## AUSTRIANS PREPARING TO INVADE ITALY

### BRITISH SUBMARINES STILL BUSY IN THE BALTIC -- ITALIANS ARE RETREATING

#### AUSTRIANS ARE PREPARING FOR A BIG INVASION

One Hundred and Fifty Steamers Loading Troops and Supplies at Austrian Port—Turks Claim Russians Repulsed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, May 20.—One hundred and fifty steamers are now at the Austrian port of Fiume, preparing to convey troops, munitions and war supplies, under the protection of a fleet of cruisers and destroyers, to invade Italian and Albanian cities on the Adriatic.

##### Turkish Reports.

The Russian advance in the Caucasus theatre of war is now meeting with opposition by the Turkish forces.

Constantinople claims that the Russian attack at Bitlisw Bailburt has been repulsed.

##### Prisoners Sufferings.

Petrograd, May 20.—Russia and Austria have made an exchange of wounded prisoners of war. Several of the Russians show signs of being in the last stages of consumption as a result of the treatment given them.

##### Fight to Finish.

The Allies are united in a fight to a finish to break down Prussian militarism is the answer given to the Berlin peace talk by M. Viviani, former prime minister of France.

#### PREVENTING LIBERALS PRESENTING EVIDENCE

Victoria, May 16.—So dirty have become the tactics by which the government majority on the committee "investigating" the Vancouver by-election is delaying proceedings to the point where the life of the government will expire before the Liberals have an opportunity to put in any evidence, that Mr. H. C. Brewster, the Liberal leader, was forced to make a protest this morning. Naturally, Ernest Miller, counsel for the government, and Neil Mackay, the chairman, with little Doc McGuire putting in his oar here and there protested that they were not trying to do any such thing, that everything was being done according to rule and it was not their intention to delay matters. The Liberal leader pointed out that the case has been dragging for three weeks, the government is still calling witnesses, some of them of absolutely no importance, and but eleven days remain of the life of the government, and when the government expires the committee naturally will cease.

##### Ignore Request.

Though the government could easily enough produce John J. Kelly, the man Sullivan got out of a Seattle jail, and who swore he plugged for Macdonald, the "wet" candidate, Mackay, the chairman, has not yet produced him at the request of the Liberals, who are now of the opinion that they are afraid to bring Kelly back. Nor has "Monty" White, the man they so glibly told of being the paymaster of the plugging gang, been produced, nor the man in charge of the Regina hotel, owned by the Sullivans, where the pluggers congregated. When this was commented on by the Liberal leader this morning, the chairman said, "Why don't you produce him?"

##### Served Tory Purpose.

Mr. Brewster asked that Sullivan, who so easily produced Kelly in the first instance, and who knew all about the operations, apparently should be asked to bring these men over.

Mackay's excuse then was that a "subpoena wasn't any good in Washington." This, in spite of the readiness of the committee to produce witnesses for its own side of the case. A lot has been found out about the operations of this choice gang since the case started, and is a question now if the government witnesses can be made to return and repeat their former statements or answer more questions. If a confession can be extracted from Sullivan it would clear the air a lot.

#### INTENSE LOYALTY OF NATIVE PEOPLE

One of the gratifying features of the war is the great display of loyalty by our Indian brothers. Mr. C. C. Perry, Indian Agent, has sent in to the Red Cross Fund, through Mrs. William Manson, a cheque for \$1,000, being a donation to the Carnival of the Allies by the Metlakatlah native people, making one of the most handsome single contributions on the coast.

A few days ago Daniel Pearson, John Leighton and Robert Mathieson, all native boys of "The Holy City," joined the 11th C. M. R. and are now in training in Vancouver. Two native sons of Metlakatlah, Johnny Rudland and Ernest Valpy, are now in the trenches. Dan Pearson, who is the Metlakatlah humorist, in bidding his parents good-bye said, "Father, I'll come back a general with a French wife."

