## DARING EXPLOIT BY GERMAN NAVAL MAN

### HELD UP SHIP SINGLE-HANDED -- GERMANS CARRY VILLAGE OF MALANCOURT

#### DARING EXPLOIT BY LONE GERMAN NAVAL OFFICER

Stowed Away on Supply Steamer and Help up Officers and Crew -- Failed in Attempt To Escape.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Lewis, Del., March 31.—The British steamer *Matappo*, laden with war supplies and bound from New York to Vladivostok, has arrived here. After the vessel had put to sea, a German naval officer named Schiller, who had stowed away in New York, appeared, armed with two revolvers, and locked the captain in his room; destroyed the wireless apparatus; confiscated the revolvers of the officers; terrorized the crew; seized \$10,000 in gold, and ordered that the vessel be taken in near shore, where he attempted to escape in one of the ship's life-boats.

Signals from the steamer brought out a pilot cutter and Schiller was captured. He is now in custody and may be either handed over to the authorities by the captain of the *Matappo* or taken to the West Indies and tried for piracy.

#### GERMANS HAVE TAKEN VILLAGE OF MALANCOURT

Fierce Night Attack—French Still Hold West Side—Germans Fail to Regain Lost Ground At Avoncourt.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 31.—After a fierce night attack on three sides, the Germans have carried the village of Malancourt. The buildings are a mass of ruins. The French still hold the west side of the town.

The Germans tried to win back the positions which they recently lost in the Avoncourt wood but were repulsed.

#### 560,000 Germans at Verdun

There are five hundred and sixty thousand Germans engaged on the Verdun front. Thirty thousand took part in the futile assault on the Avoncourt block-house last night.

#### LIEUT. C. R. DALLING GETS MILITARY CROSS

Captain Christie, of the 11th Irish Fusiliers, has received a letter from Mrs. C. R. Dalling, who with Lieut. Dalling, of the Irish Fusiliers, made so many friends while stationed in Prince Rupert.

Always very keen to get into active service, Lieut. Dalling resigned his commission in the Fusiliers and proceeded to England, where, after a few weeks of training, he was given a commission in the Royal Welsh Fusiliers and sent to the front. Mrs. Dalling writes that her husband has been rather badly wounded and is now in hospital somewhere in France.

Lieut. Dalling, however, is proud of his wounds, for he got them in carrying out a particular-daring piece of work for which he has been awarded the Military Cross, while he has also received a letter of congratulation from General Sir Douglas Haig, of which he is just as proud as the cross.

Enclosed with the letter is the following piece of verse written by one of the privates who took part in the action. It has little poetic value, but it forecasts the presentation of the Cross and shows how this gallant officer was revered by his men.

To the friends of Mr. Dalling, and that means every one, I am going to speak up for him, and tell the deeds he's done, for I'm a private soldier, and in his company too, so who could explain better the deeds he's done for you? #### VILLA LEADS AMERICAN TROOPS MERRY CHASE

The censorship on news from the Mexican front is evidently pretty close as no despatches are coming through to Canada, but, from the American exchanges, it is clear that Francisco Villa has eluded his pursuers and, in the meantime, is leading them a merry chase, the United States troops being now nearly three hundred miles south of the border.

General Pershing, who is leading the punitive expedition, has had experience in Mexican warfare, having taken part in the fighting there in 1886. However, he is at a distinct disadvantage on account of the state of the country, the bandits having led them through a country which has been looted so thoroughly on recent occasions that the American troops will have difficulty in getting supplies.

General Funston, whose portrait appears above, with that of Villa, is reticent, but an early end to the hunt is not anticipated, as Villa has got a long start and is reported to be picking up reinforcements as he goes along.

#### BORDEN CABLES TO SAM HUGHES TO RETURN HOME

Commission Appointed to Probe the Alleged Fuses Graft—Col. Allison Implicated in the Charges.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, March 31.—Sir Robert Borden has cabled to Sir Sam Hughes to return from England immediately.

