HORRIBLE MASSACRE OF SERBIAN WOMEN

CROWN PRINCE AGAIN FOILED—RUSSIANS CONTROL ASIA TO PERSIAN GULF

FIENDISH WORK BY BULGARIANS AND AUSTRIANS

Women and Children Slaughtered
in Thousands in Serbia—The
Russians Control Asia to
the Persian Gulf.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 22.—The Allied governments are in possession of evidence of horrible massacres by the Austrians and Bulgarians in Serbia, which exceeded in brutality the Armenian massacres by the Turks. There are 700,000 victims, whole districts having been depopulated by the machine gun fire and bayonet work of the enemy.

Three thousand women and children refugees, who were seeking safety in a Belgrade church, were locked in and suffocated by gas bombs.

Russian Control

The complete control of Persia, Armenia and Mesopotamia by the Russians is assured. A new Russian army is now moving towards the Persian Gulf and will advance to the relief of General Townshend at Kut-el-Amara, after which the joint armies will carry out an attack upon Bagdad.

It is reported that Villa is in possession of the oil fields south of Tampico and that he is demanding a ransom of two million pesos in order to prevent their complete destruction.

ONTARIO CONSIDERS A PROHIBITION BILL

Toronto, March 22.—The Ontario government is today discussing the first reading of its prohibition bill. The bill is a war measure and becomes effective on September 1st this year.

The government will take a referendum on the continuance of prohibition at the close of the war.

Dr. Kergin has received word that his brother, Dr. L. W. Kergin, sailed for England on the Metagami from St. John on March 11th. There were twelve doctors on board and 1,200 men. The Metagami will by this time have landed her troops in England.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE BILL INTRODUCED YESTERDAY

Victoria, March 22.—Mr. Place, member for Nanaimo, introduced in the legislature yesterday a Woman Suffrage Bill, which will become effective on June 1st of this year, if passed.

Mr. Parker Williams, member for Ladysmith, gave notice of a bill to prevent the importation of laborers into the province.

Mr. L. W. Shatford, in a speech to the address, advocated the assisting of prospectors by giving them a free government assay.

THEO. COLLART WOUNDED BY A SHELL SPLINTER

Joe Collart has received a postcard from his brother Theo., from a military hospital at La Panne in France. Theo. was wounded in the head by a splinter of shell from a big gun, but is now doing well and expects to be on duty again shortly.

PRINCE GEORGE BOYS ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

Lieut. J. C. Halsey arrived from Prince George last evening with fifty-five stalwarts comprising the interior contingent of the 102nd Battalion. The men were taken right aboard the Prince John for Comox, where they will link up with the rest of the Battalion. They were a strapping body of men, quite a number of them showing South African ribbons.

Recruiting Sergeant Charles Youngman sent two recruits along with the contingent, one of these being Corporal Charles Higgs of the American army who recently received his discharge at Haines, Alaska. Corporal Higgs made a striking figure in his smart uniform. He is a British subject, having been born and raised at Bloemfontein, the capital of the Orange Free State, formerly a Boer colony in South Africa.

Hugh Dunn has received a letter from Jack Edwards stating that his regiment was under orders to proceed to France in twelve hours, and by this time Jack will have received his baptism of fire. CROWN PRINCE AGAIN FOILED BY THE FRENCH

No Infantry Attacks upon Verdun
Last Night—New Move De-
feated—Heavy Losses
at Zeebrugge.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 22.—There were no infantry attacks upon Verdun last night, the fighting being confined to artillery work at Malancourt and east of the river Meuse.

The German Crown Prince's effort to apply a nut-cracker squeeze on a narrow sector ten miles north of Verdun has failed.

The German force which was advancing east of the Meuse was met by a withering fire from the French artillery and driven back.

Zeebrugge Raid.

Amsterdam, March 22.—Two hundred were killed and three hundred and fifty injured in the Allied air raid on Zeebrugge on Monday, from which the Allied aviators returned safely.

CONSTITUTIONAL RULE

The Victoria Colonist devotes a column to the instruction of the Lieutenant-Governor, and all whom it may concern, in the elements of constitutional government. In dealing with the point that the representative of the Crown must be guided by the advice of his responsible ministers and "must be deaf, dumb and blind as to what appears in the newspapers," the Colonist says "It is an elementary proposition in constitutional government that the legislature represents the will of the people, and it is, constitutionally, the only guide to His Majesty. By-elections do not cut any figure, and the Lieutenant-Governor must not take into consideration what Vancouver or Victoria may say, so long as the administration is sustained by a substantial majority in the house."

