DUBLIN IS UNDER MARTIAL LAW TODAY

CLEVER GERMAN SCHEME MISCARRIES -- FRENCH SUCCESSFUL IN AIR DUELS

HUN AVIATORS ARE WORSTED IN AIR DUELS

Four Planes Brought down—Duel Over Zeebrugge this Morning—Conscription is Postponed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 26.—A German infantry attack in Lorraine has been repulsed. There is artillery fighting on the Verdun front.

French aviators have destroyed four German aeroplanes in duels in the air.

A French aeroplane and a Zeppelin fought a duel two miles above Zeebrugge at two o'clock this morning. The aeroplane aimed incendiary shells into the Zeppelin.

Zeppelin Visits England.

A Zeppelin visited the east coast of England last night. When fired on, it rose to a great height and was forced to flee.

Cabinet Decision.

London, April 26.—Following a secret session of the House of Commons, Premier Asquith has issued a statement that the voluntary system of recruiting will be followed until May 27th. If fifty thousand additional men have not enlisted by that time, the government will introduce conscription.

Americans Leave Germany.

The Rupert Hotel bulletin says that Americans are leaving Germany, as they believe that a rupture is inevitable.

The Russian troops in France are camped between Paris and Verdun. There will soon be 300,000 of them on the western front.

ITALIAN ARRESTED ON ROBBERY CHARGE

Vancouver, April 26.—Julio Giovanni, an Italian, has been arrested on a charge of obtaining large sums of money from mails sent to local Italians by impersonation methods.

