GERMANS MAKE FIFTH DRIVE ON VERDUN

FRENCH CONFIDENT OF FINAL OUTCOME -- GOODWIN LIGHTSHIP TORPEDOED

GERMANS MAKE ANOTHER DRIVE AGAINST VERDUN

Huns Utterly Disregard Loss of Life in Fifth Drive—French Express Confidence—German Gain means Little.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 23.—The fifth and final drive of the Germans north of Verdun has begun. There has been a violent bombardment east of the Meuse by the army of the Crown Prince, followed by the storming and capturing of the French positions on Haicourt Hill in a flanking movement against Deadman's Hill to cut the Paris-Verdun railroad.

Disregard of Life.

The enemy assaults were made with an utter disregard of human life and resulted in an advance of a mile on a mile and a third front.

Kaiser There.

Berlin announces that the Kaiser has returned to Verdun to witness the final assault on the fortress.

French Confident.

The French military critics are confident of the outcome and state that the advance by the Germans cannot prove of any advantage unless it ends with the capture of the hills dominating Avoncourt wood.

An attempt by German infantry to debouch from Avoncourt was repulsed by the French artillery with heavy losses.

M. Clemenceau, the new minister of war, announces that the French are justified in believing that success to their arms is assured at Verdun.

FISHERMEN'S STRIKE

The latest development in the fishermen's strike is that the skippers and engineers of the tied up boats are going to put to sea and carry on fishing with the long line hauler instead of with the dories as formerly, thus doing away with the need for so many men in the crew. Of course this will mean a smaller number of boats in the business than were formerly on the banks, but it will keep the market supplied with a fair amount of fish and the extra price obtained will make fishing well worth while.

NEWS OF SHACKLETON IS NOW LOOKED FOR

News is shortly expected from Sir Ernest Shackleton, who, it will be remembered, set out in November, 1914, to cross the south polar continent from Weddell Sea to Ross Sea, a distance of 4,700 miles. The last communication received from the expedition was when Shackleton's ship, the Endurance, left South Georgia, the whaling station in the extreme south, for the ice region.

DUNNIGAN WAS MEMBER OF AUTO GANG OF THUGS

Ring of Automobile Bandits Responsible for Many Robberies and Three Murders in Coast Cities.

(Special to The Daily News.)

San Francisco, March 23.—Howard Dunnigan, the son of a prominent Supreme Court official in Maryland, who was wounded in a revolver duel following upon an attempt to hold up a cafe, has confessed that he took part in the operations of the automobile bandit ring which perpetrated eleven robberies and three murders in Pacific coast cities.

The victims were Constable Frederick Cook, who was murdered at Los Angeles on November 24th, after Cook had killed Harry Wilson, one of the bandits; Constable Lawrence Kost, who was killed during the robbery of a Seattle drug store, and James M. Shade, of San Francisco, whose home was robbed on Christmas Eve by the gang.

MOVEMENT TO CALL A TORY CONVENTION

Victoria, March 19.—There is a movement afoot for the calling of a convention for the reorganization of the Conservative party in British Columbia. Through the agency of William Blakemore, the proprietor of The Week, a government organ, letters have gone out to prominent Conservatives asking their opinion on the question.

The premier fears what a convention may do, as it is admitted that the party could not be reorganized with Bowser as an influence. His influence is dead except among some old timers who are dyed with the same stripe. Even the members of the legislative assembly, the ministers and the men who are on the old patronage list, are disgruntled, disorganized and discouraged. Offers are to be made to placate the independents who openly announce that they are no longer of the Bowser crowd. The movement has gone so far that the men who still cling to the premier are known as "Bowser Conservatives." Of course, the old crowd, in the event of the call for a convention becoming popular, are ready to pack it with supporters of the administration.

