WASHINGTON REPORTS DANGER IS AVERTED

GERMAN SOLDIERS RECOGNISE THEY ARE HOPELESSLY BEATEN AT VERDUN

GERMAN SOLDIERS REFUSE TO OBEY

Milan, May 6.—It is reported that the German officers on the Verdun front are having great difficulty in making the German soldiers obey their commands. There is a rumor amongst the soldiers that the battle is now hopeless and simply means massacre for them.

Three German officers of high position at Verdun were court-martialled at Leipzig and ordered to be shot, for having failed to carry out an important charge. They claim that the soldiers refused to make the charge.

German soldiers opposite the Irish troops on the western front put up signs telling them that Ireland was in revolt and that the British troops were shooting down Irish women and children in the streets of Dublin. They promised the Irish soldiers a hearty welcome if they would come over into the German trenches.

FAMILIAR NAME IN THE CASUALTY LIST

In the latest casualty list appears the name of Collingwood Schrieber amongst the missing. His next of kin is given as at Clarkson, Ont. There is just a possibility that this may be C. B. Schrieber, one of Prince Rupert's well known pioneers, who enlisted in Victoria shortly after the outbreak of the war, though it was supposed that Mrs. Schrieber was resident in Victoria and not in Ontario.

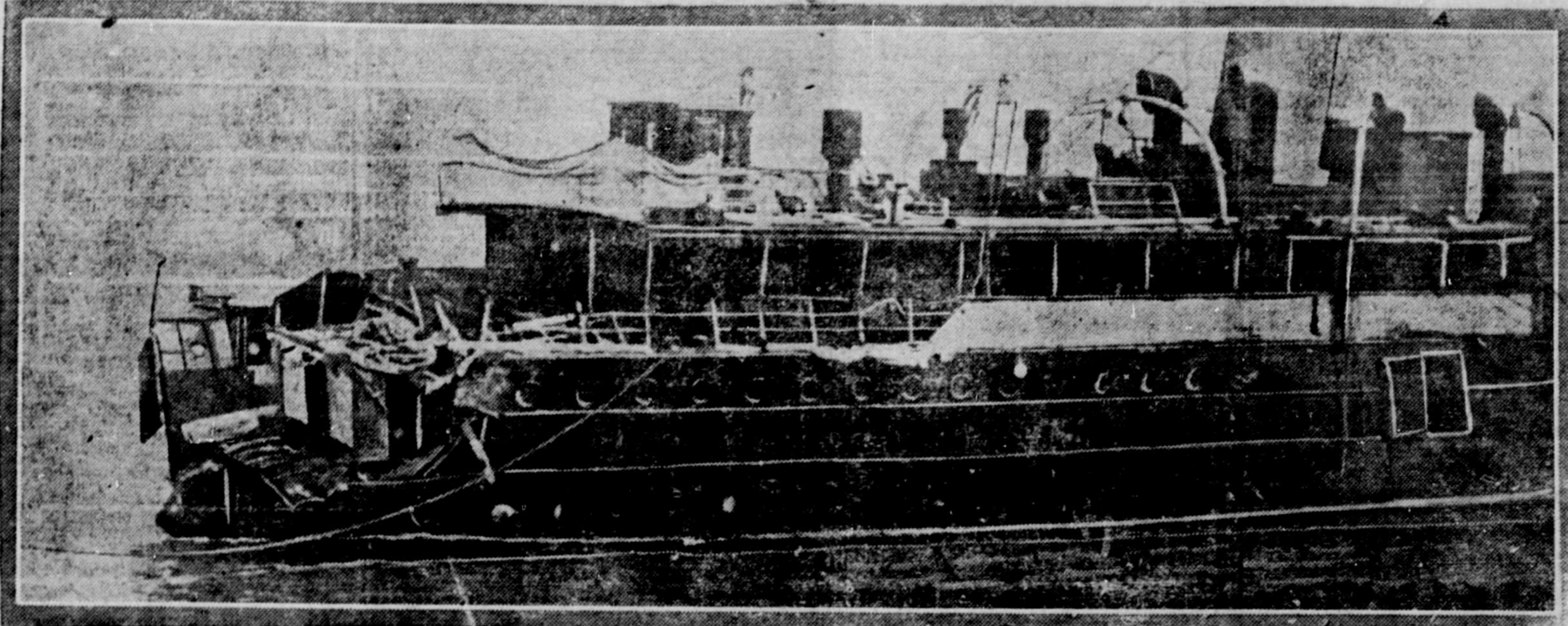
HUGE DRYDOCK FOR SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, May 4.—The contract for digging the "hole" for the largest dry dock in the world was let today by the Union Iron Works to the San Francisco Bridge Company. The contract calls for the expenditure of \$700,000. The remainder of the work is to be done by the Union Iron Works, the total expenditure being approximately \$2,000,000. The dock will be located at Hunters point, on San Francisco bay, and will be 1,000 feet in length, 125 feet in width and 45 feet deep. It will accommodate the largest ships in the United States navy.

