LAST GERMAN EFFORT AGAINST VERDUN

FRENCH RECAPTURE LOST TRENCHES — DIRECTOR SKIPPER FOOLS SUBMARINE

THIRD AND LAST GERMAN EFFORT AGAINST VERDUN

Germans Mowed down by Concealed French Batteries—French Confident of Victory—Trenches Retaken.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 15.—What is thought to be the third and last effort to capture Verdun begun. The attack lacks the violence of the previous efforts and France is more than confident as to the result. The weak spots in the French line have been filled with fresh troops.

Germans Mowed Down.

The first divisions of the German infantry, on debouching from a wood, were mowed down by concealed French batteries. The fighting lasted for only four hours and a renewal is expected tonight.

Trenches Retaken.

The French have recaptured nearly all of the trenches lost in the attack upon Hill 165. It is believed that this new move of the Germans will cost them three hundred thousand men.

Paris, March 15.—Turkey will leave every other military operation in an endeavor to stem the advance of the Russians which up to the present is unchecked.

The Turkish campaign in Thrace and Mesopotamia have been abandoned. The rumor that Enver Pasha, the leader of the Young Turks, has been assassinated has been revived.

Austria and Portugal.

London, March 15.—Austria has declared war upon Portugal.

Ottawa, March 15.—Senator Mason urges that registration of all who are eligible for military service be proceeded with in Canada on the Lord Derby plan.

FUNERAL SERVICES OF LATE JOHN M. LYNCH

Mr. William P. Lynch returned from Hazelton on last night's train, bringing with him the remains of his brother, Mr. John M. Lynch, whose sudden death on Friday at Hazelton hospital came as a great shock to the community. Mrs. Lynch, the widow of the deceased, accompanied her brother-in-law here.

The funeral services were conducted in Hayner's Chapel at 2:30 this afternoon, when a large number of the friends of the deceased was present. The services were conducted by the Rev. Canon Rix, after which interment took place in Fairview Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. A. J. Prudhomme, Fred. Stork, Olier Besner, W. J. M. Sandels, Geo. J. Frizzell and T. McMeekin.

The late Mr. John Lynch, who carried on the Smithers branch of the business of Lynch Brothers for the past few years, was well known and very highly respected in Prince Rupert. Along with his brother, he was one of the pioneers of the north, having gone into the Yukon at the time of the gold rush there, afterwards continuing in partnership with Mr. W. P. Lynch in this city in the early days of railroad construction and also in the interior towns. Of a quiet retiring disposition, he was loved by all with whom he came in contact and the deepest sympathy of the whole district goes out to his widow and his brother in their bereavement.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

The Trades and Labor Council, at its regular meeting last night, discussed the action which it should take in regard to the forthcoming provincial election. The question of running an independent candidate was considered, but no final decision was reached.

The meeting did not wish it to be understood that, because of any action taken in the southern cities or because of the course pursued by Parker Williams, that the local labor body was allied with the Liberal party. The local body, on the contrary, claimed the right to take whatsoever course it thought expedient without affiliation with either of the parties.

A communication from Captain Freeman, of the Prince Rupert Motor-boat Association, was read, relative to the demand that small gasoline boats be allowed to operate with only one man in charge. The matter was referred to the Engineers' Union for report.

A resolution from R. A. Rigg, M. P. P. of Winnipeg, in regard to the fair wage clause in munitions contracts, was discussed, and it was agreed to co-operate with Winnipeg in the matter by submitting a resolution to the Minister of Labor asking him to endeavor to have this clause inserted in all munitions contracts.

DUMMY GUNS ON LINER FOOLED HUN SUBMARINE

Skipper of Harrison Liner Bluffs Submarine Commander with Sawn-off Derrick Spar Mounted as Guns.

New York, March 15.—Four dummy guns mounted on the stern of the Harrison liner Director saved her from a submarine attack. While two hundred miles off the coast of Ireland, a submarine appeared a couple of miles astern and chased and gained upon the liner.

The captain ordered a derrick spar to be brought from below and sawed off four lengths and mounted them in a conspicuous place.

When the supposed guns were observed by the submarine, she slackened speed and maneuvered that she might not present an easy target for the liner. To maintain the deception, the captain indicated by the movement of his vessel that he wanted to fight and the bluff succeeded, as the submarine submerged and disappeared.

