GERMAN FIGHTING STRENGTH IS WANING --- HEAVY FIGHTING AROUND VAUX

FAMOUS GERMAN EDITOR WANTS PEACE AT ONCE

German Censors Pass Peace Article — Wrecked Zeppelin is Now Being Salvaged — Activity in Holland.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 4.—Maximilian Harden, the famous German writer, in an article which has been passed by the German censors, appeals for immediate peace.

He says that, in spite of the series of brilliant German victories, the war is a cruel misfortune and a mistake by all concerned.

L-15 to be Salvaged.

Aeronautical officials are salvaging the German Zeppelin L-15 from the shallow waters of the river Thames. Experts state that the airship can be salvaged, rebuilt and used against the enemy within the space of three months.

Dutch Activity.

Despatches from Zurich, in Switzerland, via Rome, state that Holland has closed her German frontier and is massing all her available troops there.

Powder Explodes.

An accidental fire in powder works in Kent caused a series of explosions, from which the casualties number two hundred.

COUNCIL DECIDES TO FILL THE FIRE STAFF VACANCY

The council decided last evening to fill the vacancy in the fire staff, caused by the departure of Fireman Parkes, who is with the 402nd. The matter was left to the council by the fire committee. The mayor said he had consulted several fire insurance men and he felt that the vacancy should be filled.

Ald. Barrie thought that the place should be filled as there were many people who carried no fire insurance.

Ald. Montgomery said he would be in favor of filling the vacancy if the police commissioners would agree to taking a man off the police force. The mayor informed Ald. Montgomery that the police commissioners that day had decided to reduce the police staff by one man.

Ald. Montgomery, in view of this, moved that the vacancy be filled.

Ald. McClymont asked if anyone had been done in regard to volunteer firemen. The mayor said that the volunteers had not yet come forward. It was decided to instruct the fire chief to hire one fireman.

TORIES GRANT M'BRIDE THAT COMPENSATION

Macdonald's Amendment is Voted Down and Dick gets \$15,000 a Year — Colonel J. W. Allison Has Been Found.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, April 4.—The Legislature has passed the vote of a salary of \$15,000 for Sir Richard McBride as agent-general of British Columbia, voting down an amendment brought in by M. A. Macdonald that the salary be fixed at \$6,000, the same as is paid to the agents-general of Ontario, Alberta and Quebec. The Legislature also voted \$175,000 for the completion of the Provincial Building in London.

Prohibition Convention.

The prohibitionists will hold a convention in the Victoria Theatre today, when they will consider the government bill and will decide on the policy of the prohibition party for the coming elections.