Letters were received last evening from some of the boys of the 62nd Battalion, who arrived in England on April 10th and are now at Shorncliffe. The British Columbia boys were greatly tickled by the little passenger coaches which are used in the old country and promptly dubbed them "jitneys." IMPOSSIBLE TO FASTEN GUILT ON THE LIBERALS

Victoria, May 2.—Another complexion has been given to the alleged plugging operations at the recent by-election in Vancouver. Conservatives now admit that it is impossible to fasten any guilt on any of the Liberal nominees or the candidate for what is charged to have taken place. They recognise that the investigation is falling flat, that it has failed of its object, and that the best thing to do is to make insinuations and allegations which will implicate some person or persons unknown. Accordingly, they have been busy all day circulating the statement that it was not the Liberals of British Columbia who planned the personating operations, but the Liberals at Ottawa.

Sullivan the Man.

The Vancouver man who paid the fine of "Kelly," the Seattle jail-bird, who is the star witness in the government enquiry into the Vancouver by-election, was John L. Sullivan, proprietor of the Irving hotel, according to the evidence of W. H. Waller, of Seattle, before the special committee tonight. The admission was made unwittingly. Kelly had refused to give the man's name and had appealed to Neil Mackay, chairman of the committee, who gave a ruling that he did not have to tell. The witness added that Kelly was "willing to do anything to get out."

The evidence of Waller, as well as the other imported witnesses, showed they all were peculiarly friendly with not only John L. Sullivan, but his father, brothers and uncles, Seattle saloon men. Waller went so far as to say that he came over here through friendship for Sullivan. Sullivan also was waiting for them when they arrived in Vancouver. Waller also said Sullivan told him, "they slipped it over on us and we want to show them up."

Sullivan is directing the case for the government. He takes care of the witnesses—pays their board and room and takes them to and from the parliament buildings. He stays in the corridor while the hearing is going on and last night he and Tom Taylor, provincial secretary, were fraternizing in the hall.

DEVELOPMENT AT SURF INLET MINE

The Full Moon, the Surf Inlet launch, arrived here yesterday with F. W. Holler, E. A. Cleveland and F. Bradshaw on board. They report that the work on the excavation for the big dam is progressing well.

It is expected that before the end of the year, the reduction plant will be in operation, when 250 tons of ore per day will be handled.

SPLENDID SHOW AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

There was another crowded house at the Westholme last evening when Marguerite Clarke appeared in "Still Waters," a six-reel drama of circus life. This play is produced by Daniel Frohman and is one of the finest examples of the art of this great artist. Marguerite Clarke as the heroine is as dainty and clever as ever.

A feature of the show was the reproduction of "My Old Dutch," Albert Chevalier's great play, over four hundred people remaining until nearly midnight to see the last of it. The male choir made a great hit with the singing of "My Old Dutch," while H. A. Harvey gave a fine rendering of "Knocked 'em in the Old Kent Road," another of Chevalier's favorites.

MORE HALIBUT

Amongst the halibut arrivals yesterday were the Anne St. Leon with 8,000 pounds; the Director with 9,000; Daisy, 3,000; Dick, 14,000, and the Leif E. with 11,000. Several of those fares had not been sold last night, the fishermen thinking the price of 5½ cents too low after the high rates which have been paid recently. Last year at this time they would have thought 5½ a big price.

IRISH SECRETARYSHIP

London, May 3.—According to the Daily Telegraph, Thomas McKinnon Wood, Liberal member for St. Rollox division of Glasgow, Scotland, will succeed the Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell, as Chief Secretary for Ireland.

