Germany is evidently still of the opinion that the United States can be kept writing notes indefinitely and that any kind of a stalling reply will serve the purpose of keeping up the correspondence. With the usual short-sightedness of the bully, Germany has mistaken the American desire for peace as a sign of weakness. 
