AROUND VERDUN ARE APPALLING

Whole German Brigades Wiped out by the French—Terrific Fighting Continues—Line Holds.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, March 11.—(Official)—West of the Meuse all the German attacks have been repulsed with appalling losses to the enemy. In the Corbeaux Woods, the French advanced and consolidated their gains.

**Line Unbroken.**  
East of the Meuse, the French line remains unbroken despite fresh German assaults by five divisions of Prussians.

The bombardment continues with deafening intensity. On the Woevre the German artillery is slackening. There is violent fighting at the village of Vaux.

**Hun Brigades Wiped Out.**  
London, March 11.—The German losses yesterday north of Verdun exceeded anything ever experienced before. Whole brigades flung themselves at the French lines and were practically wiped out.

The Zouaves, Turcos and Senegalese did fearful work with the bayonet. The Germans suffered terribly from the deadly French machine gun and artillery fire.

**Portuguese Cabinet Resigns.**  
The Portuguese cabinet has resigned and gives place to a national defense cabinet.

#### PORTUGAL IS ALLIED WITH GREAT BRITAIN

London, Mar. 11.—Notes which have passed between Portugal and Germany show that the British government had requested the Portuguese government to seize the interned German ships in view of the alliance between the two nations.

**French Line Intact.**  
There is desperate fighting between Douaumont and Vaux, but the Germans have failed to pierce the French line.

**Russian Power.**  
The Turks now realize that the power of the Russians is inexhaustible. The Russians are making great progress in Turkish territory.

**German Gain.**  
The Germans have made a gain in the Corbeaux Woods, but suffered tremendously heavy losses in doing so.

**Steamer Sunk.**  
A passenger steamer with American citizens on board has been torpedoed by a German submarine without warning. All were saved.

Mr. Macdonald also wants to know if he is drawing his sessional indemnity and pay from the government for work on the Indian Commission at the same time.

The committee will find employment for discharged soldiers who are able to work and will provide special training for disabled soldiers who are unable to take up their former employment, with a view to enabling them to secure other employment. The members of the committee have accepted office and will meet at an early date.