A commission composed of Justices Duff and Sir William Meredith has been appointed to probe into the charge of a million dollar graft made by Mr. Kyte in connection with the contracts for fuses. The charges implicate Colonel John Wesley Allison, who was so highly complimented by Sir Sam Hughes for the amount of work he had done free of charge in the way of placing orders for war supplies in the United States.

#### \$15,000 for McBride.

Victoria, March 31.—The estimates have been passed, after a long discussion, allowing the appropriation of \$175,000 for the completion of the British Columbia building in London; the appropriation of \$35,000 for the upkeep of the Agent-general's office, and providing a salary of \$15,000 a year for Sir Richard McBride.

Mr. Parker Williams demands an explanation from the Hon. W. R. Ross regarding his bill of \$4,567 for travelling expenses for last year. Mr. Williams wants to have details of this account.

#### KRUPP'S AGENT IMPLICATED IN WELLAND PLOT

Husband of Prima Donna Arrested on Conspiracy Charge—German Spy's Evidence Led to the Arrest.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, March 31.—Captain Hans Taucher, the husband of the Prima Donna Gadske and the head of the Taucher Arms Company, a representative of Krupp's, has been arrested on a charge of conspiracy in connection with the plot to blow up the Welland Canal.

The information against Taucher was given by the German spy, Von Der Goltz, who was arrested in England and sentenced to death, the sentence being commuted on condition that he came to America and gave evidence against his associates. Taucher had procured the dynamite supplies for the proposed outrage.

**GOOD NEWS**

The news of the redistribution of the British forces along the western front is one of the most reassuring items that has been received for weeks. There is no denying the fact that there has been just a little uneasiness as to the final outcome of the repeated furious German assaults against Verdun. In spite of our knowledge of the ability and bravery of the French soldiers, there has sometimes been a vision of Hun hordes breaking through at some weak spot and causing no end of trouble, though, of course, there has never been the slightest doubt as to the final result.

Now comes the news that, while the Germans have been throwing division after division against the French lines, the Allied troops on the other portion of the same front have been calmly indulging in new moves on the board, not with a view to checking any possible German advance, but in preparation for a big offensive. This evidence of the complete confidence of the Allies in the ability of the gallant little French army at Verdun to resist all German attempts to break through is indeed reassuring.

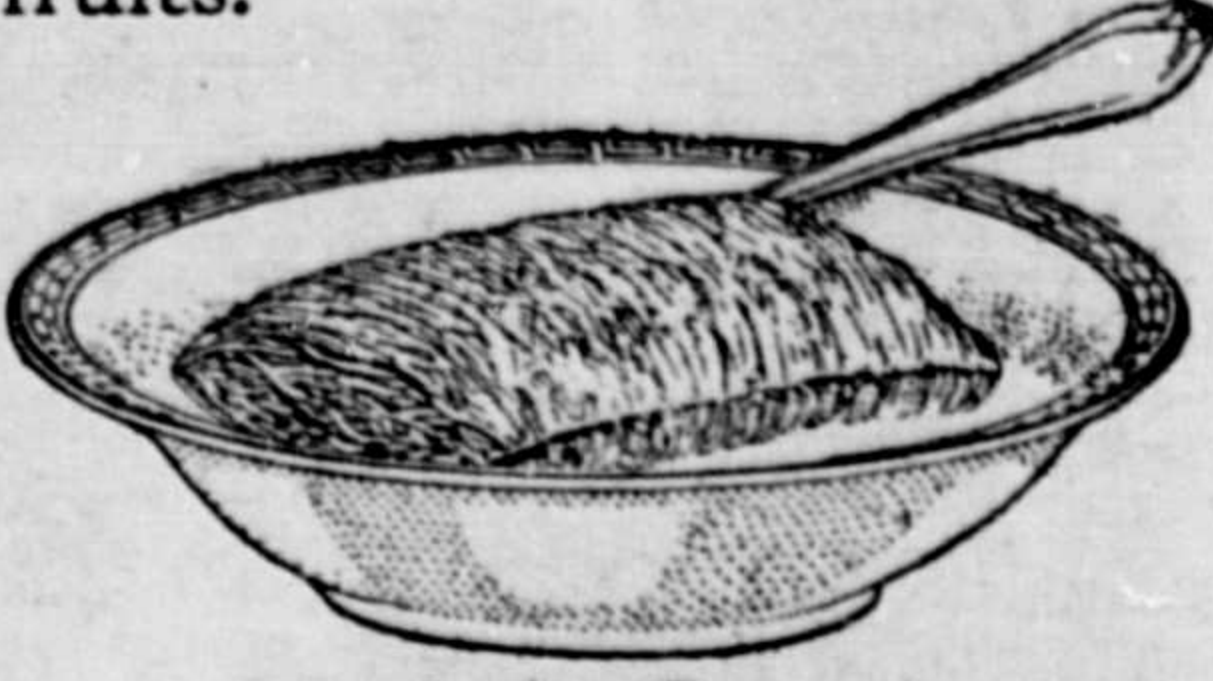
The Soldiers' Homestead Act, brought in by the minister of lands, is ample evidence of the fact that the Bowser government is ready at last to adopt the Liberal policy of taking the land away from the speculators who have not paid for it. Of course, the government has brought down an extended moratorium by which the Lieutenant-Governor will be able to use his discretion as to which