This morning, two more natives of Metlakatlah, Andrew O'Reilly and Robert Nelson, left on the Prince Rupert to join the 14th C. M. R., making nine soldiers out of a very small population of young men.

When it is remembered that cash donations and sales of native work at the Carnival of the Allies realised the sum of \$313.30, one cannot but be struck with the intense patriotic interest the Indians are taking in the war and in the Red Cross work especially. Three cheers and a tiger for Metlakatlah."

#### CAPT. AND MRS. COOPER BACK FROM INTERIOR

Captain and Mrs. Cooper, of the Salvation Army, returned last evening from a tour of the interior as far as McBride. They were very kindly received by the people of the hinterland and had a few new experiences, one of them being a drive right through a bush fire with the trees on either side of the road ablaze. The captain says that the sea breezes feel pretty good after two weeks up country.

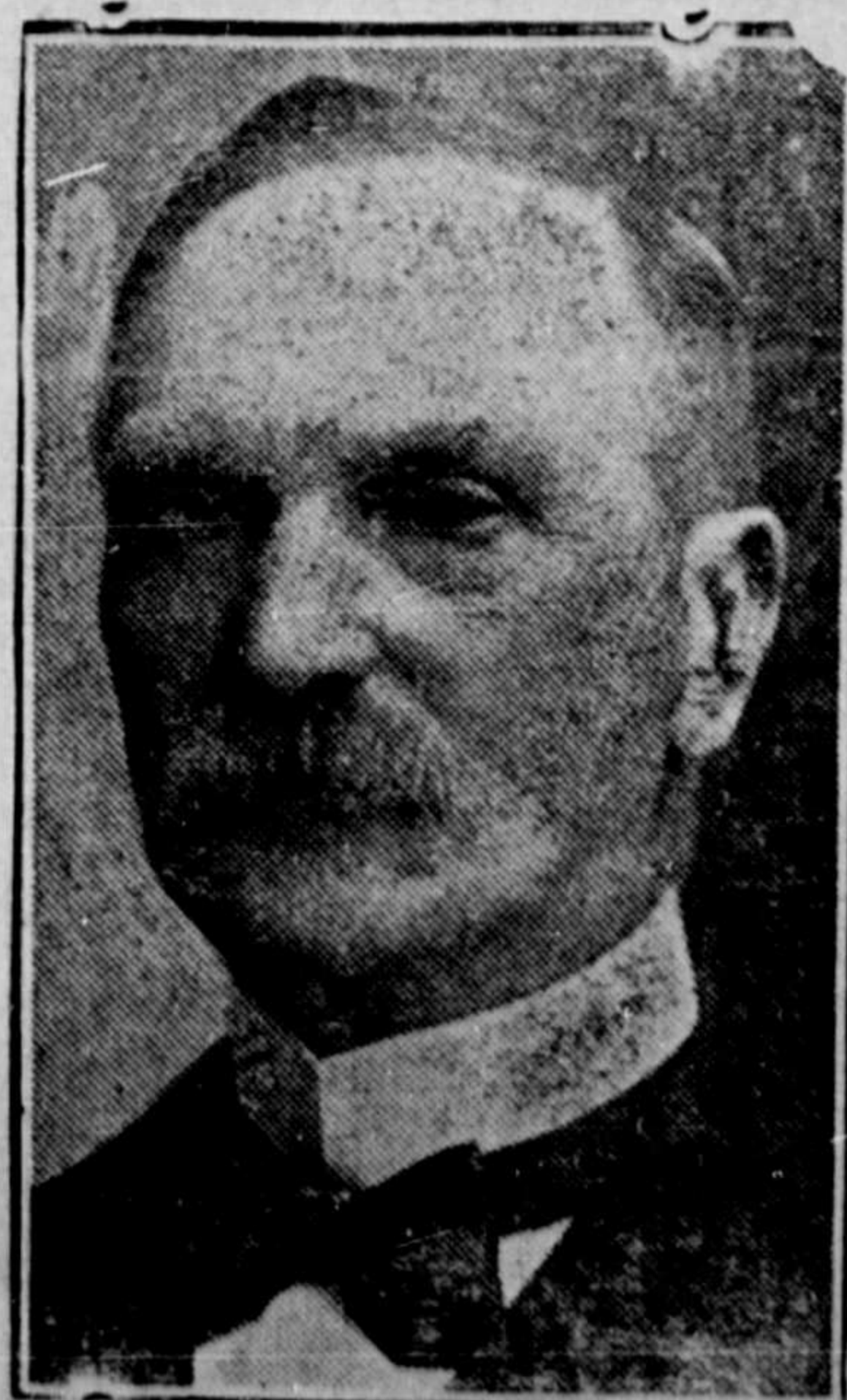

This means that the financial negotiations between Spitzer, Rorick & Company and the City of Prince Rupert are now satisfactorily completed and that the treasury certificates falling due in London on June 1st will be taken up, and the financial affairs of the city placed on a solid basis.

It is expected that the City Treasurer and the Mayor will leave shortly for Prince Rupert. Mr. McCaffery will return via Montreal where he will have an interview with President E. J. Chamberlin, of the G. T. P., in regard to matters in Prince Rupert.

#### SHIP-BUILDING

Vancouver, May 20.—The Wallace Shipyards have secured a contract to build three wooden schooners with auxiliary power under the provisions of the new Shipping Act. The keels will be laid shortly. The cost of the three hulls is estimated at \$400,000.

#### COMPLIMENT TO CANADIANS AND BRITISH GUARDS

French Say They are Best Trained Troops Sent to the Western Front—Italians have to Withdraw.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 20.—The French Imperial authorities claim that the British Guards and the Canadian re-inforcements from Shorncliffe and Bramshot camps are the best trained troops which have been received by the armies on the western front.

##### Austin Chamberlain's Speech.

Austin Chamberlain, in a stirring speech, states that Great Britain must build up her own strength in preference to discounting Germany's economic resources.

