FRENCH CONTINUE TO ADVANCE AT VERDUN

ZEPPELIN WRECKED IN NORWAY -- CIVIL POPULATION NOW EVACUATING METZ

METZ IS BEING EVACUATED BY ITS CIVILIANS

Important Development if News is Authentic—French Continue to Advance on the Verdun Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, May 4.—It is reported that Metz is being evacuated by the civilian population. Metz is the capital of Lorraine and has a population of sixty thousand. It is situated fifteen miles north of the fighting line and is fifty miles east of Verdun. Metz is the strongest of the German fortresses.

French Advance.

Paris, May 4.—The French continue to advance in the region of Deadman's Hill. Yesterday's gains in this region have been increased and all have been consolidated by the French.

In one trench there were only two live Germans left when the French infantry entered it after the heavy artillery had done its work.

There is active fighting west of the Meuse; at Avoncourt wood and at Vaux. One hundred prisoners and four machine guns were captured from the Germans in yesterday's fighting at Deadman's Hill.

More Russians Arrive.

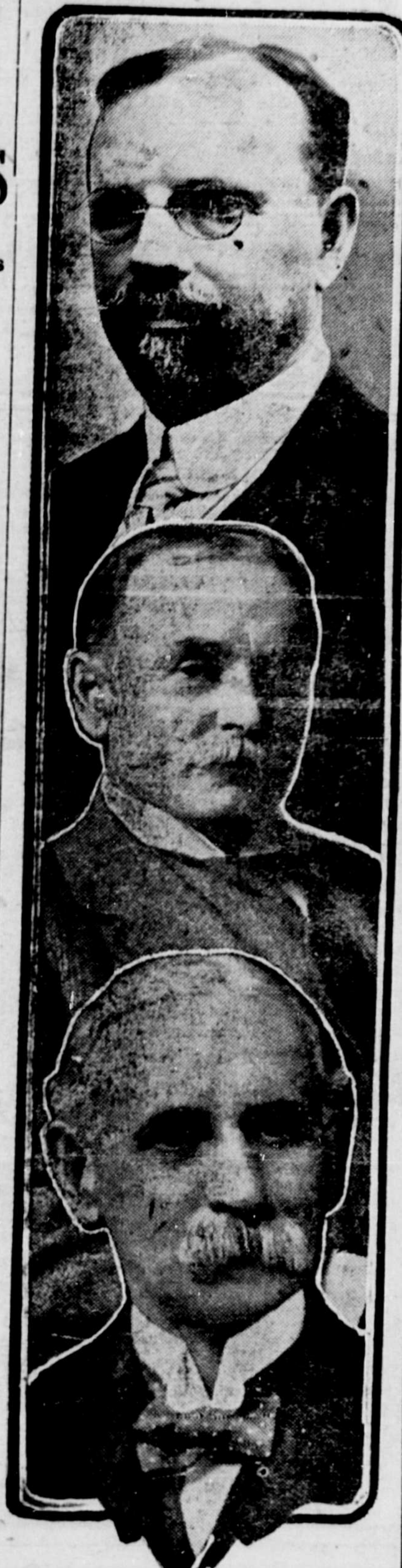
Another contingent of Russians has arrived at Marseilles and proceeded to camp at Mirabeau.

SEVERE TEST FOR YOUNG AVIATORS

G. R. Halliday, a well known Victoria young man, has returned from an aviation school in Los Angeles after passing the final tests. He entered the school on January 19th and had his pilot's certificate in three months. He will shortly leave for Ottawa en route for England where he will enter the Royal Naval Air Service. Mr. Halliday describes the test as severe, the young aviator having to ascend after dark; travel a considerable distance and alight within a given area guided only by a bonfire. Another test was to describe two sets of figure eights in the air and alight within 135 feet of a given mark. He states that there are several young Canadians in training for the British Air Service in Los Angeles. Since Mr. Halliday left the south the first of Prince Rupert's aviators, Alex Young and C. C. Purdy, will have entered the school.

