SUBS DISREGARD NATIONALITY -- GERMANS LOSE GROUND AROUND VERDUN

GERMANS LOSE GROUND AROUND VERDUN FOR

Enemy Driven Back with very Heavy Losses—British Trade is Expanding in Spite of the War.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 5.—The Germans lost ground around Verdun, between Douaumont and Vaux, yesterday and sustained heavy casualties. Three German regiments which made an attack upon Chafour woods were driven back by the rifle fire and shrapnel of the French, leaving half their number dead on the field before retreating.

British Budget.

London, April 5.—The new budget was introduced by Chancellor of the Exchequer McKenna yesterday. Mr. McKenna tackles the problem of providing for a war which is costing \$25,000,000 per day.

New taxes have been placed upon amusements, railway tickets, matches, mineral waters, and there are increases in the tax on incomes, cocoa, sugar, coffee and motor cars. The new and increased taxation will provide an additional \$325,000,000. Revenue last year exceeded the estimate by \$160,000,000, owing to the expansion of British trade.

PRINCE JOHN RETURNS FROM ALASKAN TRIP

The Prince John returned from her initial run to Alaskan ports one hour ahead of schedule time yesterday afternoon. George A. McNicholl, assistant general freight and passenger agent for the company, made the round trip to Skagway, accompanied by R. Beament, assistant to Captain Nicholson. The officials state that they are well satisfied with the first trip and that the citizens of the Alaskan ports visited are delighted that this new service has been opened up. The Prince John leaves again on Thursday for the north.

Throughout most of the trip very heavy rain was experienced and it was only when nearing Prince Rupert that sunshine was encountered. The Alaskan passengers who arrived yesterday were agreeably surprised to find that Prince Rupert was enjoying brilliant sunshine while the northern part of the coast was being literally soaked.

HOLLAND MAKES PREPARATIONS FOR DEFENSIVE

Navy and Army Mobilized Merely as Precaution—Automobiles Commandeered and Fleet Ready.

(Special to The Daily News.)

The Hague, April 5.—Following a secret session of the Dutch parliament yesterday, the president announced that the suspension of all naval and military furloughs was merely a precautionary measure, and not the result of any political entanglements. This measure had been adopted on account of certain information which had reached the government, but it was considered inopportune to make public at the present time.

Mobilization Complete.

The mobilization of the Dutch forces has been completed and every motor car in Holland has been commandeered by the government. The army has been mobilized on the German frontier, while the fleet has gone through maneuvers along the line of repelling an invasion of Holland from the sea.

ESPERANZA PROPERTY SHIPS FIFTY TONS

Pedro Salinas, of the Esperanza mine at Alice Arm, came south on the Venture this forenoon. He reports that everything is going splendidly at his property and that another fifty tons of ore were shipped to the smelter at Granby yesterday. The last shipment ran 220 ounces of silver, \$5.50 in copper and \$4.60 of gold, with a small percentage of zinc. This shipment is expected to pan out equally well. Pedro has put in a lot of hard work in the Alice Arm district, but is now being amply repaid for his labor.

"SIR ROBERT" MOUNTAIN

The Geographical Board of Canada has perpetuated the name and fame of Sir Robert Borden for as long as the topography of the Dominion lasts. In the latest official records of the board "Sir Robert" is the name given to a mountain in the British Columbia coast range, nine miles southeast of Doreen station on the G. T. P. At the foot of the mountain there is a glacier which has been named Borden.

A. J. MORRIS PASSED AWAY YESTERDAY

It will be with the deepest regret that citizens of Prince Rupert will learn of the passing away of Mr. A. J. Morris, in Edmonton yesterday. Mr. Morris contracted a very heavy cold while on a visit to the east last fall and never seemed to regain his strength, though a letter to a friend in this city by the last mail stated that he hoped to be about again very soon.

Mr. Morris was born in England about forty years ago. He came out to Victoria, B. C., while a boy and entered the service of Mr. John Piercy of that city, afterwards travelling throughout the Yukon and along the coast for the firm of John Piercy & Company. About eight years ago Mr. Morris opened a Prince Rupert branch for the firm and became a partner in the firm of Piercy, Morris Company, Limited.

The firm's first place of business was on Centre Street, afterwards being moved into the large warehouse which still bears the name. As trade developed in the interior, Mr. Morris removed the firm's headquarters to Edmonton.

