## SIR ERNEST SHACKLETON ARRIVES SAFELY

### NO CHANGE IN VERDUN SITUATION--BIG RUSSIAN DRIVE ON DVINSK FRONT

#### SHACKLETON IS SAFELY ACROSS ICE CONTINENT

**Intrepid Explorer Reports All Well After a Hazardous Journey Across the Southern Polar Region.**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Sydney, N. S. W., March 24.—Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton has arrived here after crossing the Antarctic continent from Weddell Sea to Ross Sea, a distance of 1,700 miles. Sir Ernest was last heard of in November, 1914, when he left South Georgia for the frozen regions.

The party has been absent for eighteen months and the intrepid leader reports that all are well. All details of the expedition are withheld from publication meantime.

The expedition was largely financed by Scotch capital. Sir James Caird, the wealthy Dundee jute manufacturer who died recently, being the largest contributor. When it seemed that the expedition would not be carried out because of a shortage in the public subscriptions, Sir James put up the necessary capital to complete the arrangements.

#### MEXICAN REPORTS OF VILLA'S DEFEAT

#### HUNS CARRIED THE TRENCHES BY LIQUID FIRE

**No Change in Verdun Situation—Military Committee Demand Reprisals in Kind—Heavy Bombardment.**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, March 24.—There was no change in the military situation at Verdun yesterday, fighting being confined to intermittent bombardments.

The French trenches, which were carried recently by the Germans, were taken by means of a liquid fire attack. The French military committee is demanding that reprisals be made in kind.

**Heavy Bombardment**  
There were heavy bombardments in Argonne and in the Woevre region throughout the night, and Malancourt woods were searched by the French batteries.

#### PARTIES DIFFERED ON SALARY FOR M'BRIDE

At a meeting in South Vancouver, Mr. H. C. Brewster gave the true version of his conference with the premier. After charging Bowser with "breaking the seal of privacy," the Liberal leader declared that the premier had misrepresented on the floor of the house what had actually taken place.

Dealing with the interview with the premier on March 14th, Mr. Brewster said Mr. Bowser had admitted there was a doubt as to the legality of the sittings after midnight that night. "We talked the matter over," said Mr. Brewster, "and so as not to embarrass the government I said I would agree to a reasonable extension of the life of the legislature, four months' supplies and to defer the general election until after the May court of revision on condition that no contentious legislation was introduced."

**Negotiations Failed.**  
"We agreed on a half holiday weekly for clerks and other measures. Then Mr. Bowser asked us where we would stand in regard to the prohibition measure he had promised to introduce. I asked, 'will you refer the measure to the people to become law?' and when Mr. Bowser said 'yes' I then replied 'then that is non-contentious.'" (applause.)  
"Then Mr. Bowser brought up the question of providing for Hon. Mr. Turner and Sir Richard McBride. To our surprise he proposed that the province should vote a bonus of a thousand pounds to pay off the private debts of Mr. Turner, give him a pension of \$6,000 a year for life and a further pension of \$3,000 a year for life to his widow in the event of his decease, and on top of that to vote an allowance of \$15,000 a year to Sir Richard McBride."  
"I told the premier at once," said Mr. Brewster, "that we could never consent to that and that we must regard the proposals as contentious. I do not believe the

#### T. D. PATTULLO SLATED FOR PUBLIC WORKS

The Vancouver World to hand yesterday states that while Mr. Brewster, with characteristic Scotch caution, refused to predict a Liberal sweep at the general elections, some of his followers are not so wary. They see nothing ahead but the defeat of the Bowser administration.

So far has their confidence carried them that they have been drafting a Liberal cabinet, the following being the one which meets with most general acceptance among the leading party men in the city.

#### LIBERALS OBJECT TO EXTENDED MORATORIUM

Victoria, March 24.—A large deputation of financial men waited on the premier and urged the inclusion of a compensation clause in the Prohibition Bill. No decision in the matter has been announced.

**Extended Moratorium.**  
The Liberals in the legislature object to the passage of a bill to extend the moratorium, owing to a blanket clause which gives the Lieutenant-Governor power to use his discretion in regard to payments on coal lands, and purchases and leases of petroleum lands.

#### THE CHAMPION SNIPER OF GALLIPOLI PENINSULA

The Cairo Evening Mail publishes the following graphic account of the wonderful work of an Australian marksman on the Gallipoli Peninsula, the story being written by Private Frank Reed, another Australian:

Trooper W. E. Sing may well be termed Australia's champion rifle shot, for during the time he was on Gallipoli he accounted for over 200 Turks. Of course, during enemy attacks he probably shot many more, but as a sniper he knows that over 200 fell owing to his excellent marksmanship.

