## FRENCH ASSUME THE OFFENSIVE AT VERDUN

### A STRONG RUSSIAN FORCE REPORTED AT MARSEILLES TO AID THE FRENCH

#### FRENCH ASSUME OFFENSIVE IN VERDUN REGION

German Trenches and Prisoners Captured—Russian Forces are Welcomed by the French at Marseilles.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, April 20.—The French troops took the offensive in the Verdun region last night and captured German trenches; occupied an enemy redoubt and took several hundred German prisoners. The German casualties for the past week amount to fifty thousand men.

**Russians in France.**  
A strong force of Russian troops have disembarked at Marseilles to join the French army on the western front. They were given a welcome by General Joffre in his order of the day, in which he said that the appearance of Russian troops at that point was proof of their devotion to the common cause.

#### TWO LOCAL NAMES IN CASUALTY LIST

The new method of reporting casualties at the front, without giving battalion numbers, etc., is not very satisfactory to enquirers, but the censor seems to think it necessary that no such information should be divulged.

In the latest list appear the names of William Kerr and John Clapperton, amongst the pioneers. The next of kin are not given and there is a fear around town that these names may represent "Bill" Kerr and John Clapperton, who left from Prince Rupert. Mr. Clapperton's father has no news from the war office, John having given his wife's name as next of kin.

#### GREEKS KILLED IN HUNDREDS BY TURK SOLDIERS

Wholesale Massacres at Various Points—British Cabinet has Settled Question of Conscription.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, April 20.—Massacres of Greeks by the Turks at Adrianople, Demotika, Smyrna and Constantinople are reported. On April 14th four hundred Greeks were killed and three hundred wounded in Adrianople. Two hundred were massacred in Smyrna. The Greek papers are prohibited from publishing the details.

#### Cabinet Crisis Over.

An authoritative statement has been issued to the effect that the British cabinet crisis has passed and that a settlement has been reached on the conscription deadlock. An announcement of the details of the settlement will be made at a secret session of Parliament to be held next Tuesday.

#### SIR SAM DISCUSSES EVERYTHING BUT FUSES

Ottawa, April 18.—Sir Sam Hughes in opening his speech on the Kytte charges, explained that he had enquired of the premier and the leader of the opposition as to whether he was required in Ottawa, before leaving for Europe. He defended Colonel Allison in regard to his commission and the American manufacturers as to the non-delivery of fuses, stating that the Kytte charges were purely a matter of parochial politics. He went on to dwell at length upon the sacrifices being made by the Canadian soldiers, saying that many of the members in Ottawa should be at the front instead of offering criticism.

Sir Sam then stated that he was going to ask the Prime Minister to help him administer the department, while the enquiry by the Meredith-Duff Commission was in progress.

Sir Sam maintained that not a cent would be lost by firms who had accepted the fuse contracts, but they would not make much. They almost threw up the contracts because they did not get the regular twenty-five per cent. commission. It would all come out before the Royal Commission.

Sir Sam, continuing, said Col. Allison and his associates, in connection with other contracts, had saved millions and millions for the British government. He said he was one of the first to realize that Germany was preparing for war, but these views were not held at that time by the honorable gentlemen opposite.

General Hughes said he was assured by his counsel who had been in New York that not one dollar of the money advanced to Yoakum and his associates had been divided.

#### Called to Order.

General Hughes then described some of the assertions by Mr. Kytte as "abominable" and was called to order by the speaker. Referring to a number of other contracts referred to by Mr. Kytte in his statement, the minister declared that not one dollar had been advanced or divided in regard to these contracts because they had not been entered into. #### PERSHING MAY WITHDRAW FROM MEXICAN SOIL

May not Risk Futile War with Both Factions—United States Puts Double Guard on the Panama Canal.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Washington, April 20.—General Pershing is not pushing his campaign against Villa. He is holding intact his force of ten thousand men from the border to four hundred miles into Mexico. It is believed that he will withdraw from Mexico rather than risk the possibility of war with both Villa and Carranza under futile conditions.