It is reported that Germany is preparing traps for her enemies in German East Africa.

##### Italians Withdraw.

The Italians have been compelled to withdraw from their advanced positions in the vicinity of Trente on account of the heavy opposition of the Austrian forces.

#### ALLISON OVERCOME IN THE WITNESS BOX

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, May 20.—Colonel John Wesley Allison was under examination before Commissioner Duff and Meredith, in the fuse enquiry yesterday. Allison was completely overcome in the witness box, following upon the giving of hazy answers when important matters in connection with the fuse contracts were exposed by Fred Carvell, K. C., M. P.

##### Revised Pension Scale.

The government has adopted the revised pension scale for soldiers, allowing a more liberal consideration to men of lower rank than the former scale carried.

#### AMERICANS ATTEMPT TO RE-CAPTURE FISHING

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, May 20.—A bill has been introduced by the Department of Commerce designed to re-capture from Canada the portion of the Northern Pacific fishing industry which has been lost by the American fishermen, on account of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway service from Prince Rupert to eastern points.

#### MALCOLM LAMB IS ALIVE AND KICKING

Alex. M. Manson has received a military postcard from Malcolm Manson Lamb, one of the St. Andrew's Society boys who was amongst the first to enlist in Prince Rupert. On April 29th, Malcolm was all alive and kicking, having been in the trenches for a year, with the exception of a two weeks vacation at Christmas, which he spent at his home in Leith, Scotland.

#### FOURTH GERMAN VESSEL SUNK IN THE BALTIC SEA

British Submarines Have Tied Up Baltic Shipping—Sweden is Threatened with Coal Famine.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Stockholm, May 20.—British submarines have sunk the German ore-carrier Travee in the Baltic. The crew has been safely landed in Sweden. This makes the fourth German vessel sunk by the British since the new submarine campaign started in the Baltic.

##### Swedish Coal Famine.

Christiania, May 20.—The activity of British submarines in the Baltic Sea is likely to accentuate the coal famine in Sweden. German ships in Swedish ports have been instructed to remain docked until further orders.