Sing's sniping methods were somewhat similar to those of the Turk. He played them at their own game, and beat them badly. His "posy" was so close to the Turkish trenches that their artillery rarely troubled him. He had three distinct targets for his mates, by tacit consent left to him. One was an enemy trench 350 yards away, another was a communication sap 500 yards off, the third was a track in a gully 1,000 yards distant. Comfortably ensconced in his nest, Sing lay with a couple of telescopes focused on likely places. An officer lay near with another telescope. So afraid were the Turks of these unlucky spots that the patient sniper often lay a whole day without getting a glimpse of the enemy. On other days the Turks (new troops probably) looked for trouble. They walked boldly into view at a bare 500 yards, and Sing as he toppled them over exclaimed, "It's too easy to be called sport."

**Locating His Posy.**  
Every time Billy Sing felt sorry for the poor Turks he remembered how their snipers picked off the Australian officers in the early days of the landing, and he hardened his heart. But he never fired at a stretcher-bearer or at any of the soldiers who were trying to rescue wounded Turks. At first the enemy had not the slightest idea whence the death-dealing bullets came. Often Sing would bag a Turk, and the enemy would blaze furiously at some of our loopholes a hundred yards away. But after a time they located him, and the sandbags and bushes around his "posy" were riddled with bullets. On one occasion a bullet found its way through the loophole, badly wounding a sergeant who was observing, and slightly wounding Sing. Another sergeant took the telescope, and Sing, after having his wound dressed, resumed his sniping.

**A Hit that Didn't Count.**  
One day a well known General crawled up into Sing's "posy" to observe for him. Sing was in a bad mood, for it was blowing hard and he had missed a man—actually missed a man at 300 yards. "I'll have to start and learn shooting again," he said disgustedly. Just then a hat showed on a parapet 500 yards off. Once more Sing sighted and waited. Soon a head appeared and Sing pulled the trigger. As he fired two things happened. A gust of

#### RUSSIAN DRIVE AROUND DVINSK IS SUCCESSFUL

**Three Lines of German Trenches are Taken—Deadly Russian Bayonet Work—Activity in Black Sea.**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, March 24.—A Russian drive in the Dvinsk region by three armies on a seventy mile front has resulted in the capture of three lines of German trenches at Lake Marocz. There was much slaughter as a result of the bayonet work of the Russians and a thousand Germans and twelve machine guns were taken.

**Black Sea Activity.**  
Bucharest reports great activity by the Russian fleet in the Black Sea. Russian submarines entered the Bulgarian port of Varna and torpedoed the ships in the harbor.

Three Russian dreadnoughts and three ironclads encountered a fleet of Turco-German vessels off Constana with a convoy and sunk them all. They were laden with petrol and cereals.

The Russian squadron has bombarded Trebizond three times and Sinope once.

#### FATAL COLLISION ON GRAND TRUNK ROAD

Toronto, March 24.—There has been a collision at Port Credit between the Grand Trunk eastern flier and a coal train. Engineer Harry Overend, of the flier, was killed with his hand on the throttle and fireman W. O. Anderson was also killed, while brakeman Ward was missing. Fireman Edward Hanahan was injured.

**PANIC**

Evidence of the state of panic into which the Bowser followers have been driven by the crushing defeats in Vancouver and Victoria is to be found in their methods in the house. After the Vancouver debacle, wholesale promises of every imaginable kind of reform and new enterprise were made in order to bring about the return of the now forgotten Mr. Flumerfelt. The house has now been in session for about two weeks and the members of the government have devoted most of their time to a fruitless effort to discredit the opposition which has been returned by the people.

The Premier, in his big speech, did not utter a single word about the Prohibition Bill, which he so readily promised to the Prohibition party, much to the disgust of such followers as Mr. McLean, of Nelson, and many others. Neither did he make any mention of the great shipbuilding scheme which was to be started within ten days, whether Mr. Flumerfelt was elected or no. So far, the bulk of the time of the house, which costs the people \$1,000 per day, has been taken up with abuse of the men who really represent the people. The fact of the matter is that the time was spent in one last effort to redeem the fortunes of the fallen political machine.

