THE KAISER HAS ANOTHER DISAPPOINTMENT

FRENCH RETAKE LOST GROUND—AUSTRIAN TRANSPORT GONE—MORE SHIPS SUNK

EASTER VISIT TO PARIS MUST BE CANCELLED

Kaiser Promised Ferdinand that His Verdun Offensive Would End in Paris by Easter—Huns Lose Ground.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 8.—Essad Pasha, who is visiting here, in discussing the future of Albania says that the Kaiser pledged his word to King Ferdinand and the Bulgarian court that the great offensive which he had planned against Verdun would open up the road to Paris and that he would occupy the French capital by Easter.

French Gains.

The French, by an attack with hand grenades, have re-captured the ground which they lost the other day at Bethincourt. A German attack upon Haucourt has been repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy. The French curtain of artillery fire prevented the German reinforcements from being brought forward, while the French machine guns concentrated a deadly fire upon the attacking forces that they were obliged to retreat.

JAPANESE NAVY MEN ASSISTING THE RUSSIANS

Steamer Torpedoed and two More are Mined—Speed Saves French Liner—Norwegian Ship is Sunk Without Warning.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 8.—The British steamer Chatalla, of 5,000 tons, has been torpedoed and the steamers Braunton and Clyde have been sunk by coming into contact with mines.

The French liner Colbert was shelled in the Mediterranean by a submarine but escaped from her enemy because of her superior speed.

Norwegian Ship Sunk.

The Norwegian steamer Arena has been torpedoed without warning.

Holland Calls Reserves.

Holland has called out her 1917 reserves as part of her scheme of preparedness.

German Denials.

Germany states that the steamer Palembang was not sunk by a German submarine as none was in the vicinity at the time the ship foundered. A similar reply is en route to Washington in regard to the Channel steamer Sussex, in which several United States citizens lost their lives.

WESTERN UNIVERSITIES COMPANY FORMING

A Western Universities Battalion, known as the 196 Overseas Battalion is now being recruited and British Columbia is to furnish a company. Enrollment is now taking place at the University of British Columbia, corner 10th Ave. and Laurel Street, Vancouver.

The Battalion will be led by officers who have had experience in the war, the command having been given to Major D. S. Mackay, who is at present in France with the 27th Battalion. KINGFISHER BOUGHT FOR GRANBY TRAFFIC

The New England Company's halibut steamer Kingfisher has been purchased by James Griffiths & Sons of Seattle, and will now be engaged in carrying copper between Granby and Seattle. The Kingfisher has been bought by the same company which purchased the Amur a few weeks ago.

ANOTHER RECORD PRICE FOR HALIBUT

Over twenty-two thousand pounds of halibut arrived overnight, all of it in Canadian bottoms. The Alliance No. 1 had 14,000; Muirneag, 4,000; Anita, 800; Debora, 2,000; Roald, 3,000; Thelma, 600, and the Fisher 1,000 pounds.

All the above catches were purchased by Mr. Bernhoft for the National Independent Company at 9½ cents per pound, which constitutes a new high record for halibut at this port.

W. T. DONNELLY SPOKE ON DRYDOCK PLANT

The Board of Trade rooms were crowded last evening when William T. Donnelly, the designer of the drydock, delivered an address on the drydock situation. G. A. Woodland presided.

At the outset, Mr. Donnelly pointed out that this was the eleventh drydock he had designed. The idea of Mr. Hays, who instructed him in the matter, was to build a structure which would take care of the situation here for twenty-five years. The dock had been built by the G. T. P. independent of the government subsidy. The financial situation was such that it was impossible for the G. T. P. to carry out their arrangements.

After telling of the efforts which had been made, and were still being made, by the G. T. P. and by himself, to secure work for the dock, he went on to describe how the tendency amongst manufacturers and producers generally today was to control the distribution of their products. This was particularly so in the lumber trade, the Washington lumbermen having wooden auxiliary schooners to carry their lumber overseas. He advocated the building of such schooners at this point, as it would be out of the question to build steel vessels here for many years, while wooden ships could be built quickly and cheaply. He thought that a capital outlay of \$150,000 would cover the building of a wooden schooner and would set the dock going with more work to follow. He pointed out that in this work the ship shed was a big saving, as work could be carried out much more quickly under cover than in the open. He took the building of the pontoons as an instance.

George R. Naden asked if wooden ship-building would be a permanent industry, and if they could compete with steel ships for cargoes.

Paris, April 8.—The Admiralty announces that an Austrian transport has been sunk in the Adriatic.

asked and went on to tell how fifteen years ago, a friend of his had built 14 wooden vessels in nine years, showing good profits. This man went into the business against the advice of shipping men but had proven that he was right. In these days, and probably for years to come, wooden vessels would earn their cost very quickly. The timber here was the finest obtainable for ships while steel could not be obtained for years.

W. E. Williams asked if Seattle was not competing against the world in steel ships.

Mr. Donnelly replied that this was not the case and that the Seattle yards had been in great difficulties until recent years.

Mr. Williams asked if there was no possibility of producing steel on the coast.