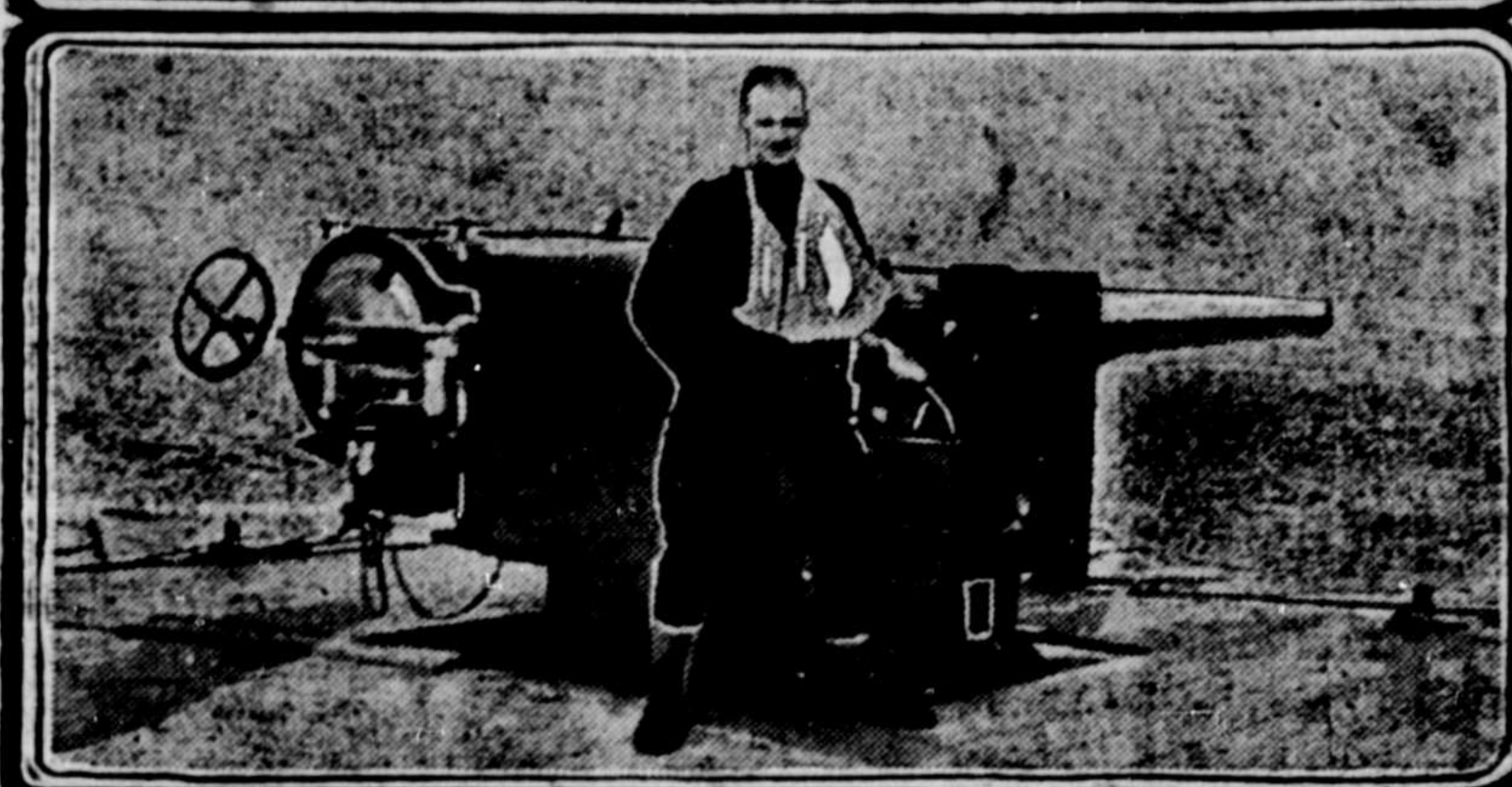
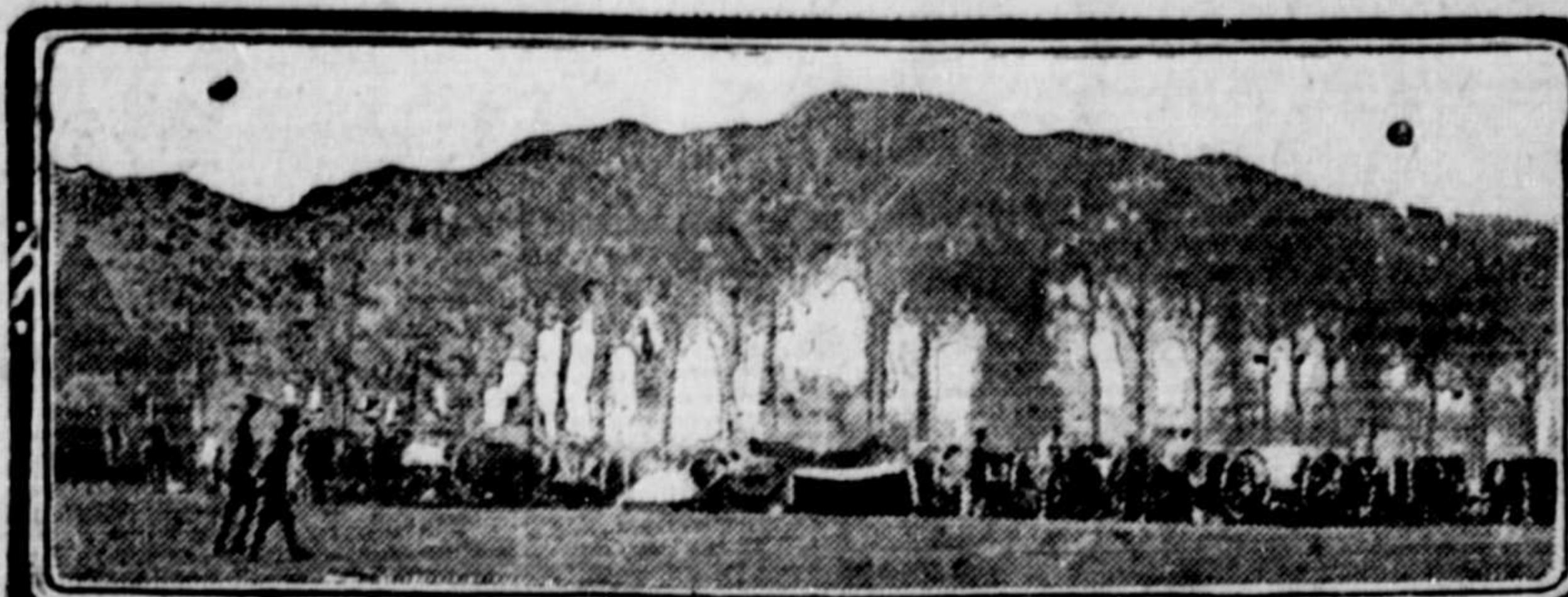