speculators are to be allowed to retain their lands.

If the figures of acreage available for farming, brought down by the Hon. W. R. Ross and his colleagues in the past, are correct, it seems as if the Tories were now about to hand out rather harsh treatment to some of their former friends. If there is such a huge available acreage which the speculators have not grabbed, why not open up the entire new lands to the returning soldiers? The public benefactors, as Tories have termed them in the past, would still have their opportunity of doing noble work for the province, while the soldiers would be given a chance to open up territory which is at present untouched. The fact of the matter is, as Moses Cotsworth has shown from the official records at Victoria, the lands really worth having are in the hands of the "benefactors" and the boys who are returning from the front must be given land and not rocks.

Our returned soldiers are entitled to nothing but the best, and the speculators have the best, therefore the unpaid for lands must be taken possession of. Mr. Ross, on his last visit to Prince Rupert, talked of the millions of acres of farming land which was still open for pre-emption, all good land, but evidently this huge acreage is not good enough for our soldiers, which is just exactly in keeping with the statements made by Moses and many others. The speculators had the best and, at last, some of them are to be made to hand it over. Doubtless the results in Vancouver and Victoria had much to do with this move.

**OUTSPOKEN PARSON AT PORT ARTHUR**

Port Arthur, March 26.—Rev. Dr. S. Bland, of the Wesley College, Winnipeg, preaching at Trinity Methodist church tonight said the whole system of supplying soldiers throughout the three prairie provinces was permeated with graft and dishonesty. Frozen liver worth four cents a pound was being supplied where beef at 11 cents a pound was being paid for and butter that could not be eaten was given to the soldiers. Dr. Bland said he had first hand information and gave several other samples of alleged graft.

"While Canada," he said, "was sending forth an army of men, the spirit of whom was unequalled since the days of the crusade, and paying the men \$1.10 a day, she was sheltering at home hordes of others who were digging their hands into the money sent from Britain and given by our people for supplies taking them out covered with filth and corruption, yet waxing rich. An unparalleled reign of graft had sprung up," he said, "since the war started all the way from the Annapolis valley, where decrepit horses were sold to men wishing to use them in fighting for their country, to the British Columbia coast where submarines of doubtful value were bought at outrageous prices."

"The government," declared Dr. Bland, "dare not allow it all to become known but it will become known."