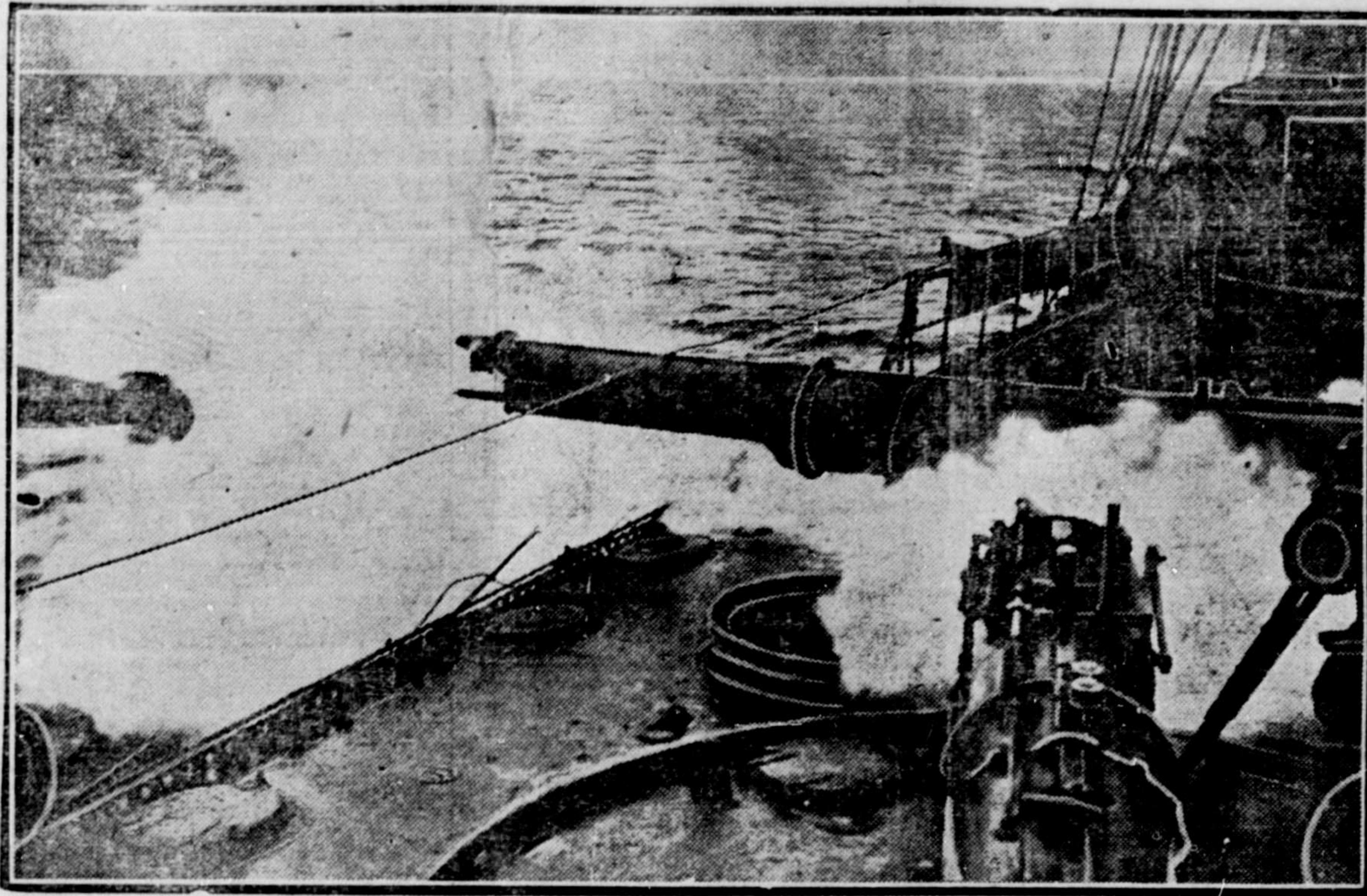

GEORGE FAWCETT AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

"The Majesty of the Law," the five-act feature at the Westholme, in which George Fawcett plays a striking part as Judge Kent, is the story of a young man whose sense of honor is so high that he is twice condemned as a thief, while on each occasion he is perfectly innocent, though to all appearance the guilty man.

In the first instance he is driven from home, in shielding the brother of his sweetheart, and, in the second, under an assumed name, he is brought before his own father for sentence. Of course the real cause of the trouble turns up and saves the situation but the old judge has already sentenced his own son to ten years. The climax is intensely dramatic.

PRINCE RUPERT BILL DISCUSSED IN SOUTH

The southern papers devote quite a deal of space to the Prince Rupert private bill and go into the financial history of the city, pointing out the great saving which will be effected by the issue of serial bonds in place of the old sinking fund bonds.

In considering the bill, the municipal committee objected to the clause which provides for a reserve fund of \$50,000 on the ground that it created a precedent which every other community selling bonds would have to adopt. The only other clause which this committee took exception to was that which applied to the issue of short term treasury notes.

The amended bill is expected to pass without a hitch.

