KAISER SAYS VERDUN BATTLE DECIDES WAR

BRILLIANT FEAT BY BRITISH NAVAL AVIATORS -- TURKS ARE AGAIN DEFEATED

KAISER SAYS VERDUN FIGHT WILL END WAR

Fighting Resumed with Vigor—Germans Preparing for Another Attack on French Lines—French Take Trenches.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 17.—Following a full there is a renewal of spirited fighting at Verdun. The French in an infantry attack south of Douaumont, captured several German trenches and took two hundred prisoners.

The Germans are carrying out a heavy bombardment of Avoncourt and the French front from Deadman's Hill to Cumieres and Haudremont.

General Petain, in thanking the French army for its heroism in the previous battle, says that the Germans will attack again.

Verdun Decides War.

The Kaiser, in reviewing the German army at Verdun, told his troops that, just as the war of 1870 was decided at Paris, so would the present war be decided at Verdun.

NAVAL PLANES MAKE RECORD FLIGHT OF WAR

Constantinople Bombed by British Naval Aviators—Powder Works Attacked—Aeroplanes Return Safely to Their Base.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 17.—(Official) Four British naval aeroplanes raided Constantinople on Friday night, dropping bombs on the Zeitenluk Powder Works, on the aeroplane hangars and on the railway. All returned safely to the base near Saloniki after making the longest flight of the war, having covered three hundred miles in the return trip.

Turks Again Defeated.

General Lake, who commands the British relief expedition in Mesopotamia, reports that the Turkish lines on the right bank of the Tigris have been driven in and that the relief column is now advancing on Kut-El-Amara.

DR. ALFRED THOMPSON'S MILITARY APPOINTMENT

Ottawa, April 11.—Dr. Alfred Thompson, member for the Yukon, has been gazetted as a lieutenant-colonel attached to the Canadian Expeditionary Forces and is assigned for duty to the Military Hospitals Commission, of which Senator Loughheed is the head. Dr. Thompson has accepted the position of superintendent of the military hospitals for the soldiers who have been invalided home. These hospitals are situated at Sydney, N. S.; St. John, N. B.; Ste. Agathe, Ont.; Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary and Esquimalt. Others will be opened from time to time as more soldiers return.

Dr. Thompson has had an extensive experience in medical work and hospitals and is well qualified for this position. He is one of the members of parliament who concluded the military course in Ottawa provided for the members by the minister of militia during the present session. Dr. Thompson will enter upon his duties immediately.



The tails will be accepted as evidence. No bounty will be paid on seals killed before April 15th, nor on sea lions.

FOUR HONEST CONSERVATIVES SUPPORT LAURIER'S RESOLUTION

"HONEST ANDY" BRODER REFUSES TO GIVE IN TO THE BORDEN SCHEME OF PARTIAL INVESTIGATION—DEEP GLOOM REIGNS IN CONSERVATIVE CAUCUS CHAMBER

Ottawa, April 14.—Certainly a deep gloom has been cast over this community. It can be cut with a knife—this Stygian melancholy. It hangs like fog in the halls and lobbies, in Green Chamber and Red. But it settled thickest in No. 16, the Conservative caucus room.

Gone is the light word, the sparkling anecdote—Col. Hugh Clark has not told a new story for a week—the cheerful banter, the merry quip, the loud laugh that speaks the peaceful party mind. Gone—all gone. Instead, the long face, the bated breath, the whispered fear. Our old friend R. E. Morse is in their midst and he looks like making a good visit.

The strikers all came back but four. They were glad to be pleased with a Royal Commission that would find out as little as possible—any old excuse for falling out of bed and falling back again. But now they are not so glad. The biggest gallery of the session greeted Sir Wilfrid's speech on bloodstained graft, a gallery more than half women, which shows that the better half of the world is thinking. When Sir Wilfrid proclaimed that the object of all good patriots was to demand an account of every dollar drawn from the treasury and every drop of blood shed on the battlefield, the gallery which had sons and brothers, husbands and sweethearts on that distant, dangerous field, showed signs of deep emotion and the strikers realized that stop-gap measures were not enough. They realized that the widows and orphans whose tears moistened the millions so lightly looted by Colonel John Wesley Allison and his pals took a different view of these things from the party politicians. In short they saw that their party game was a long way behind public sentiment and they would have to catch up or be left out in the cold at the next general election.

They were sore then and are sore now that they did not go the limit like the Hon. Andrew Broden, W. F. Maclean, Mondou and Lamarche, who said by their votes that they would rather be right than hide-bound. Andy Broder, honest Andy as he is called, has had a run in with Colonel John Wesley Allison before now and knows just what to expect from this gentleman with the pious name and the predatory instincts. Mondou and Lamarche displayed the ultimate courage of their convictions and W. F. Maclean went the length of standing by a week-old editorial of the Toronto World, which is almost revolutionary in W. F.'s case.