The Director was well known on this coast, being one of the regular traders between Liverpool and Vancouver prior to the war.

PREMIER ASKS FOR EXTENSION OF PARLIAMENT

Bowser Promises only to Vote Supply if Brewster will Agree—Brewster Says Dissolve.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, March 15.—There was a sensation at the opening of the Legislature yesterday afternoon when Premier Bowser, under a promise to drop all contentious legislation, asked for the continuation of the life of parliament until June 1st.

Bowser urged that there is legal doubt as to the exact date when the term of the legislature expires and asked the leader of the opposition to agree to vote reasonable supply.

H. C. Brewster says that the term of the legislature is at an end now and asks for an immediate appeal to the people. The situation will come to a head today.

THE ISSUE

The local Tory organ describes Mr. Parker Williams and Mr. H. C. Brewster as the leaders of different wings of the Liberal party and twits the Socialist leader with being a convert to a type of Liberalism which can be put on or off at will. What the Tories and the Tory press either fail to see or are too arrogant to notice, is that it is not any particular type or variety of types of Liberalism, or any other 'ism which has brought about the downfall of the so-called Conservative party in this province, but simply a uniting of honest men of all shades of opinion and political creed in an endeavor to oust forever that thing which has for years been masquerading in the garb of government in British Columbia.

In returning Mr. Macdonald and Mr. Brewster to the house with overwhelming majorities, the people of Vancouver and Victoria signified much more than the fact that opposition was wanted. They plainly intimated that they believed the charges made by the Liberal candidates and by Mr. Parker Williams to be true and that they were perfectly satisfied that the province had been misgoverned most shamefully by the McBride-Bowser administration. The majorities were so large that they emphatically sounded the political death-knell of the premier and his colleagues.

That Bowser is perfectly well aware of this is evidenced by the fact that he dare not name a successor to the defeated Minister of Finance and risk another by-election. He knows, and every Tory in the province knows, that no representative of Bowserism could be elected in a straight fight in any single

constituency in the province. Knowing this, they know that the province is sick—very sick—of anything that sounds like the name of Bowser, and that the people, when given an opportunity, will return a Liberal government with an overwhelming majority in the house. Bowser is governing British Columbia today under false pretences and without the mandate of the people, and every day he remains in power is simply adding to the majority against him.

When the people in the south voted for Mr. Macdonald and Mr. Brewster, they did not vote for or against prohibition; ship building; workmen's compensation; credits to farmers; the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern or any other measure. They voted on one clear issue and one only, and that issue was Bowser. They declared most emphatically for no more of Bowser and his methods and if that gentleman, who, in his position as attorney-general, has repeatedly defied the law of the land, still continues to defy the people, so much the worse for Mr. Bowser.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Vancouver city was badly flooded last week during the sixty-hour rain. Prince Rupert sheds rain just like a duck's back sheds water.

The Germans are to make their final dash on the Verdun front within forty-eight hours. It comes about seventeen months too late to be of any real service to them.

The government is making frantic efforts to keep the lid on by countering the questions of the opposition with demands for a statement of the opposition's intentions.

Rupert and the province generally. I have today discussed this matter with the superintendent of education, and he intends to secure a report from the School inspector at Prince Rupert with a view to seeing what may be done in the matter.

Sir:—I am in receipt of your letter of the 7th inst., and regret very much indeed to learn of the serious accident which befell the son of Mr. A. H. McPherson recently in the Prince Rupert school. I may say in connection with this accident that for some years past this department has endeavored in building schoolhouses to confine the rooms exclusively to the first floor, largely because I am of the opinion that the danger to the children arising from fire is much lessened when the buildings consist of one storey only. In a two-storey building there will always be danger of accidents happening if the boys will persist in riding the bannisters. Even when the principal of the school gives the most stringent orders against the practice venturesome lads will always be found willing to take the risks.

