## PARIS IS PREPARING FOR FINAL TRIUMPH

### SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE IS GIVEN BY YOAKUM IN FUSE ENQUIRY AT OTTAWA

#### PARISIANS ARE PREPARING FOR FINAL TRIUMPH

Landlords Preparing Against the Great March Past—Germans Repulsed Again—British Line in Trouble.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, May 13.—In anticipation of an Allied final victory, all leases of apartments facing on the Champs Elysees, the most famous boulevard in Paris, now contain a clause reserving the right of the land-lords to sub-let the windows and balconies to sight-seers "WHEN THE VICTORIOUS ARMIES OF THE FRENCH REPUBLIC AND HER ALLIES MARCH PAST IN TRIUMPH."

#### Germans Again Repulsed.

The French trenches southwest of Fort Douaumont have been violently bombarded. All the German attacks have been repulsed. Artillery fighting continues along the left bank of the Meuse.

#### Small German Success.

London, May 13.—A German heavy offensive against the British line around Hulluch has begun. A heavy artillery bombardment preceded an infantry attack at Vermilles.

The Germans captured 500 yards of the first line of trenches, but these were partially recaptured in a British counter attack. Berlin claims that the Germans captured prisoners and machine guns.

#### COLLINGWOOD SCHRIEBER IS AMONG THE MISSING

The Collingwood Schrieber who figured in one of the recent casualty lists is a grand-nephew of Sir Collingwood Schrieber, general consulting engineer to the Dominion government, and a son of H. H. Schrieber of Clarkson, Ont. He is reported as missing. Mr. Schrieber is twenty years of age and enlisted in Vancouver about a year ago. Before enlisting, he was an engineer on the C. N. R. construction.

James McMillan, son of W. J. McMillan, formerly a wholesale merchant here, passed through this morning on his way south from Granby, where he has been store-keeper for the company. Before leaving Granby, he was presented with a handsome gold watch by his fellow employees as a mark of esteem. Jim was well known here, having assisted his father here in the early days.

#### A. J. PRUDHOMME IS ENTHUSIASTIC FARMER

A. J. Prudhomme returned last evening after having spent a month on his ranch at the end of Tyee Lake near Telkwa. Mr. Prudhomme, who owns the Geo. R. Driver ranch, has spent a very busy time plowing and harrowing, and breaking new land, and looks it. He is bronzed with the sun and looks remarkably fit.

Mr. Prudhomme is full of enthusiasm in regard to the future of this great farming district in the interior, and expects to have 150 acres under crop this year, and makes no secret of his ambition to gain some of the prizes at the Agricultural Exhibition in September, in any case he is satisfied that the Bulkley will get its full share.

He has two men and two teams busy all the time, and while at the ranch, he drove a team himself and is already laying plans to return there at an early date to carry on the good work. He says every man and every horse in that district is busy and this year should see the finest crops yet. He expects to have at least 100 acres of the finest timothy hay. Since going in he has prepared 26 acres of new land for crop and left his men putting in the season's vegetable crops. Along in the summer he will bring in a carload of young cattle.

There are several new settlers of the right stamp there now, the Dunnigan ranch being handled by a Mr. Duff who is working hard to produce a bumper crop, while the Caldwell family from Oklahoma are doing splendid work on the ranch adjoining the Driver.

Mr. Prudhomme was greatly struck by the fact that the settlers are devoting every minute to the land and not worrying about work from the government or any other outside source. He says that wherever one looks there are clearing fires which mean new acreage ready for the plow.

George W. Davis, representing Canadian Explosives, returned last evening from a visit to the interior mining camps. He is enthusiastic over the mining outlook.

The three boys, who have been playing havoc in several unoccupied houses around town, were brought up before Judge Young this morning. The parents of the youngsters were bound over in their personal bonds for \$500 as a guarantee of the good behavior of the boys in the future.

#### YOAKUM'S FUSE PROFITS SPLIT WITH ALLISON

Sensational Evidence Given Yesterday in Fuse Enquiry—Annance Goes to Prison—C. N. R. Vote is Held up.

Ottawa, May 13.—Sensational evidence was given by B. F. Yoakum, of New York, at the fuse enquiry yesterday. Yoakum says that Colonel Allison had an arrangement to split Yoakum's half of the profit on the fuse contracts. He also stated that Allison from time to time gave orders on the Shell Commission for payments amounting in all to \$195,000, against Yoakum's profit account.

#### Annance to Prison.

Vancouver, May 13.—Failing to procure the necessary bondsmen, Peter Annance has been removed to the Oakhalla prison farm where he will serve his sentence of nine months.

