CASEMENT'S FAILURE DISAPPOINTS BERLIN

TERRIFIC BOMBARDMENT ON VERDUN FRONT -- RUSSIANS REINFORCE FRENCH

BERLIN PRESS DISAPPOINTED OVER FAILURE

British Troops Have Irish Revolt Well in Hand—Ireland Under Martial Law—Hoped to Influence States.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 27.—The British regulars from Belfast and from England have recaptured the Dublin centres held by the Sinn Feiners. All government and financial institutions are now guarded by troops. The search for suspects is proceeding.

The guns of the warships in Dublin Bay are trained on the city while machine guns have been mounted on the roofs of buildings. A general disarming of the rebels is proceeding. Martial law is in force throughout Ireland.

Berlin Disappointed.

The Berlin press today expresses disappointment over the failure of the Casement expedition. Casement claimed that there were a hundred thousand Irishmen ready to revolt and that the revolution would affect feeling towards Britain in America, where a large number of Irish-Americans would favor the movement.

THE SECOND ISSUE OF "THE BRAZIER" ARRIVES

The Daily News has received from P. F. Godenrath a copy of the second issue of The Brazier, the journal of the 16th Battalion, Canadian Scottish. It is a live little sheet and carries a very fine picture of Lieut.-Col. J. E. Leckie, D. S. O., on the front page. There is a page devoted to poetry which is more forceful than poetic, but all of it breathes the spirit which fills our soldiers. One piece is honestly entitled "Doggerel." There are many good stories and several clever drawings, one of which represents a Tommy and a German having an argument from trenches which are only a few yards apart. Tommy (during German digging operations) says "Say, Fritz, if you don't quit throwing your blooming earth over into our trench, there's going to be trouble." The Brazier is bright, breezy and interesting.

RUSSIANS ARE WITH FRENCH ON VERDUN FRONT

Most Terrible Bombardment Since the Verdun Struggle Began—May be Crown Prince's Birthday Celebration.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, April 27.—The most terrific bombardment since the beginning of the fighting around Verdun is concentrated today against the French positions at Avoncourt and Cote Du Poivre, the key positions of the French defence.

General Petain's army has been reinforced by the Russians who arrived recently at Marseilles and determined German infantry attacks are prepared for.

The attack is believed to coincide with the birthday of the German Crown Prince which is on May 6th. A small attack north of Fort Vaux was repulsed.

Prussian Casualties.

The Prussian casualty lists just published show a total of 2,518,254, exclusive of Saxons, Bavarians, Wurtembergers and the men lost in colonial warfare.

Zeppelins Driven Off.

Four Zeppelins raided Kent and Essex last night. They were forced to fly high by anti-aircraft gun fire. They dropped a hundred bombs through the mist which was hanging over the coast. There were no casualties and little damage was done.

EIGHTY MILLIONS IN WAR CONTRACTS

Ottawa, April 19.—Since the placing some weeks ago of the \$75,000,000 credit by Canada at the disposal of the British Minister of Munitions, orders have been placed by the Imperial Munitions Board for \$80,000,000 worth of munitions. The orders now placed will keep most of the munitions factories busy until well into the summer. Further large orders are expected from Great Britain early in June.

CASEMENT LEFT TO HIS FATE BY GERMAN SEAMEN

Crew Scuttled Ship When Held up by British Patrol—Twenty Thousand Rifles and Machine Guns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 27.—The Casement expedition was stopped by a British patrol off the west coast of Ireland, which ordered the supposed Dutch trader to proceed to Queenstown harbor.

When the patrol appeared, the crew of twenty on board of the disguised German auxiliary cruiser hoisted the German flag and scuttled the vessel.

Sir Roger Casement was placed in a collapsible boat and left to his fate. The patrol vessel rescued all the Germans and took Casement prisoner. The men were all picked German naval men. The submarine, which accompanied the expedition, made its escape by diving.

The cruiser carried as cargo twenty thousand rifles, machine guns and ammunition.

MUNITIONS CONTRACTS

We publish elsewhere a statement that the Imperial Munitions Board has just placed orders to the extent of \$80,000,000. This exactly bears out the forecast made by T. D. Pattullo in the recent discussion on the drydock situation and is further evidence that the Borden government representatives on the Munitions Board have no intention of placing a single contract for munitions in Prince Rupert.

We have the assurance of Mr. Donnelly, the designer of the drydock, that the plant is ready to start making munitions at any time. We have the statement of E. J. Chamberlain, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, to the effect that the board refuses to grant a munitions contract to the drydock plant, and now we have the fact that \$80,000,000 worth of contracts have been placed recently. We have the statement of the Minister of Militia that it cost ten per cent. commission simply to place contracts in the United States. Surely it would not have cost the British government more than this ten per cent. had the Munitions Board placed part of these contracts here.

The government may have nothing whatever to do with the drydock, but it most decidedly has something to do with the placing of munitions contracts, and the interest of the government in the future of Prince Rupert is clearly evidenced by the fact that no effort has been made to place any of the work at this point.

One hates to contrast the two political parties in regard to what might have been done here, but one cannot refrain from wondering whether, had a Laurier government been in

power, Prince Rupert would have had to go on its knees pleading for work at the drydock. We venture to think that the drydock, with Laurier in power, would have been so busy with its shipping work that it would not have been interested in munitions contracts.

CROOKED METHODS

Premier Bowser has promptly acceded to the request of the Liberals of Vancouver for a searching investigation into the alleged "plugging" at the Vancouver by-election and it is to be hoped that the committee does its work thoroughly and speedily. It is refreshing, in these days of revelations, to find a party anxious to lay bare illegal methods which were ostensibly used for the benefit of that party. The parties responsible for such dastardly work should be sent to the penitentiary for the limit which the law allows. If this is done, it will serve as a warning to all manipulators and should help to make elections cleaner.

It is not impossible that the game was played by an enemy of the party, but, whether it was done by friend or foe, the culprit should be subjected to instant exposure and the extreme penalty of the law for such an offence. The Tories, notoriously hard-up for political capital and ever anxious to make their opponents appear black, are doing their utmost to make it appear that the alleged corruption had its root in the heart of the Liberal party. All who know M. A. Macdonald know that he would not for a moment tolerate such methods and no one will be more anxious for a searching enquiry than the member for Vancouver.

GRANBY PROSPECTS
FOR THIS SEASON

Granby Consolidated should treat approximately 1,000,000 tons of ore at its Anyox smelter during the coming year. Assuming a recovery of not better than 35 pounds of copper per ton of ore, the yield from that plant should approximate 35,000,000 pounds in addition to which the Grand Forks smelter should turn out 15,000,000 pounds, making a total of 50,000,000.

During the coming summer the Midas mine in Alaska, owned by Granby, is expected to start shipments. This ore will be treated in the Hidden Creek smelter at Anyox.

The usual winter interference with operations has about ceased. The agglomerator will start permanent operations just as soon as normal water power can be secured. This will also permit the entire four furnaces of the Hidden Creek smelter to run full blast. With the agglomerator the management expects four pounds of copper per ton of flue dust to be secured at a very low cost.

Although paying but \$6 dividends, Granby has been earning very much more. Assuming a cost of 10 1/2 cents a pound the company on 20-cent copper can show profits of \$4,750,000 per annum, on an output of 50,000,000 pounds. On a production of but 40,000,000 profits would approximate \$3,800,000. The latter figure is equal to \$25 per share. —Boston News Bureau.