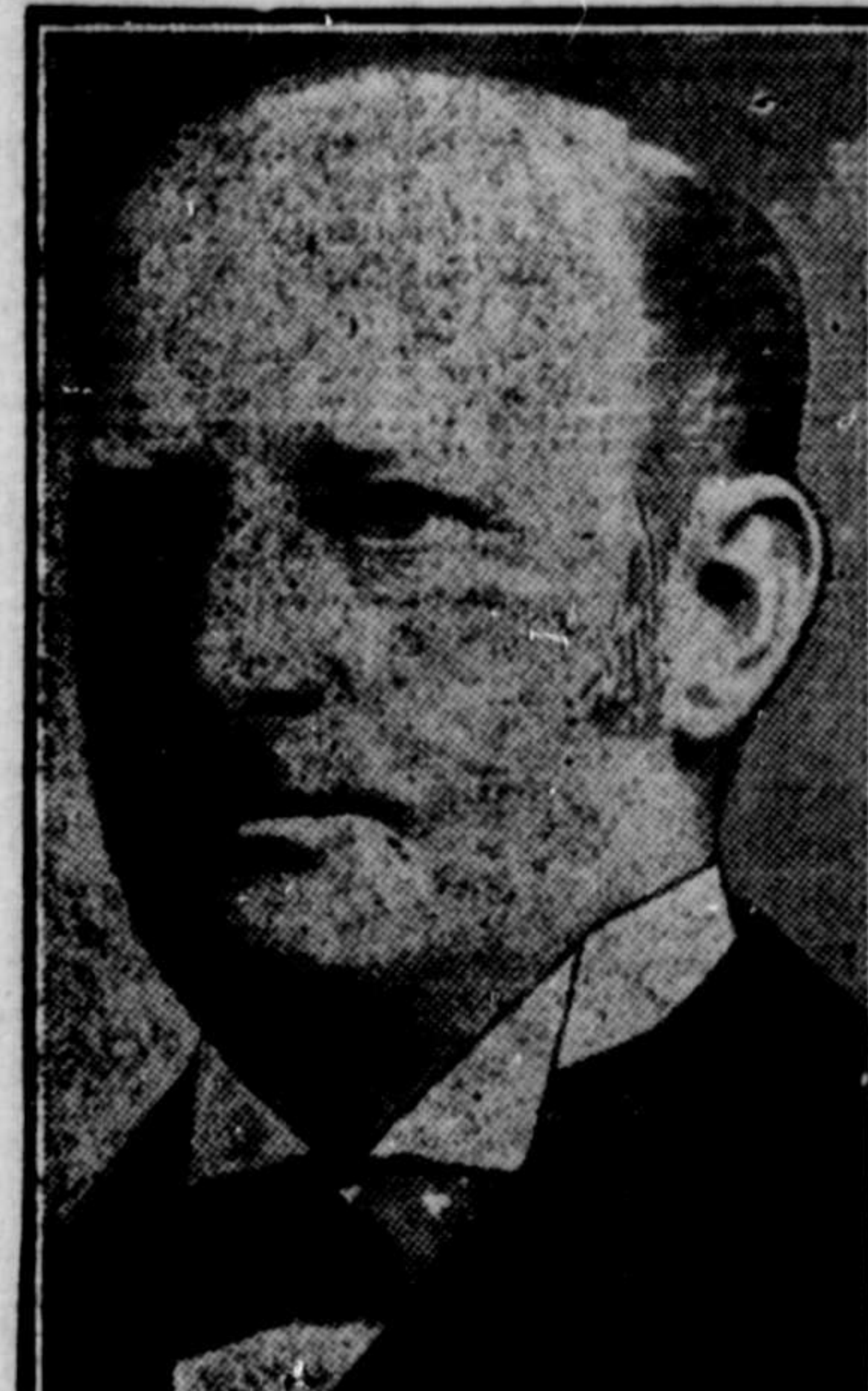

STEAMERS SUNK IRRESPECTIVE OF NATIONALITY

Many More Victims Claimed by German Submarines—Dutch Enquiry into Sinking of the Tubantia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 5.—German submarines have sunk the British steamer Bendew and the Spanish steamer Vigo in the Bay of Biscay; the Norwegian steamer Belle off the Scilly Isles, and the Dutch steamer Elaine Bolora in the North Sea.

A Norwegian steamer was sighted, flying signals of distress in the Bay of Biscay and a British steamer approached to render assistance, but, observing a German submarine close by, made for the nearest port, sixty miles away, where information was lodged with the British and Norwegian consuls.

Dutch Enquiry.

The Dutch government has ordered an enquiry into the sinking of the Dutch steamers Tubantia and Elaine Bolora.

The fragments of a German torpedo which were discovered in the Channel steamer Sussex have been forwarded to Washington.

OLD TIMER PASSED AWAY AT GRANBY

Jim Morris, better known as "Dad" Morris, passed away at Anyox yesterday, aged about seventy. "Dad" was in the service of the Hudson's Bay Company at Port Simpson and located in Granby before the establishment of the mining company there. He has a son, Ambrose, serving in the 102nd.

