FRENCH SUCCESSES ON THE VERDUN FRONT

FRENCH AIR SUPERIORITY IS DEMONSTRATED -- TURKISH TRANSPORT SUNK

FRENCH MAKE GAINS ALONG VERDUN FRONT

German Trenches and Prisoners are Taken—French Aerial Successes in April—Attack on Loos.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, May 2.—In a strong attack upon the German positions to the southeast of Fort Douaumont, the French captured the first line German trench which is 500 metres long, taking one hundred prisoners.

On the north slope of Deadman's Hill the French gained the German trenches on a front of 1,000 metres and a depth of 300 to 600 metres. There is great artillery activity west of the Meuse from Avoncourt to Deadman's Hill.

French Air Superiority.

The superiority of the French aerial corps over that of the Germans has again been demonstrated. During the month of April, French pilots brought down thirty-one German aeroplanes. Nine fell within the Allied lines and twenty-two fell in flames into the German lines. During the same time, the French lost only six aeroplanes, all of which fell into the German lines.

Attack Repulsed.

A mine and bomb attack was repulsed at Loos yesterday. In seven air combats two German machines were brought down.

RUNAWAY

CANADIAN LINES ARE BEING ATTACKED

(Courtesy Hotel Rupert.)

London, May 2.—The Germans are attacking along the Canadian portion of the western front and the enemy's bombardment is very trying. Our artillery fire has exploded several German gas tanks.

French Gains.

The French have captured German trenches in the Verdun region, and an intense artillery duel is raging. The Germans are also making frequent infantry attacks.

Note to Washington.

Berlin sends cheery preliminary note to Washington which says that relations between the United States and Germany can be looked forward to with less apprehension.

Irish Rebellion.

Only a few Irish rebels are still fighting. Railroad communication in Ireland is still interrupted.

The British people have been asked to refrain from eating meat on Thursdays and to abstain from alcohol on Mondays.

HOLIDAY ALLOWANCE TO LIGHT SUPERINTENDENT

At the council last night, Ald. Casey asked what had been done by the light committee in regard to the allowance in lieu of holidays to T. C. Duncan.

Ald. Montgomery said that the motion of the committee was not yet signed completely.

The acting mayor thought that the report could not be presented incomplete.

Ald. Casey moved that Mr. Duncan be granted \$100 in lieu of holidays, which he had not taken while light superintendent.

Ald. Montgomery pointed out that Mr. Duncan had taken holidays last year and had had several days this year. He did not think that the city should grant \$100 at a time like the present.

Ald. McRae said that there was no hurry and thought that the matter should be left over until the committee report was completed.

Ald. Casey said that he thought Mr. Duncan had sacrificed his holidays to the welfare of the plant and the city, and was entitled to \$100.

The motion carried. Ald. Casey, Barrie, Dybhavn and Smith voting for it, and Ald. McRae and Montgomery against.

PECULIAR CASE

Some time ago, Tony Christian got judgment against John Schaefer, of the Prince Rupert Dairy, for \$1,300. Before the case came up, Schaefer made over all his property and his business to his father, and up to the present has made no effort to meet the judgment. Some time ago, Schaefer was arrested for contempt of court and spent thirty days in jail. He was brought up before His Honor Judge Young again yesterday, the case being postponed for two weeks to allow Schaefer to procure certain receipts.

RESOLUTION REGARDING LABOR CONDITIONS

A resolution approved by the Union of B. C. Municipalities regarding the establishment of government labor bureaus was read at the council last evening and a request made that the resolution be signed by the mayor and aldermen and sent to Ottawa. The resolution asked the Governor-General-in-Council to move in the establishment of labor bureaus throughout the country to provide for the employment of returned soldiers; to take care of the looked-for influx of immigrants after the war, and to take care of the industrial situation created by the displacement of the large number of men at present employed in munitions factories.

The idea of the resolution seemed to meet with the approval of all the members of the council and will be signed by each member.

COMPLAINT REGARDING CREEK ON SECOND AVE.

At the city council last night, a letter from Otto Nelson was read drawing attention to the creek which flows under his building on Second Avenue. He stated that he had complained a year ago of the smell which arose from the creek, which was simply an open sewer, but nothing was done. He asked that the creek be covered in.

The matter was referred to the health committee and city engineer with power to act.

VANCOUVER ELECTION ENQUIRY CONTINUES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, May 2.—Peter Stewart and Larry Madden corroborated the evidence of "J. J. Kelly" in regard to the "plugging" at the Vancouver election, before the committee today.

They said that they had been brought to Vancouver from Seattle by Jack White. The party of eleven were instructed to vote for Macdonald and voted several times each. "Kelly" refused to reveal the name of the British Columbia man who paid him for voting.