**Guard Doubled.**  
In view of the strained relationship which exists between the United States and Germany over the latter's submarine warfare, the secret service guard in the Panama Canal zone has been doubled. Soldiers are placed on guard at the various locks in order to prevent anyone gaining access to them during the night.

Vancouver, April 20.—South Vancouver Conservatives have nominated the Rev. William Boulton, minister of Beaconsfield Methodist Church, as their candidate to oppose J. W. Weart, the Liberal candidate, in the forthcoming provincial election. The previous candidate, Stuart Campbell, withdrew from the contest three weeks ago.

#### STEELE AND MULLEN STRIKE OLD CHANNEL

News from Manson creek, conveyed in a letter from W. B. Steele to Jim May, the veteran miner, is to the effect that Steele and Mullen, who have been tunnelling for the old channel for several years, have reached their objective at some 800 feet, having defined both rims. Flattering prospects were obtained, one pan yielding \$47. Mr. Steele says the prospect may be only a flash, but he has confidence in the richness of the ground. The tunnel is through dry ground, and it was not found necessary to use side lagging. Three air shafts were raised.

THOSE FUSES

Sir Sam brought his vocal machine gun into play yesterday in the house when he described the Kyte charges as "petty partizan piffle." This sounds really Sam-like, but is not very convincing, as it does not explain anything and it would appear that explanations are in order.

It is at least satisfactory to note that Sam did not attempt to portray his friend Colonel Allison as the man who carried out millions of dollars worth of contracts, accepting nothing for his pains.

It is interesting, in this connection, to recall that Sir Sam said of Allison that "He never charged one cent for the transfer of thousands and tens of thousands of dollars worth of stuff across the river. I do not know how he did it, but I know that it was done, and he has never rendered his bill yet, so that anything he has done has been a labor of love."

Now, probably what Sam meant was that Allison did not charge one cent over ten per cent., everything over that commission being done out of sheer love. But Sam did not make this clear, and it is very unkind of him to shatter our faith in the goodness of human nature, which had been vastly stimulated after reading of the colonel's love.

We tremble to think what the fuse colonel would have charged had he hated instead of loved. After defending the ten per cent. colonel, Sir Sam went on to defend the actions of the shell committee by stating that they had purchased war supplies cheaper than Great Britain had been able to do.

Probably it was to protest against the spirit of self-sacrifice which was eating up the middlemen that caused Lloyd George to send D. A. Thomas over to Canada to reconstruct the shell committee. However, the chief point in the Kyte charges was that contracts had been let to companies which had no capital, no plant and no intention of ever making a fuse, and on top of that 2 companies, which seemed to have nothing but a contract, received over \$3,000,000 from the committee the day the contracts were signed.

Worst of all, the shell production in Canada has been held up because the fuses have not been delivered. Even if the prices were all right the fact remains that the contracts have never been filled to any extent. Calling the charges "petty partizan piffle" will not supply the boys at the front with complete shells, and we have the word of the chairman of the shell committee that only a very small percentage of the fuses have been delivered.

Sam scattered the P's in broadsides on Tuesday, but he will require to look after both his P's and Q's when he comes before the commission.

The Kaiser's nervous system must have received another severe shock when he learned that Trebizond had fallen and that fifty thousand Turks had been taken. Cheer up, Bill, the worst is yet to come.

briefly, said that when the minister of militia left for England, his motion asking for an inquiry was still pending. The government had taken the attitude that an inquiry would not be granted.

Sir Wilfrid's Questions. Sir Wilfrid remarked that the minister of militia, in his speech, had discussed almost everything but the Kyte charges. He had discussed contracts of all kinds. It would have been well had he given the House some information in regard to the sale of small arms ammunition which was being talked about in the press.

The minister of militia interrupted to say that he would be glad to give information on that point at any time. Sir Wilfrid asked Sir Robert Borden in regard to the minister of militia's statement that the Prime Minister would run his department during the enquiry.

To Organize Tomorrow. Sir Robert replied that General Hughes had asked him to take over the administration of the department for the present. The minister, he said, had assured him that it was his desire and determination that the enquiry should be complete, and he proposed to devote his whole attention to it.