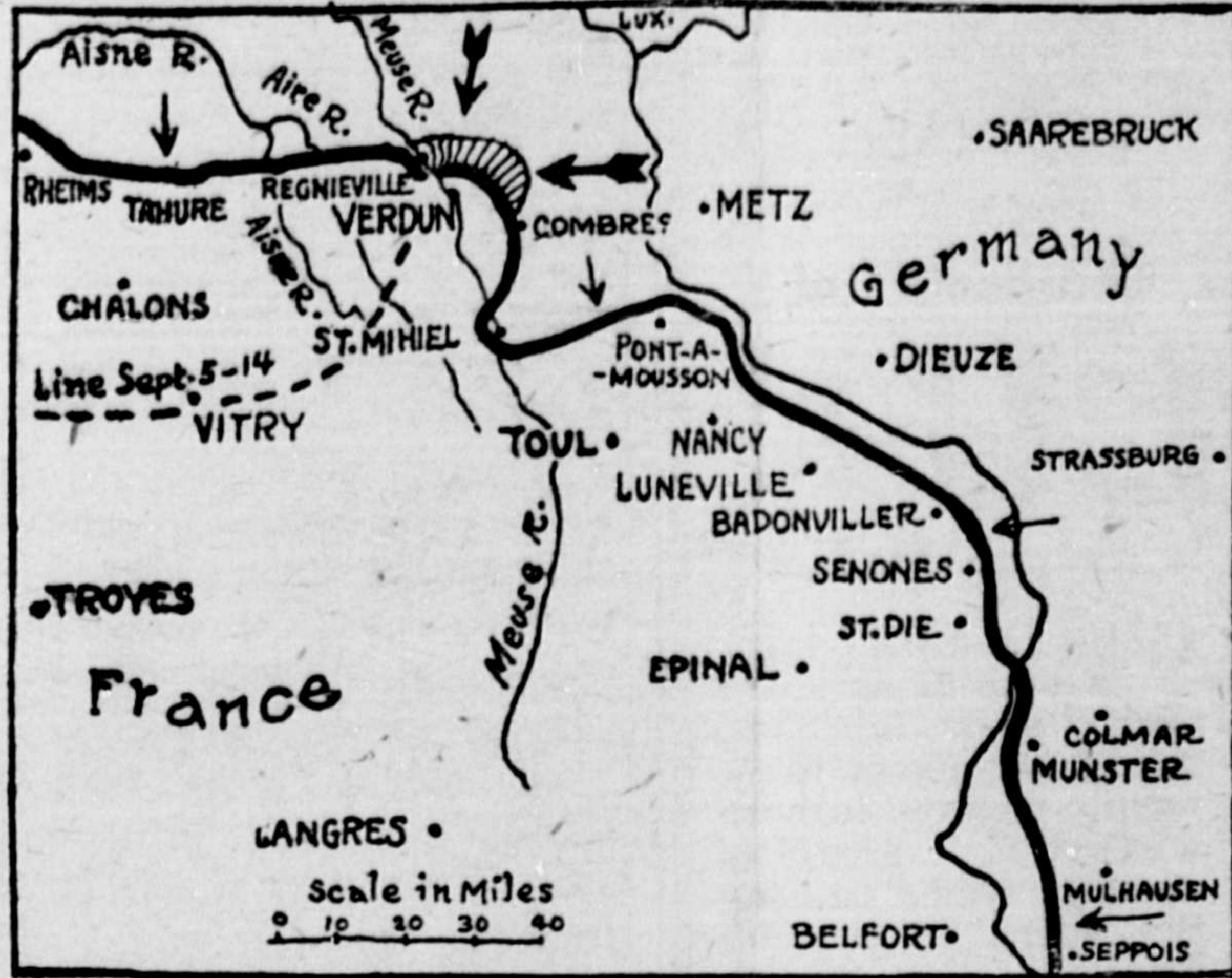

#### JOHN M. LYNCH DIED SUDDENLY AT HAZELTON

Mr. John M. Lynch, of the firm of Lynch Brothers, of Prince Rupert and Smithers, passed away very suddenly at the Hazelton hospital yesterday. The news came as a great shock to Mr. Lynch's friends in Prince Rupert, some of whom had heard from him by the last mail from the interior, at which time he seemed to be in good health. The cause of death was peritonitis, following upon an attack of appendicitis. On taking seriously ill, the deceased was taken to Hazelton hospital from Smithers, on a special train, in the hope that an operation would save his life, but acute peritonitis set in, the end coming very suddenly.

Mr. Lynch was one of the pioneers of this district, entering into partnership with his brother, Mr. W. P. Lynch, who carries on the business of the firm in Prince Rupert, in the early days of railroad construction here. The brothers were in business at Granville Creek in the Yukon during the days of the mining boom in that district, and it will be with great regret that old Yukoners will learn that the old-time partnership has been broken by the death of the younger member of the firm. The sympathy of the whole community will go out to the widow of the deceased and to Mr. W. P. Lynch in their bereavement.

#### ROUMANIA HAS SEIZED GERMAN WHEAT SUPPLY

Supplies Purchased from Roumania Held There—German Air Raid on Russian Ships Is Repulsed.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, March 11.—Roumania has seized for army purposes fifty thousand wagons and all the cereals which were bought by Germany some time ago.

**Air Attack Near Varna.**  
German aeroplane attacked a Russian battleship and five destroyers and merchant ships near Varna, the Bulgarian port in the Black Sea. They were driven off by shell-fire.

**Norwegian Bark Sunk.**  
Washington, March 11.—The Norwegian bark Sifius, bound from New York to Havre, has been torpedoed without warning in Havre Roads.

Captain Syvertsen and three of his crew were killed. Three Americans who were on board escaped death, one being injured.

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**FLYING**

The conquest of the air is the greatest material achievement in the world's history. With such amazing swiftness has the art of flying advanced during the past decade that in forecasting the near future the imagination must be enlisted. It is not idle to say that in a few years the aeroplane will be as commonly used as the automobile is now. In the rapidity of its development, and in a far more difficult field at that, the aeroplane has fairly run away from the automobile. This progress is largely the result of the war. A few years ago a flight across the English Channel was an amazing feat, the aeroplane was the helpless victim of every fickle gust of wind, while the flight of an hour with a passenger aboard made a thriller for the headlines. The memorable trip across the channel by Miss Harriet Quimby, of Leslie's staff, in 1912, the first channel flight by a woman alone, has not yet been duplicated.