LIGHT SUPERINTENDENT APPOINTED ON TRIAL

At the city council last night, Ald. Barrie asked if it were not unusual that the heads of departments be appointed by a committee and not by the council.

The acting mayor said that personally he thought the council should make all such appointments.

Ald. Casey thought that the question was timely, in view of the fact that there had arrived from the south a new light superintendent. He thought that the council should consider the appointment of Mr. Duncan's successor now.

Ald. Dybhavn explained that the understanding when the mayor left for the south was that since the outstanding applicants were all resident in the south, Mr. McCaffery should interview them while he was in Vancouver and send a man up on trial.

Ald. Nelson explained that Mr. Kennedy had come north on three months' trial.

Ald. Casey thought that the matter should have come before the council in the usual order.

Ald. Montgomery moved that the action of the mayor be ratified as to the appointment of Mr. Kennedy on trial. This was seconded by Ald. D. C. McRae.

Ald. Casey said that he knew nothing of the qualifications of the applicant and asked if the applications had been considered by the council.

The acting mayor said that they had not.

Ald. Casey said that this was foolish. Since the man was here, he did not wish to raise any question as to qualifications, but he protested against the selection of a man solely by the committee.

Ald. Dybhavn explained that there were five outstanding applicants and as all were in Vancouver, it was thought better that the mayor interview them and make a trial selection.

The action of the mayor was ratified.

BRITISH SUB SINKS A TURK TRANSPORT

Hundreds of Turks Drowned in Sea of Marmora—Dublin is Still Under Strict Military Law.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 2.—The Turkish transport Chirketi Mairie has been sunk by a British submarine off Rodosto in the Sea of Marmora. Hundreds of Turkish troops were drowned.

Von Der Goltz Murdered.

It is reported from Bucharest that General Von Der Goltz, the German commander in the Near East, did not die of fever, but was assassinated by a Turkish officer named A. L. Abdullah, of the Anatolian regiment on April 14th. Three shots were fired before the general fell.

Martial Law Continues.

Dublin, May 2.—Despite wholesale unconditional surrender on the part of the rebels, Dublin still remains under martial law.

The search for arms continues. The bodies of fourteen women have been recovered from the debris of the buildings destroyed in the \$20,000,000 fire. A thousand rebels have been taken prisoners. Four hundred and ninety left last night for an English internment camp.

WOUNDED SOLDIER RETURNING TONIGHT

Word reached town this morning that Private Hallett, who left this district for the front, is returning on the train tonight, having been discharged from active service after recovering from wounds sustained on the western front.

IRELAND

The rebellion in Ireland seems to be over and it will probably prove a blessing in disguise. The few misguided, hot-headed individuals who were largely responsible for the whole terrible business will have time to cool their heads and their heels, while the mass of the Irish people, who are loyal, first, last and all the time, will redouble their efforts to overthrow the Germans. Without a doubt, the Dublin rumpus will produce thousands of stalwart recruits for the army of the Empire.

The forming of the "Irish Republic" and the nomination of a President would have been Gilbertian had it not been so tragic. The "president" was elected, if it could be called an election, by a mere handful of rebels, while Commander-in-Chief Connolly was appointed by the "president." The whole affair must have appealed tremendously to the imagination of a small section who are not necessarily pro-German, but essentially anti-British, and it ended as it was bound to end.

This disturbance will probably go further towards bringing the Nationalists and the Unionists more closely together than any conceivable thing ever could. The Nationalists as a body are not disloyal to Britain, and John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, joined forces with Sir Edward Carson in denouncing the action of this small band of insurgents. The Unionists, when they opposed Home Rule, were not afraid of the actions of the followers of Redmond, but were suspicious of the loyalty of a minority of desperate characters who hid behind the Nationalist party. Now that the boil has burst and the bad

blood has been let, Ireland will be in better shape to govern herself than she has ever been.

