## GERMANS WEAKENING ON VERDUN FRONT

### ALLISON GOT \$220,000 ON ONE CONTRACT--DISASTROUS FIRE ON THIRD AVENUE

#### GERMAN POWER WEAKENING ON VERDUN FRONT

Germans Altering Plans—Realize that Military Disaster is Now Imminent—French Air Attacks.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 18.—Paris despatches declare that German enterprise in front of Verdun is weakening considerably. The opposing forces are withdrawing from certain sections of this front to prevent further heavy losses. Germany has already sacrificed three hundred thousand men in the futile attempt to capture the French positions.

The heavy fighting being carried on by the Allied forces on the western portion of the Flanders front is compelling the Germans to alter their plans. It is evident that Germany is beginning to realize that military disaster is imminent.

#### Air Raids.

Paris, May 18.—French aviators have bombed a German camp at Damvilleres and also the railway stations at Metz, Frescati and Briulles.

Heavy cannonading by both sides continues near Verdun and is particularly heavy around Haudremont and Vaux.

#### PROHIBITION BILL THRU' STORMY CAUCUS

Victoria, May 18.—After a stormy government caucus, which lasted until two o'clock in the morning, Premier Bowser steered his Prohibition Bill through the party deliberations with a majority.

The Bill, which includes no compensation clause, will likely extend the time in which liquor may be sold by making prohibition effective on July 1st, 1917, if the electors endorse the principle. Under the Bill, the sale of liquor as a beverage will be prohibited and will be handled only by drug stores and government dispensaries. Individuals who commit an offense under the act by keeping liquor for sale will be liable to six or twelve months' imprisonment without the option of a fine.

CANADA'S NEW ALDERSHOT.—This is one view of the new Borden Concentration Military camp at Angus Pine Plains, Ontario, purchased by General Sir Sam Hughes for the Dominion Government for a permanent training camp. The site takes in over 20,000 acres and is the largest camp in Canada. Work has been commenced for putting the camp in shape to receive about thirty thousand troops from all parts of Canada. The work is being supervised by Col. Robert S. Low, who built Valcartier Camp.

#### DISASTROUS FIRE TODAY ON THIRD AVE.

The most disastrous fire in the history of the city broke out about 12.10 today in the rear of Self's Cafe. The flames rapidly got a firm hold and when the brigade arrived, it was apparent that they had a big job on hand. The fire quickly spread to the adjoining premises, occupied by Mrs. Demers, and in a very short time, the interiors of the two buildings were badly damaged.

Volunteer firemen were plentiful and energetic and every effort was put forth to aid the brigade in keeping the outbreak from spreading further. Killas Bros. took the precaution of emptying their store of all that was movable.

Fortunately there was very little wind, else the fire might have wiped out the entire block. After a little over an hour's strenuous work, the outbreak was completely quelled. Nothing was saved from the cafe and very little of any value could be got out of Mrs. Demers' store before it was in flames. Both premises are covered by insurance.

#### COL. J.W. ALLISON GOT \$220,000 IN ONE CONTRACT

House Prorogues Today—Compulsory Service Bill Passed in London by Big Majority—Casement Committed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, May 18.—The evidence taken at the fuse enquiry yesterday revealed the fact that Colonel John Wesley Allison's share of the profits on one contract amounted to \$220,000.

#### House Prorogues.

The Federal Parliament prorogues today. Hon. Frank Oliver, in a stirring speech, advocated more liberal allowances being made to Canadian soldiers and their dependents.

#### Conscription.

London, May 18.—The Compulsory Service Bill passed its third reading in the House of Commons by a vote of 250 to 35. The Bill will now go to the Upper Chamber where it is not likely to meet with much opposition.

#### Casement's Trial.

At the Old Bailey yesterday, Sir Roger Casement was committed for trial on a charge of high treason, arising from his participation in the Irish rebellion. He will now come before a judge and jury in the higher court.

#### SHELL DOCUMENTS WERE NOT PRODUCED

Ottawa, May 8.—The beginning of the third week of the Meredith-Duff Commission's probe into the conduct and operations of Gen. Sir Sam Hughes' Shell Committee finds the Commissioners still unable to obtain important documents bearing upon the "contracting members'" relations to the Minister of Militia and their status before the War Office.

When Col. Carnegie, the twenty-five-thousand-dollar-a-year ordnance adviser of the committee, was on the stand at the beginning of the inquiry he promised the commission that he would produce all papers and documents in his possession, and instructed "my man O'Neil" accordingly. But two weeks have passed and the promised papers and correspondence have not yet been produced. The matter was sharply referred to by both Commissioners Duff and Meredith today.

Commissioner Meredith observed that nothing in the way of correspondence has yet been produced to show how the agreement between General Hughes and the contracting members of the committee originated. Commissioner Duff remarked that all the evidence went to pointedly suggest that there were communications between the War Office and the Shell Committee other than those brought to light.

The only witness heard today was R. L. Patterson, of New York, active director of the International Arms & Fuse Company, one of the concerns mentioned in the Kyte charges.

#### Admissions About Company.

Mr. Patterson admitted to Mr. E. F. B. Johnson, K. C., that his company, which was incorporated with an authorized capital of \$1,500,000, had a paid up capital of only \$3,000; that at the time it got its contract from the Shell Committee it was without a loading plant or manufacturing facilities of any kind, and that it

#### PREMIER ASQUITH NOW IN IRISH PRIVY COUNCIL

London, May 18.—Premier Asquith was yesterday sworn in as a member of the Irish Privy Council at Dublin. This means that the premier is to assume a much greater share in the responsibilities of shaping the future policies of the Irish executive than has ever been shouldered by any of his predecessors.

was nine months after the contract was entered into that the first small delivery of fuses was made.