This may be strictly constitutional and quite all right, so long as the administration represents the will of the people, but, in British Columbia today, we have the spectacle of a premier who has had two cabinet ministers turned down by huge majorities, as a result of which he has been obliged to give the portfolio of public works to a member of the cabinet in order to keep the people from again expressing their wishes. He has been obliged to carry on the government of the province without any minister of finance because he knows that the people will turn down any minister he may put up.

Bowser, by his actions, has clearly shown that he knows that his majority in the house is not a sign that he represents the will of the people, and his refusal to give the people a

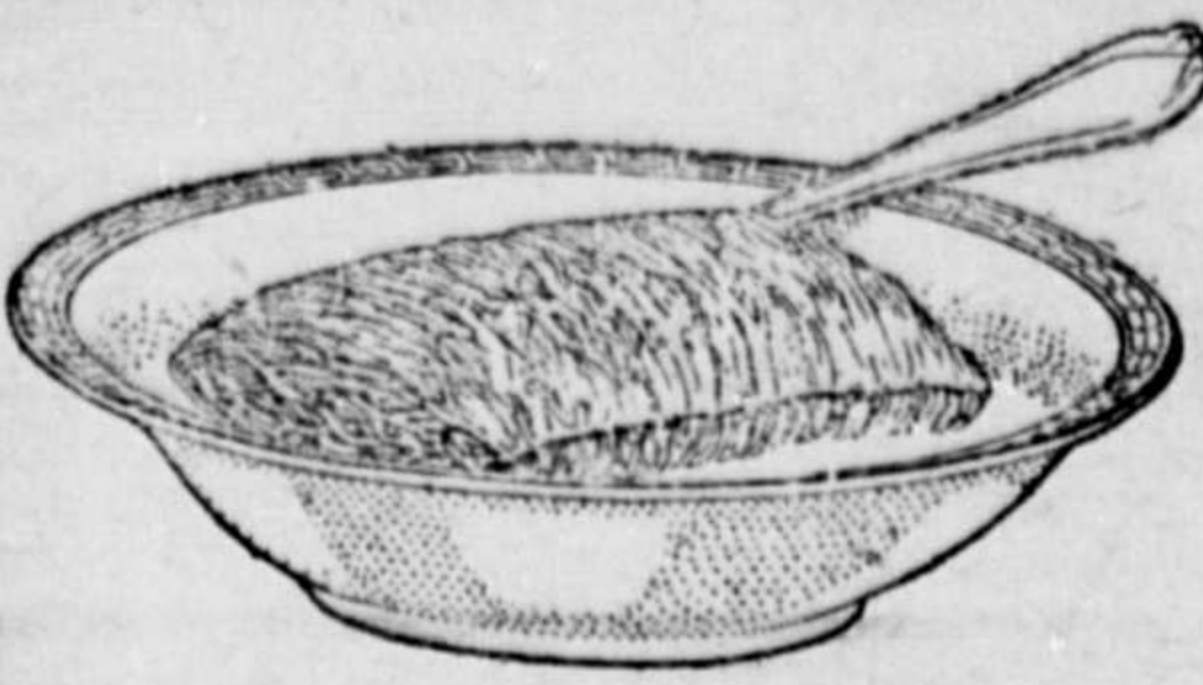
minister of finance is clear proof that he knows that he is legislating against the will of the people. As an elementary proposition in common sense, the legislature today is holding office under false pretences and Bowser is in the position of an absolute monarch who refuses to give the people a voice in the government of the country. It may be unconstitutional for the Lieutenant-Governor to dismiss him, but if the constitution allows any man to become a dictator as to what the people shall have in the way of government it is time that the constitution was changed. Bowser may be acting constitutionally, but the people may be depended upon to rend the constitution to shreds if it stands between them and truly representative government. Evidently, according to the Conservative interpretation of the constitution, Bowser is Czar of British Columbia, instead of a servant of the people.

Just in passing it may be well to remind the Colonist that the Roblin government in Manitoba refused to have a commission appointed to enquire into the graft scandals and that the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba took the matter into his own hands. In this case we suppose that the Colonist would insist that the governor acted unconstitutionally, and that the Roblin bunch should still be misruling Manitoba, according to the constitution.

