## REPORTED NAVAL BATTLE OFF JUTLAND

### GERMAN FLOTILLA PUT TO FLIGHT—SUCCESSFUL AIR RAID ON ZEPPELIN SHEDS

#### HUN FLOTILLA PUT TO FLIGHT BY THE BRITISH

Copenhagen Reports Naval Battle off Jutland on Sunday—German Torpedo Heads Found on Stricken Ships.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, March 27.—The "Politiken" reports that there was an engagement between British and German squadrons at noon yesterday off the west coast of Jutland.

A German flotilla of five cruisers and twenty destroyers was put to flight by the British.

Several German patrol boats burst into flames and ran for protection to the fortress on Sylt Island. Violent cannonading was heard between 7 and 8 p. m.

#### Evidence of Hun Guilt.

A piece of a bronze torpedo head has been found in one of the lifeboats of the Channel steamer Sussex which was torpedoed last week. Germany is the only nation using bronze torpedoes.

An unknown sailing vessel which stood nearby the Sussex when she was torpedoed, ignored all appeals for help. It is believed that this ship was acting as a screen for the submarine.

A portion of a German torpedo has also been discovered on the wrecked Dutch liner Tubantia, proving conclusively that the deed was done by the Germans, in spite of their denials.

#### GREAT NORTHERN TO HAVE SEPARATE STATION

**MEMBERS OF THE SASKATCHEWAN COMMISSIONS.**—The Saskatchewan government has appointed three boards to probe charges against members of its own party and political workers or receiving money improperly. A notable fact is that the head of one commission is Sir F. W. G. Haultain, formerly the Conservative leader.

#### JESS WILLARD RETAINS HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE

In a ten-round boat at New York on Saturday night, Jess Willard, heavyweight champion of the world, outpointed Frank Moran in seven of the ten rounds, at Madison Square Garden. The Garden was packed to the roof, many ladies being present, while John L. Sullivan, Bob Fitzsimmons and Jim Corbett, at one time holders of the championship, had seats close to the ring.

Moran put up a game fight, coming back splendidly in the later rounds after receiving hard punishment at the hands of the Texas giant. The champion clearly demonstrated his superior ability as a fighter, his long left constantly having his opponent in trouble.

The fighting throughout the ten rounds was very fast. The winner took \$40,000. Moran forced the fighting and nearly had Willard out in the third round when the champion broke his hand.

#### MRS. BARRINGTON-HAM IS STUDYING CONDITIONS HERE

Mrs. Barrington-Ham, Port Secretary of the Y. W. C. A., addressed the Board of Trade on Saturday evening on the question of immigration after the war. This energetic lady, who is making a tour of Canada in the interests of her society, said that the boys at the front from Canada are doing more than the regular advertising concerns to boost Canada. Between the bullets in the trenches; in the hospitals, and in the hotels, young men who have never been here are hearing about the west. She felt certain that, after the war, there will be a big tide of immigration to Canada and it was her business to secure all the information possible for the Y. W. C. A. particularly in regard to the opportunities for women, and as to the preparations which were being made for their reception. Mrs. Barrington-Ham was cordially thanked for her address.

#### PASTOR BARTON ON THE DAY OF JUDGMENT

The Empress Theatre was well filled yesterday afternoon when Pastor B. H. Barton, of Philadelphia, lectured on the Judgment Day. After explaining several of the obscure passages of Scripture relative to the second coming of Christ, the speaker declared that the Judgment Day began in the year 1874 and would continue for a thousand years, and that Christ was now upon the earth although invisible. In support of this statement he said that Christ had said that at His coming all things would be made new and that during the last forty years this prophecy was being fulfilled in that everything in the world was changing rapidly and the old things were passing away. The speaker, by way of illustration, pointed to the desert of the western States which was now "blooming as the rose" and to the invention of the telegraph, telephone, etc. He declared that the last trump had been sounded by Pastor Russell, he being the seventh great evangelist, Martin Luther and John Wesley being two of the other six. He explained how the passages in the Bible are figurative and require intelligent interpretation to make them plain. He ridiculed the idea of the burning up of the earth, declaring that the earth would last forever and that the righteous were destined to live on the earth made perfect in time to come. The lecture was listened to with great attention and seemed to be thoroughly appreciated.

#### DRYDOCK DISCUSSED BY BOARD OF TRADE

At a well attended meeting of the Board of Trade on Saturday evening, presided over by Mr. G. A. Woodland, Mr. W. C. C. Mehan, general superintendent of the G. T. P., explained the state of affairs at the drydock. He stated that the dock had been referred to as completed and the statement had been made that it had actually turned down business, but that the fact of the matter was that, though the pontoons had been completed, under the direction of Mr. Crole, there were still several of the other contracts to be finished. He felt certain that the work would be finished in from forty to sixty days and as soon as the government and the company made a thorough inspection of the structure, a combined effort would be made to secure business.

