## RUSSIANS HAVE TAKEN TURKISH POSITION

### GERMANS AGAIN REPULSED AT VERDUN — ITALIAN PERSISTENCE IS REWARDED

#### RUSSIANS ARE APPROACHING CITY OF BAGDAD

Turkish Position Captured—Kut Surrender is Incentive to Russians — Austrian Transport Sunk.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, May 11.—Teuton assaults on the western portion of the eastern front have been repulsed by the Russian artillery fire.

In the Caucasus, the Turkish offensive at Mamapatun has been stopped. Kasri-Shiru, a Turkish position 110 miles northeast of Bagdad has been occupied by the Russians, three guns and a large quantity of supplies having been captured.

Increased Incentive.

The British reverse at Kut-El-Amara is providing an increased incentive to the Russian troops. Large bodies of German troops are reported to be assisting the Turks.

Austrian Transport Sunk.

Paris, May 11.—A French submarine has sunk a large Austrian transport in the lower Adriatic. The transport was laden with war supplies.

#### BREWSTER CALLS FOR CRIMINAL PROCEEDINGS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, May 11.—H. C. Brewster will demand, in the Legislature on Friday, that Attorney-General Bowser institute criminal proceedings, under section 160 of the criminal code, against the ministers who handed over the full amount of the monies obtained from the sale of the Pacific Great Eastern bonds to the company, instead of the amount they were entitled to, in the proportion to which the amount of work done bears to the whole work.

The report shows that the province paid to the P. G. E. the sum of \$18,035,000, while the entire road was reported to cost \$18,802,000.

#### HILAIRE BELLOC SAYS VERDUN BATTLE WON

London, May 9.—(By Hilaire Belloc) The battle of Verdun is won. The greatest battle ever fought, an action with consequences that will affect the whole future of mankind almost as much as the original victory on the Marne, has been won by the French.

For the Germans it means that the effort on which they concentrated the whole of their available resources, for which they had spent many months in preparation and in which they had such confidence that they risked open declaration of victory and definite prophecies of success, has resulted for them in bloody defeat.

#### STEAMER ROANOKE CAPSIZED IN GALE

(Special to The Daily News.)

San Francisco, May 11.—The steamer Roanoke, bound from San Francisco to Valparaiso, has capsized in a gale a hundred miles south of San Francisco. Forty-one of the crew are missing.

The tanker Lansing has gone in search of four of the lifeboats which are missing. The fifth boat drifted ashore at San Louis Obispo. Three sailors in her were still alive, and five were dead from exhaustion.

Captain Dickson and his wife are reported to have been lost. The vessel was owned by the North Pacific Steamship Company and was carrying a heavy cargo of explosives to South America, when the cargo shifted in the gale. The crew was unable to provision the lifeboats before the vessel foundered.

#### SERGT. WELLS ADDRESSES HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Sergeant Wells this forenoon addressed the pupils of the high school, when he held the children spell-bound with his account of the work being done by the British troops on the western front, while he also gave a graphic account of his experiences while a prisoner in Germany. He said that all who have relatives serving at the front have good reason to feel proud of what the soldiers are doing. At the close, he was accorded a very hearty vote of thanks by Principal Brady. Principal Brady considers the sergeant one of the finest speakers he ever listened to.

#### LOTS OF HUMBUG BUT NO CONTRACTS

Ottawa, May 9.—Lloyd Harris, of the Russell Motor Company, was the chief witness before the Shell Commission today. He stated that they had a floor space of 70,000 feet and fourteen acres available for a loading plant, in addition to an excellent mechanical department. Both he and Mr. Russell had an intimate knowledge of machinery.

On hearing of the contracts for 5,000,000 fuses, they phoned General Hughes, who told them that the matter was in the hands of the Shell Committee. They took the matter up with Colonel Carnegie and General Bertram, who told them that the fuses could not be made in Canada. They resented this and the conversation got warm.

#### GERMANS AGAIN DRIVEN BACK ON VERDUN FRONT

Night Attack Repulsed — French Carry German Trenches and Take Prisoners — Italian Success.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, May 11.—The German troops delivered a night attack upon the French positions near Vaux pond, on the Verdun front east of the Meuse. They were repulsed with heavy losses.

West of the Meuse, the enemy is carrying on a vigorous bombardment of the French artillery positions in the Avoncourt wood.

A small French offensive west of Deadman's Hill proved successful. The French carried the German trenches, taking sixty-two prisoners and two machine guns.

Italian Success.

Rome, May 11.—The persistence of the efforts of the Italians, under General Cadorna, have been rewarded with success. The Italian army, after fighting for every foot of the ground, are now within sixteen miles of Trento. The Italians have penetrated the Austrian frontier for a distance of eighteen miles.

#### ALASKA SALMON ARRIVED YESTERDAY

The Roald brought into port yesterday the first shipment of Alaskan spring salmon of the season. The catch of 6,000 was bought at 8½ cents by P. J. Sandwick, the buyer for the Cold Storage Company.

There were two halibut arrivals yesterday, the Jim Ham having 8,000 pounds and the Hi Gill 13,000. These went to the Cold Storage Company at 6½ cents.

**GERMANY'S CONDITION**

The Danish report that the Germans cannot last after the end of this year may be thoroughly well founded, but, from a military standpoint, it will be ignored. The Allies will fight as if Germany could last for another five years and there will not be the slightest let-up to the preparations for the future. While we hope that the report is authentic, it is not impossible that it may simply be German press agency stuff, with a view to lessening the outcry in Britain for conscription.