Sir Robert added that he had received a telegram from Sir William Meredith saying that the commission would be organized tomorrow.

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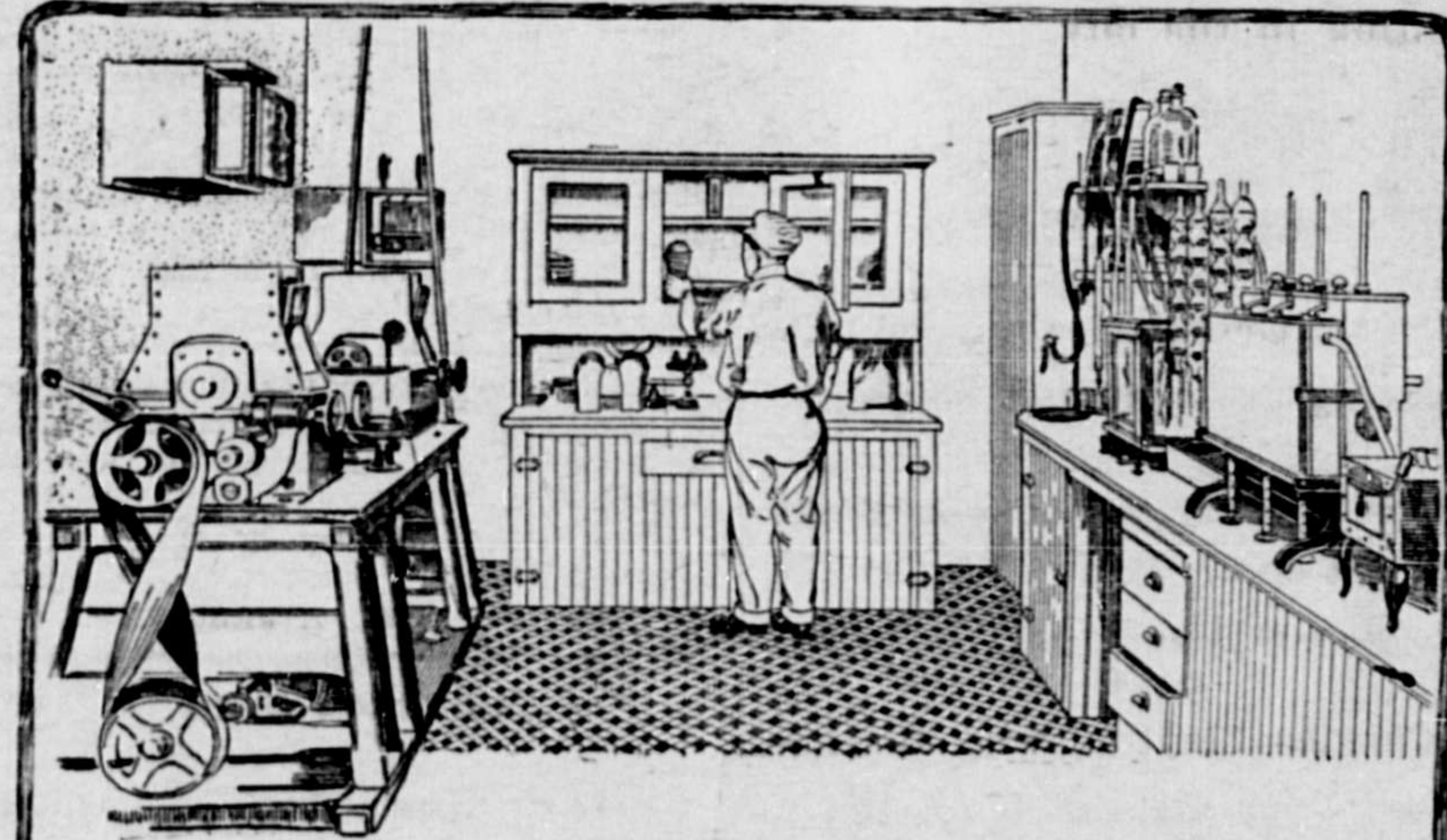
