FRENCH AND BRITISH SUCCESSFUL IN WEST

ATTEMPTED AIR RAID ON ENGLAND--HUN SUBMARINE SUNK--NORWAY ANGRY

FRENCH TROOPS GAINED GROUND WEST OF MEUSE

German Submarine Sunk—British are Successful in Mining and Artillery Work—Zeppelin Driven Off.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 6.—The French have captured a large portion of the German positions on the Avoncourt front at Bois-Carre and west of the Meuse on the Avoncourt-Bethincourt line.

German Submarine Sunk.

The Minister of Marine announces the sinking of a German submarine by an Anglo-French squadron. The submarine crew were taken prisoners.

British Success.

The British have carried out successful mining and artillery operations destroying enemy positions at St. Eloi and north of Ypres on the St. Julien road.

Norway Angry.

The Norwegian press takes a threatening attitude towards Germany, being angered over the torpedoing in the last few days of eleven Norwegian ships with the loss of twenty lives.

Attempted Air Raid.

London, April 6.—A single Zeppelin attempted the sixth air raid on the northeast coast of England this week. It was driven off by gun-fire. The airship dropped bombs into the sea and returned home. A second Zeppelin was hit in the last raid judging from the carbon copy of a wireless message from her commander, which has been picked up.

HUN SUBMARINE FIRED TORPEDO AT RESCUE SHIP

French Official Report on Sinking of Sussex—Brazilian Blockade Runner Caught—Intrigue in Bulgaria.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 6.—The official report by Admiral Grassett, of the French Admiralty, in connection with the sinking of the Channel steamer Sussex, states that the captain and passengers saw a torpedo speeding towards the vessel eight seconds before she was struck. The captain tried to manoeuvre his ship to avoid the missile. The fore part of the Sussex was severed and foundered while the after part remained afloat.

Twelve hours after she was struck, about three a. m., when a British destroyer picked up the boatload of survivors, a submarine which was hiding in the vicinity of the Sussex, fired a torpedo.

Blockade Runner.

The Brazilian steamer Saldanha De Gama has been seized off the Orkney Islands with a cargo of 1,200 tons of raw rubber consigned to New York. The vessel was making a deliberate attempt to run the blockade.

Intrigue in Bulgaria.

M. Chenadieff, a former premier of Bulgaria, has been arrested, along with seven others, on a charge of intriguing against the government.

W. T. DONNELLY HERE TO INSPECT DRYDOCK

Mr. W. T. Donnelly, who planned the drydock, arrived from the south on the Prince Rupert today. Mr. Donnelly intends to inspect the dock and return south on Saturday morning.

Interviewed by The Daily News with reference to the possibility of work coming to the dock at an early date, Mr. Donnelly said, "The citizens of Prince Rupert must realise that the Grand Trunk Pacific are not overlooking any tricks in this connection. The company is, in the very nature of things, anxious to see speedy development at their Pacific coast terminal, and is spending large sums every day to keep Prince Rupert on the map."

Questioned as to his visit to Ottawa, Mr. Donnelly said that he went straight to Ottawa after his last visit here and laid the claims of the drydock before Sir Robert Borden, while he also interviewed the representatives of the British government who were over here at that time.

BIG PASSENGER LIST

The Prince Rupert this morning carried over a hundred first-class passengers and the wharf had quite a tourist season appearance after the vessel berthed. There were twenty-five through passengers for Alaska, who left on the Prince John this afternoon.

LEGAL INSPECTOR SHARED COMMISSION

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, April 6.—C. C. Pemberton, broker, in examination before the public accounts committee, has admitted that he divided a commission of \$4,000 on the purchase of the Victoria Court House site with H. C. Hannington, inspector of legal offices for the provincial government.

Money Bills Passed.

The Lieutenant-Governor has given his assent to the money bills today. The vote for supplies totals eleven million dollars, and includes J. H. Turner's pension of \$6,000 and a bonus of \$5,000.

BLOOD MONEY IN MILLIONS FOR MUNITIONS GRAFTERS

CONFIDENTIAL FRIEND OF MINISTER OF MILITIA MADE HUGE FORTUNE IN TURNING OVER CONTRACTS FOR FUSES AND SHELLS TO DUMMY COMPANIES

The revelations in connection with the fuse and shell contracts let to dummy companies by the shell committee, and on which huge sums were paid before any work was done, have caused consternation in Ottawa and throughout the country. The Toronto Globe deals with the matter editorially as follows:

"The lid is off at Ottawa. Further pretence that the revelations made do not warrant an investigation into the operations of the Shell Committee will be received with indignation by the Canadian people. The excuse that the Committee was responsible to the Imperial government, and that any investigation must be made by authority of Mr. Lloyd George, can no longer be advanced without bringing Sir Robert Borden's ministry into contempt.

