GERMANS PREPARE FOR THE FINAL DRIVE

THOUSANDS OF GUNS ON HUGE CURVE -- EXPERTS PREDICT GERMAN DEFEAT

HUNS PREPARE FOR FINAL DRIVE AGAINST VERDUN

Thousands of Guns on Fifty-mile Curve—Germans Bring up New Army for the Great Final Attempt.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 14.—There is a continuance of artillery activity on the Verdun front, with very violent fighting west of the river Meuse. There is also heavy cannonading near Vaux and in the Woivre district.

Thousands of Guns.

There are thousands of guns active on a fifty-mile curve, the advantage being with the French, who are working on the interior lines.

German howitzers, which have been brought from the Italian-Bulgarian front, are now in action. The French, who are supplied with mountains of shells, are vigorously replying.

Final Assault.

One hundred thousand additional German troops, including the Imperial Guards and the Corps D'Elite of the German army, have arrived for the final smash which is expected to take place during the next forty-eight hours. Military experts predict that the German defeat is certain.

German Casualties.

The official war office estimates place the German losses around Verdun at 200,000 men and the French losses are estimated at 40,000.

S. O. ERICH TO ENLIST FOR OVERSEAS SERVICE

Sidney O. Erich, the popular passenger agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific here, is giving up his position to join the overseas forces. MANITOBA FOR PROHIBITION BY LARGE MAJORITY

Prairie Province goes Dry on June First—Pier Destroyed at Halifax—Lipton is Optimistic.

Winnipeg, March 14.—Prohibition has passed in Manitoba by two votes to one. In Winnipeg the vote was 14,172 for and 9,709 against.

All the soldiers in the various camps voted for prohibition. The act becomes effective on June 1st next. Only North Winnipeg and St. Boniface voted wet.

Halifax Pier Destroyed.

Halifax, March 14.—Pier No. 2 has been destroyed by fire and loss is estimated at \$150,000. It is feared that one woman was killed in the blaze. The upper storey of the building was filled with Red Cross supplies.

Lipton Optimistic.

New York, March 14.—Sir Thos. Lipton has cabled the New York Yacht Club that he will race the Shamrock for the America Cup next year.

It will be remembered that Sir Thomas had arrangements made to compete in the great yacht race when war broke out necessitating the cancelling of his program. Evidently this great yachtsman is satisfied that the war will be over next summer.

"DON" YELF CARRIES MEMENTO OF FESTUBERT

"Don" Yelf, who was reported at Victoria Convalescent Hospital last week, arrived from the south on the Prince John on Sunday evening. "Don" still carries two pieces of shrapnel in the neighborhood of his spine as a memento of his adventures against the Germans.

Mr. Yelf, who left here with the first contingent and was afterwards drafted into the 7th Battalion, was wounded on May 24th at Festubert. He spent eight months in an English military hospital, where several efforts were made to dislodge the pieces of shrapnel but, as there was danger of permanently damaging the spine, they were left in the meantime. "Don" received a right hearty welcome from his many friends in the city.

ROCHER DE BOULE ORE FOR TACOMA SMELTER

D. J. Williams, superintendent of the Rocher de Boule, intimates that this mine will shortly start shipping its ore to the Tacoma smelter, this arrangement having been made necessary by reason of the fact that the Granby Company have all the ore they can handle. While in the south, Mr. Williams will complete the arrangements with the Tacoma people. The ore of course will still be shipped through Prince Rupert.

UNITED STATES TROOPS ON MEXICAN BORDER

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 14.—The government has entered into a reciprocal agreement with Carranza in regard to United States troops crossing the Mexican border in pursuit of Villa and his gang.

Twelve thousand troops with forty-eight batteries are located on the border between Douglas, Arizona, and El Paso, Texas. Villa has gone eastward. The wires from Juarez have been cut and it is reported that Villa is now at Galena on the Santa Maria River, fifty miles from the Mexican Central Railway.

BIG DEVELOPMENT AT SURF INLET MINE

Mr. P. W. Anderson returned early this morning from Surf Inlet on Princess Royal Island, where he has completed the building of a wharf. Mr. Anderson reports that a large body of valuable ore has been exposed at this mine, which is about seven miles inland. The ore will be treated right on the ground. Surveyors are busy at present planning for the construction of a big dam in connection with the power plant which the company is putting in, and it is expected that about five hundred men will be employed at this camp during the summer.

M. A. MACDONALD AND BREWSTER INVESTIGATING

Conservatives Discuss Prohibition in Caucus last Night—Macdonald Calls for Public Accounts Enquiry.