PICTURES OF CANADIAN FRONT TAKEN BY A RETURNED SOLDIER.—These pictures, taken by a Canadian soldier now invalided home, who took a small camera to the front trenches, gives a good idea of the conditions under which Canadians are fighting. The picture with the stately tree in the foreground is a suburb of Ploegstreet, the white building was used for a billet. The long row of trees defines a main road at Dickiebush on which the Canadian transport is halted. The road is a mile and a half behind the trenches and is shelled every day. The bottom picture shows the battle line in broad daylight with the Germans only a few yards away. The dark streak is the Canadian trench with the Germans 80 yards beyond. The gun picture shows a six-inch gun mounted as a stern chaser on a Canadian converted cruiser. The soldier beside it created a stir by smuggling a cat in his sling across the ocean on returning to Canada.



REVOLUTION ON SMALL SCALE IN CITY OF DUBLIN

Rebels Seize buildings—Acting in Conjunction with the German Raiders—Casement is in Tower of London.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 26.—Dublin is under martial law today. The greater part of southern Ireland is under military control, following an attempt by the members of the Sinn Fein society to start a revolution.

Revolutionists captured Dublin post office and adjacent houses and buildings in four other parts of the city. In the fighting which followed the occupation of these buildings, three officers, five soldiers and two of the police force were killed. The casualties of the rebels are unknown.

Troops Arriving.

Troops and machine guns are arriving on the scene. The cut-back was planned in conjunction with the German gun-running exploit which was frustrated yesterday.

Sir Roger Casement is confined in the Tower of London and it is expected that he will be charged with high treason.

The Naval Raid.

The attack on Lowestoft by German cruisers is believed to have been intended to distract attention from affairs in Ireland and to assist the conspirators to carry out their schemes.

All the British ships have returned safely. The extent of the injury to the German vessels is unknown. The British casualties were twenty wounded and none killed.

The ladies of Port Essington, who are ever to the front in Red Cross and other patriotic work, held a most enjoyable dance on Monday evening to raise funds for the purchase of wool etc., with which to make supplies for the soldiers. Everybody along the river was present and a thoroughly good time was had by all. The sum of \$43 was realised.

CARNIVAL REALISES OVER THREE THOUSAND

The Carnival of the Allies, which closed last night, or rather this morning, far exceeded the expectations of the most sanguine, the sum of \$3,055 being realised during the two days. The result reflects the greatest credit upon the ladies who have worked tirelessly for weeks in making the arrangements, while it also speaks volumes for the spirit of the people of Prince Rupert.

Too much praise cannot be bestowed upon the committee of three ladies who carried out the preliminary arrangements and also upon those who managed the various booths along with a host of willing and able assistants. We do not mention names, as those ladies are thoroughly satisfied simply to know that by their efforts the Red Cross fund of Prince Rupert is the richer by over three thousand dollars.

Last night there was just as big a crowd present as on the opening night and an even larger sum of money was realized, this of course being largely due to the fact that the earnings of the raffles were included in the drawings.

About eleven o'clock the acting mayor mounted the platform and announced the names of the winners of the various raffles. These we will publish tomorrow as the list is not quite complete. TOM SILVERSIDES IN RECENT BIG FIGHTING

Harry Silversides has received a letter from his brother Tom, who has been promoted to lance-corporal since entering the trenches. Tom was in the recent heavy fighting and saw many men killed and wounded around him but none of those were boys from Prince Rupert.

