

Five thousand dollars a day is being spent in legal and other expenses at the Meredith Duff inquiry into the Kyte charges re fuse centracts at Ottawa. Sir Sam Hughes and Col. John Wesley Allison are the central figures. Few people have much idea what a fuse looks like, but the illustration will help some. Fuses are screwed on the end of shrapnel or high explosive shells and causes the mto explode at a certain time after leaving the gun, or on percussion. The illustration shows a fuse about three quarters actual size for 18 pounder shell (a) nose of fuse (b) brass ring holding time index in place (c) spacing for setting time fuse (d) body of fuse. Dotted lines indicate body of shell to which fuse is attached. They are worth anywhere from \$3 to \$6 each.
