MATSON ON STAND IN SONGHEES ENQUIRY

CASH PAYMENTS AND NO TRACK KEPT—LIBERALS MEMORIALISE APPEAL COURT

MATSON KEPT NO TRACK OF MONEY HE SQUANDERED

Joe Paid Everything but one Payment in Cash and kept no Accounts—Enquiry is Proceeding.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, March 17.—J. S. H. Matson was on the stand yesterday before the public accounts committee in the enquiry into the Songhees Reserve deal. In reply to questions, he stated that he had given over \$50,000 of the \$75,000 commission, which he received, to various Indians and to their adviser, Harry Helmcken, K. C., in order to get the deal put through.

The payments were made in cash and he had kept no records of the amounts nor of the persons to whom payments were made, except a cheque for \$22,620 which he paid to Chief Cooper. Mr. Helmcken also received \$30,000 from the government in the legislature.

HUN ASSAULTS REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSSES

Germans Make Five Futile Night Attacks—French Minister of War Resigns—Brazil Seizes Ships.

Paris, March 17.—Five important assaults were made by the Germans on the French lines east of Verdun last night, and all were repulsed, the Germans suffering heavy losses.

French Minister Resigns.

General Gallieni, the French minister of war, has resigned, owing to ill-health, and will be succeeded by General Charles Roque. Gallieni, who was of advanced age, lost an arm during the Franco-Prussian war.

Brazil Seizes Ships.

London, March 17.—Brazil has seized fourteen German ships were interned at Rio de Janeiro.

SIX MEN DROWNED AT RACHEL ISLAND

The boat which was reported wrecked off the coast yesterday afternoon, turned out to be the Alpha, a tender belonging to the Pacific American Fisheries. It is feared that John Christiansen, who made Metlakatlah in one of the ship's boats, is the sole survivor of the crew of seven. Chief Gammon set out for the scene of the wreck immediately on receipt of the news, but no trace could be found of the vessel or the men. The Indians had also cruised around in the vicinity for hours with a like result.

The Alpha, which left Bellingham on Sunday for the cannery at Sturgeon Inlet, about 400 miles north of Ketchikan, was struck by a very heavy sea near Rachel Island yesterday morning. The engine room was flooded and the vessel was never able to right herself, gradually going down by the stern. Christiansen, who was supplied with clothes by Mr. C. G. Perry, the Indian agent at Metlakatlah, is now in town and seems none the worse for his trying experience. He states that Captain Miller, who is a well known navigator on this coast and a native of South Bend, Wash., the engineer and he were on deck at the time of the accident and he and the captain managed to cut loose one of the boats. The boat was upturned and they clung to its keel. Captain Miller, who had on a life-belt, suffered so much from the cold that he decided to swim to Rachel Island, a short distance away.

Christiansen ultimately got the boat righted and turned her head to the seas. The engineer disappeared shortly after the ship foundered, while the other members of the crew went down with the ship. The sea was so heavy that it was impossible for him to carry out any rescue work in a water-logged fourteen-foot boat. Standing in the boat, which was half full of water, he paddled to Rachel Island, where he beached

SPECTACULAR FIRE IN VANCOUVER HAY SHEDS

Vancouver, March 17.—The hay sheds of the Rupert, Ross Hay Company on Main Street were destroyed last night. The stock of 2,800 bales of hay and five carloads of straw made a spectacular blaze, the reflection of which was visible for miles. The loss is estimated at \$10,000.

LIBERALS WILL MEMORIALISE APPEAL COURT

Legislation Since March 14th May be Void—Maguire Says the Liberals are in League With Liquor Men.

Victoria, March 17.—The Liberals will memorialise the Court of Appeal asking that it settle the constitutional question as to whether the term of the legislature expired at midnight on March 14th. Otherwise, all legislation enacted by the house since that time may be declared void.

Prohibition.

Dr. Maguire, member for Vancouver and formerly organiser for the Prohibition party of British Columbia, suggested, in a speech in the legislature yesterday, that the Liberals were in league with the liquor men to defeat the Prohibition Bill when it comes before the house.

W. R. McLean, member for Nelson, said that he was opposed to prohibition unless compensation was allowed to the hotel keepers.

KAISER WANTS GERMAN FLEET TO SALLY FORTH

Von Tirpitz Differs with Kaiser and Resigns—Bethmann-Hollweg's Resignation expected—Dutch are Angry.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 17.—The resignation of Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg is expected to follow that of Admiral Von Tirpitz. The resignation of the German Grand Admiral is due to the fact that he is opposed to the bringing out of the German fleet from the Kiel Canal. The Kaiser desires a North Sea fight.

Dutch Angry.

The Hague, March 17.—The officers of the Dutch liner Tubantia, which was torpedoed yesterday off the Noorhinder light-house, reported to the ministry of marine that the vessel was torpedoed without warning from the submarine. Four persons are missing.

The Tubantia was the newest and finest vessel sailing under the Dutch flag and profound anger has been aroused in Holland over the torpedoing of her.