The point on which the government and the opposition differed most sharply in the recent debates in the house was one which was kept in the background during the elections. We refer to the voting of \$15,000 per annum to Sir Richard McBride, besides a grant of \$5,000 to the Hon. J. H. Turner, in addition to a pension of \$6,000 a year. Of

course, the new premier made the promise of this big salary at a time when he did not reckon on having any opposition to speak of, and when he felt that British Columbia must keep up its reputation as a spender. Sir Richard has always been a source of expense to the province, but this is no time to offer him a retiring allowance which is higher than the salary of the Prime Minister and much higher than that of the High Commissioner for the Dominion. In refusing to agree to any such piece of wanton extravagance, Mr. Brewster will have the people of the province behind him.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

The measure which Bowser is most anxious to get through is the appropriations for the year, which will give the party a big fat election fund at the people's expense.

Mr. McLean, the member for Nelson, in a fit of Scotch excitement seems to have displayed his real feelings in regard to prohibition, same feelings being coughed in language befitting the man and the party he represents.

The Tory organizers and the road bosses are very busy these days preparing for the general election, but they can't fool the public this time.

The Germans have made a few "final" attacks on Verdun, but the fifth is evidently not going to be any more successful than its predecessors, even if the Kaiser is there in person.

Sinking lightships is the latest diversion for German submarines. The Huns are simply piling up a huge debit balance which they will be obliged to wipe off.

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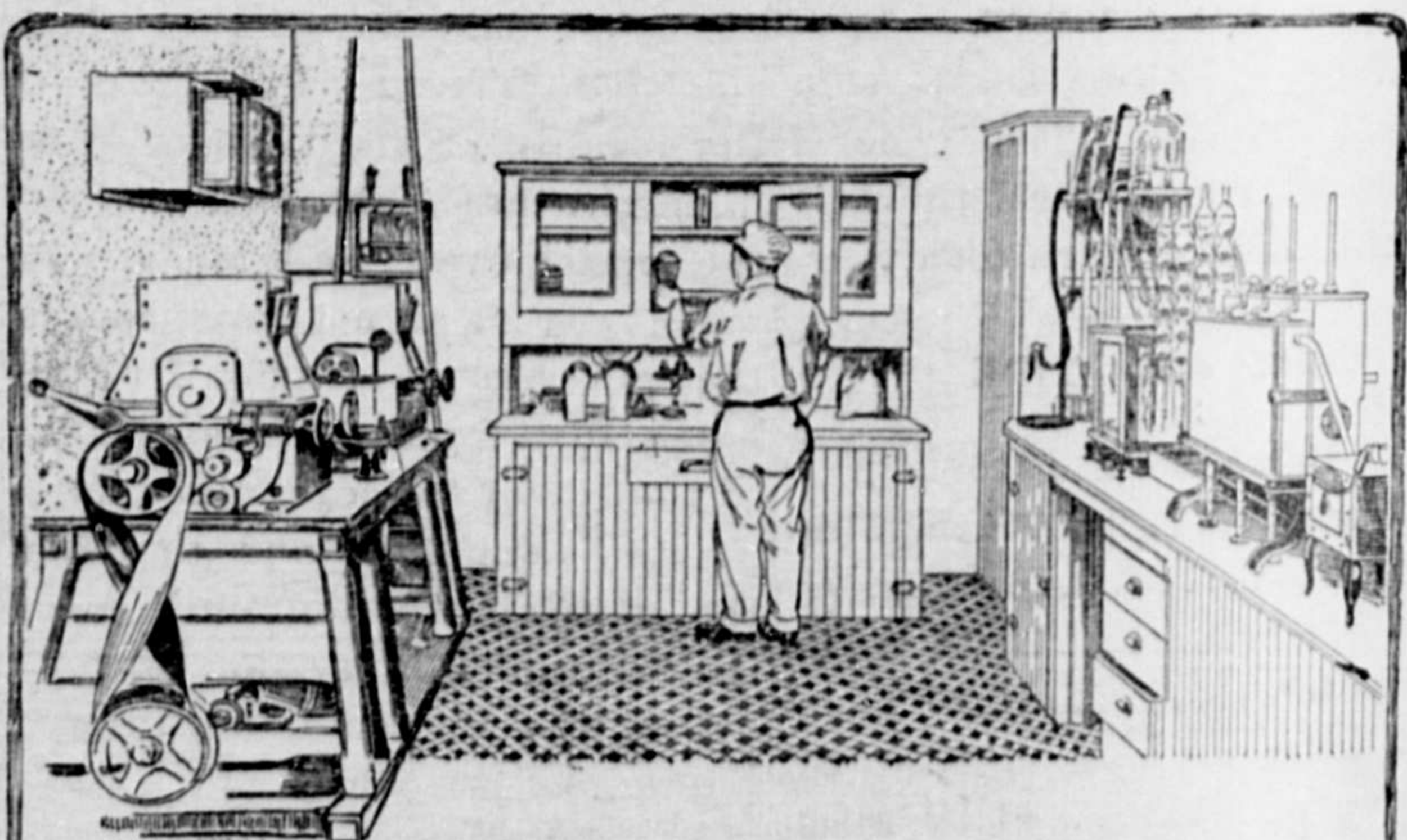

people of Vancouver and Victoria sent Mr. Macdonald and myself to the legislature to vote money out of the treasury like that. (Applause).