##### Berlin and Washington.

Washington, May 20.—Germany considers that the controversy with the United States over the submarine warfare is now closed, and is not attempting to reply to the last note from Washington.

##### American Implicated.

London, May 20.—A naturalized United States citizen has been accused of complicity in the recent rebellion in Dublin.

#### ALBERT BURY PASSED AWAY LAST EVENING

The death occurred at the general hospital last evening of Albert Bury, a well known figure in the city since the early days. Albert was employed at the old Premier Hotel and later at the Prince Rupert Hotel. Some time ago his health broke down and, after a spell in the hospital, he went to live in the interior. Last week he returned to the hospital, having suffered a relapse and last night, he passed away.

The funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers who are awaiting instructions as to the burial. Albert has a brother and sister in the city, one brother in the trenches and two sisters in Edmonton.

**TORIES KNEW**

John L. Sullivan, in his latest examination in the "plugging" charges in the Vancouver election, gave some interesting evidence. John knew that the pluggers were coming from Seattle, early in the week of the election. He saw them arrive from the south and seemed to be aware of every move they made. He claimed to have remonstrated with Monty White, whoever he may be, but he seems to have failed completely to take any steps to stop the "plugging" which he says he knew all about before it happened. Surely the simplest plan was to inform the Tory scrutineers at each polling booth. Forewarned by Sullivan, the scrutineers could easily have had the Seattle gentlemen arrested when they attempted to vote.

The whole story wants a good deal of explaining. Sullivan says he tried to impress upon his friends that Macdonald was not the "wet" candidate, for the Liberal was opposed to the "wet" interests. Evidently John's friends did not place great reliance upon his word for, according to his evidence, they came north and voted for the "dry" candidate. Possibly John thought they were to vote the other way.

One remarkable feature of the enquiry is that not a single Tory scrutineer has been called and there is no evidence that a single one of the "pluggers" was ever challenged by a Tory, yet the Conservative executive received warning from Sullivan that the "plugging" was to be attempted, and the hotel-keeper seemed to be able at any time to lay his hands on the gentlemen. They seem to have

been his close personal friends. There is still a vast amount of clearing up to be done, but one fact stands out clearly—Sullivan, on his own word, knew enough about the business before the election to hinder the men from voting or to have them arrested if they tried to vote. The chief fault from John's standpoint seems to have been that they voted for the wrong candidate, after receiving warning that Macdonald was not the "wet" representative.

Sullivan says that he was assisted, in his attempt to get in touch with the Whites, by ex-Ald. Joe Hoskins. Now Hoskins is on the Tory executive, while his son is in the customs service, and it should surely have been the easiest thing in the world for Hoskins and the rest of the Tory executive to have the "plugging" nipped in the bud. Probably they did not feel sore about the "pluggers" until after the election.


**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Lord Charles Beresford has evidently become convinced that the British air service is not the ineffective thing he had been led to believe, and he had the courage to admit he was wrong. Evidently when the bluff old Admiral discusses the air he is "all at sea."

For the first time for weeks, there was no mention of Verdun in the war despatches yesterday. For once, the western front was quite overshadowed by the desperate fighting on the Italian front.

**MELTING CHURCH BELLS TO PROVIDE SHELLS**

Copenhagen, May 16.—Schleswig newspapers, commenting on a recent order of the military authorities, say that it seems that they favor the wholesale dismantling of church bells for ammunition purposes. The order was occasioned by the publication of a memorandum from the consistory at Kiel which stated that a Berlin firm had sent a circular letter to the German clergy offering to buy all the church bells in Germany and forward them to the army.

The general commanding at Brandenburg immediately prohibited the firm from circularizing the clergy for this purpose, and issued another circular letter to the clergy warning them not to deal with private firms but to apply to the army headquarters direct.

