Changed German Tactics on the Western Front - Estimates Show that Kaiser's Army is Dwindling.

Paris, April 3.—There is heavy fighting around Vaux. No infantry attacks were made last night, the French continuing their bombardment on the Douamont-Vaux front. The German reply was feeble.

The occupation of Haucourt and Bethincourt by the Germans resulted in heavy loss to the enemy, the concealed batteries of the French pouring a heavy fire into the German flanks.



In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. 4.-What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the childhen are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