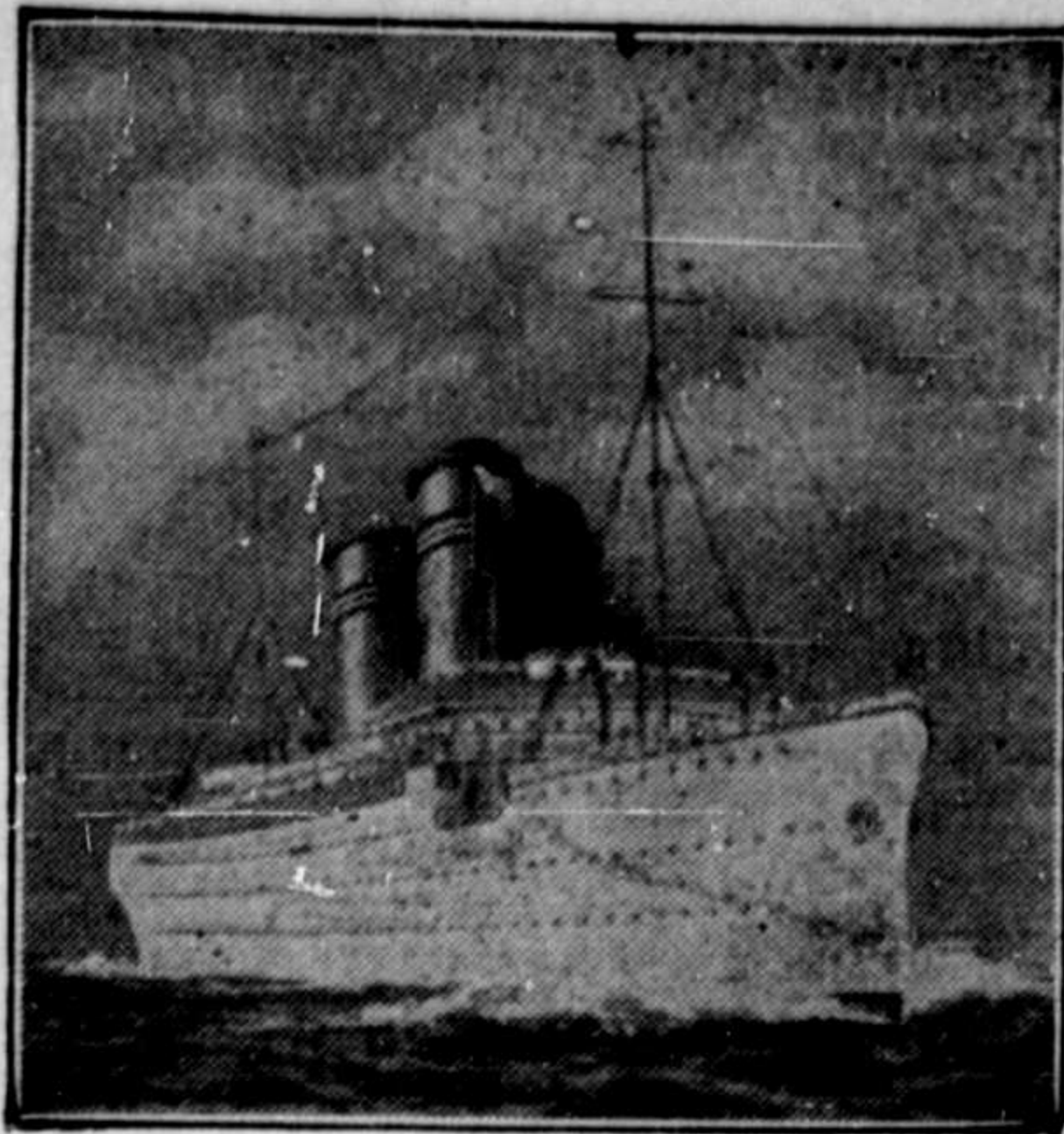

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