BULGARIANS ARE RECRUITING NEUTRALS

Rome, May 3.—Despatches from the Macedonian front state that the Bulgarian army has been considerably increased of late, eleven new battalions, altogether, it is reported have been formed, composed of Turks, Macedonians, Greeks, Jews, Roumanians and Serbians, who have been pressed into service. Bulgarian field artillery supplied with German guns has been concentrated on the Roumanian frontier.

WIRELESS FOUND IN EGYPTIAN DESERT

London, May 4.—An official report says conditions are rapidly returning to normal in the northern area of the desert in Western Egypt. Small patrols, usually in armored cars, continue to hunt and destroy hidden stores, and since the re-occupation of Sollum, on the Mediterranean, near the border of Tripoli, more than 250,000 rounds of ammunition have been discovered.

Two sets of German wireless were discovered hidden in the desert.

Mogbara has been occupied to strengthen the cordon around the troubled district. The British are harassing their foes at Daklu and are able to detect every movement of their enemy in the neighborhood of this oasis. A small hostile detachment is occupying Baharia, refugees from which point report there are prospects of famine and typhus in that region, and that no medicines are on hand.

SHIPBUILDING

E. H. Mortimer, haing learned that J. W. Stewart and his associates are contemplating entering the shipbuilding business at Bellingham, Wash., has written to him drawing attention to the drydock here and its desirability as a shipbuilding plant and asking that its claims be considered before the company decides to enter into a contract below.

LACK OF SAILORS FOR WINDJAMMERS

San Francisco, May 4.—Three British windjammers are being held up in the bay and unable to sail on account of lack of seamen to man them. Two of these vessels have been ready for sea for nearly two weeks, but owing to the scarcity of sailors have been unable to leave.

It is predicted along the waterfront that before these three vessels can sail with their grain cargoes they will have to pay nearly, if not fully, \$50 monthly to seamen.

The ships held up are the British ships Yawry and Talus and the British bark Yoeman.

ALICE ARM STRIKE

Ald. Montgomery has received a telegram from Alice Arm stating that the strike is still on, and the men making emphatic demand for \$3.50 and \$4.00 for a nine-hour day, which is the government scale of wages in the district. The company's offer of compromise has been rejected and the men are confident of having their demands acceded to.

While J. E. Merryfield was in the south, he visited the camp of the 102nd Battalion at Comox in company with the Hon. William Manson. It is not recorded whether they discussed the votes for soldiers bill.

The Board of Trade has decided to send two delegates to the meeting in Vancouver to discuss the formation of an Association of British Columbia Boards of Trade.

WASHINGTON REPORTS DANGER IS AVERTED

Washington, May 6.—The consensus of opinion today is that the danger of a break between the United States and Germany has been averted.

Members of Congress state that Germany has complied with the basic demand contained in President Wilson's note. This is taken to mean that Germany will abandon her illegal submarine warfare.

JAP CONSUL-GENERAL TO VISIT PRINCE RUPERT

E. H. Mortimer, publicity commissioner, advised the Board of Trade last evening that he had been advised that C. Yada, the Japanese Consul-General, was about to make a tour of this country in connection with trade matters and that he would visit Prince Rupert. It was decided to have the trade and commerce committee of the Board meet him at this point.

PUBLICITY

Being notified that the Chamber of Commerce of Lawrence, Mass., intends organizing a tour through the west this summer, the publicity commissioner of the Board of Trade has written to the secretary suggesting that the company include the trip over the G. T. P. to Prince Rupert in their program, and offered to have a committee conduct the party around the canneries, etc.

THE PESSIMIST

There were pessimists in the long ago. Somebody poring over the old files in the Patent Office of the United States has lately found a letter from an old employee there offering his resignation on the ground that "as everything inventible has now been invented, and the Patent Office would soon be discontinued, there would be no further need of his services, and he preferred to leave before the blow fell."

CORRUPTION

The Journal, with its usual contempt for the facts, again says "A searching investigation made by the Liberals in the House, with every aid given them by the Conservatives, has revealed nothing to warrant the reckless charges made by the Liberals."