GERMANY'S MISTAKE

Maximilian Harden's article demanding immediate peace, having been passed by the German censors, seems to bear the official stamp upon it, as, until recently, no Berlin editor, no matter how famous, dared to mention the word "peace." We have been repeatedly told that the popular subject of private discussion in Germany is an early peace, but no newspaper had the courage to mention the subject, the penalties for so doing being thoroughly Prussian.

Maximilian Harden is the most brilliant of German newspaper men and there can be little doubt but that his article received official endorsement before it saw the light of day. Even in Germany, public opinion is strong though it may be slower in gaining expression than in more democratic countries. The German people want peace, and official Germany would also welcome peace, if the Allies are willing to allow Germany to go back to her old ways just as if nothing had happened.

Harden says the war was a mistake. On the part of Germany, it was not a mistake, but simply a case of wholesale murder which had been premeditated and planned for forty years. Germany's one regret is that she has failed and must now pay the price for her failure. In miscalculating her chances of success, Germany certainly made mistakes, and such mistakes have to be paid for, but the greatest punishment must come to her because of her criminal intent, and much of that punishment may be meted out by her own people when they realise the truth.

DEAR GASOLINE

We publish a letter from G. A. Woodland, which explains the enormous increase in the price of gasoline. The facts brought out in the recent investigation in the United States into the rapid and large increases in the cost of this commodity are very similar to those stated in this letter. So acutely is the huge price of gasoline felt that Pacific coast fishermen are considering the advisability of petitioning Congress to take some action to prohibit the export of gasoline to foreign countries.

The whole question seems to be one of supply and demand, though one never can get away from the feeling that any commodity handled largely by John D. Rockefeller and his associates does not always depend upon any natural law for its price.

Mr. Woodland mentions that the price of gasoline in London is 60 cents per gallon, but it must be remembered that this price includes the duty, which, if we mistake not, is somewhere around 25 cents per gallon, Lloyd George's 1910 budget having raised the duty from 8 cents to 14 cents and a subsequent war budget having added the difference. However, London is still paying slightly more for gasoline than Prince Rupert is. The real solution is in the reduction of the consumption of the commodity, and that is bound to come through, as Mr. Woodland suggests, the improvement of carburetors, etc. In some lines electricity will be substituted, as it is now in up-to-date linotype machines, which carry an electrical heating appliance to take the place of the old gasoline burner. The big price of gasoline will hasten the perfecting of the Diesel and other oil-burning engines and gradually substitutes will be found for the very scarce gasoline.

In the Letter Box

The Editor, The Daily News,
 Dear Sir:—We feel it desirable that from a local standpoint it would be well for us to explain to gasoline users the reason for the unprecedented price of that commodity at the present time.

The demand for gasoline is now and will probably be throughout 1916 greater than the available supply; as the production of naphtha bearing crude oils has not kept pace with the constantly increasing consumption. The large increase in the number of automobiles, motor boats, farm tractors and stationary gas engines has brought the gasoline price to its present level.

In 1905 there were approximately 1200 automobiles registered in the Dominion of Canada. In 1910 10,000 cars were in operation, and in 1915, 83,000. The automobile manufacturers estimate that in

1916 there will be over 3,000,000 cars in operation in Canada and the United States.

In 1905 there was probably not one gasoline tractor owned in the Dominion of Canada. In 1910, 2,000 of these machines were in operation, and in 1915 there were approximately 8,000 gasoline tractors in the Dominion. The average high power gasoline tractor consumes a barrel of gasoline every ten working hours.

In 1915 it is estimated that there were only 5,000 stationary gas engines in use in the Dominion. By 1910 this number had increased to 25,000, and at the present time there are over 100,000 of these machines, all helping to swell the figures for gasoline consumption.

In 1905 Canada used approximately 100,000 barrels of gasoline. In 1910 approximately 390,000 barrels of gasoline, and in

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

(Continued From Page Two.)
1915 the consumption of gasoline in the Dominion was over 1,300,000 barrels.
Most of the gasoline refined in Canada is manufactured from United States crude, as the production of crude oil in the Ontario field is not large. Unfortunately the great increase in the number of gasoline consuming machines has not been followed by a proportionate increase in the production of crude oil, in fact some of the large naphtha producing crudes in the States have shown a marked falling off in production. The great Cushing field in Oklahoma is now producing considerably less than 100,000 barrels per day, as against 300,000 barrels per day, which it was producing a year ago.
The decrease in the production of naphtha bearing crudes has caused the price of this grade of crude oil to soar, and refineries are now paying from two to three times as much for crude as the price paid a year ago.
The price of gasoline in London, England, at the present time is 60 cents per gallon. Our price at Prince Rupert is on a ratio with the prices paid in New York.
Our hope is that some inventive genius will evolve a practical kerosene carburetor which would enable a large proportion of the motor driven vehicles to operate on refined oil as fuel.