#### Seems Not Altogether Frank.

One bit of evidence given by Mr. Patterson would seem to show that the dealings of the Shell Committee with the Russell & Harris Canadian Co. was not wholly characterized by frankness. Last week Col. Carnegie swore that as early as May 13 he had given Mr. T. A. Russell a verbal promise of an order for 1,500,000 of the 5,000,000 fuses. Today Mr. Patterson stated that up to May 21 the Shell Committee had led him to suppose that he was to be given the contract for the entire 5,000,000. About this time the American Ammunition Co. appeared upon the scene and the order was split in half.

#### ANOTHER DUTCH STEAMER BLOWN UP IN NORTH SEA

Americans on Board—A German Torpedo Boat Strikes Mine and Sinks—Austrians Claim Gains.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 18.—The Dutch steamer Batavier V, while on a voyage from Rotterdam to London, has been blown up in the North Sea. There were American citizens on board. One American was drowned and four of the vessel's crew perished.

#### German Destroyer Mined.

Copenhagen, May 18.—A German torpedo boat destroyer has been sunk by coming into contact with a German mine near Falsterbo on the Swedish coast. One member of the crew was drowned.

#### Austrians Claim Victory.

London, May 18.—The Austrian forces in the Tyrol claim that they have captured 141 Italian officers, 6,200 men, 13 big guns and 17 machine guns. The casualties in the recent fighting were decidedly heavy and many bodies have been seen floating down the Adige river.

#### STEAMER OMINECA BOUND FOR ALASKA

The steamer Omineca, which was used by Foley, Welch & Stewart on the Skeena in the days of railroad construction here, and which has been laid up at Digby Island for several years, has been sold to the United States government for river work in connection with the Alaskan Railroad from Seward to the Matanuska coal fields.

The vessel will be overhauled here under the superintendence of Hal Peck of the Georgetown Sawmills, after which she will be taken to Cook's Inlet. Lieut Locke, of the Alaskan Railway Commission, recently looked over the boat along with Captain S. Johnson, of Foley, Welch & Stewart, and advised the purchase.

That the Russians are doing magnificent work in Turkey in Asia is evidenced by the appeal of Enver Pasha, the leader of the Young Turks and dictator in Turkey. His cry to Germany for men and munitions will not fall upon deaf ears. It will be heard with alarm, but it seems impossible that it ever can be adequately answered. Germany has her hands more than full on the western and eastern fronts, while her Balkan force is liable to have to resist a determined Allied attack at any time, while the large German army, which was recently reported at Smyrna, is too far away from the line of the Russian attack to be of any service.

The Grand Duke seems to have carried out his plans with great success and Bagdad and the Turkish army seem to be at his mercy. If the Russians are successful in releasing the army of General Townshend there will be great rejoicing, while the fall of Bagdad will be a blow from which the Turks will never recover.

The fall of Bagdad will also be a tremendous blow to Germany, as it is no secret that Berlin has simply been biding her time to take over the territory through which was to run Germany's great steel artery to the East. With Bagdad in the hands of the Russians, the great German dream of eastern expansion is at an end for many years to come.

It has been often stated that this war is simply a matter of men and money. Great Britain has provided much of the money, but Russia has ably done her share in men. With the Russians holding the Germans on the eastern front; Russians aiding the gallant French army to drive back the enemy from Verdun, and the

Russian Caucasian army driving the Turks out of Asia, with a big prospect of taking the great Moslem stronghold of Bagdad, the story of the great war must contain many chapters of Russian history, and the arrangements after peace has been declared are liable to be largely influenced by Russia.

The one great feature of the war is that there is no thought that any one nation is doing more than its share. Each is doing its utmost, according to its abilities, and it is a case of "each for all, and all for each."

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

The German naval theory seems to be "He who fights and runs away, lives to run away some other day."

The Ross rifle may be defective as a service weapon, but the Germans have never noticed it.

Probably Kaiser Bill did not indulge in "note" language when he got Enver's "Cry from Mesopotamia." He probably said "Ach, can't he see I'm busy," with a few German expletives thrown in for seasoning.

So far, the evidence in the fuse enquiry at Ottawa has borne out accurately the charges made by George Kyte. None of the committee seems to have known all that went on, but each knew a little and when the various littles are put together, they are going to make a "muckle."

In the Davidson enquiry, Col. Allison said he did not accept a part of the commission "because I wanted it to be distinctly understood that I should not receive any commission in connection with purchases made by Canada."



**SHEDDING A DELUSION**

The people of the United States have shed their delusion that there is an eastern and a western hemisphere, and that nothing can ever pass between them but immigrants and tourists and trade, and realized that this world is one round globe that gets smaller and smaller every decade if you measure it by days' journeys. They are only going over the lesson the British have learnt in the last score or so of years. This is one world, and bayonets are a crop that spreads. Let them gather and seed, it matters not how far from you, and a time will come when they will be sticking up under your nose. There is no real peace but the peace of the whole world, and that is only to be kept by the whole world resisting and suppressing aggression wherever it arises. To anyone who watches the American Press this realization has been more and more manifest. From dreams of aloofness and ineffable superiority, America comes round very rapidly to a conception of an active participation in the difficult business of statescraft. She is thinking of alliances, of throwing her weight and influence upon the side of law and security.—H. G. Wells, in the Daily Chronicle.