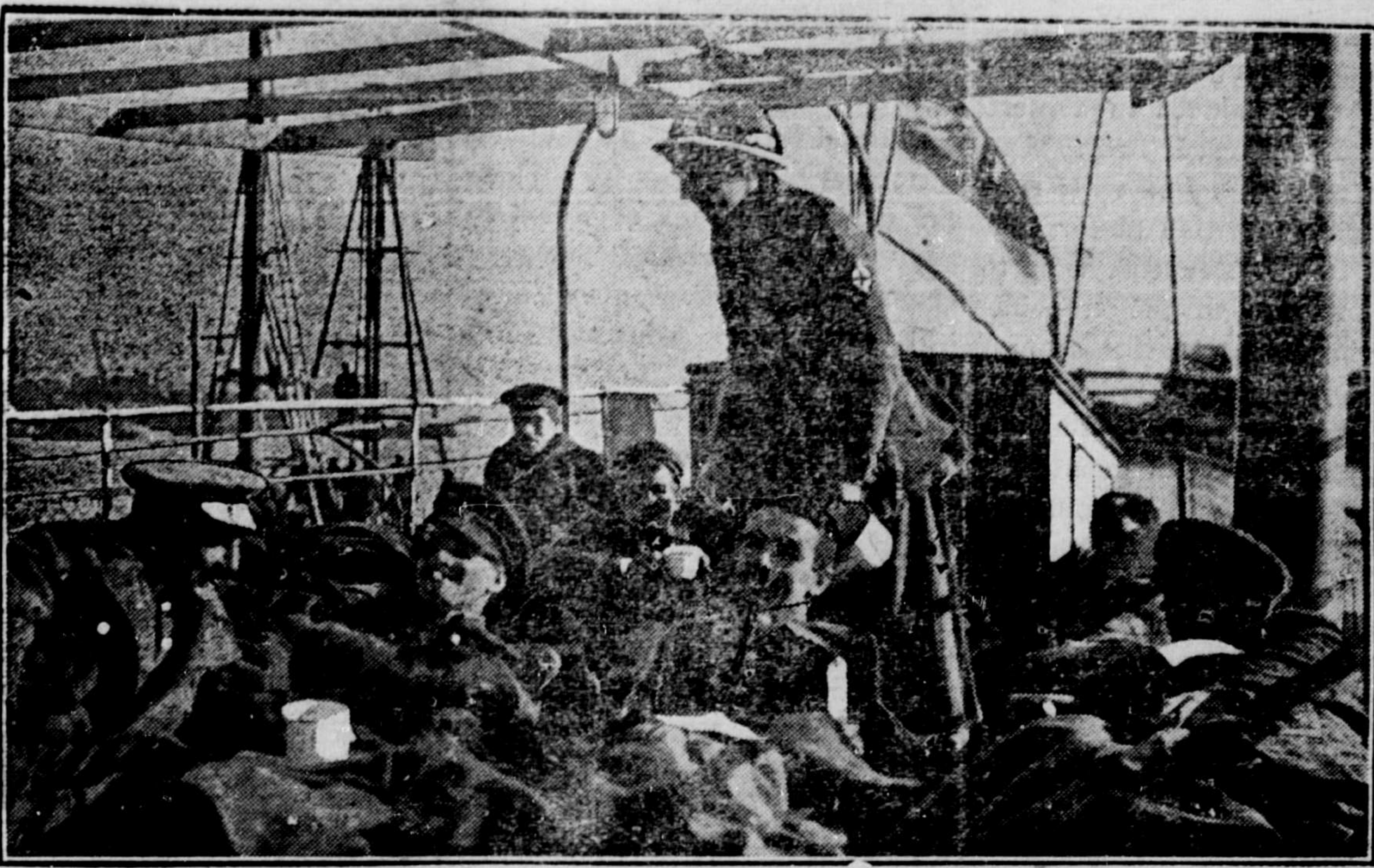
K. OF P. DANCE WAS PRONOUNCED SUCCESS

DRYDOCK DELEGATION TO OTTAWA DEBATED

Several gentlemen waited on the city council last evening to impress upon the council the necessity of sending a delegation to Ottawa to back up the drydock resolution. Mr. George W. Morrow said that the citizens at the recent public meeting had expressed their approval of the idea of a delegation going to Ottawa, and he suggested that the mayor and Mr. J. E. Merryfield make the trip, including a visit to Montreal. His reason for suggesting Mr. Merryfield was that he was the Conservative leader in the district.

Mr. A. J. Prudhomme said he was in favor of the Mayor going, but thought that the one representative would be sufficient. He was strongly in favor of keeping politics entirely out of the question. He felt that after the 16th, when parliament prorogued would be soon enough, as, up to that date, the members would be very busy. He thought that the mayor should go about the end of the month.

Mr. T. D. Pattullo said that he understood that Mr. H. S. Clements represented the Conservative party of this district. He pointed out that Mr. Merryfield had refused to have anything to do with the recent public meeting on the drydock question. Mr. Merryfield had had ample time to take the matter up but had done nothing, and, in any case, he felt that this matter should be kept entirely outside of politics, as this city had already had more than enough of it.

The mayor had kept himself singularly free from politics and he felt that he would be a proper representative and would satisfy all parties. He was in favor of the Mayor going alone.

Mr. H. F. McRae said that he felt that someone should go. He was more interested in Prince Rupert than in politics and thought that politics should be kept out of the question entirely.

Ald. Montgomery said that it would be impossible to let the Mayor go at present, as he was

Chiefly owing to the halibut fishermen's strike which began towards the end of January, the halibut returns for Prince Rupert for February exceed those of Seattle by about 900,000 pounds. The Prince Rupert receipts totalled 1,602,895, while the deliveries by schooners and company vessels at Seattle amounted to only 736,000 pounds.

The strike seems to be as far away from settlement as a month ago, and Canadian owned boats have a great opportunity to reap a rich harvest in the meantime.

needed here on very important business. He suggested that a night letter be sent to Mr. H. S. Clements asking when it would be suitable to receive a delegation.