The German soldiers may not be getting the variety of food which they received at the outbreak of the war, still they are well enough fed to warrant their keeping in good condition. Germany is admittedly short of certain lines of food, particularly meats, but there is no reason to believe that the people are not well fed. All kinds of vegetables are plentiful while farinaceous foods are still to be had in ample quantity, if not in great variety.

Horses may be getting scarce but it is significant that the report states that steel is still being produced rapidly in large quantities. Though horses are necessary to a large extent, motors can be used for hauling big guns, especially on the western front where the roads are good. Cavalry is of little or no use in the present war, so that the shortage of horses is not so serious a matter as might appear at first glance.

The most important feature of the situation is the moral effect of the terrific slaughter at Verdun, where the Germans have been mowed down in tens of thousands by the French guns. The continual attacking

in face of certain death must have done much to break the spirit of the troops, while the utter hopelessness of the whole business is bound to have its effect. The report that Socialism is spreading amongst the German troops can readily be believed and in this lies Germany's salvation. The German people must rise and overthrow the Hohenzollerns, who, with the Prussian military caste, have ruined the German Empire. When the war is over, and the German people take over the government of their country, as they must do, there will be a tremendous re-awakening and the business science of this nation will enter upon an era of development which will far outstrip anything accomplished in the past.

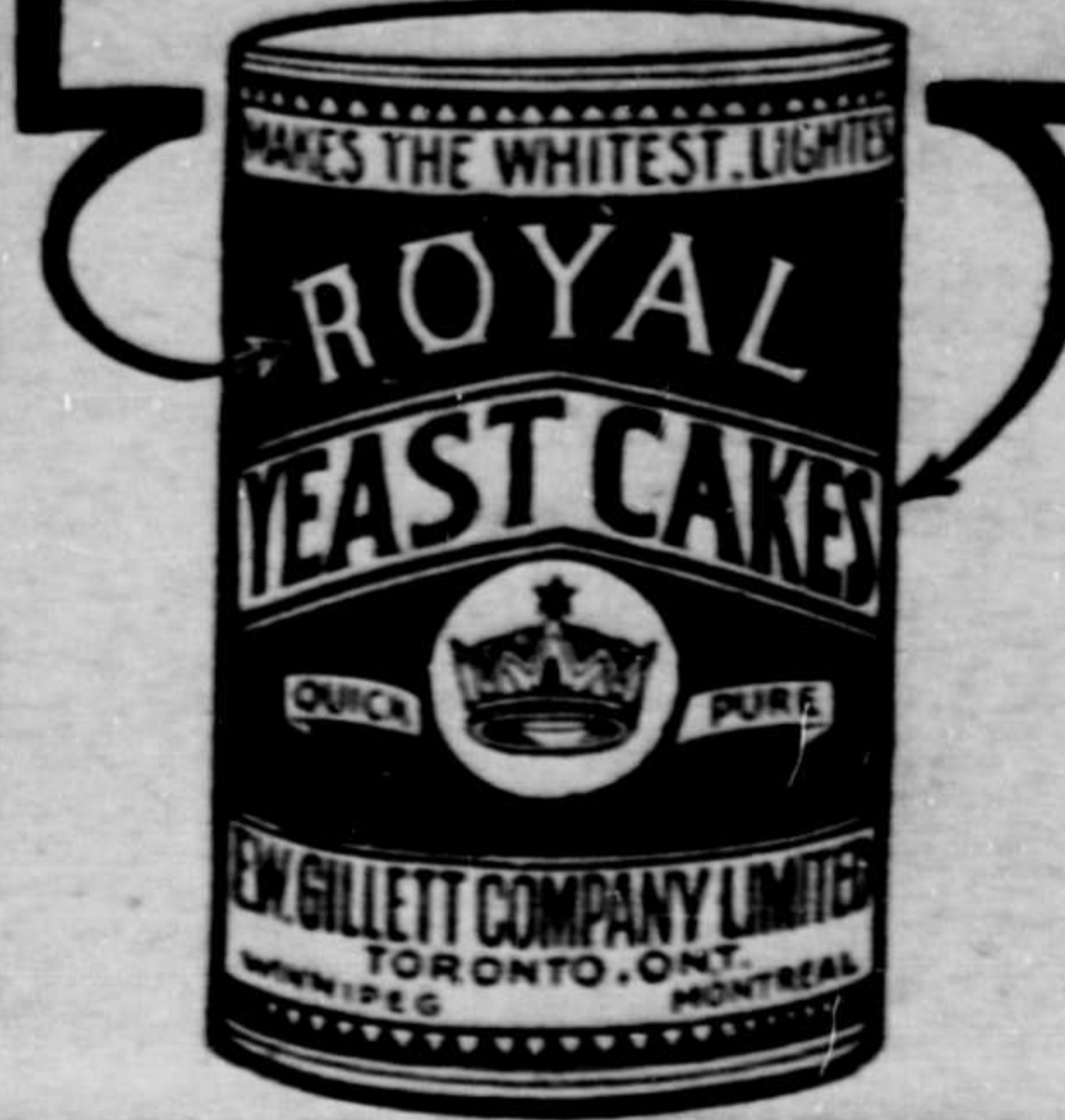