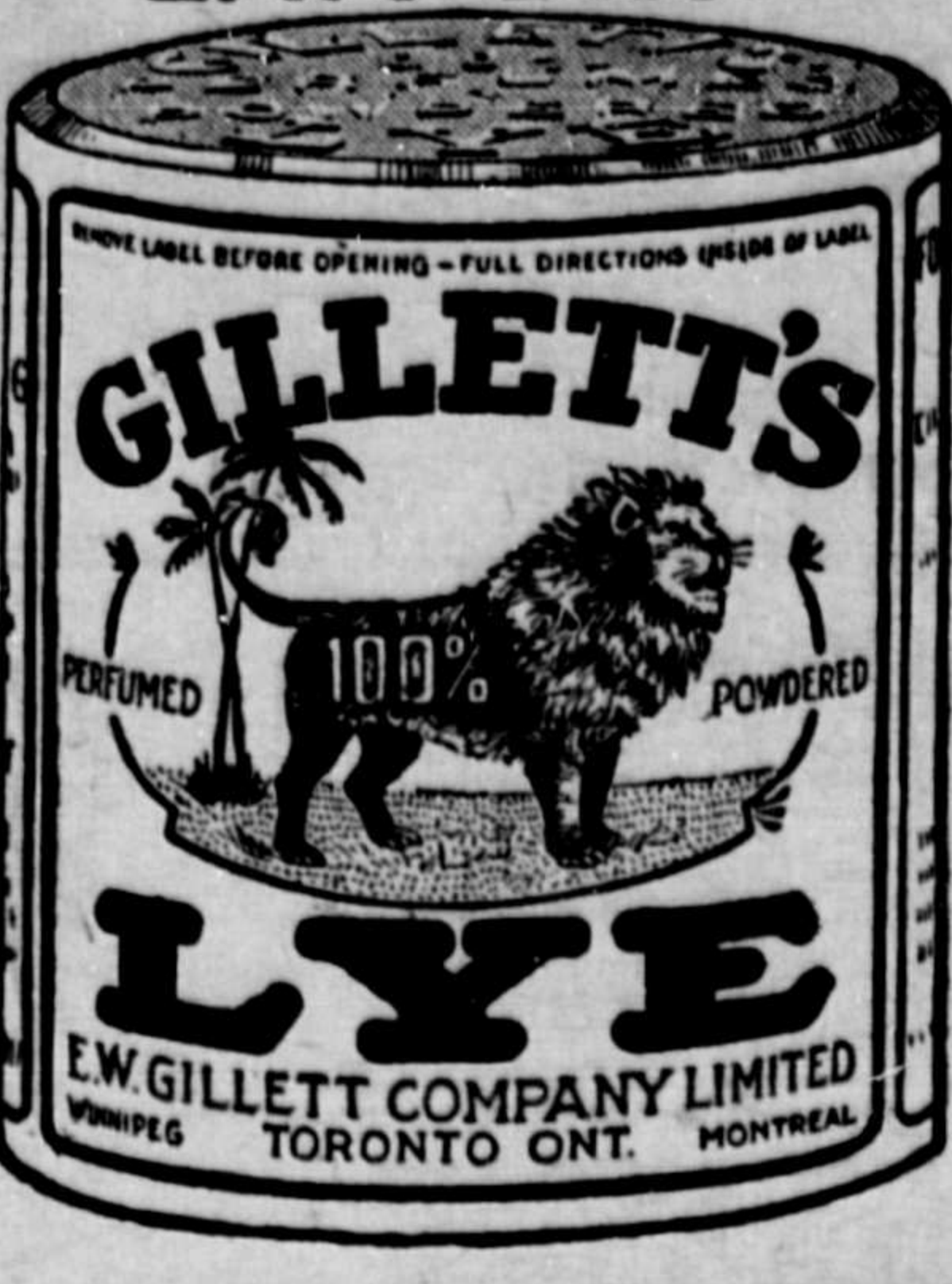
SPLENDID FAILURE

The surrender of General Townshend's force at Kut-el-Amara is the greatest disaster which has befallen the British army since the outbreak of the war, and the fact that the force was an Indian one makes it all the more serious. It is very easy to be critical when failure has been admitted, but had the Townshend expedition been successful in taking Bagdad, or even in holding Kut until the relief column arrived, it would have been hailed as the greatest triumph in the history of our Indian army and the critics would have joined in the praise.

Our Indian officers have for so many years been used to facing odds, and undertaking desperate expeditions under the most adverse conditions, that probably they never stopped to count the cost of failure. Today, the critics are loud in their denunciation of the whole expedition in its effort to penetrate into the interior, instead of being content to remain at the head of the Persian Gulf. Certainly it was a blunder, but it was just one of those splendid blunders which have so often turned out successfully in British foreign warfare. All through our history, we have similar instances, though the failures are most strongly fixed in the public mind, as, for instance, the death of Gordon at Khartoum. Townshend failed, but he failed heroically.