Needless to say, the local Tory apologist carefully omits any mention of the selling of 5,760 acres of valuable timber lands to the Puget Sound Lumber Company as second-class agricultural land at \$2.50 per acre.

Fortunately for British Columbia, the people are thoroughly conversant with the true facts of the case, as well as with the facts of the Songhees Reserve deal; the Kitsilano deal; the Hannington graft; the \$39,000 scandal in connection with the Parliament Buildings extension, in which Harry Price, the coal grafter and Tory campaign manager, and the other patrons of the Bowser government played their usual parts, and the attempt to show, by the evidence of Seattle jail-birds, whose evidence has not yet shown that they were paid by Liberals, that members of the Liberal party brought in "pluggers in the Vancouver election."

One hates to be personal, but surely it is a grave matter for the city of Prince Rupert, when the man who is its acting mayor cannot see any corruption in the Speaker of the Legislature and his partner putting through a deal by which the people of the province were swindled out of hun-

dreds of thousands of dollars. If this is not corruption of the worst description there must be no such thing as corruption.

So far as the Vancouver election enquiry is concerned, there is not a single word in the whole of the evidence that goes to show that "Kelly" and his partners were paid by Liberals, and, unless they can prove so, the only inference to be drawn is that these men are in the pay of the Tories. The Vancouver Sun states that the whole business is a frame-up on the part of the Conservative party and the statement has not yet been denied.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Eberts, of the firm of Eberts & Taylor, who put through the crooked lumber deal disclosed by the public accounts committee, is the Speaker of the Legislature, and the gentleman whose wife drew from the public purse the sums paid out to "sundry indigent persons," in addition to the gratuity arising out of the death of a forty-second cousin who died while in the government service.

The Shell Commission has already shown that the shell committee acted exactly contrary to instructions from the British War Office in regard to the placing of contracts in the United States.

The Seattle "pluggers" have yet to prove that they were paid by Liberals for the part they claim they played in the Vancouver election.

The charges brought against the McBride-Bowser government by the Liberals have been proven up to the hilt and it is easy to understand why A. C. Flumerfelt stated that he accepted no re-

responsibility for the doings of that government.

The Tories in this province have indulged in cattle scandals; coal scandals; land scandals; reserve scandals; timber scandals; parliament building scandals; site graft scandals, and election scandals, yet the Tory organs say that there was nothing corrupt about the government of this province. The fact that they say so is one more nail in the coffin of the Bowser government.

GERMAN SOCIALIST LEADER ARRESTED

Berlin, May 3.—(By wireless to Sayville) Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the Socialist leader, was arrested on May 1, in connection with a May Day demonstration in Berlin.

Dr. Liebknecht on various occasions has made caustic criticisms in the reichstag regarding Germany's military policy. It was recently stated that he had made the remarkable statement that all the deposits in German savings banks had been commandeered in order to assist in financing the latest war loan.

FRIGHTFULNESS AS PRACTICED ON LAND

The following is an extract from an interview the Weekly Dispatch had with Lord Northcliffe on his return from the Verdun front:

"A typical German act took place this week when a French gunner succeeded in doing what is very rare in this war—finding a hidden German battery and destroying it. Within an hour, obviously after consultation with some high authority, neighboring German batteries dropped 200 shells on a distant and quite inoffensive French village, destroying many homes and killing children who were playing in the streets.

"That is the usual method of revenge of German gunners, and one that reveals the callous and unsporting side of the detestable character of the Hun. There is no chivalrous admiration for an opponent's skill. A returned English prisoner, who was taken in the early days near Mons, told me that he and a number of his companions were so foolish, not well understanding the Germans, as to shake hands with their captors, who, in reply, spat in their faces and kicked them in the stomach.

"One point I personally investigated along certain of the French lines I had not visited before was the question as to whether the Germans do or do not deliberately seek out hospitals and churches for objects of shell-fire. Practically every church in every bombarded town has been selected by Germans for special attention, and, as often as not, the hospital.

"These buildings have been selected not for any military purpose, but to terrorise the people. That can be proved by the fact that numberless French villages, sunk deep down in valleys and ravines, where the church towers and hospitals, by reason of their low location, give no possible opportunity of being used for observation, are shelled out of existence, just as systematically as buildings occupying positions overlooking the surrounding territory."