ZEPPELIN L-20 IS WRECKED ON NORWAY COAST

Crew of Sixteen Interned—Vessel was Damaged by British Guns—Another Raid on East Coast.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 4.—Zeppelin L-20 one of the German air fleet which raided the northeast coast of England on Tuesday night, when there were thirty-six casualties, has been driven ashore in a gale in Hafso Firth, in Norway. She broke in two and drifted out to sea.

The craft was completely destroyed and the sixteen members of her crew have been interned. The Zeppelin was so badly injured by British gun fire that she was unable to reach Germany.

Another Raid.

Five or six Zeppelins visited a large area on the east coast of England last night, flying high to keep out of the range of the anti-aircraft guns. They dropped one hundred bombs. Three women were killed.

HERO OF YPRES WILL LECTURE IN WESTHOLME

Sergeant Wells, of the 7th Battalion, who lost an arm at Ypres when in charge of his platoon and who spent four months in Germany as a prisoner of war, created great enthusiasm in Vancouver last Monday evening by his recital of the doings of the Canadian boys at Ypres. Along with his lecture, the returned soldier shows six reels of war films taken under government supervision and make up the finest views of Canada's army ever shown in the Dominion. The pictures were taken by Lieut. Dwyer of the 30th Battalion.

It will interest Prince Rupert people to know that the gallant sergeant will lecture in the Westholme Theatre here on May 12th and 13th, when his war pictures will also be screened.

He will be accompanied north by Corporal White who won the D. C. M. for conspicuous bravery under fire. Sergeant Wells was exchanged for a German prisoner as he was entirely unfit for further active service.

STRIKING PICTURE

The New York Sunday Times which arrived by last mail has the most remarkable war picture yet published. It is a view of a German attack on the British positions on the western front and was snapped from a British aeroplane. The German troops are distinctly outlined following in the wake of clouds of gas, while British shells can be seen bursting right amongst the Germans.

HUNDRETH ZEPPELIN

According to the Munich Neueste Nachrichten Germany has now completed her hundredth Zeppelin, seventy-five of which have been built since the outbreak of the war.

TIMBER LANDS PURCHASED AT BARGAIN PRICE

Huge Fraud Discovered by Public Accounts Committee—Valuable Timber Land is Given Away.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, May 4.—A fraud on the land department has been revealed before the Public Accounts Committee. It appears that the Canadian Puget Sound Lumber Company obtained by powers of attorney, and misleading surveyors' reports, 5,760 acres of valuable timber lands containing 345,765,000 feet of timber, for \$17,916 as second-class agricultural land at \$2.50 per acre. The land was valued for registration purposes at \$421,800. The deal was put through by the law firm of Eberts & Taylor.

Shipping Bill.

The shipping Aid Bill was introduced by the Hon. Lorne Campbell yesterday. It provides for a loan on mortgage at six per cent. up to fifty-five per cent. of the cost of the ships or loans equal to that amount on security, to companies building a ship for the British Columbia foreign trade. One per cent. of the gross earnings is to go to the province for an administration fund.

FOURTEEN FRESH RUSSIAN DIVISIONS

The Idea Nationale, of Rome, reports that Von Hindenburg is now faced on the eastern front by fourteen new divisions of Russian troops. The new divisions are composed entirely of young soldiers and they are splendidly supported by the latest powerful artillery.—Central News.

Harry Hayes, one of the most popular of Prince Rupert waterfront men, has been promoted to the rank of corporal in the 102nd Battalion, according to word received from Comox today.

The Cold Storage Company bought the fares of thirteen of the schooners which came in yesterday and the San Juan Company the other two.

BIRRELL RESIGNS

In connection with the Irish rebellion, the London press is loud in its denunciation of the neglect and slackness of the government. The Daily Telegraph, a consistent supporter of the coalition government, says "It is difficult to write with patience of the gross blundering in high places, but for which the deplorable episode could not have occurred." The Evening News placarded London with big bills reading "Birrell must go."