He has had experience on listening post duty, which entails lying out all night in the "no man's land" between the trenches within a very short distance of the enemy. He says there is no night there as the Germans are continually using flashlights to locate the British positions, while the sharpshooters are busy all the time. The boys get plenty of good food and are all fit and well. They are supplied with braziers on which they prepare hot tea and coffee whenever they require it.

Yesterday afternoon the following halibut catches were brought in: The Hy Gill, 15,000 pounds; the Fram, 15,000; the Dolphin, 20,000, and the Nellie, 5,000. There is a steady demand for halibut throughout the east and the price is certain to remain around its present high level for some time yet.

ELECTIONS ENQUIRY COMMITTEE SELECTED

Victoria, April 26.—The premier has announced the appointment of the following select committee to investigate the alleged attempt at plugging in the Vancouver by-election: Messrs. Neil McKay, McGuire, Miller, Brewster and Parker Williams.

The Liberals demand that the scope of the committee be extended to take in the alleged shenanigan on election day and also to enquire into the reason for the withdrawal of the charges and to investigate alleged irregularities in the Rossland election.

The committee meets on Friday and Monday, and will announce its decision regarding a police court trial on Monday.

FISHERMEN WILL PRESS THEIR DEMANDS

In considering the report from Mr. Cunningham of the findings of the Fisheries Advisory Board in connection with the resolutions submitted by local fishermen, the council last night brought down a detailed report prepared by the combined fisheries committees of the city council, Board of Trade and citizens, in which the various matters which the board had refused to have altered were gone into in detail, with a view to submitting them to J. D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries, the premier and the leader of the opposition.

Ald. Montgomery explained that the report was in the form of an explanation of their demands, going more fully into detail than was done in the first instance. He explained the advantages of the abolishing of the boat-rating, the permitting of the use of gasoline boats in salmon fishing, etc. On the motion of Ald. Dybhavn, seconded by Ald. McClymont, the report was adopted and will be immediately prepared for submission to Ottawa and Victoria.

SIDEWALK ENQUIRY

At the council last night a letter from F. W. Chandler was read in which he pointed out that he had been charged with local improvement taxes covering a four-foot side-walk on Claude St. and Seventh Avenue, which had never been laid down. Personally, he would prefer that a plank road-way be laid at this point. The matter was referred to the board of works.

GOOD WORK

The people of Prince Rupert are to be congratulated upon the response they have made to the calls upon them in aid of the Red Cross fund. These are hard times and money is scarce and it says much for the self-sacrifice of those who are here that such a substantial sum was realised at the Carnival of the Allies. It is evidence that the same spirit which prompted the boys to cross the Atlantic to help defeat the Germans remains in the hearts of those they left behind.

That the gallant work done by our soldiers on the field of battle had not a little to do with the ready response goes without saying. The recent reports of the fighting around St. Elói, in which the Canadian soldiers held positions which were almost untenable must have moved many, to giving more than they would otherwise have done.

While the continual demand for money is a severe drain upon our reduced population, it is gratifying to find that it is being met cheerfully and that, though there are fewer people here than when the war broke out, there is more money forthcoming for Red Cross work than at the beginning of the war. The feverish excitement of the early days of the war has abated and people have settled down to a more clear understanding of what is really required of them. Besides supplying necessary hospital outfit, the raising of such a sum as was realised by the Carnival of the Allies will do much to encourage the men in the trenches, as the mere fact that they are remembered by the folks at home will nerve them to even greater efforts.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

For the benefit of the Journal, we repeat that the Liberals of Vancouver are clearly demonstrating the kind of election tactics they will not tolerate, and we may add that the Liberals took action in the matter the moment they discovered that there had been an attempt at wrong-doing.