Victoria, March 14.—A caucus was held last night to discuss the prohibition policy of the Bowser government. It is rumored that the Conservative slate will be changed to include Jonathan Rogers, president of the British Columbia Prohibition party.

Macdonald Investigating.

M. A. Macdonald is moving for an investigation of the public accounts since 1912.

Many Questions.

H. C. Brewster has filed a list of thirty-two questions in regard to the Canadian Northern Railway and the Canadian Northern Pacific finances and the relations of these companies with the British Columbia government.

M. A. Macdonald is today demanding the early closing of the legislature. He argues that the four-year period expires this week.

STEAMSHIPS WILL CALL AT ALICE ARM

Starting on Saturday next, the Union Steamship Company will give a fortnightly service from Prince Rupert to Alice Arm. If the trade warrants it the service will be increased to once weekly. The Prince Albert of the G. T. P. fleet, which will operate in conjunction with the Union steamers, will make the first trip.

CITY COUNCIL HAD VERY BRIEF SESSION

The council meeting last night was very brief, there being no business of importance to transact. After the routine work of passing on supplies had been got through, Ald. Casey drew attention to the fact that no report had yet been turned in by the building inspector and fire chief in regard to the proposed improvement in the exits from Seal Cove School.

Ald. Casey also pointed out that no report had been made, as requested, with regard to the reduction of the curve at McBride and Seventh Avenue. He felt that something should be done at once in order to make this point safer for traffic. Acting Mayor Nelson said that he was not familiar with the details, but he would take these matters up with the officials immediately.

MORE EXCUSES

The Tories have devised all sorts of excuses for their overwhelming rout in Vancouver and Victoria. First, it was that the Conservatives themselves desired an opposition, and, therefore, voted for M. A. Macdonald and H. C. Brewster with that end in view. Then the Vancouver Tories very unkindly threw the blame for the deluge which drowned poor Tisdall upon the misguided orators who took the platform in a lame effort to combat the schemes laid bare in "The Crisis." The latest is from Victoria, where, at first, the unfortunate Mr. Flumerfelt was saddled with the blame on account of his being a poor vote-getter, and it is to the effect that the Liberals managed by some miraculous means to gather in the prohibition vote with one hand and the liquor vote with the other, neither hand knowing what kind of nefarious work the other was indulging in.

Mr. Miller, of Grand Forks, a gentleman who has had a wide and varied experience of elections and election dodges, accuses the Liberals of having a conference with the liquor men. How dare the Liberals consort with the liquor trade? This particular line is a special preserve of the Tories and it is extremely unfair that a Liberal should even seek to recognize a liquor man on the street.

The Journal comes out with a four-column, three-tier headline charging the Liberals with debauching the electors during the elections. Now the Tories from past experience should have a fairly good working knowledge of the electorate and its little weaknesses, but surely it is rather unfortunate at the present juncture for the local Tory organ to come out and

proclaim in big type that the southern electors were debauched. What the Matson press may have to say of the Liberals is never taken seriously, but we must protest against such a slur being cast upon the people of the south. The debauchery, at that, must have been of a wholesale character since over four thousand were debauched in Vancouver and nearly twenty-five hundred in Victoria. Perhaps, however, we should deduct the Tories who voted Grit from these figures, as it is beyond all possibility that they could have been debauched.

After all the charges of Mr. Miller, who is by way of being a kind of a Conservative wing leader himself, have been disposed of by Mr. Brewster, the Tories will have plenty of time to find out still more excuses for the landslides. Just in passing, however, it might be well to remark that the she-bear which did such a healthy business on election day in Victoria was not run by the Liberals, and was closed only when the supporters of Mr. Brewster appealed to the police. The fact of the matter is that Mr. Miller and his friends imagine that they will look at least a little whiter if they can manage to throw some mud on the opposition.

The Journal thinks it is illogical for the Liberals to ask for a dissolution when half of the people of the province have signified their desire for a new government. The premier's attempt to continue legislating when the country has already given him notice to quit can hardly be termed logical, to put it mildly.

Ernest Miller, the member for Grand Forks, seems to be particularly bitter at Mr. Brewster, however, it may be some consolation to the Liberal leader to observe that the Grand Forks representative is just as sore at Bowser. That prohibition declaration of Bowser's seems to have hit poor Ernest very hard indeed.

The Liberal leader must be some artist in vote-getting when he can collar both the liquor vote and the prohibition vote at the same time.

Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty
(30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to pur-
chase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of
further sinking fund.

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt
payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present
authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the
ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund de-
bentures to Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds or changing the
term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of
bonds or temporary notes.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present
throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of
the questions which are considered by those who contem-
plate entering the Service. The following is a list of perti-
nent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war
and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will
be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this
you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Govern-
ment.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every
month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20
(also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to com-
fortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund
will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will
be cared for by the Government and your pay continued
until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an
allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of
your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die
while on Active Service? The Government will provide an
adequate pension, that will enable the family to live com-
fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be
her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

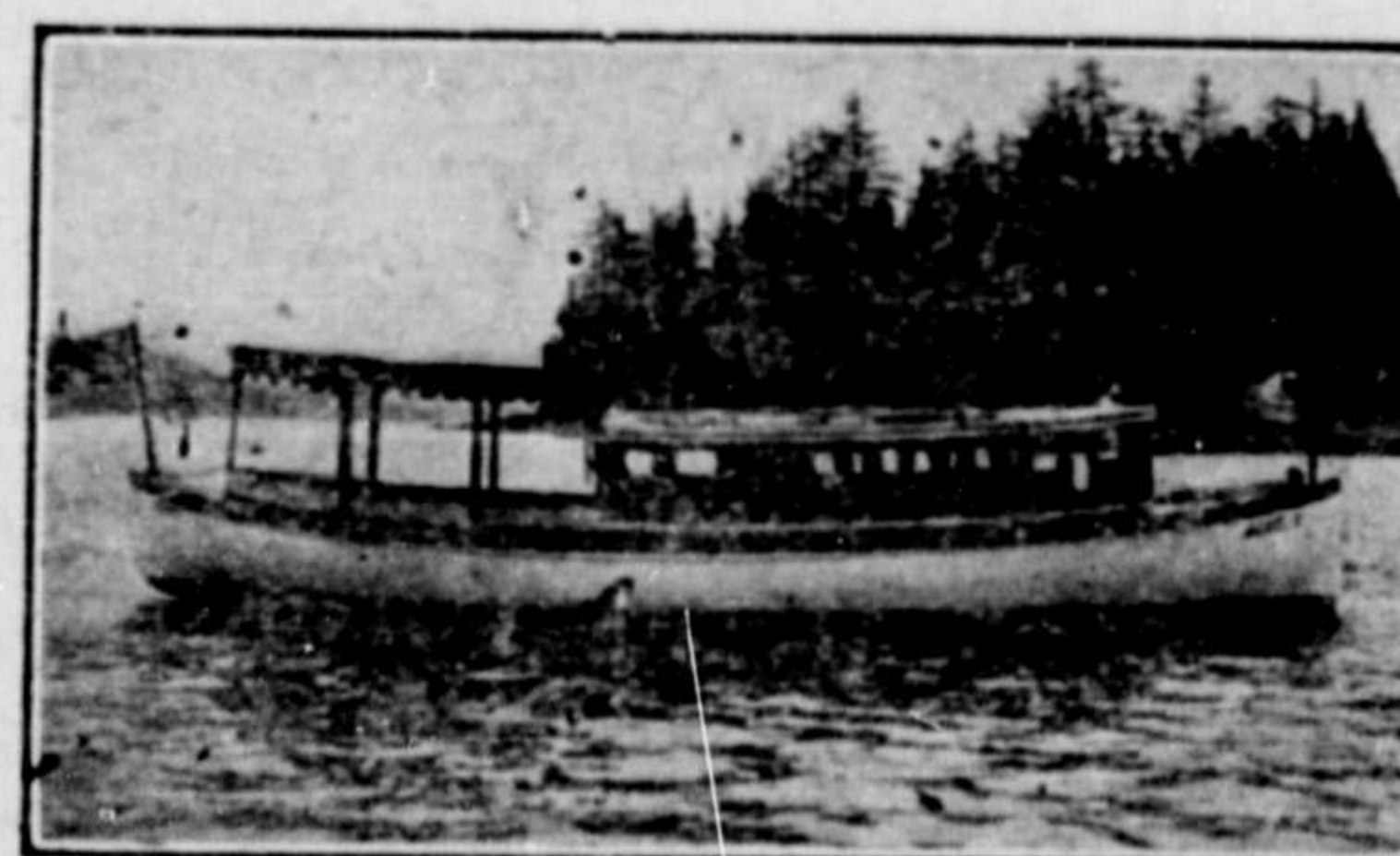