"Documents have been produced and read in the House of Commons showing that one of the most scandalous transactions ever carried out by a group of high finance bandits was formally endorsed and ratified in the following terms:

"I, Major-General the Hon. S. Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence of the Dominion of Canada, in accordance with authority duly conferred upon me by His Britannic Majesty's Government, hereby ratify and confirm on its behalf the foregoing agreement between the American Ammunition Company, Incorporated, and the Shell Committee. Dated at Ottawa, Canada, this 19th day of June, A. D. 1915."

"What was this agreement so unreservedly ratified and confirmed by the Canadian Minister of Militia and Defence? The American Ammunition Co. was a make-believe company, organized by dummy directors and officers under the laws of the State of Virginia three weeks before the agreement was made between it and His Britannic Majesty. Its authorized capital was a million dollars, but only \$1,000 was subscribed. This company, without plant, or factory, or assets, or any means of carrying on business, was awarded a contract by General Bertram and the Shell Committee, with the approval of General Hughes, for 1,666,666 graze fuses for projectiles at \$4 each, and 833,334 time fuses at \$4.50 each.

On this huge contract, involving almost ten and a half million dollars, a cash advance of \$1,041,000 was made on the day the contract was signed, and another cash advance of \$520,000 was made four months afterwards. These sums should have been sufficient to build and equip at least four up-to-date fuse factories of large capacity. There was the most urgent need of projectiles, for at that time the Rus-

sians were being driven out of Poland for lack of shells, and the Canadian factories were piling up shells that were useless without fuses. Yet more than six months after the contract was made the American Ammunition Co. had not delivered a single one of the 833,334 time fuses it had contracted to supply, and only 160,000 of the graze fuses. Under similar circumstances a contract was entered into with another mushroom concern, the International Arms & Fuse Company, and this organization two weeks ago had delivered only 6,000 fuses out of a total of 2,500,000 contracted for, and upon which cash advances of \$1,687,000 had been made by the Shell Committee.

"Why this criminal delay? Who was behind the scenes influencing the Shell Committee and securing vast contracts for irresponsible middlemen without means to manufacture the articles they had contracted to supply? The sinister figure of Col. J. Wesley Allison, the confidential friend of the Minister of Militia, is seen in the background. B. F. Yoakum, who secured a rake-off of \$475,000 for negotiating and effecting the contract with the Shell Committee, out of a total of a million dollars divided between the middlemen involved, was a partner of Col. Wesley Allison, under this partnership agreement, was entitled to receive a portion of the rake-off on the American Ammunition Company's contract.

"Was that commission paid to Allison and to Yoakum out of the cash advances made to the company which should have been spent on the purchase of material and the equipment of factories for the manufacture of urgently required munitions? That question must be answered. If Sir Robert Borden does not permit an inquiry by the Public Accounts Committee or some other competent tribunal he and his government should be forced to go before the electorate to defend their refusal. Canada's honor is involved in the disclosures made by Mr. Kyte. A group of Canadians appointed by Mr. Lloyd George on the nomination of the Government of Canada to manage the manufacture of munitions in Canada refused to take steps looking to the making of fuses in the Do-

GRAVE CRISIS

The Borden government faces the most serious crisis which any Dominion government has ever been called upon to face. It may be that no minister is directly concerned in the profiteering carried on by alleged munitions companies in the United States, but, taking the most lenient view of the situation possible, there has been a display of gross negligence and incapacity. At a time when the people of Britain have been urged to use one lump of sugar instead of two, the men who had the distribution of hundreds of millions of dollars worth of munitions contracts have allowed grafters to get away with millions. Whether any member of the government or the shell committee shared in the graft remains to be seen, but, for the sake of the good name of Canada, it is to be sincerely hoped that they did not.