Mr. Donnelly replied that the coast for fifteen years to come could not compete with the east in producing steel, as for the next few years one mill could produce all the steel required on the coast while each mill in the east specialized in the various kinds of steel required and that it would be impossible for one mill to produce them all.

Ald. Montgomery asked if the plant could have handled the repair work on the Jap cruiser.

Mr. Donnelly said that the Japanese officers were satisfied that it could, but that the company failed to land the contract.

At the close of the meeting, Mr. Donnelly was heartily thanked for his address.

MALLORY SAYS BARNARD SAID IT WAS ALL O. K.

Revelations in Victoria Harbor Dredging Enquiry—Lieut.-Governor of Province Brought in

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, April 8.—E. G. Mallory, during his examination before the Victoria Harbor Dredging enquiry committee, admitted classifying 25,000 of material as solid rock at \$9.10 per yard when only 6,000 yards had been handled. He says that he acted under instructions from J. L. Nelson, the superintendent of dredging for the government.

He protested against the classification at the time but was forced to sign retraction affidavits in C. E. McDonald's office. He reported the matter to Lieutenant Governor Barnard in Victoria, who said that an investigation had been made which had shown that matters were all right.

WHAT SHIPBUILDING IS DOING FOR SEATTLE

With the increased activity at the yards of the Seattle Construction & Drydock Company, due to the big demand for cargo vessels and orders placed by the government for war craft, the number of men employed at the big plant has gradually increased until there are now more than 1,300 workers on the pay roll of the several departments.

With the recruiting of more mechanics of various kinds, the pay roll has increased rapidly until approximately \$100,000 a month is now paid out at the plant.

If the record is maintained for the year, and there are prospects that a still greater increase in the number of men employed will be made, the company will disburse a total of \$1,200,000 for the twelve months for labor.

There are vessels of various types building at the different yards which will represent a total expenditure of \$11,000,000, and the bulk of this amount is being spent at the plant of the Seattle Construction & Drydock Company.

THAT DELEGATION

Bob Rogers has wired to the Mayor that it would serve no good purpose to send a delegation to Ottawa in connection with the demand for work at the drydock, but the receipt of this telegram should not influence citizens in the slightest. The people of Prince Rupert should now be more determined than ever to get at the root of the matter. When the Minister of Public Works states that the drydock belongs to the railway company, he states the truth, but it is only a diplomatic truth, in view of the fact that the money of the Dominion is behind the project.

The time is drawing near when the dock will be ready for ship-building and for months past the plant has been in shape to handle other contracts which, for military reasons, we are not supposed to mention. It is well known that naval construction work has been going on for months in other places, which we are also debarred from mentioning, although it is permissible to say that some of that work has been done where there were recently no ship-building facilities whatever, while other contracts have been freely let to mushroom companies in the United States which had no plant whatever, and no intention of ever having one.

The government may not own the drydock, but it has some little say in the placing of certain contracts which the drydock could handle now and other contracts which could be handled later, and the Minister of Public Works does not get over the difficulty by shelving the matter as he has attempted to do. Thanks to Mr. Donnelly, the government has been aware since last summer that the ma-

chine shops at the dock were ready for work and could handle certain contracts which were being given out at Ottawa, and we venture to say that had Colonel Allison been a Prince Rupert man there might have been a vastly different story to tell.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

First Holland wanted permission to import an extra 100,000 tons of wheat and now she wants Britain to hand over a paltry \$11,000,000. Well, there's nothing like asking for what you want.

