GERMAN SOLDIERS RECOGNISE THEY ARE HOPELESSLY BEATEN AT VERDUN

GERMAN SOLDIERS REFUSE TO OBEY

Milan, May 6 .- It is reported that the German officers on the Verdun front are having great difficulty in making the German soldiers obey their commands. There is a rumor amongst the soldiers that the battle is now hopeless and simply means massacre for them.

Three German officers of high position at Verdun were courtmartialled at Leipzig and ordered to be shot, for having failed to carry out an important charge. They claim that the soldiers refused to make the charge.

German soldiers opposite the Irish troops on the western front put up signs telling them that Ireland was in revolt and that the British troops were shooting IMPOSSIBLE TO FASTEN down Irish women and children in the streets of Dublin. 