The members of the government are in a state of consternation and the Conservative papers in the east are loud in their clamor for a thorough investigation, while a few short weeks ago, we were calmly told that this was an Imperial matter with which the Dominion government had nothing whatever to do. The Toronto Telegram (Conservative) accuses Borden of placing a political halter around the necks of the thirty Ontario members and accuses the premier of a "fatal inability to act until action is useless." The Toronto News, while reiterating that the government has never condoned wrongdoing, states that "it will not hesitate to sacrifice a minister of the Crown if that is necessary in the public interest and in order to maintain decent political conditions."

The situation is much too grave for any seeking for party advantage in the matter. Where the good name of Canada is at stake, party must sink miles out of sight. If the statements made by Mr. Kyte are true, and he would not have dared make them unless he had substantial proof, then Canada has received a staggering blow which will prove far more injurious than any diabolical scheme contrived by the Germans could ever have delivered. The barbarians who wrecked the cathedral of Rheims are noblemen compared to men who will drain the life's blood of their own land at such a time, and, even in a calm moment, it would be difficult to conceive of a punishment that would fit the crime.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

When Sir Robert Borden cabled to Sir Sam Hughes to return because of the Allison scandals, Sir Sam replied that he desired a full investigation to be carried out by Sir Charles Davidson. Why Sir Charles Davidson?

Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the debate on the resolution demanding an investigation into the shell contracts said that "the worst feature of the case was not the waste of millions of the public money, but the irreparable loss of time in the delivery of the completed shells so sorely needed at the front."

Prince Rupert manufacturers could not get a contract for shells yet a flute player in a Montreal orchestra shared in contracts for millions of dollars worth.

It now transpires that the Hon. D. Lloyd George instructed Mr. D. A. Thomas to consult with Sir