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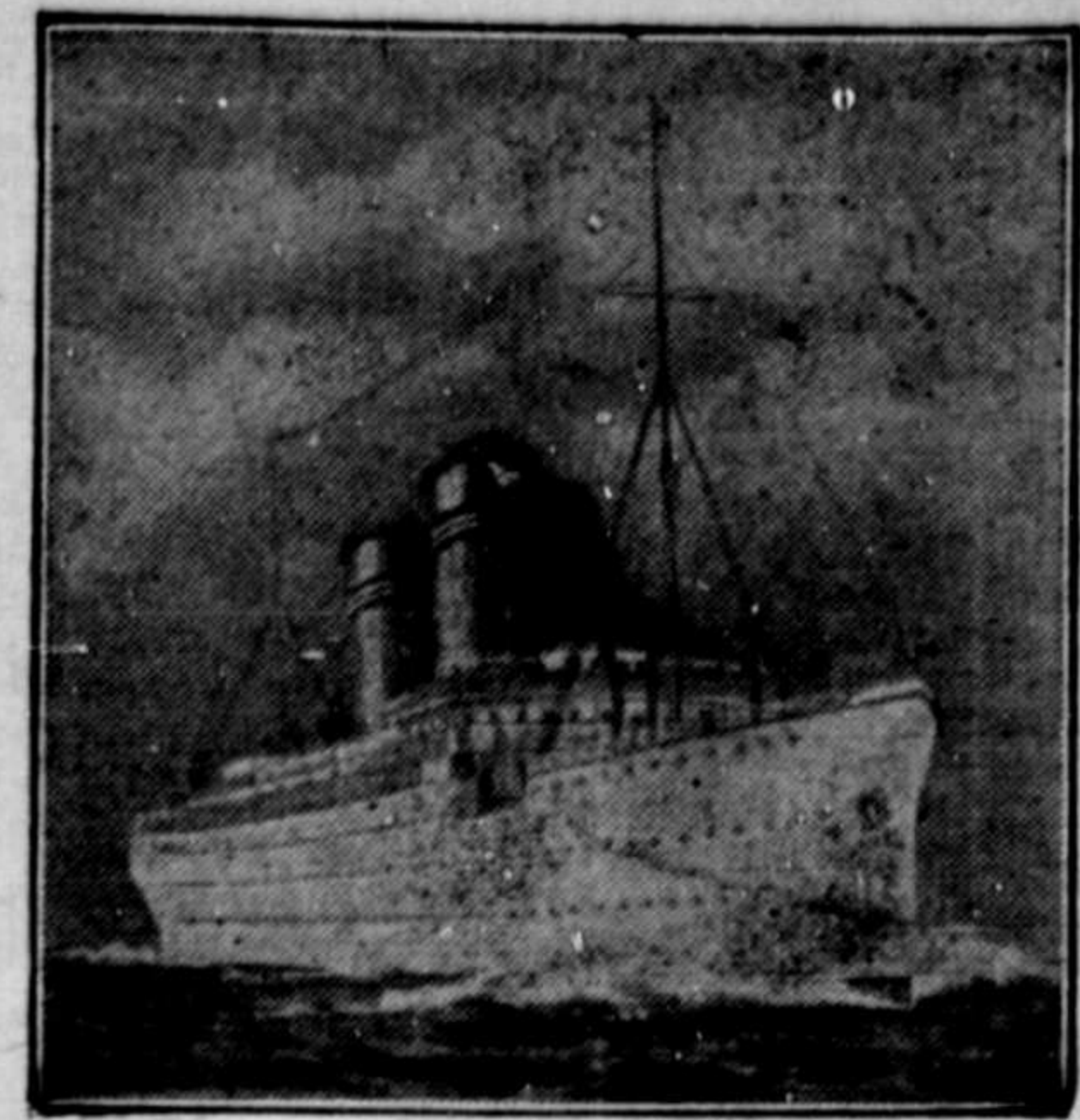
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In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
