London, May 18 .- Paris despatches declare that German enterprise in front of Verdun is weakening considerably. The opposing forces are withdrawing from certain sections of this front to prevent further heavy losses. Germany has already sacrificed three hundred thousand men in the futile attempt to capture the French positions.