Ald. McClymont said that the mayor could not be spared at present and that if the citizens felt that the matter was very urgent, someone else should go, though he thought that a wire to Mr. Clements would enlighten them. He moved that a night letter be sent to Mr. Clements. This was seconded by Ald. Montgomery.

Mr. Prudhomme said that a public meeting could be called to appoint a delegation if the mayor could not go, though he believed that the business could be done better some ten days hence.

Mr. McRae suggested that the council decide on the sending of a delegation and the appointment could be made later.

Ald. Montgomery said that he felt that the whole matter was up to the government. The people's money had built the drydock and the railroad and he thought that the government should see to it that a shipbuilding job was forthcoming. He thought that the government might place an order for a successor to the Quadra now to set things going.

F. C. WADE DEALS WITH THE MACKAY LETTERS

We are in receipt of a letter from F. C. Wade in connection with the tabling of the MacKay correspondence, which is too long for publication. Mr. Wade goes fully into the points of the correspondence showing how the members of the cabinet ignored Dr. MacKay entirely after Dr. Young had offered him the post of president of the University. Dr. MacKay relinquished his work at Westminster Hall to prepare for the new post and only when a new man was appointed as president was he made aware that his engagement was off. He makes it very clear that Dr. MacKay had a very real grievance. The letter also makes plain the fact that Dr. MacKay took no active part in the publication of "The Crisis," though the pamphlet had been printed three years after such discourteous treatment had been meted out to him by the government.

The letter concludes as follows: "The most repulsive feature of the whole episode is the action of the government in publishing Dr. MacKay's private correspondence without his permission. Under the safeguards of privacy many things are uttered and written carelessly, for the simple reason that the protection which privacy affords makes caution less necessary. Who of us could stand the test if all our private letters and private remarks, jocular or malicious, were dragged into the light of day? If there is to be no more privacy, all reciprocal confidences, which are one of the most esteemed privileges of social life and friendship, must disappear utterly. We must all become Ishmaels and social pariahs. It was the glory of Peel that when Disraeli uttered his famous lie against him in the House of Commons he had under his hand Disraeli's letter with which he could have ruined him irretrievably, but preferred to suffer and forebore it. Respect for private communications has ever been one of the proud boasts of gentlemen wherever found. The government has not only published Dr. MacKay's

GERMAN ARMY RUNNING SHORT OF FIGHTING MEN

Changed German Tactics on the Western Front — Estimates Show that Kaiser's Army is Dwindling.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 3.—There is heavy fighting around Vaux. No infantry attacks were made last night, the French continuing their bombardment on the Douaumont-Vaux front. The German reply was feeble.

The occupation of Haucourt and Bethincourt by the Germans resulted in heavy loss to the enemy, the concealed batteries of the French pouring a heavy fire into the German flanks.

Germany Short of Men.

There is evidence that Germany is running short of soldiers. All her 1916 class are now in the trenches and the German casualties of the first three months of 1916 amount to a total of 300,000 men. It is estimated that the German reserve amounts to only 700,000 men.

Changed Tactics in West.

The Germans on the western front have divided their army into two masses, with thirty divisions facing the French at Verdun and thirty-four divisions facing the British front.

CANADA IN FLANDERS

The popular edition of "Canada in Flanders," by Sir Max Aitken, M. P., has been placed on the market by Hodder & Stoughton at 25 cents. It is a plain, unvarnished recital of the doings of the men who formed the first Canadian Expeditionary Force, and is certain to be read with the greatest interest and pride by all Canadians.

After congratulating Sir Sam Hughes on the rapidly with which he organized and equipped the contingent of Canadian soldiers from the ranks of civilians, the author describes the camp at Valenciennes; the transportation of the force across the Atlantic; its reception in England; its life on Salisbury Plain and then its experiences in the trenches.

The battles at Neuve Chapelle, at which only the Canadian artillery was engaged; Ypres, Festubert and Givenchy are gone into in detail and make intensely interesting reading. The exploits of the various battalions are described so far as details may be gone into at the present stage of the war, and their recital will stir the blood and brighten the eye of every Canadian and Britisher. Diagrams of the various battle fields are provided and aid considerably in the following of the movements described by the author. At a later date a fuller history of these battles will be published, but there is enough in the present small volume to show that the Canadian citizen soldiers acquitted themselves with the utmost bravery and resource. At times small companies were isolated and the Canadian officers had to act on their own initiative and invariably they chose the most

daring plan and in every case were amazingly successful, on several occasions the very daring and unorthodoxy of their methods fooling the enemy.