#### Railroad Vote.

Ottawa, May 13.—The Commons yesterday passed the vote of eight millions for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, but postponed the question of granting fifteen millions to the Canadian Northern until today.

#### SUMMER TRAIN SERVICE WILL START JUNE 11TH

Morley Donaldson, vice-president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, who arrived on the train last evening, announces that there will be three express trains a week after June 11th, each train having an observation car attached.


Mr. Donaldson said that conditions on the prairie are not ideal this spring, the weather being cold and seeding delayed in some quarters. In speaking of agriculture, he emphasized the opinion that the interior of northern British Columbia is well suited to the raising of sugar beets. He feels that this would lead to the establishment of sugar factories, while the land is also splendidly adapted to the raising of cattle and hogs.

Mr. Donaldson looks for a large increase in the tourist traffic this summer. He will return east on his private car, Transcontinental, some time this afternoon.

#### SERGEANT WELLS MAKES BIG HIT

There was a full house at the Westholme last evening to hear Sergeant Wells, and there is certain to be an even larger audience tonight, while there should also be a large attendance at the matinee.

The pictures of the various movements of the Canadian forces were very fine, particularly the review scene in England, while the various views of convalescent homes in the old country were extremely interesting, especially as "Doc" Wells had interesting things to say about many of the patients.

The most striking feature in the films was the series of diagrams explanatory of the movements of the Canadian, French and British troops from April 22 to 24, when the boys of the Maple Leaf saved the situation at St. Julien. Another splendid scene was that of the Canadian officers in Flanders being presented to a Cardinal behind the firing line.

Sergeant Wells' remarks regarding the various scenes were always interesting and often highly amusing. His lecture was a soldierly talk, studded with witticisms and humorous anecdotes of experiences in the trenches, while his description of the reception the Canadian prisoners received in Germany was funnier than it seemed to him at the time. It is impossible to adequately describe the lecture, as it is something that must be heard and not described.

The sergeant was introduced by Canon Rix, while the Cadets Bugle Band played the salute as he appeared on the stage. A pleasing feature was his having Prince

#### JAPANESE CONSUL GENERAL ARRIVES

Hon. C. Yada, Japanese Consul General at Ottawa, arrived from the east last evening, and was met here by the G. T. P. officials. He was taken to the drydock in General Superintendent Mehan's car, after which he spent some time interviewing the Japanese residents of the city.

On being introduced to the local press representatives, Mr. Yada said that he had been in Prince Rupert eight years ago and remembered meeting John Houston, Prince Rupert's pioneer newspaperman. He pointed out the spot where the late Mr. Houston's office stood on Centre Street, remarking that the town looked vastly different today from what it did on his former visit.

Later in the evening, Mr. Yada was conducted over the city in an auto accompanied by the G. T. P. officials, winding up with a visit to the Westholme Theatre to hear Sergeant Wells tell of his war experiences.

This morning, Mr. Yada was interviewed by G. A. Woodland and G. R. Naden. He expressed regret that he was unable to stay longer in the city, as he would have liked to have discussed commercial matters. Those members of the Board of Trade assured him that they would be delighted to furnish him with any information desired.

Before going aboard the Prince Rupert for the south, Mr. Yada said it had been a great pleasure to him to travel over the Grand Trunk Pacific road and remarked on the fact that the train, after losing over four hours through a small rock slide west of Jasper had arrived in Prince Rupert just a few minutes late.

#### ASQUITH'S IRISH VISIT HAILED AS MASTER STROKE

Return to Civil Law Imminent—United States Army to be re-organised—Preparedness Parade.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 13.—Premier Asquith's sudden resolve to visit Dublin has been hailed by the press as a stroke of genius, as it has had the effect of assuaging the political passions which were rampant.

General Maxwell has reviewed the troops stationed in Dublin, and feeling is comparatively quiet. The restoration of civil law is imminent.

#### United States Army.

Washington, May 13.—The House of Representatives and the Senate have agreed upon an army re-organization bill which gives a regular army of 206,000 men as peace strength, which will be capable of an expansion to 254,000 in time of war.

#### Preparedness Parade.

New York, May 13.—145,000 men and women took part in a parade in support of a policy of preparedness, here today.

## TORY METHODS

The local Tory organ, without waiting to hear what M. A. Macdonald had to say in regard to the Gosden charges, rushed into big type to declare that the Liberal candidate had been connected directly with the paying for votes in the Vancouver election. Today, it is just possible that the Journal may be sorry that it did not publish the exact evidence of Gosden and await developments. However, the garbled Tory message was too good to allow of one more opportunity to attempt to regain the lost Tory prestige to be missed.