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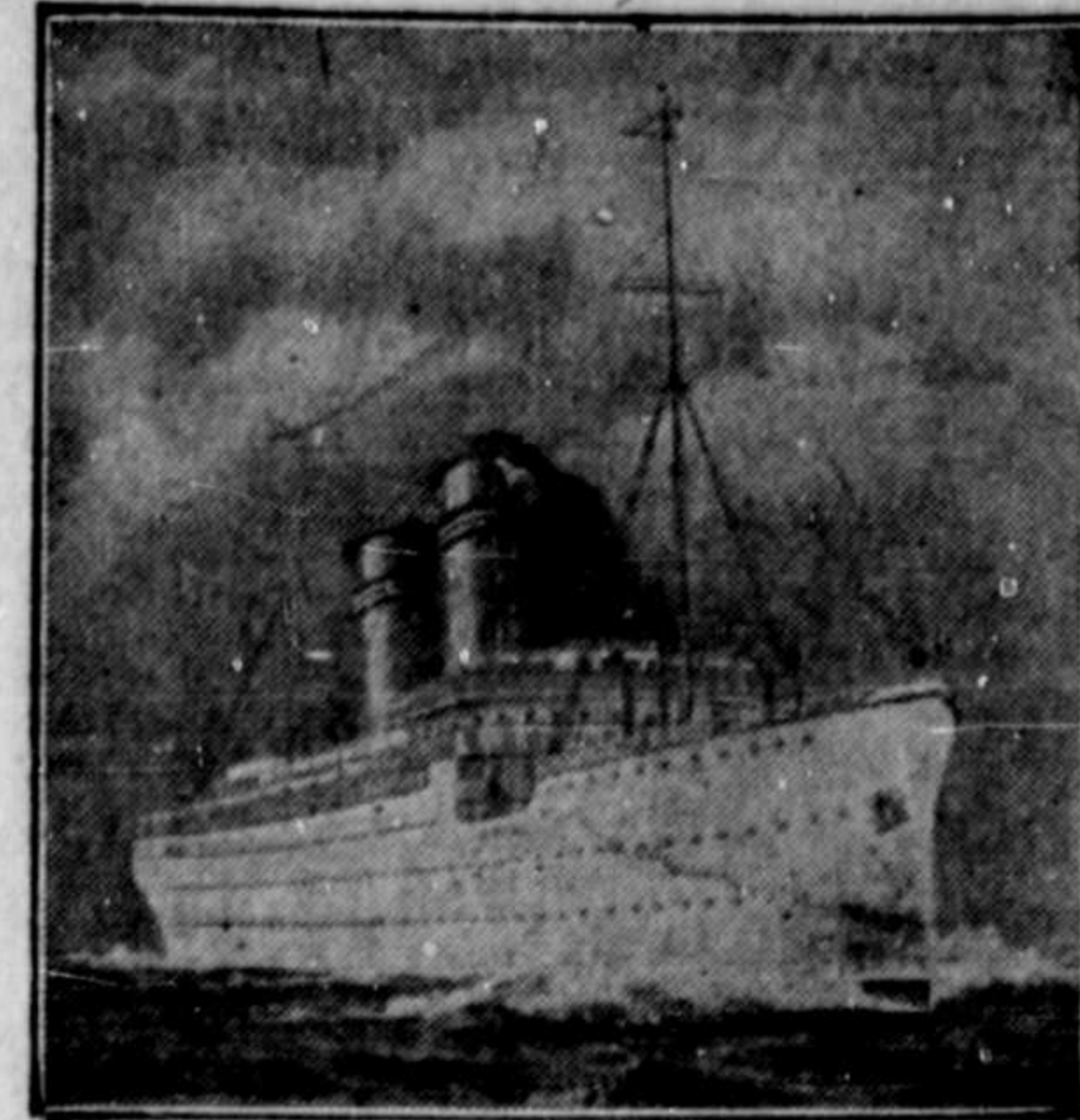

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is appropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

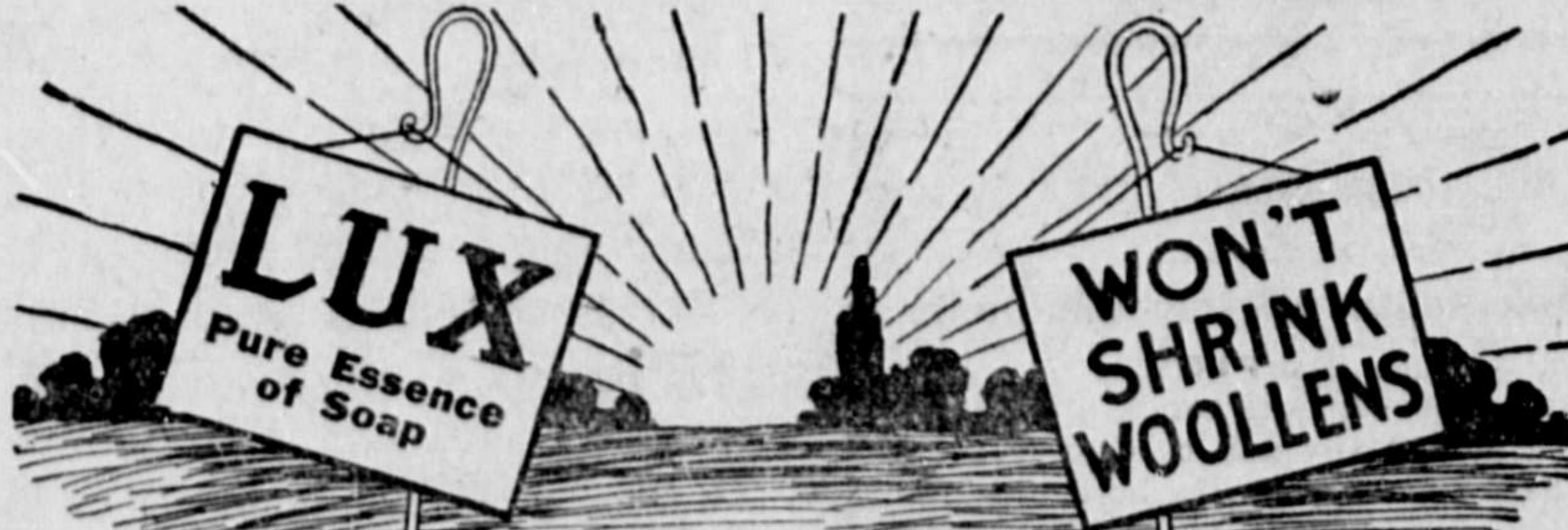