On the whole No. 16 is wrapped in profound regret that it didn't

show up better on the division. Nelson's maxim was that the boldest measures are the safest and who are they to go behind the ripe wisdom of that great leader? If safety first is the line to take, why didn't they take it? If Mark Twain was prepared to sacrifice all his wife's relations why shouldn't the Conservative party in the House of Commons be prepared to sacrifice Major General Sir Sam Hughes? Has he any more right to escape complete investigation than the Duke of Marlboro who was one of the examples cited by Sir Wilfrid Laurier?

Sacrifice Sir Sam? Would he be the only sacrifice? Aye, there's the rub! There's the consideration that gives them pause. Wouldn't it mean the sacrifice of the whole government? Time was—and so long ago at that—when the cabinet ministers were making free use of detectives to hang something on each other. How far did they succeed? It is all right for the cabinet to profess collective ignorance of Sir Sam's doings, but the fact remains that, in the War Lord's various absences, Sir Robert Borden, Hazen Kemp, and Loughheed served as acting minister of militia and must have had a peep

PEACE TALK

Though the Germans have repeatedly denied that they are anxious for peace, there is every reason to believe the report that French delegates who were sent to Switzerland to discuss the exchange of prisoners were approached on the subject. The mere fact that such a man as Count Von Buelow was Germany's representative is proof enough that Germany wanted to discuss more than merely the simple matter of a prisoners exchange. Von Buelow is the premier diplomatist of the Kaiser, and his being sent on such a mission is equivalent to Britain's sending Sir Edward Grey on such an errand, which would be looked upon in diplomatic circles as ridiculous. There is little doubt that there is internal trouble brewing in Germany over the failure at Verdun and that peace is urgently demanded by a large section of the German populace.

The reply of the French delegates was just the reply which might have been expected from representatives of this brave nation. They have vowed to see this thing through to the end, and they have implicit confidence in the determination of their allies towards the same conclusion. The men who have held Verdun for nearly two months have no intention of letting up simply because Germany realises that she cannot win.

PARSON POLITICIANS

Bowser is making an effort to patch a piece onto the constitution in order to enable parsons to sit in the legislature. There is nothing objectionable in having parsons assisting in the conducting of the affairs of the province,

though there is just the danger that they may come to be recognised as politicians, and, thanks to the history of the McBride-Bowser administration, the reverend gentlemen may have serious objections to being saddled with any such name.

While it may be quite all right to introduce the pulpit into politics, it would be a grave error to introduce politics into the pulpit, and one can realise how hard it would be for a parson, who has spent a strenuous week in the house debating with opponents, to keep politics and the pulpit separate. We do not mean that the live questions of the day should not be discussed in the pulpit, but that they should not be discussed from a party political standpoint, and, although parsons are on the whole a remarkably fair-minded class of men, the man who has spent six consecutive days listening to or taking part in political debates is apt to have a few stray political thoughts or feelings left over for the seventh, and they will require careful watching else they will get out. The dual position of preacher and politician seems out of the question, and the only sane plan for a parson who wants to enter politics is for that man to resign his charge first.

as it leaves the big syndicates in possession of hundreds of thousands of acres which they have no intention of improving.

A heavy increase in wild land taxation would go far towards forcing the syndicates to improve their land instead of waiting until the settler does enough work to make the surrounding territory more valuable.

The genuine settler, who has spent much labor and money in improving his land holdings and has allowed his payments to the government to lapse, will suffer under the new act, which calls for cancellation on all lands on which payments are not completed in six months, while the big speculator, who has no intention of producing anything but unearned profits for himself, and who has made his payments, is unaffected.

Our returned soldiers are entitled to the best which the country has to offer, but a gift of 160 acres is nothing, as they can get that at any time as British subjects.

into the abyss. How much did they see? How much did they shut their eyes to? Senator Loughheed, for instance, was acting minister of militia at the very time the fuse contracts were handed out to the American Ammunition Company and the International Arms and Fuse Company. How little does he know about it?

Did nobody but the Shell Committee examine the contracts by which twenty-three million dollars worth of fuse orders and advance payments of over three million dollars were slipped along to a couple of mushroom companies in the United States for which a professional soldier of fortune like Allison was the agent and of which a railroad wrecker like Benjamin Franklin Yoakum was a leading member? Did nobody but the Shell Committee inspect the pledge of the Guarantee Trust Company of New York for these two companies, a pledge with this clause as a joker—"that this company shall not be held responsible otherwise for the non-performance of this agreement due to any cause beyond its reasonable control? How far does Sir Thomas White's contention go that Major General Sir Sam, as shown by his ratifying letters, was acting for His Britannic Majesty in these matters? How far on the other hand prevails Sir Wilfrid Laurier's argument that he derived his whole force and authority to ratify contracts, not as Major General, not as Sir Sam Hughes, not as both put together, but as Minister of

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

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
