ATTACK ON VERDUN NOW DWINDLING AWAY

ALLIED AIRMEN RAID KRUPP WORKS—DUTCH LINER TORPEDOED IN NORTH SEA

GERMAN ATTACK ON WEST FRONT NOW DWINDLING

No Weak Spots in French Line—All German Efforts to Break Through are Beaten Back.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 16.—The third great attempt to take Verdun has stopped. Attempts were made to break the French line at new points particularly at Le Mort D'Somme, but with no more success than the others. The attack of the enemy has dwindled down to a feeble artillery fire.

Charges Failed.

Many attempts to break through were made, but all were completely stopped by a heavy curtain of fire from the French guns. Three times the enemy charged but failed each time with big losses. They are apparently looking for weak spots in the line, but are able to find none.

THE CANADIAN SCOTTISH HAVE NEW PUBLICATION

Percy Godenrath has sent to The Daily News a copy of the first issue of the Brazier, the regimental journal of the 16th Canadian Scottish and the latest and best in the way of trench newspapers. Its first issue saw the light on the anniversary of the arrival of the Canadian Scottish in France—February 15th, and is full of newsy little items, sporting "dope," news of the trench "movie" shows, in fact everything but news of fighting. P. F. Godenrath is manager and the mechanical staff consists of Drummer A. R. McCreadie and Piper George Inglis, and The Brazier does those gentlemen much credit.

There are now no fewer than nine trench newspapers published by Canadian units, but The Brazier has the distinction of being the only sheet actually printed by boys serving in one of the regiments. One of the best things in the paper is an open letter to Johnny Cannuck by Mr. Godenrath in which, for the benefit of the boys at home, he describes winter life in the trenches.

MALASPINA GOES SOUTH

The fisheries patrol boat Malaspina came into port yesterday on her way south from the Alaskan fishing grounds. Captain Newcombe reports that this has been the roughest season he ever experienced on the coast, the fishing boats in the north encountering terrific gales and returning to port sheathed in ice. The Malaspina had a very dirty passage coming south.

TURK CAMPAIGN IS COLLAPSING ON EVERY HAND

Reinforcements Arrive too Late to be of use—Dutch Liner Torpedoed—French Ship Escapes.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 16.—Reports from Petrograd state that the Russians in Mesopotamia have so far been virtually co-operating with the British forces in Persia. The Turks were reinforced too late to be of any use and are now in full flight. The whole campaign is collapsing.

Submarine Warfare.

The big Dutch liner Tubantia with nine hundred passengers on board is in a sinking condition in the North Sea through being torpedoed by a German submarine. The liner was bound for Buenos Ayres and was torpedoed without any warning being given. The passengers have been taken off.

Despatches from New York state that the French steamer Patris while in the Mediterranean was missed by twenty feet by a torpedo. The vessel had twenty Americans on board and no warning was given. She was unarmed. Washington is busy making investigations.

RED ROSE PROPERTY OPENING UP WELL

The Red Rose mine, on Rocher de Boule mountain, which is being developed by a company of which "Bill" McAdams, the Edmonton newspaper man, is the head, is opening up in splendid shape and Mr. McAdams is confident that it will prove to be a big shipper.

B. B. KELLIHER PASSED THROUGH THIS MORNING

Mr. B. B. Kelliher, chief engineer of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad, arrived from the south this morning, accompanied by Mrs. Kelliher. They left for the east on the train.

CRITICAL STAGE OF VERDUN FIGHT OVER

London, March 15.—A French officer states that the dead Germans around Verdun are piled 25 feet high. The same officer states that the French staff considers that the critical stage of the great battle is past.

Neutrals who have been residents in Germany for five years are being called upon for military service.

Turks and Bulgars.

The Turks and Bulgarians are anxious for peace and are anxiously watching developments around Verdun.

Dutch Liner Sunk.

Having struck a mine or been hit by a torpedo, the big Dutch steamer Turbantia is disabled and is in a sinking condition. All the passengers have been taken off. Dutch torpedo boats have been rushed to the scene of the disaster.

PROMISING PROPERTY

O. W. James, of Smithers, reports that he and his partners have struck a five-foot vein of silver-lead ore which runs about \$30 to the ton, in the Owen Lake country. The ore body has been stripped for about sixty to seventy feet and holds great promise all the way. The property is about twenty miles from the railroad and should it come up to expectations, the ore should be easily handled.