In spite of the fact that the Tory organ sought to condemn the Liberals in general and M. A. Macdonald in particular, because of the evidence of Gosden, we refrain meantime from any comment on that evidence, since Gosden has been arrested for perjury. It is time enough to condemn a man when he has been found guilty. If Gosden is proven guilty of the crime with which he is charged, it is to be hoped, for the sake of the honor of British Columbia and Canada, that the men who were behind him receive suitable punishment.

## CLEANING UP

Annance, the man who was arrested on information laid by the Liberals for attempted impersonation in the Vancouver election, has received a fitting sentence, and it is to be hoped that his experience will be a warning to others who may have been tempted to make a little easy money by such criminal methods.

In following up the information of which they had become possessed, the Liberals have done much to clean up politics

in this province, and such a cleaning-up process was evidently very necessary. In bringing about the investigation when they did, the Liberals also did good work from a party standpoint, as it is very evident that the last thing the Tories wanted was an investigation. The scheme clearly was to bring out the men who claimed that they had been paid to vote for Macdonald, just before the general election, so that the Liberals would have no opportunity to refute the statements effectively. The plot has fallen down badly and must rebound on to the Tory heads from which the idea originated.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Berlin report that an Austrian steamer had been torpedoed without warning is probably a crude attempt to gain the sympathy of the United States, while it will afford a splendid opportunity to send some more notes to Washington.

Now that the Kaiser has decorated the deported Captain Boyd for "distinguished conduct," Washington will probably recognize the futility of accepting the word of the head of the German nation in regard to submarines or anything else.

The Journal has kept on predicting that the election frauds would be brought home to the "higher-ups." Perhaps they will.

The Vancouver Liberals would be delighted to know where all the thousands of dollars of Liberal election money was supposed to come from, as they were so hard up during the election that they had no election fund.

## LORDSHIP OF THE BALTIC IS THE ISSUE

The fate of Denmark, the control of the Sound and the Belts, the international position of the Kiel Canal, the command of the Baltic, the commerce of Northern Europe—all these big issues hang upon the outcome of the present war.

If Germany is victorious, the hegemony of the Baltic and its shores will be not the least valuable among many and magnificent prizes which she will secure. Nay, a German victory is not essential. If Germany can, through the good offices of the premature peace-mongers, procure a tolerable draw

she will achieve her Baltic purposes none the less surely. It was during the fifteen months of peace that succeeded the premature Treaty of Amiens in 1802 that Napoleon made vaster annexations of territory than he had been able to accomplish during all the preceding years of war. At the end of that brief period he renewed the war with incomparably greater resources and immeasurably better chances of obtaining the goal of his ambition—the lordship of the world.

The awful sequel to the untimely peace of 1802 should be a solemn warning to those who would advocate the making of terms with an undefeated Germany this or next year. The sequel would inevitably be the German absorption of Denmark—as also, no doubt, of the Netherlands as an outlet to the North Sea—the establishment of commercial

## LORDSHIP OF THE BALTIC IS THE ISSUE

and naval control of Norway and its dependency, Iceland; the building of a colossal fleet of Dreadnoughts, airships and submarines and then (on the Napoleon model) the renewal of the war with Great Britain in circumstances which would give the latter no hope whatsoever of successful resistance.

It is impossible to exaggerate the importance to Great Britain of the maintenance of the integrity and independence of Denmark and Norway. Russia's interest in the continuance of the friendly Danish control of the inlets and outlets of the Baltic is hardly less supreme. "Russia has entered upon this struggle against Germany," says Mr. A. J. Toynbee in his suggestive book "Nationality and the War," "to realize an object vital to her national existence, the liberation of the Baltic Sea from German control."

Thus to Russia and Great Britain alike the thorough defeat of Germany and the destruction of her naval ascendancy in the Baltic are essential. If these necessary preliminaries are achieved it will then be possible for the Entente Powers to establish an enduring settlement of the North. They will probably strengthen Denmark by restoring to her the Duchy of Schleswig, with its large Danish population; they will confirm Denmark in control of the Sounds and the Belts, and will place under her military care the Baltic end of the neutralised Kiel Canal; they will guarantee her independence, and will give her such financial aid as will enable her effectively to fulfill her international functions as guardian of the gates of the Baltic.—F. J. C. Hearnshaw in The Nineteenth Century.