The most tragic part of the failure was the defeat of the relief column in its efforts to get food and support to the beleaguered garrison. It may be that it was too late in starting,

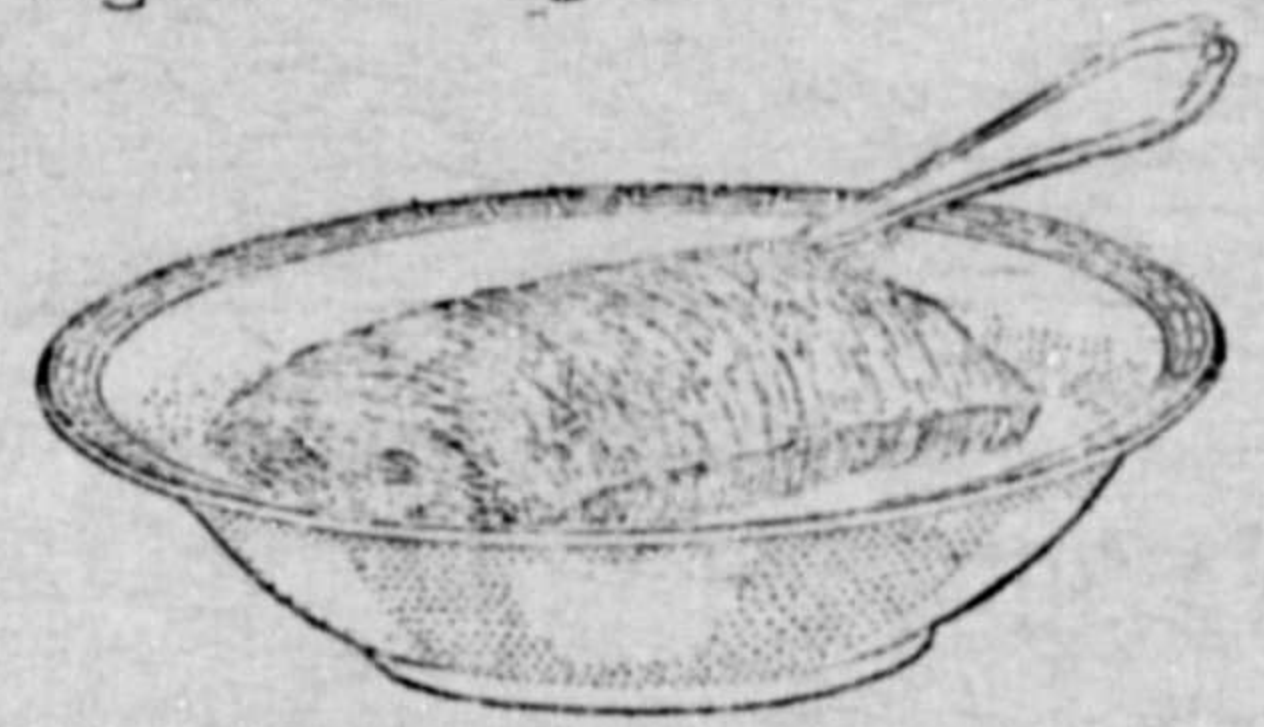
CABARET SHOW AT THE WESTHOLME THEATRE

NEW ZEALAND HAS HONORED SOUTH AFRICA

the city of Auckland, New Zealand, determined a few months ago to send, as a proof of their admiration for the conquest of German Southwest Africa, presents to Generals Botha and Smuts, and these have now been prepared.

To General Botha goes an address on vellum, exquisitely illuminated, and enclosed in a silver casket that stands on a base of three New Zealand woods—rewarewa, Wairangi purau, and wavy manuka. Above is a block of greenstone on silver feet, and the casket itself is ornamented with the Dominion coat of arms, a carved Maori whare, and the South African and New Zealand flags crossed. Other ornamentations include representations of fern leaves, kiwis, and tikis in silver.

On the lid of the casket is a mounted trooper in solid gold. The monogram of the recipient is done on gold, and gold-bordered panels bear representations of Mount Egmont and Mitre Peak, the two famous New Zealand mountains. A similar casket and address has been prepared for General Smuts.—Exchange.

REBELS DEFEATED IN MEXICAN BATTLE

American exchanges just to hand report that there was a battle last Thursday just north of the city of Oaxaca between six thousand rebels and the constitutional army, when the rebels were defeated, losing five hundred killed and many wounded. The fighting lasted for five hours when the rebels were forced to flee into the mountains.

Despatches from Chihuahua state that General Alvaro Obregon, minister of war of the de facto government, will submit assurances to Generals Scott and Funston at their coming conference at Juarez or El Paso, that the Carranza forces are now fully able to cope with the Villistas. Obregon said that he hoped to be able to arrange for a speedy retirement of American troops from Mexican soil.

REINDEER FARMING IN NORTHERN ALASKA

W. G. Davis, an old time mining man of Alaska, who is now in the Kuskokwim country, writes to his old partner at Seward stating that there are several paying creeks in that country where a single man can make a good living, though there is nothing really big discovered yet, the best creek being in the hands of the reindeer Laplanders. The most interesting part of the letter is that in which he says that one Lap, who rented one hundred female reindeer from the United States government ten years ago, refused thirty thousand dollars for his herd last fall. Two white men have gone into the reindeer business, which they consider is highly profitable.