"Less than a decade ago," says Senor Santos-Dumont, the Brazilian aviator and scientist, "my aeroplane was considered a marvel. In this machine, in which there was room for only one person, I used a 20-horsepower motor. My record flight was twelve miles, and I could carry only enough gasoline to fly three-quarters of an hour." Today aeroplanes can carry thirty passengers, can fly over twenty-four hours without alighting, have ascended practically five miles, and between sunrise and sunset have traveled 1,300 miles. "We no longer fear wind or weather," said Mr. Dumont. The modern machine can brave any gale, and fly through a storm of any velocity. It can travel over mountains, forests and seas. The

atmosphere is its ocean, and its ports are everywhere."—Charlton Bates Strayer in Leslie's.

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## CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for n of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof:

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(6) To provide that securities to be issued under the following bylaws, under none of which any securities have as yet been issued, Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds may be issued and such bonds to be for the term here set forth, namely:

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

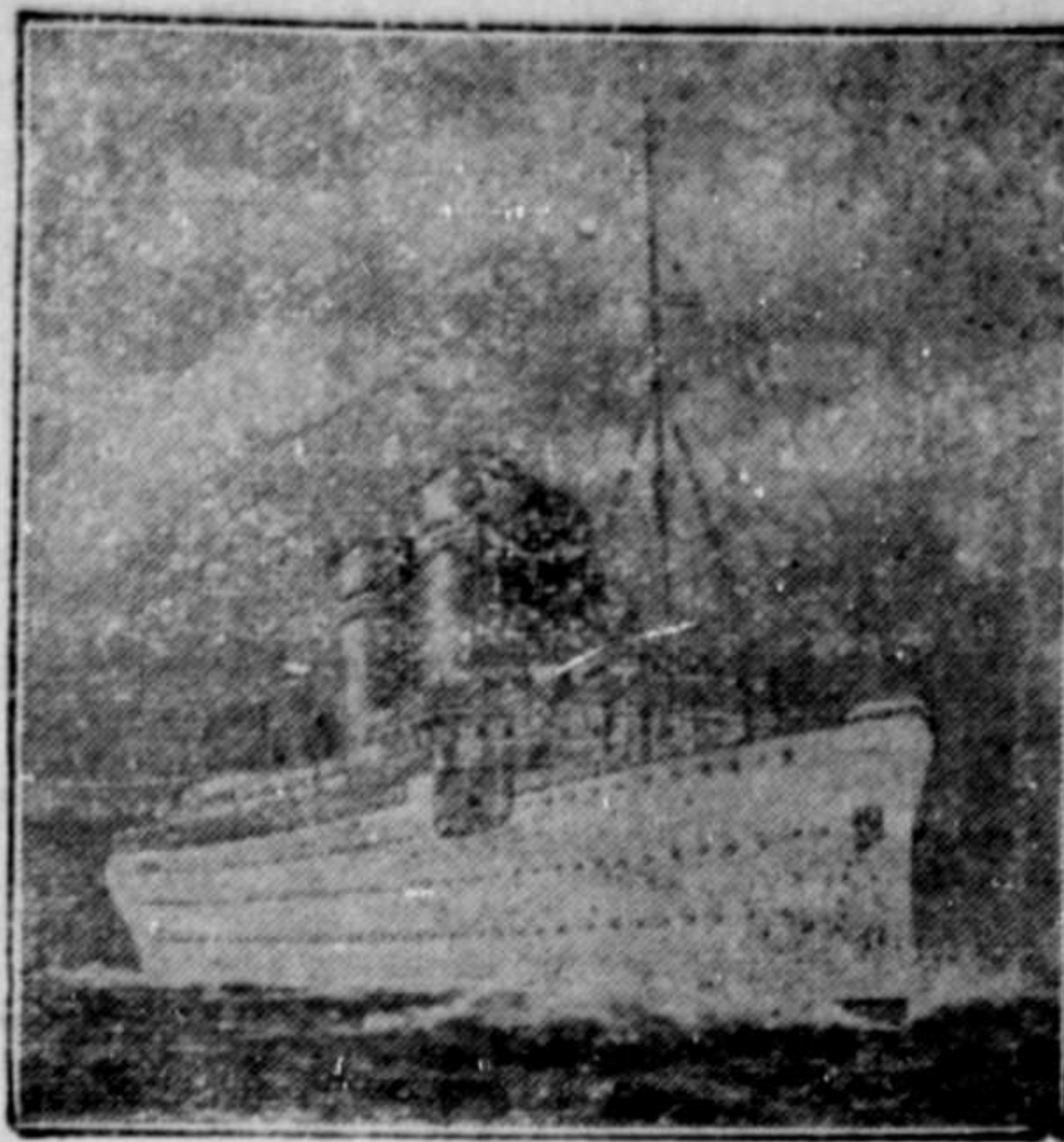
(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