He stated that the G. T. P. and the government were keeping in close touch with the work, as they were anxious to have the dock busy at the earliest possible moment. He explained that, meantime, the plant was not in shape to handle anything but the smallest overhaul jobs, and that it would be incurring needless expense to organize a proper drydock staff until the dock was tested and officially accepted. He assured the board that the G. T. P. was just as anxious to see work done there as they were.

Mr. J. H. Pillsbury said that his knowledge was chiefly in regard to the construction of the dock, but that he felt very cer-

tain that the company would not have dreamt of sinking so much money in such an undertaking unless they meant to procure work for it.

Mr. L. M. de Gex asked Mr. Mehan which contracts were uncompleted. Mr. Mehan replied that there was still work to do in the way of installing machinery, assembling tools, removing of the submarine reef, etc., all of which he was certain would be completed in, at the latest, sixty days.

Mr. de Gex asked if there would be a staff of men at work by June 1st, as the Board of Trade had received many enquiries as to when men would be required.

Mr. Mehan said that he had no definite information on the subject, but he assured the board that the company was just as anxious as they were to have work started. He thought no definite answers should be given to enquirers until the dock had been officially tested and taken over from the builders. When that had been done, he was certain that every effort would be made to secure work for the dock.

T. D. Pattullo thought that, until it was ready for big ship-building, the drydock might be used for the making of munitions and the building of submarines. He pointed out that Ottawa had made further appropriations of \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000 to be spent during the next few months and he thought that the present was a good time to bring pressure to bear on the government to have some of that money spent here.

Mr. Pattullo also pointed out that munitions were being shipped to Russia from Seattle, as Vancouver was unable to handle all the traffic. He thought that a lot of this business could be handled through Prince Rupert and would help things along until steady shipbuilding business was entered upon.

Mr. Mehan said that munitions could be manufactured at the drydock now, and that they could be turned out cheaply and quickly. He understood that question had been taken up with the government some time ago. He said that building submarines would retard the completion of the plant.

Mr. Pattullo thought it would greatly strengthen Mr. Mehan's hand if strong representations were made to the government by the people of Prince Rupert. He felt that nothing would be got unless we asked for it. He believed

#### AERIAL RAID ON AIRSHIP SHEDS IS SUCCESSFUL

Three Planes Missing After Big raid on Schleswig-Holstein—Three German Ships Sunk—Big Guns in West.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 27.—An Allied aerial raid has been made on the German airship sheds in Schleswig-Holstein.

Three of the aeroplanes which took part in the raid are missing, but Danish reports state that the operation was successful.

#### German Patrols Sunk.

Two German patrol ships and one torpedo boat have been sunk. The British destroyer Medusa has sunk after being in collision with the British destroyer Lavroek. The crew was saved.

#### Western Front.

There is a continuation of the violent German bombardment east of the Meuse and north of Verdun, which indicates that new attacks may be expected in that quarter. The brunt of the attack was made between Douaumont and Vaux.

#### Skirmishing in Greece.

Skirmishing is taking place in front of Saloniki, preparatory to a general attack by the Teuton Allies against the Franco-British lines.

## THE DRYDOCK

If the recent talk of shipbuilding in the south did nothing else, it did some good in stirring up the citizens of Prince Rupert to the point of asking "What about our drydock?" Shipyards all over the world, and particularly on this continent, are swamped with orders; new docks are spoken of at Portland and other points, in fact everything in the way of shipbuilding is booming, and, Prince Rupert drydock, which to the casual observer is very nearly completed, remains dormant.

It is gratifying to know, from the statement made by Mr. Mehan at the Board of Trade meeting on Saturday, that the drydock will be ready for official testing and acceptance in, at the latest, sixty days, and probably in forty. That work will be forthcoming inside of three months may be too much to expect, but it will do no harm for the citizens of Prince Rupert to ask Ottawa what is going to be done in the matter.

"The Grand Trunk Pacific, like every other large corporation which is doing construction work at the present time, finds it impossible to raise money in the old country, owing to the war, and, therefore, it seems to be clearly the duty of Ottawa to step in and do something towards making the drydock a producer. As Mr. Mehan clearly pointed out, to organise a staff to handle such a plant means the outlay of a huge amount of money every month, and it is no secret that any such sum is not at the present time at the command of any new railroad company, therefore, the whole matter is up to Ottawa.

Mr. D. G. Stewart raised a most important point when he

spoke of the carrying trade between the coast and Russia. The C. P. R. is at present loading the Princess Ena for Vladivostok, while the Russian government has gone the length of sending a little six hundred ton steamer across to this coast to be loaded. With the finest transcontinental railway on the continent making its terminal here, at a point five hundred miles nearer Vladivostok than Vancouver is, it seems strange that the southern port should be getting so much more of the traffic than it can handle. At the same time, the Grand Trunk Pacific is certainly doing all it can to secure business, as no railroad is in business purely for the fun of the thing, and we may rest assured that every point which occurs to the man in the street has long since been fully gone into by the officials of the railroad.

A citizens' petition may not do much good, but it will at least show the powers at Ottawa that the people of Prince Rupert are alive and anxious for a share of the business which is going on elsewhere. The petition may not hasten the final completion of the drydock, but it will strengthen the hands of the railroad officials and Mr. Donnelly in their efforts to procure work for the dock.