SCHOONER WRECKED DURING SNOWSTORM

About two o'clock this afternoon a phone message was received from Metlakatlah stating that a Seattle schooner had been wrecked on Rachel Rocks about fifteen miles from here. The schooner was on her way from Seattle to Ketchikan when she struck in a blinding snowstorm. One of the crew rowed to Metlakatlah in a small boat and sent in a call to Prince Rupert for assistance.

Provincial Chief of Police and Mr. J. H. McLeod at once proceeded to make arrangements for a boat to put out to her assistance.

FISHERMEN'S STRIKE HAS BEEN SETTLED

Communications from Seattle state that the fishermen's dispute with the boat owners is over and that the men will proceed to sign up today. The details of the settlement are not yet known, but it is supposed that a compromise has been effected.

KRUPP'S SHEDS DESTROYED BY OUR AVIATORS

Report of Several Successful Air Raids by the Allies—Derby List is Now Being Revised.

Amsterdam, March 16.—Allied aviators raided the Krupp gun shops at Essen yesterday and destroyed six sheds. Essen is one hundred and seventy miles north of Verdun.

Other aviators raided Munich and Gladbach in Bavaria. London neither confirms nor denies the report but there was great rejoicing in the metropolis over the account of the raid.

Revision of Derby List.

London, March 16.—The calling of the second group of married men who attested under the Derby scheme has been delayed indefinitely. The war office will first revise the starred list of single men. It has always been contended that there were far too many exemptions amongst the single men on the list and the revision will likely result in many of these being put on the active service list.

The following is an extract from an interesting letter on the question of increased freight rates by Dr. Head in the Railway Age Gazette.

"Neither the farmer, stockman, wool grower, manufacturer, wholesaler, jobber, distributor nor retailer pays the freight; it is the ultimate consumer who pays every cent of cost there is in anything he uses. When I bought the suit of clothes I am wearing I paid the cost of production, including the wool grower, the cotton planter, the broker, the manufacturer, the jobber or wholesaler, the retail merchant who sold it to me, and the freight and when we build a house we pay for every expense attached to it, and the freight on all the material used; and not the saw-mill man, the iron manufacturer or the local retailer who sold the material. We have to charge to the renter a sufficient rent to earn the proper interest on the investment and it seems to me that I am the man to 'kick' on increased freight rates, if they are so burdensome.

"I figured out about what my freight bill was each year on everything my family and myself use, and it amounted to about eleven dollars a year, and to grant the railroads an increase of 10 per cent. on present rates would not cost me over 50 cents a year, or the price of four good cigars or four bottles of beer, which the average man would buy for his friends and never think of. Nor would the solicitous politician who is trying to shield the dear public from the extortions of railroads and big corporations or alleged trusts. I take the position that I can far better afford to pay this increase of 10 per cent. or 15

per cent. with the attendant prosperity it would bring to the country, and the very great increase in my business and income, than I can pay the present rates under present conditions.

"It is my belief that if the railroads were in a prosperous condition we would have more business than ever before in the history of the country, and it also occurs to me that as the above mentioned protestors would do so much more business, with the same overhead charges, they should welcome an increase in freight rates.

"I am perfectly willing for the railroads to earn as much money on their investment as the banks of the country are doing. Why permit the banks to make from 20 to 40 per cent. a year on their capital invested and restrict the railroads to 6 or 8 per cent, and then not let them earn that? The patrons of the banks are paying those earnings, just the same as the patrons of the railroads are.

"The public pays the earnings on all capital, whether invested in banks or trust companies, industrial corporations or mining; so why restrict the railroads to starvation returns? They are certainly of far greater value to the country than the banks; they have more money invested, employ more people, and are the largest purchasers of material of any business in the world. They are more necessary to the very life of business than any other thing or agency, for they occupy the same relation to business and commerce as our arteries and veins do to our bodies, they carry the life-sustaining forces from one part to the other, and who would think of trying to cut off the circulation from any part of his body or impair its cir-

ulation in any way? If anything got the matter with it, we would go to the best doctor we could find to have it remedied at any cost."