As a result of all this newspaper clamor, the Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell has gone. When the press and the public have calmed down to normal temperature they will probably realize that such a disturbance in Ireland was liable to happen, no matter who was Chief Secretary for Ireland and it may be that they will discover that if there were any neglect it was on the part of someone in Ireland, and not in London.

The Irish Secretaryship is a political position and the holder of the portfolio has never been looked upon as a combined chief of police and commander-in-chief of the Irish forces. The secretary is located at Downing Street, London, and his knowledge of what is transpiring in Ireland is gathered solely from reports of heads of departments in Ireland. If reports of threatened rebellion were sent in and nothing done by the government, then there is good reason to blame the man in power in London, but, if the disturbance was a sudden outbreak as a result of secret meetings, carried out without discovery by the Royal Irish Constabulary, the only fault to be found will be that that body did not make the discovery.

To blame Mr. Birrell for neglect for an uprising may be just as ridiculous as to blame the Secretary for India for an uprising amongst the natives of Bombay or Calcutta or the hillmen of the north. When all the facts are made known, the blame will be placed upon the right shoulders. Meantime, no one will be more anxious for a thorough investigation than the late Chief Secretary for Ireland.

It may be unfortunate for Mr. Birrell that he is recognized as the star humorist of the House, even his most serious speeches being studded with witticisms which on many occasions have got under the skin of his opponents. It is just possible that this quality may have brought many individuals and several newspapers to look upon this illustrious minister as a man who took nothing seriously.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Hannington seemed to be quite certain that Bowser knew that he was getting \$2,000 commission in the court house site deal, but now that the premier says he does not remember anything about it, Hannington is quite willing to change his mind to suit Bowser's memory.

The effects of the terrible slaughter before Verdun are now being felt in Germany and the women whose husbands, sons and brothers are being sacrificed are clamoring for peace. They have been answered with bullets, but the day is coming when this argument will no longer be effective.

John L. Sullivan must be an ardent searcher after the truth when he pays a jail-bird's fine to



have him come to Victoria to tell his version of it. Unfortunately, "Kelly" will only tell part of the truth. Why?

If those Seattle witnesses are not very careful the whole truth about the votes bought in Seattle may leak out and then there may be arrests on charges for which immunity has not yet been granted.

The Ketchikan Progressive Miner raises a great editorial howl because Prince Rupert is getting the lion's share of the halibut business and clamors for immediate and drastic legislation to divert more of it to American ports.

UNITED STATES TROOPS ARE TO STAY IN MEXICO

Washington, May 2.—After a consultation with some members of his cabinet, President Wilson gave out some of his plans formulated to carry out his policy in regard to Mexico. The president purposes keeping United States troops in the field until all brigandage has been eliminated, despite the fact that General Obregon represented to General Scott that the presence of American troops had the tendency of weakening Carranza's power to control the situation.

Secretary of War Baker, in a message to General Scott yesterday, emphasized the necessity of having General Obregon strictly understand that whatever agreements are made must not be based upon the belief that the United States will withdraw the troops immediately, as the country must become peaceful before the withdrawal is affected.

A report from El Paso received here this morning says that the order given by the secretary of war that was communicated to General Obregon, spread rapidly among the Mexican of-

ficials here and cast a gloom over the situation, so far as those officials are concerned, as they had hoped that the troops would be withdrawn immediately.

SEEDING PROCEEDS THROUGHOUT ALBERTA

Reports from the prairies state that seeding is proceeding apace. Farmers state that the land is in good condition and everything points to a big crop though the area under wheat will be about twenty per cent. less than last year, at least in Alberta.

In southern Alberta sixty per cent. of the seeding has been completed; in central Alberta about forty per cent., and in northern Alberta about twenty-five per cent. A snowfall during last week has greatly benefited the land in the northern part of the province.