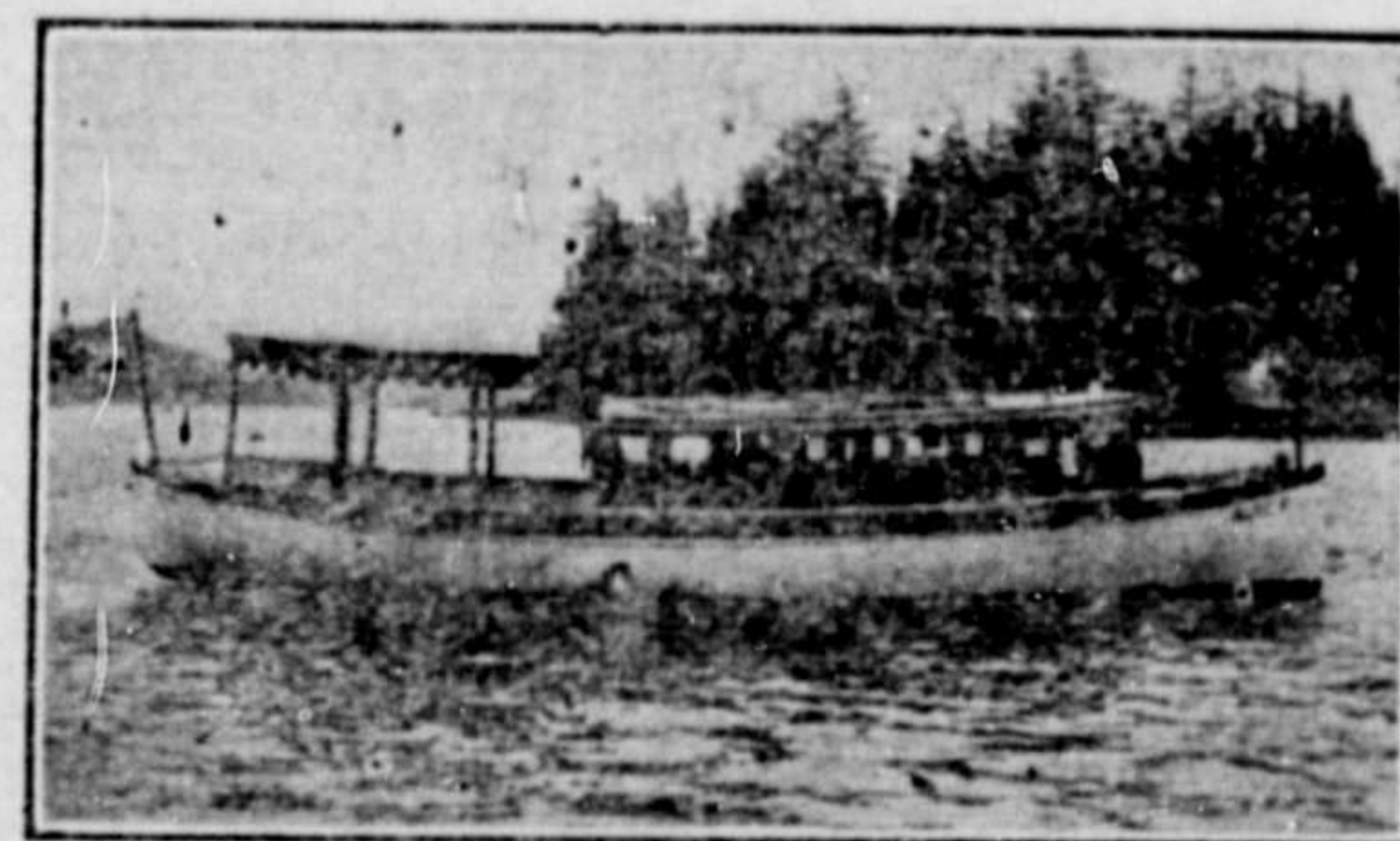