A whole chapter is devoted to the deeds of the "Princess Pals," and it is a thrilling chapter. This gallant regiment which was reduced to a mere remnant, covered itself with glory and its name will ring throughout British history.

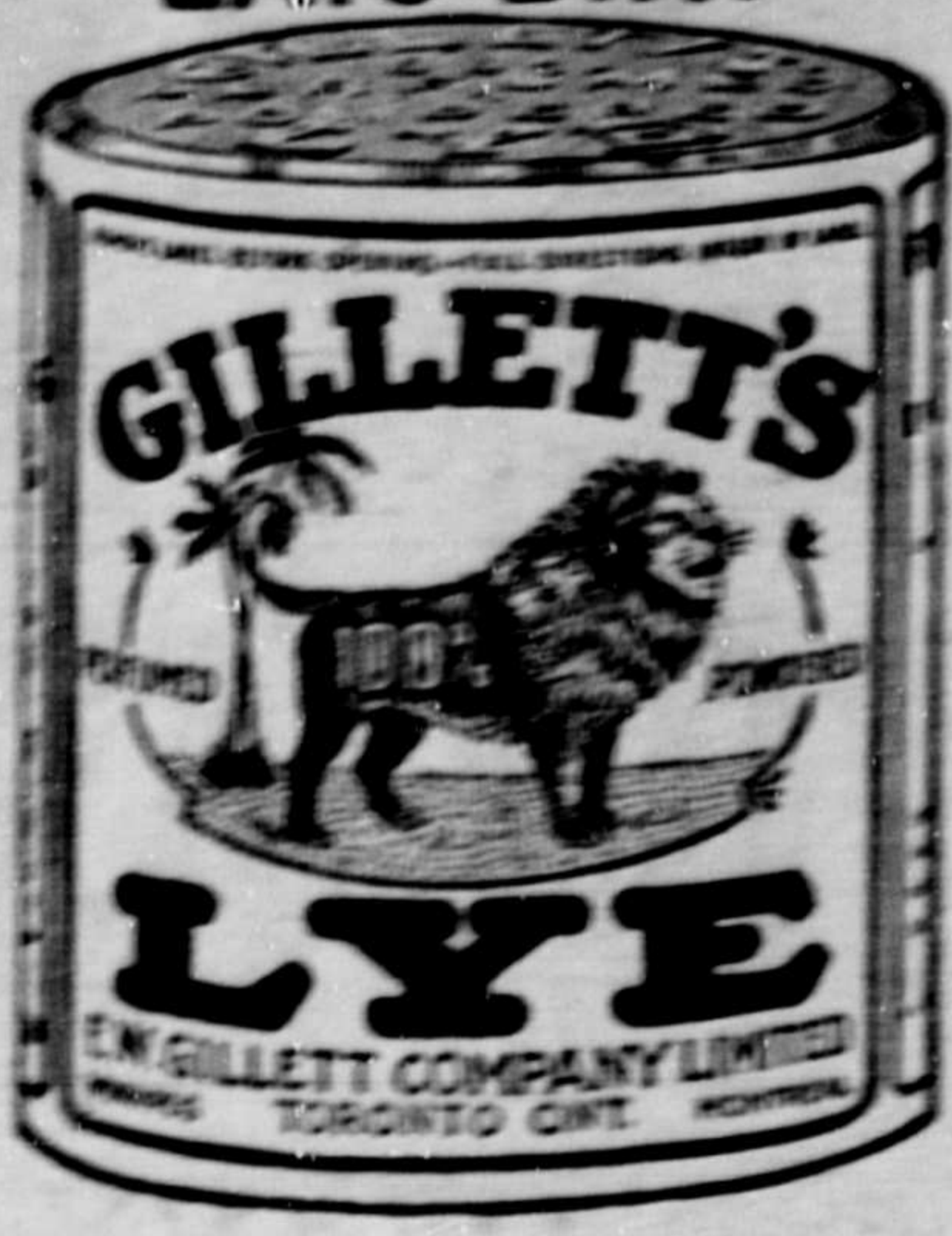
Sir Robert Borden's visit to England and to the trenches occupies a considerable amount of space, parts of his speeches being reproduced. In the enthusiasm of the moment, Sir Max places Sir Robert alongside the late Cecil Rhodes, Joseph Chamberlain and Louis Botha, the great South African leader, as an Empire builder of recent times, and ranks him with Pitt and Chatham and Clive and Hastings of an earlier day. It is early yet to place Sir Robert in his niche in history, but there is no harm in Sir Max looking ahead. "Canada in Flanders" should and will be read by all Canadians.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