SPLENDID SHOW AT MAJESTIC THEATRE

The Majestic show tonight is a remarkably beautiful display of colored film work. "A Rose Among the Briers," the story of a young factory girl's adventures as a cabaret dancer, is one of the most magnificently staged pieces seen here. Jackie Saunders is as dainty as ever as Mary, the factory hand, dancing girl and captivator of hearts.

The Pathe colored gazette includes views of German prisoners in France, the Grand Duke Michael of Russia decorating troops, and other interesting war items. The scenes of rustic Holland are particularly pretty, the canals with their green borders showing up splendidly in color, while the flower pictures are wonderful, the development of the blooms being traced on the screen. "Whiffles" brings down the house as a wooer who has to deal with a cunning rogue, the rogue getting left in the end. This is a very fine show.

CAMOSUN DOCKED

The Camosun has arrived safely at Vancouver and is now at the Wallace Shipyard for examination to determine the damage sustained in her attempt to take the overland route on March 7th.

GOODWIN SANDS LIGHTSHIP SUNK WITH ALL HANDS

Another Flagrant Breach of International Law—Dutch Ship Narrowly Escapes—Roumania Ready.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 23.—The Galliper lightship which stood guard over the treacherous Goodwin Sands, off the mouth of the Thames, has been torpedoed and sunk with all hands. There is great indignation over this gross breach of international law.

The fact that the lightship had been sunk was discovered by the Dutch liner Amsterdam which narrowly escaped going on the Goodwins.

Norwegian Barque Sunk.

The Norwegian barque Lindeniold, bound from Portland, Oregon, to Queenstown, has been sunk, thirty of the crew being saved.

Tubantia Incident.

The theory is advanced that the Dutch steamers Tubantia and Palembang were sunk by torpedoes released from a German destroyer. It is significant that Germany's denial relates only to sinking by mines or submarines.

Roumania Ready.

Rome, March 23.—War preparations in Roumania are now complete, and the military authorities are ready to assume control of the railroads.

The concentration of the entire Roumanian army will follow the first move made by the Teutons and Bulgarians in the Balkans, without a declaration of war.

BRITISH SCULPTOR REMAKES DAMAGED FACES

A celebrated British sculptor, who is now a private in the Army Medical Corps, is finding a new use for his skill. All his leisure time is at present employed in replacing the parts of men's faces destroyed by wounds in battle. These include mouths, jaws, and even eyelids, all of which he made to move naturally.

He has just finished remaking a nose for a soldier whose nose was blown away below the bridge. His addition, which he prepared of electrically-treated metal, is so perfect that where it is joined is absolutely imperceptible, and the patient has regained his sense of smell.