I think it advisable, however, that a careful investigation into all the matters connected with the fatal accident to young McPherson should be held by this department, and I am today forwarding to Inspector Lord at Prince Rupert the communication from Mr. Macdonald, together with the petition signed by Mr. McPherson and many other residents of Prince Rupert, and am instructing him to hold a

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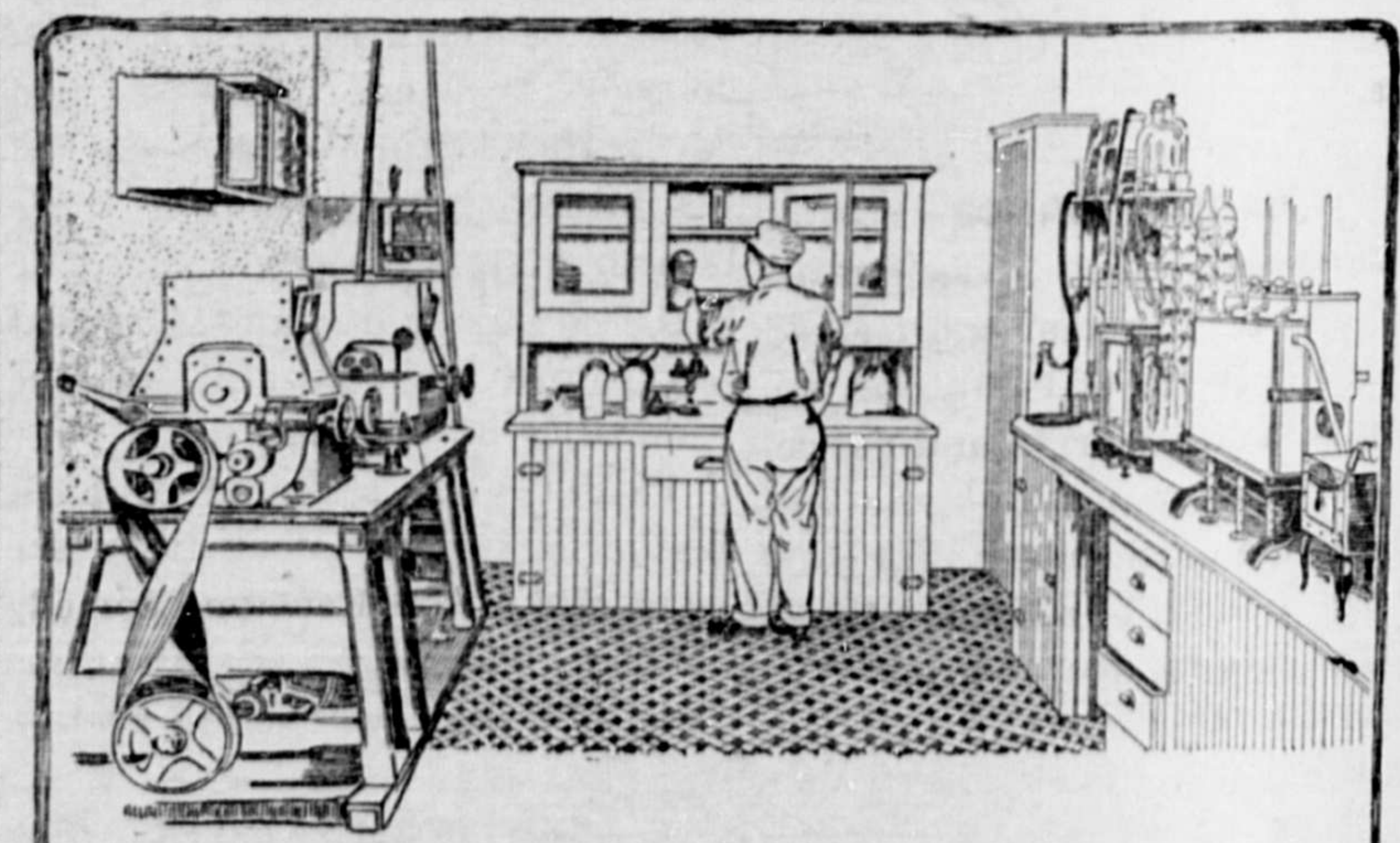

careful investigation into all the circumstances attending this unfortunate accident. I am also indicating to the inspector that it might be well for him to investigate the sanitary conditions of the schoolhouses at Prince Rupert in company with the sanitary inspector and the building inspector of your city.
You are aware I presume that the Board of School Trustees at Prince Rupert are responsible for the sanitary conditions of the schools under their charge and also for the safety of the children who attend these schools, but I have deemed it advisable that the inspector should, at his earliest possible convenience, look into these matters and furnish me with a report regarding them.

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for a term of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof;

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(6) To provide that securities to be issued under the following bylaws; under none of which any securities have as yet been issued, Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds may be issued and such bonds to be for the term here set forth, namely:

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund;

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