REINFORCEMENTS

The Conservatives have been in a bad plight ever since February 26th, but at last they think they see daylight coming through. On being reminded by the opposition leader that the term of the legislature expired on March 14th, the premier discovered a legal doubt about the matter, but, just to make certain, he brought in a bill prolonging the life of the present parliament until the first of June. This was done ostensibly to allow the Liberals to have a full enquiry into the many little eccentric movements of the government, but really to allow Bowser to make one last bid for a return to office.

Up to February 26th, Bowser thought that the Tory machine was in good enough shape to take him along comfortably. However, he received a rude shock in Vancouver when he discovered that the machine was getting a little frayed and worn out, and, in fact, was not any longer a vehicle but simply a mixed up mess of shafts and cranks. In an effort to regain his lost hold of the situation, he enlisted the services of a fleet to try and take Victoria. This also failed. Now, as a last spasm, he is to enlist an army to try and carry the positions. The fact that that army is at present in Europe and doesn't care a straw whether Bowser is in power or in jail, so long as it gets a chance to help lick the Kaiser, does not matter.

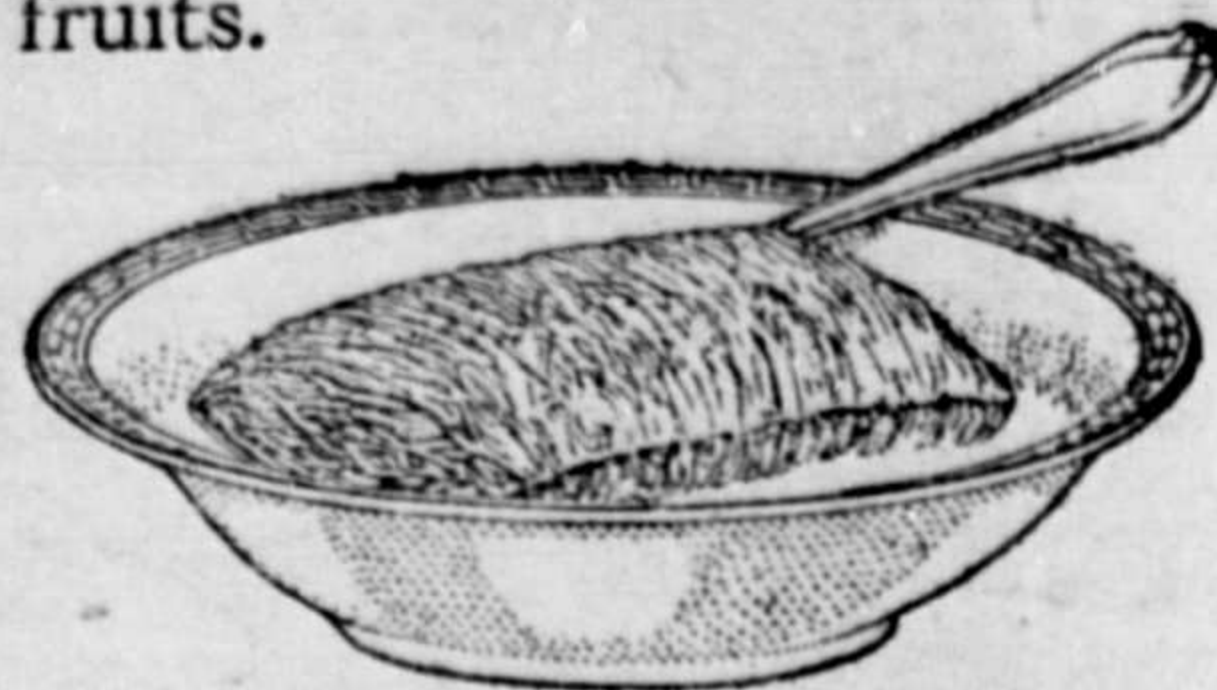
People of the province have shown a most extraordinary distaste for Bowser as premier, but, as is the determined way of this gentleman, he knows what is good for the people and they must have it whether

they want it or no. In order to make certain of the result, reinforcements of trained troops are to be called in. Bill always has had a weakness for the military and has found them useful in the past in backing up his arguments, as the miners of Nanaimo can testify. However, he will probably find that the British Columbia boys in Europe have recollections of just how things were in the province when they left it, and a vote taken at Shorncliffe would undoubtedly give a huge majority against the government.

Of course there are other sides to this question. For instance, ballot boxes have been known to disappear in the past, while others have been changed. If you want any information about ballot boxes, kindly apply to "Ballot Box" Bill, who is a member of the present cabinet. Bill doesn't like the name some folks gave him some years ago, but if you whisper it in his vicinity he will know to whom you refer. Accidents happen in the best regulated families or governments, and, though the Bowser bunch are not quite so well regulated as they once were, accidents are liable to happen again.

Taking the matter a little more seriously, it is well to notice that the Elections Act expressly states that the term of the house dates from the return of the first writs. This is stated very clearly, and it is just as clear that the first writs of the last election were returned on March 14th, 1912, therefore the present government automatically came to an end some three days ago, and any legislation it may pass now must carry with it a legal doubt. Even if there is a legal doubt, there is no moral doubt

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