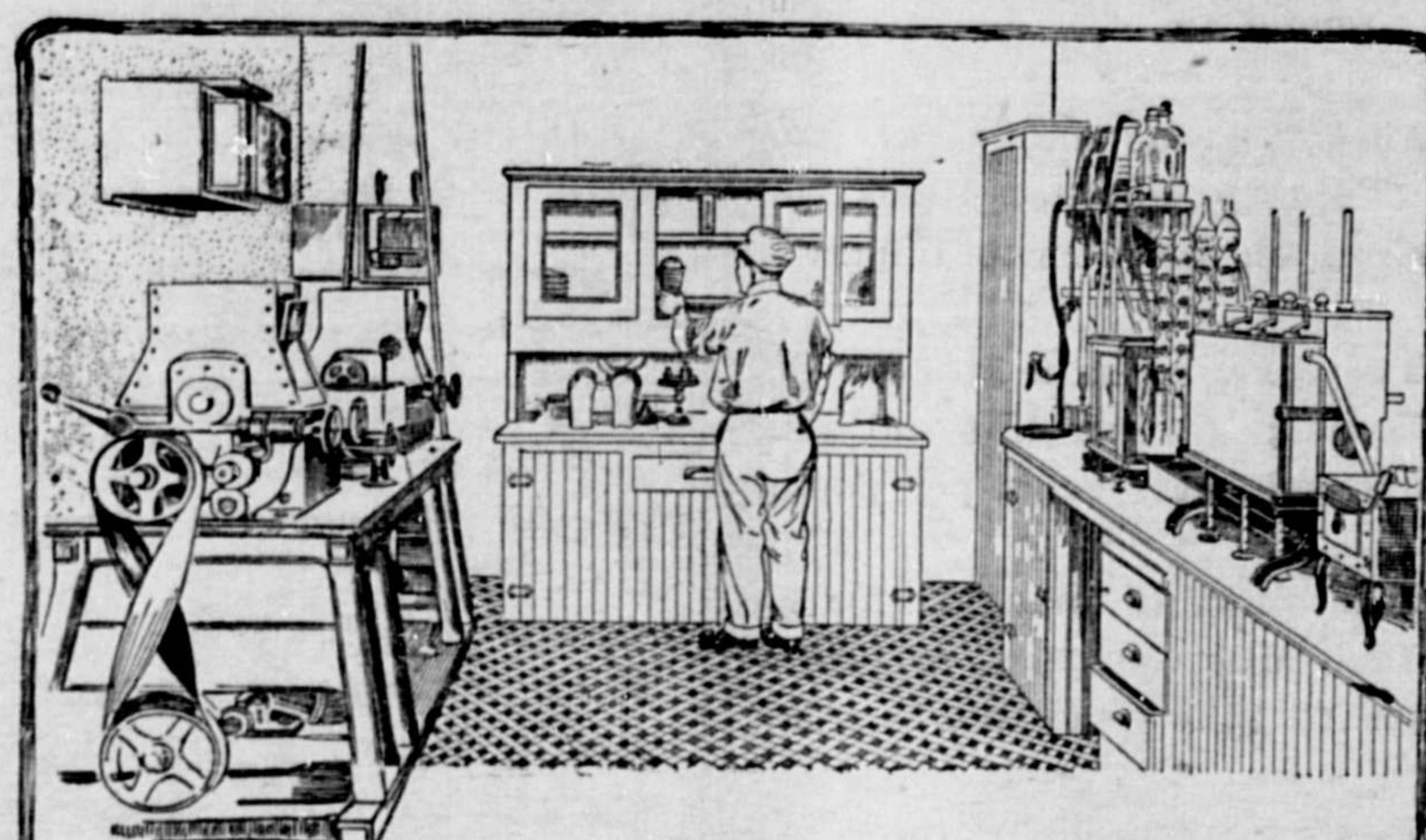

minion, and, with the approval of the Minister of Militia, advanced over three million dollars to a group of American middlemen to aid in the speedy turning out of fuses in the United States. Documentary evidence appears to point to the division amongst these middlemen—one of whom was a confidential friend of the Minister of Militia—of a rake-off amounting to a million dollars before arrangements were completed for the manufacture of the fuses.

"From the Minister's confidential friend to the Minister is but a step. No one has charged Sir Sam Hughes with participation in this orgy of war contract graft, but the people of Canada will not be content with negative exculpation. They expect General Hughes to take the stand before a properly constituted Court of Inquiry and declare on oath that he was not a party to Allison's

exploitation and obtained no advantage from it. They expect also that he will disavow any knowledge of the million-dollar rake-off and of the bogus nature of the companies which, on a joint capital of \$4,000, secured contracts, approved by him, aggregating twenty-two millions.

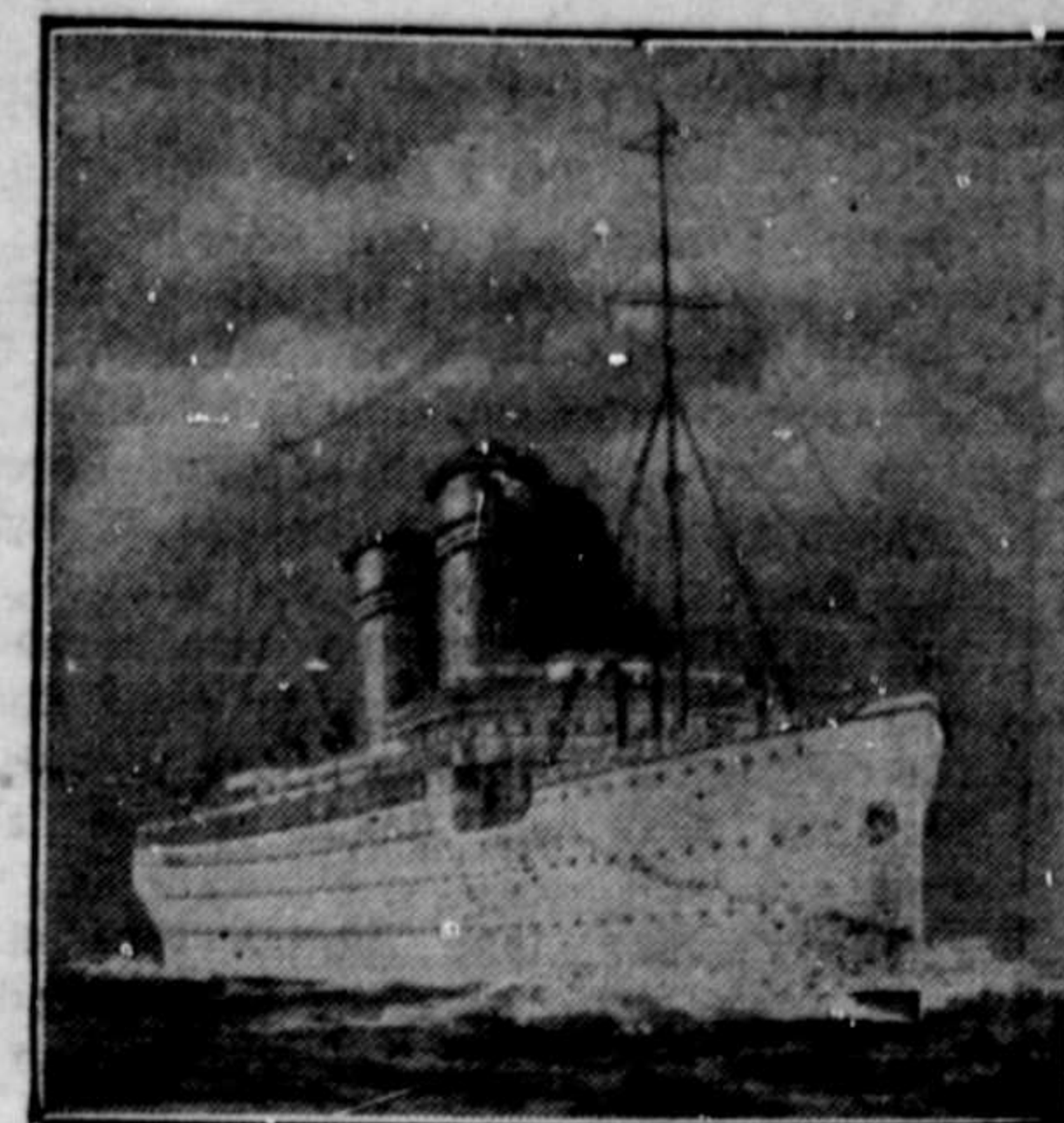
Only by the most explicit disclaimers before a tribunal charged with the investigation of the whole subject will General Hughes be able to disassociate himself from the dirty mess that is befouling Canada's good name. The government must act, and act at once."