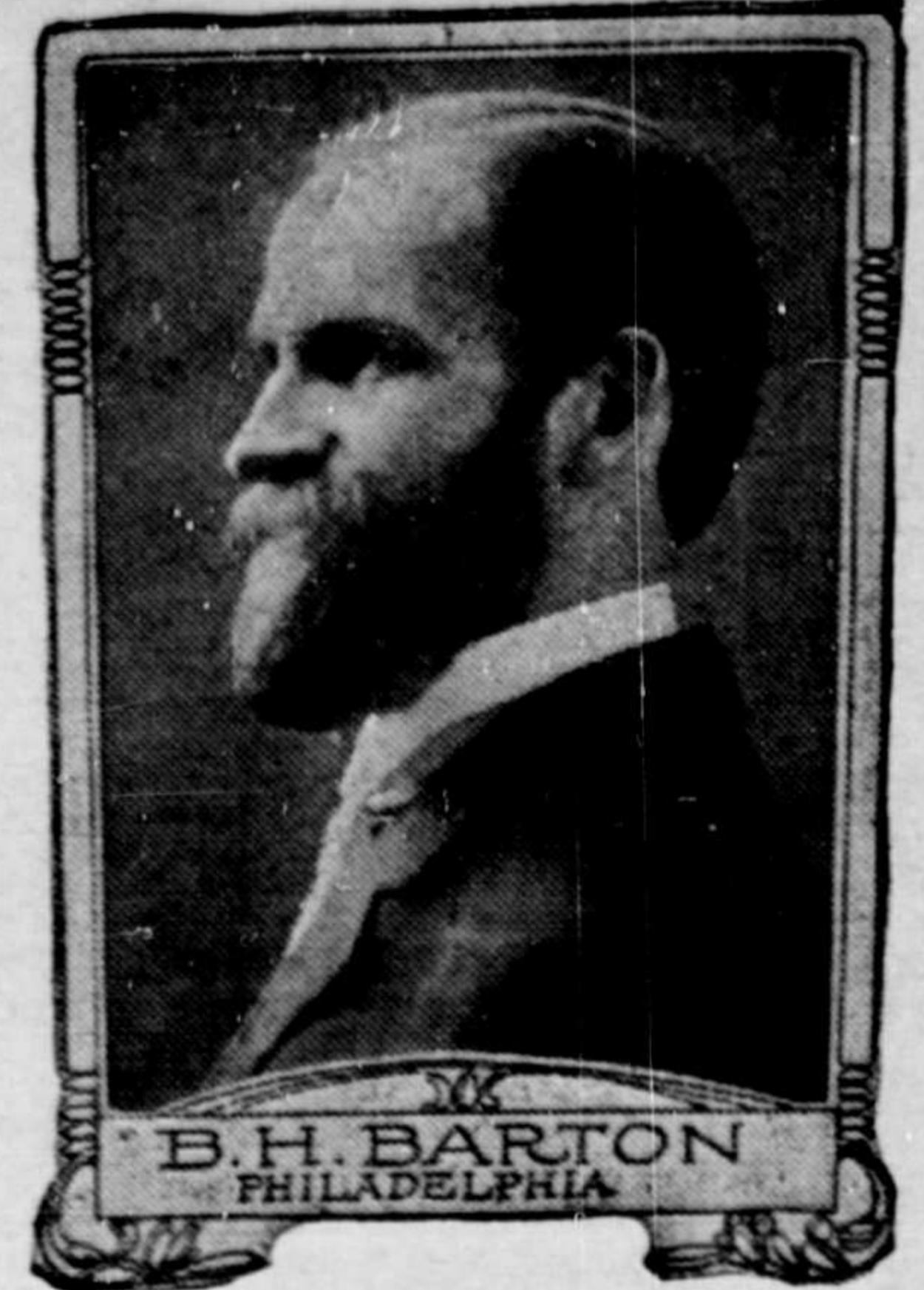

PREMIER'S SPEECH

Premier Bowser, in his recent lengthy speech in the legislature, again accused the opposition of preaching "blue ruin," and remarked that this was a time for optimism and not for pessimism. Mr. Bowser may rest assured that the opposition views the future with unbounded optimism. It is quite well aware of the possibilities of the province of British Columbia, under a safe government—a government which will not propose to pay over \$75,000 to a political press agent without receiving an exact accounting of every cent.

Mr. Bowser says that "The independent voter at this time is badly affected by political revelations in other provinces." The independent voter of British Columbia has not found it necessary to go outside of the boundaries of this province in order to secure evidence on which to base his opinion. The mere fact that Joe Matson was given \$75,000, to do what he liked with, is enough in itself to condemn the McBride-Bowser administration in the eyes of any sane, thinking man. The premier reiterates the story of the wealth of the province. Again, it may be remarked that the fact that such a wealthy province has to confess to being \$18,000,000 in the hole is sufficient condemnation for any government.

The Tory press agents in Victoria claim that Mr. Matson made a good deal for the government when he purchased the Songhees Reserve from the Indians. Such deals are just exactly the standard of that government. If the government made such a good deal as they claim—getting millions

worth of property for thousands—then the Indians did not get a square deal, and Matson and the rest of the crew stand condemned out of their own mouths. As a matter of fact, Mr. Matson has not yet completed his contract in the matter, according to his evidence before the public accounts committee.

The fact which has condemned the government in the eyes of the outside voter is that the men on the government payroll in most districts have been simply paid election agents. As a matter of fact a local road-boss is at the present moment on a vote-getting tour for the party, at the people's expense. No flowery generalities of the premier or any other minister or member will prove of the slightest use in denying facts which come under the everyday notice of men throughout the province. The Bowser gang stand condemned, not because of anything which any member of the opposition may say, but by their own acts which come under the everyday notice of voters throughout the province. Their methods have been Prussian and they must pay the same price as the Prussians will have to pay.

MANITOBA ABOLISHES ARCHITECT'S DEPARTMENT

The Norris government of Manitoba has abolished the office of the provincial architect, which was costing the province \$30,000 a year. The employees have been given notice that their services will not be required after the end of March.

It has been decided that much better results, at much less cost, will be obtained by asking for plans of all public buildings in open competition. The old system of having a provincial architect and a staff of assistants led to a sameness of design in the public buildings.

Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof:

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(6) To provide that securities to be issued under the following bylaws, under none of which any securities have as yet been issued, Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds may be issued and such bonds to be for the term here set forth, namely:

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