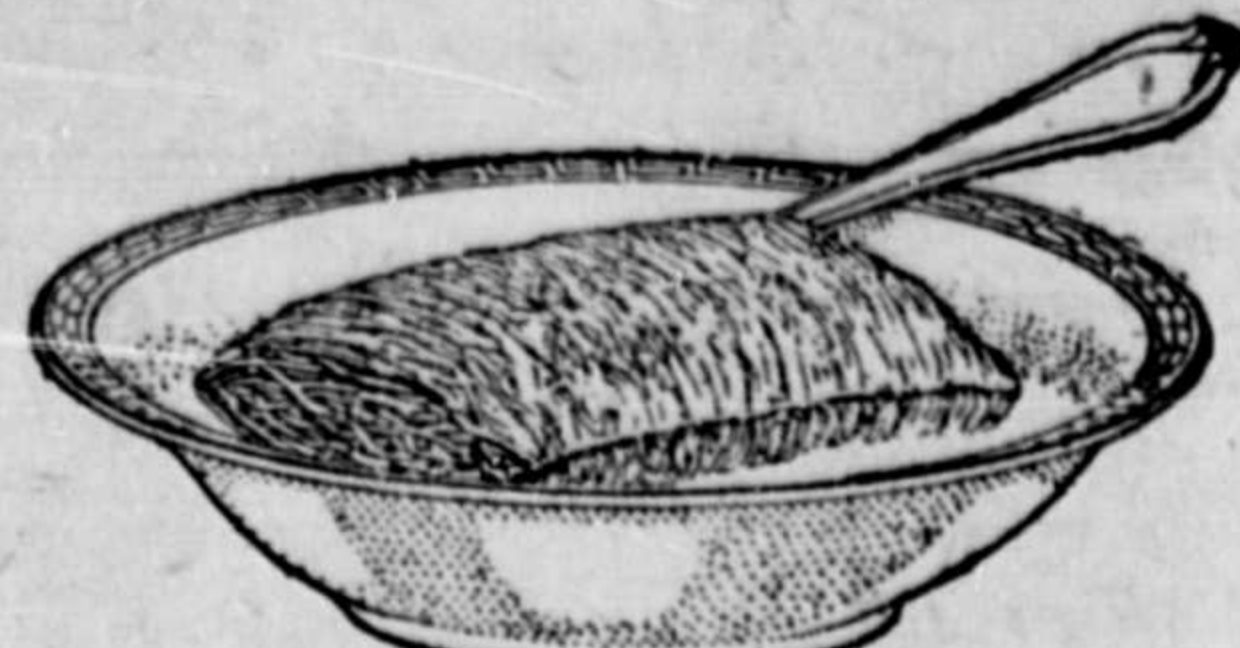

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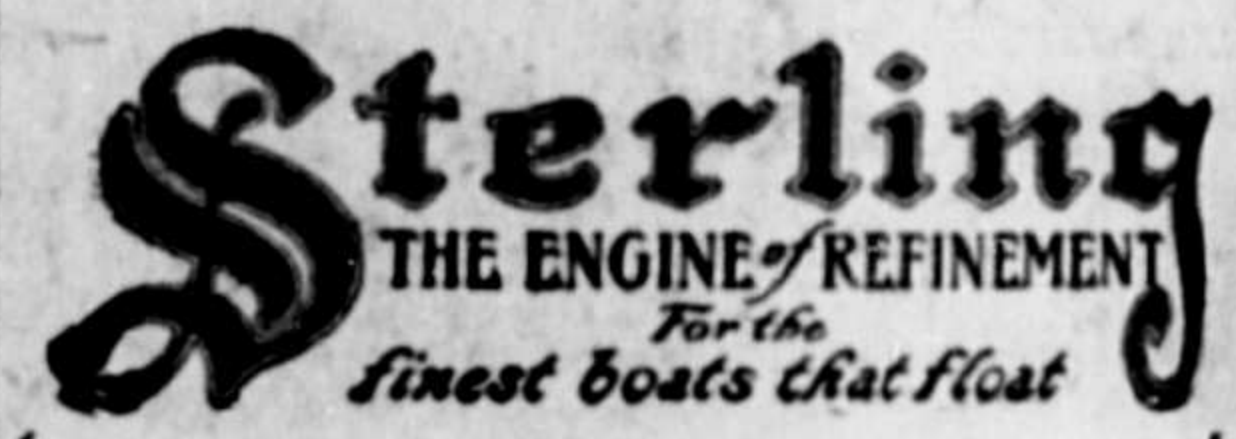