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits. **QUESTIONS ANSWERED.**

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

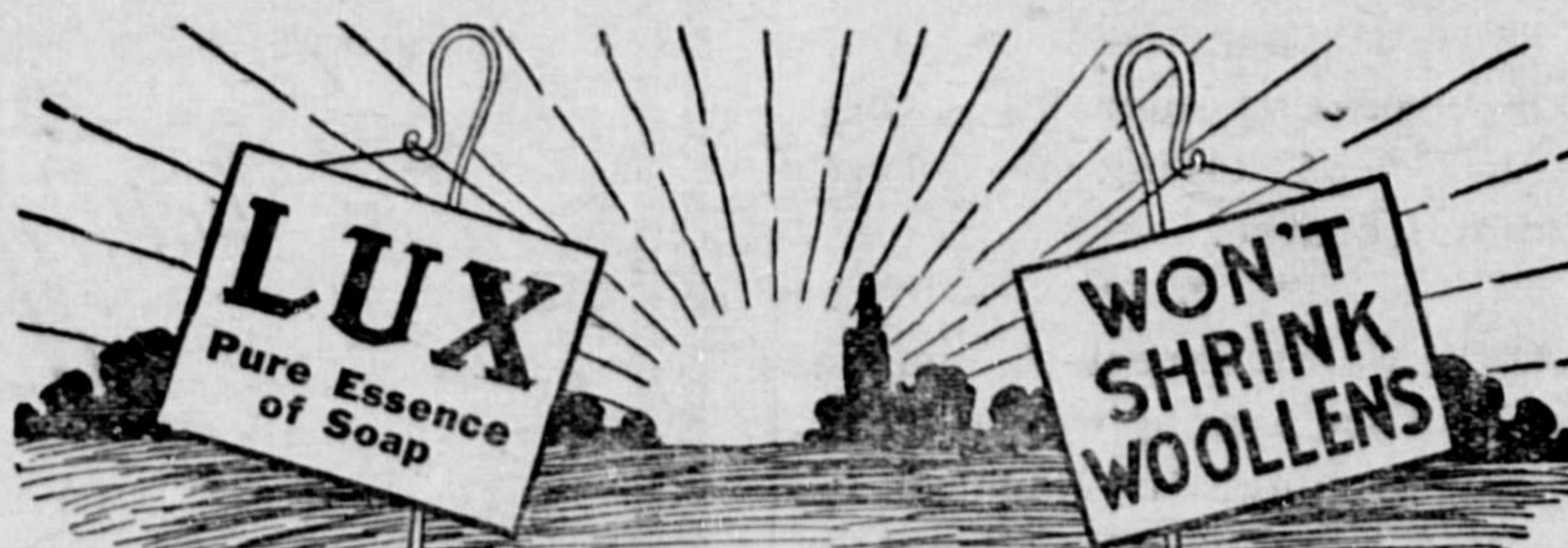