"We refused and the negotiations ended. That same evening the premier rose in the house and suggested that we had refused to agree to extend the life of parliament because we were in league with the liquor traffic. He made that statement although we had expressly agreed not to oppose the prohibition bill, although we had all along publicly expressed our intention to submit a prohibition bill to the people, and although the premier himself had been opposed to prohibition until he got the double blow in the by-elections.

"Read the correspondence passing between the prohibitionists and the government; read the replies of the two parties to their demands, and if after that you can cast your vote in favor of Mr. Bowser's friends I can only say you will deserve the kind of government you will get from him."

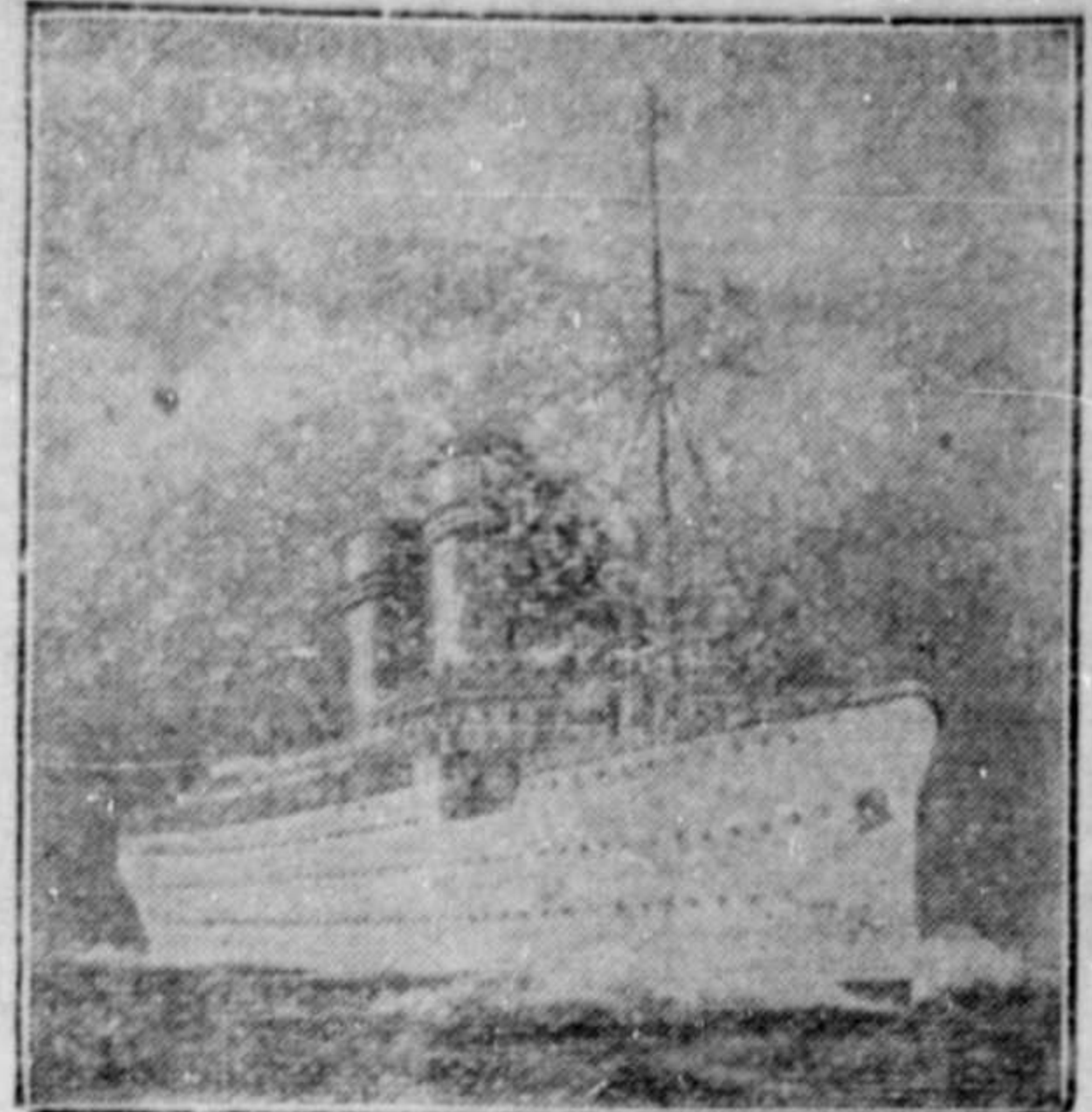

The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

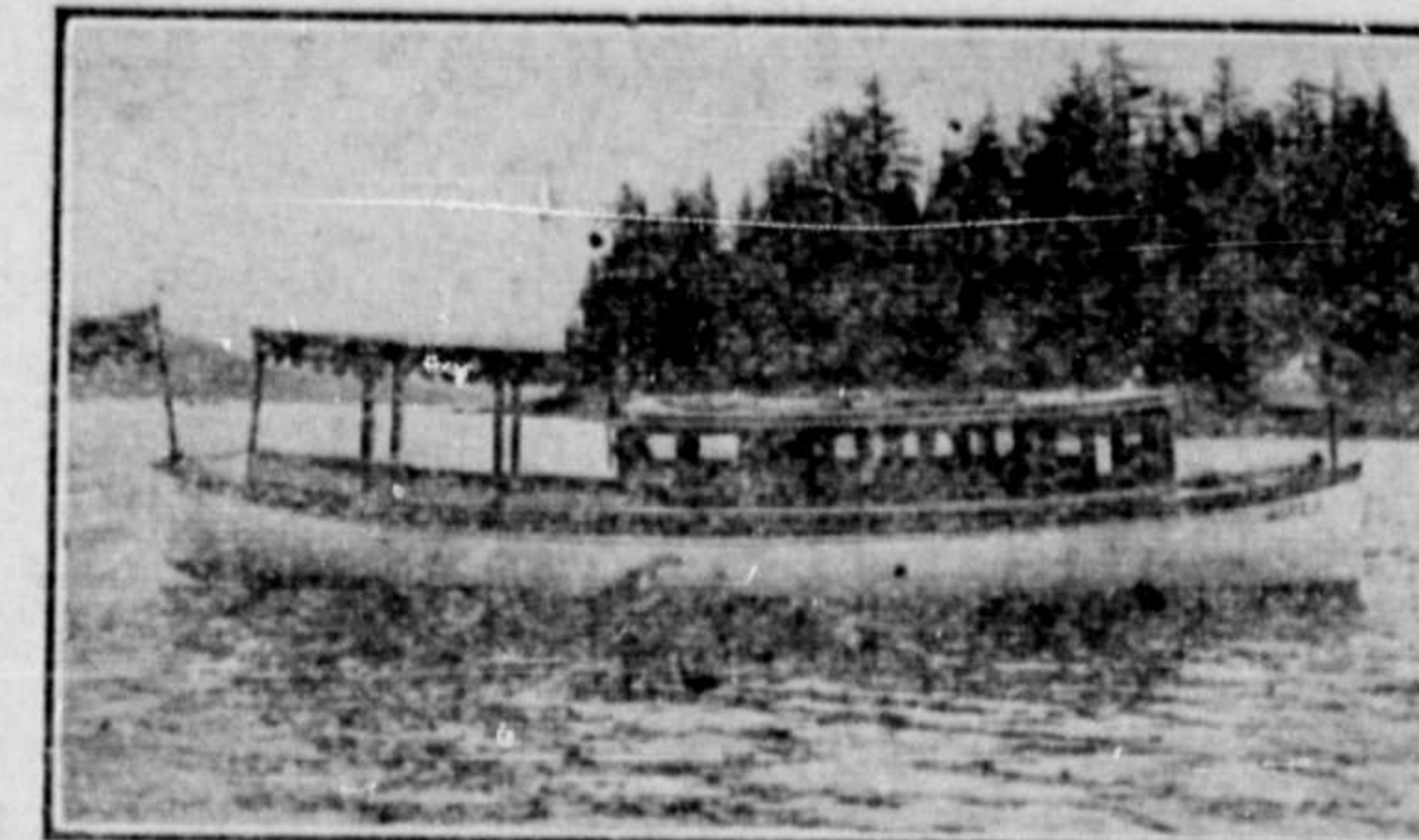