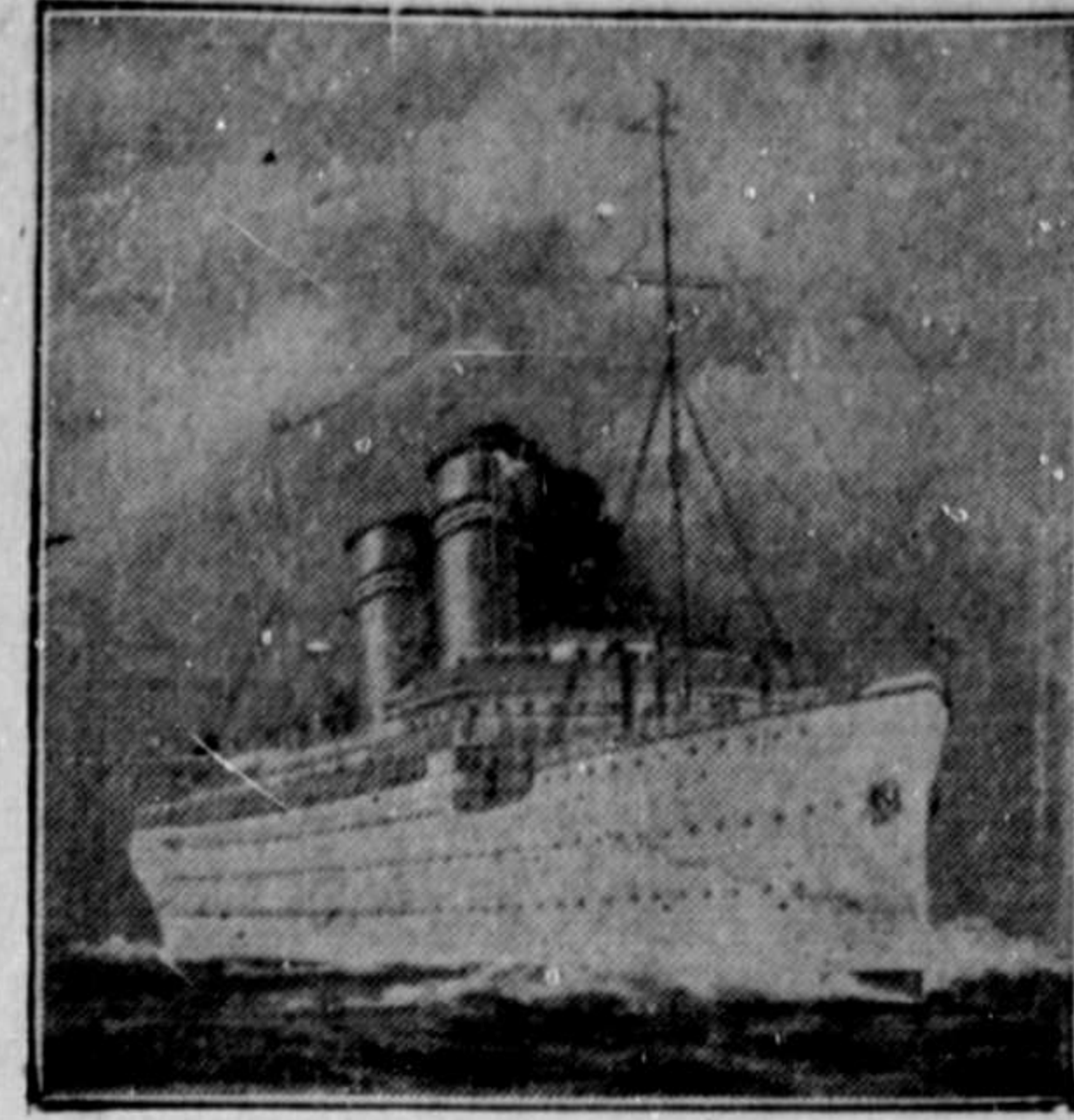
VITAL STATISTICS