AUSTRALIA BUILDING HER OWN SUBMARINES

Australia is to undertake, as soon as possible, the building of submarines in its own shipyards. The Commonwealth Navy Office is calling for qualified persons desirous of proceeding to England to undergo a course of instruction in submarine building. Applicants required are ship draftsman, engineer draftsman, with a good knowledge of Diesel and similar engines, electrical draftsman, and one ship, one engine, and one electrical fitter. Applicants must be Australian born or permanently domiciled in Australia. The salary offered is \$1,250 per annum, with a separation allowance of \$5.00 a week to married officers. Those selected will be required to enter into an undertaking to serve the Commonwealth Government for a period of at least five years after their return to Australia. Candidates selected will come to Great Britain and work in the Admiralty shipyards to learn the methods of construction. They will take a two years' course, afterwards returning to begin the work of submarine construction for the Australian Navy.—Scotsman.

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

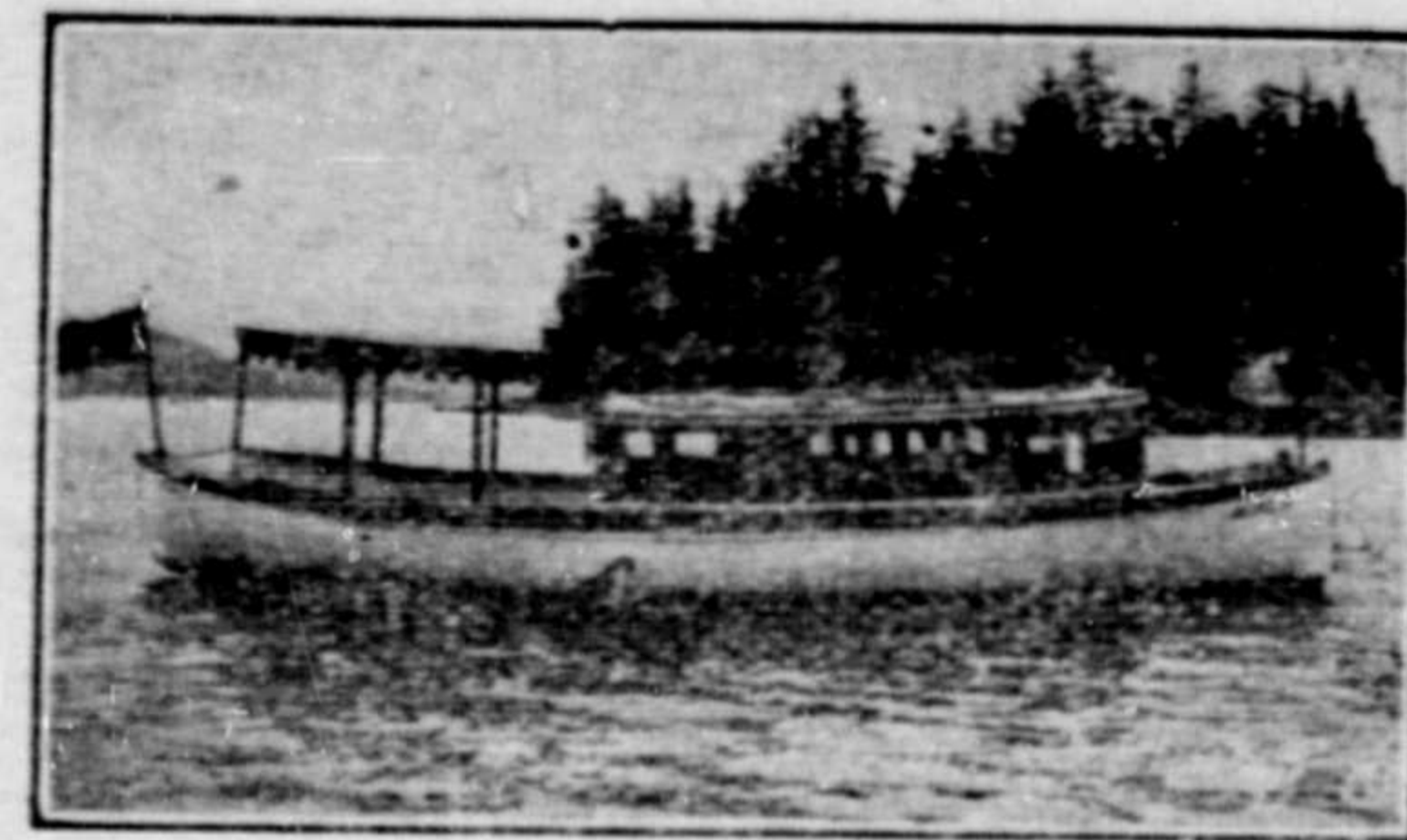