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nelly had taken the matter up with Ottawa and evidently there was something in the way which the citizens did not know of.

M. J. Hobin said that the shell contractors in the south found shell making unprofitable in some cases and that all had to rush their contracts by August 1st.

making profits when times were good.

D. G. Stewart asked if nothing could be done to secure part of the Russian freight trade. The C. P. R. had more than they could handle and he thought some of that could be handled here.

Mr. Mehan said that was outside of his province, but that he understood the G. T. P. had made efforts to procure ships for that trade, but so far had not succeeded.

Mr. Woodland, in moving a vote of thanks to Mr. Mehan for his courtesy in addressing the board, said that it was encouraging to know that the drydock would be completed at an early date.

In seconding the motion Mr. Pattullo said that he felt that the board was not antagonistic to, but in sympathy with, Mr. Mehan and the G. T. P. at the same time, the people had a perfect right to know what was ahead, as so much of the people's money was tied up in the drydock. He was strongly in favor of going after the government in the matter.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

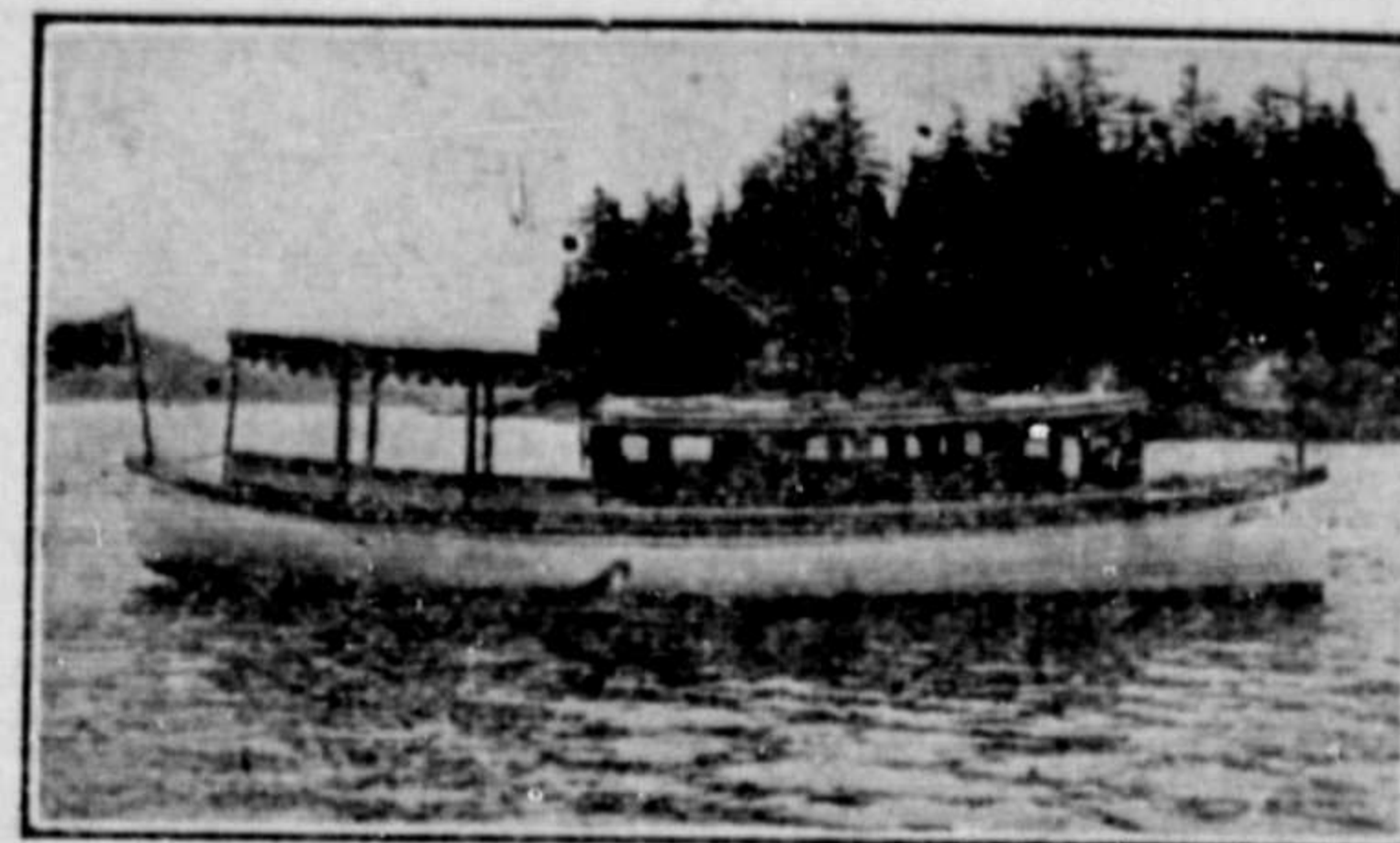