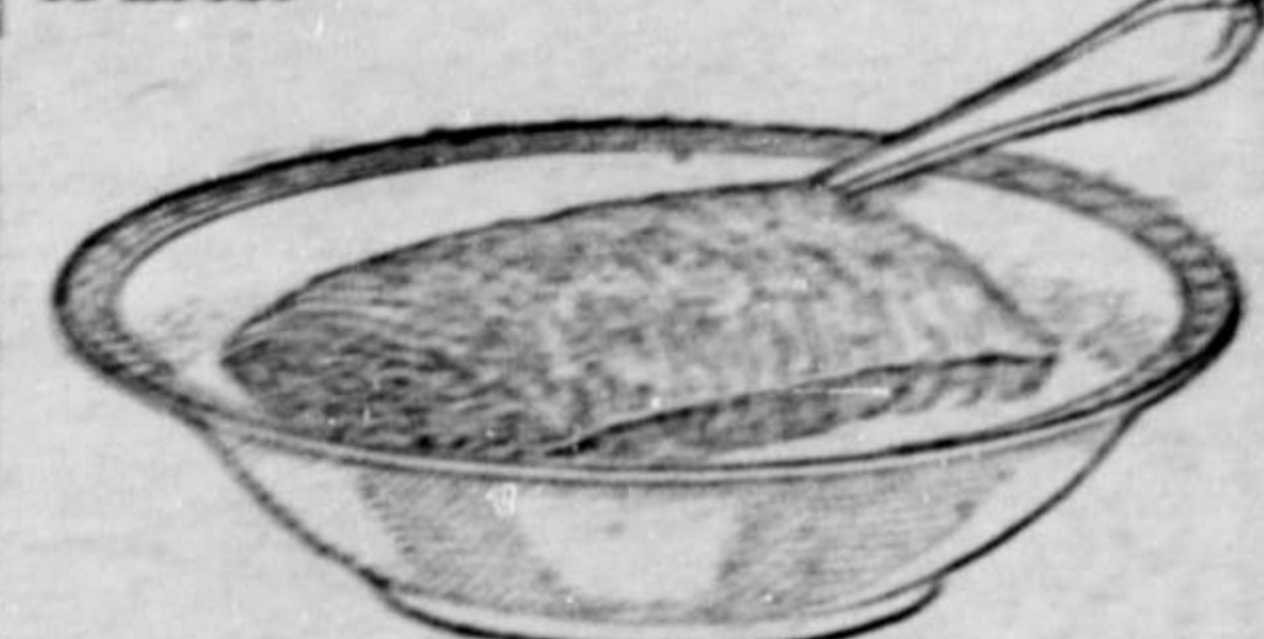

any government vessel. He drew attention to the fact that the citizens of Seattle had given financial assistance to the yards there in securing the first work and that possibly the G. T. P. could make some arrangement in this way.

Ald. Montgomery pointed out that the yards in Seattle were privately owned while this dock was built with the people's money and that the government should place work.

Ald. Nelson pointed out that the drydock was owned by the G. T. P. and not by the government.

T. D. Pattullo said that though it was a G. T. P. dock, still the government had a monetary interest in it on behalf of the people and he thought with Ald. Montgomery that it was entirely up to the government. The government was responsible for the dock being here and for the people being here and he felt that the government should place an order with the dock. He thought that

a wire to Mr. Clements would simply bring the reply that the matter was being considered, with the usual result. It was a time to demand that the government come through and that at once.

With regard to the appointment of a delegation, he thought that was entirely up to the council, as they were putting up the costs, though he would willingly abide by the decision of a public meeting on all questions and at all times.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