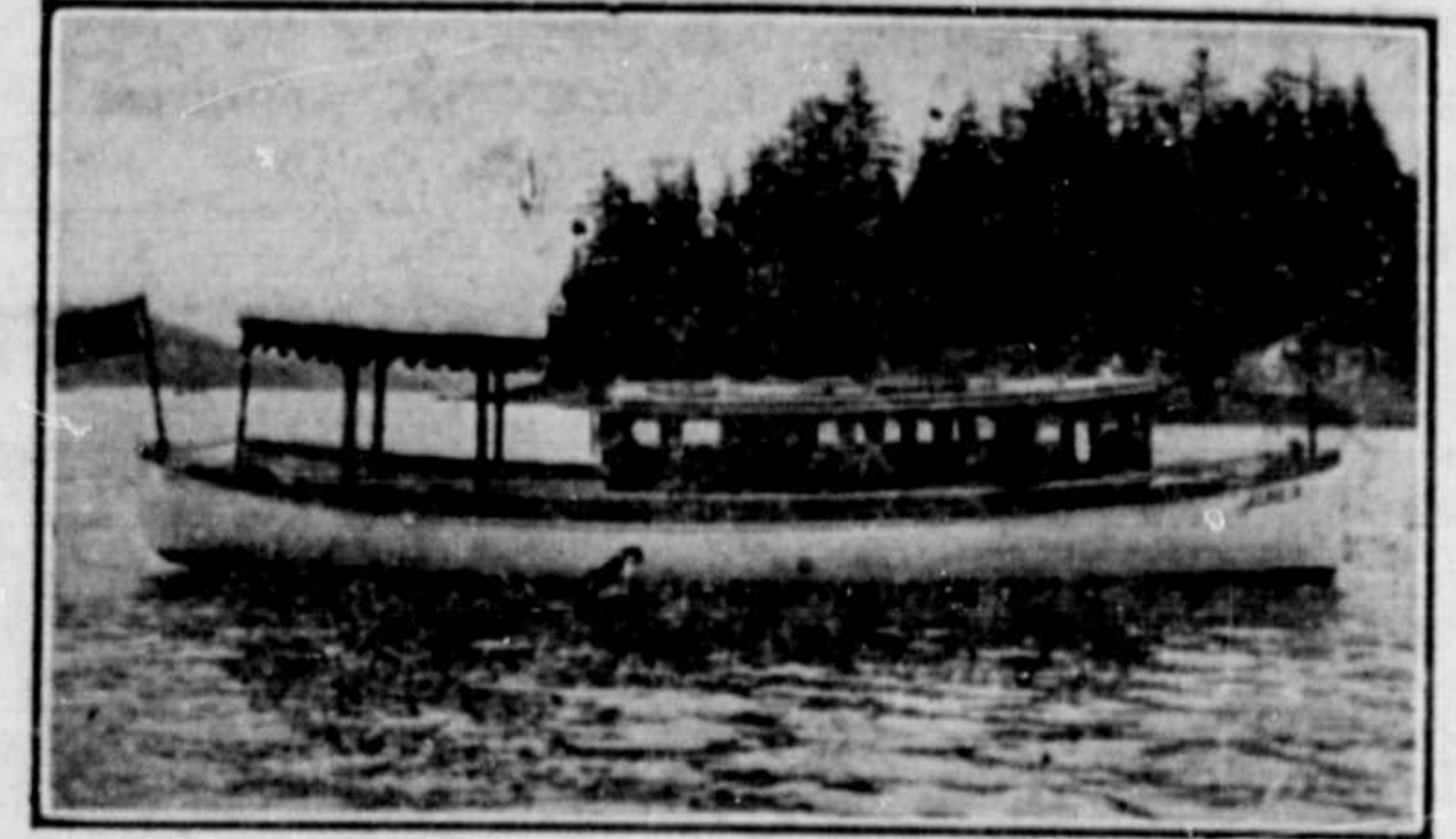