The board of license commissioners met yesterday afternoon at an adjourned meeting. Ald. Nelson acted as chairman in the absence of the mayor, and Ald. Smith and John Viereck were present. The chief of police reported that the various licensed premises were complying with the law.

There were no complaints that the hotels were violating the selling law, the only question raised being that the fronts of the bars might not be strictly in accord with the regulations.

The subject of relieving the hotels of the keeping up of dining rooms, which were a burden, was discussed. It was pointed out that this had been done in Vancouver and it was suggested that it would help out the restaurants.

The chairman said that he would prefer that the matter be left over until the return of the mayor. It was decided to postpone the discussion of the question.

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof:

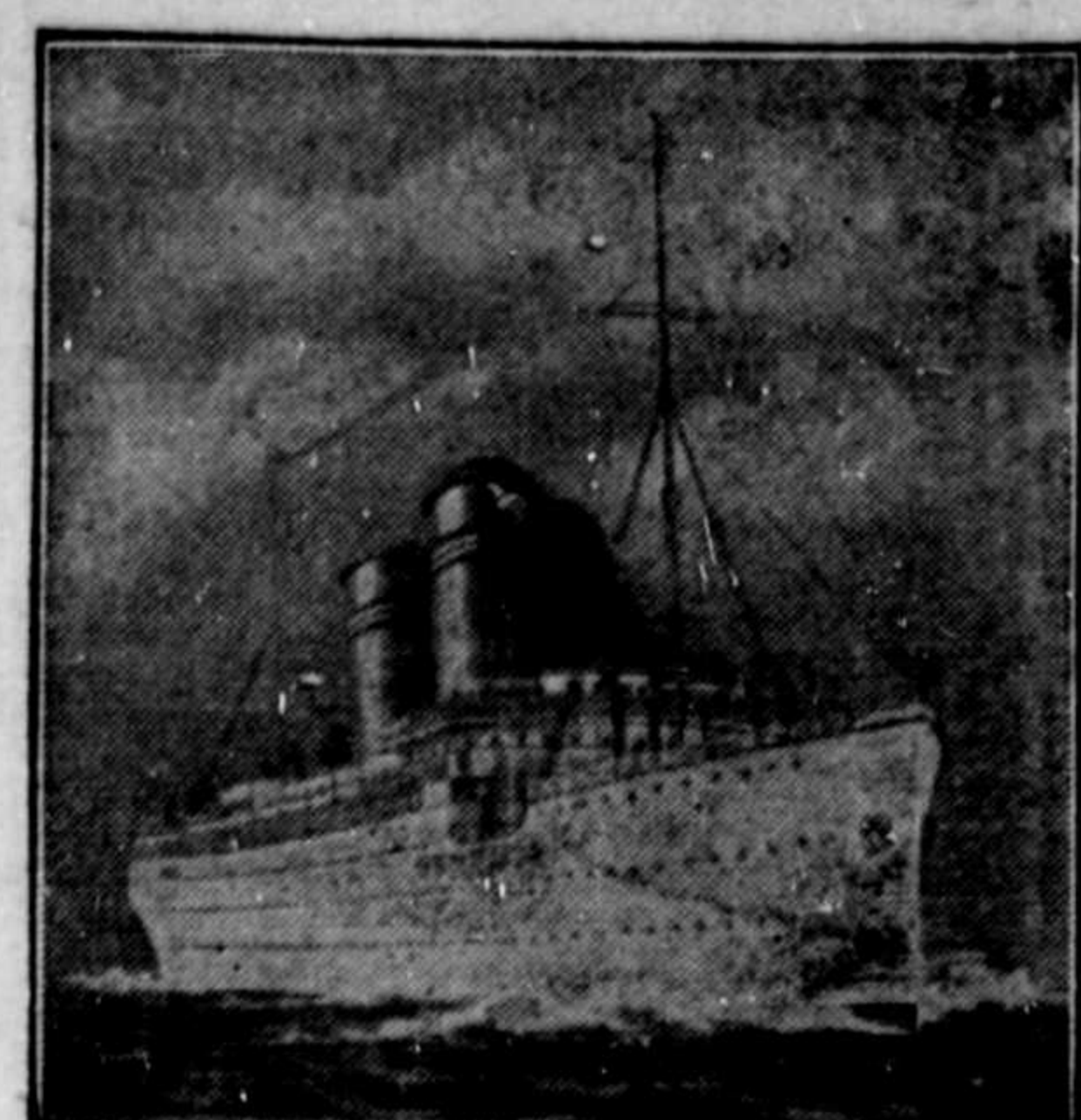

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

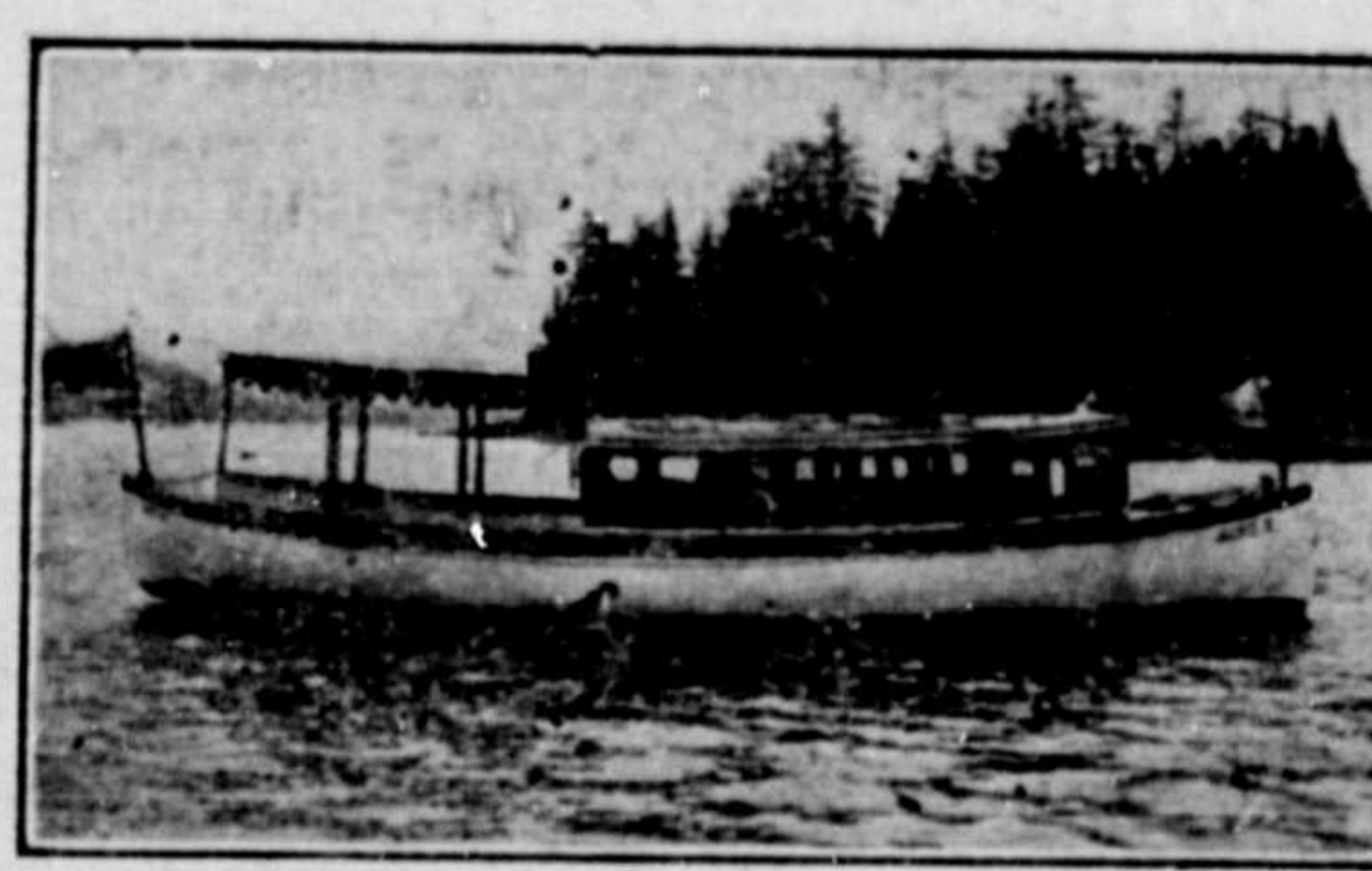