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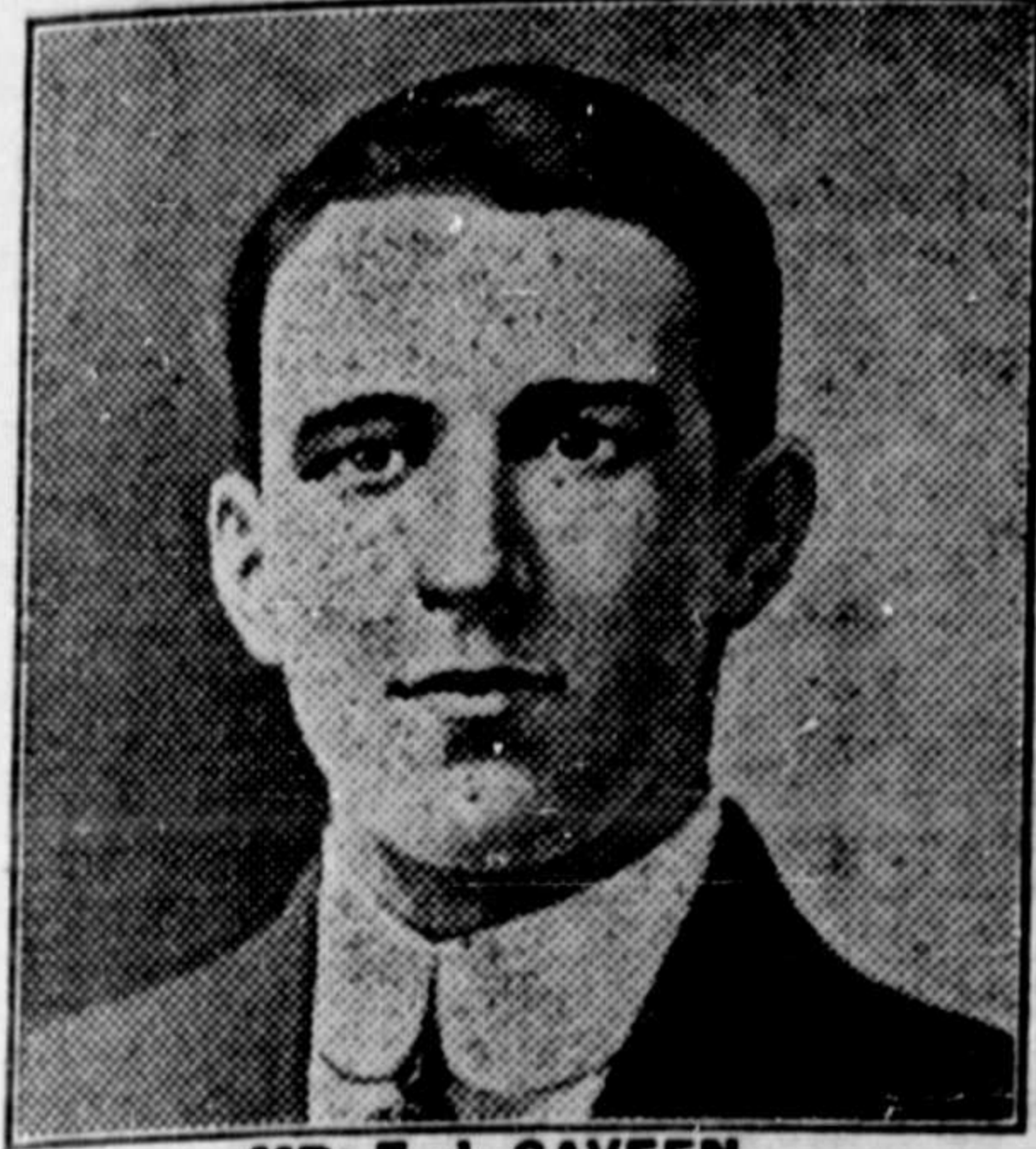

## ITALIANS ARE USING FUEL MADE OF PAPER

The problem of supplying the soldiers of Italy with fuel while they are battling up in the mountains wholly bare of wood is being met by patriotic girls and boys at home. Which shows, too, that the ingenuity of the Germans in solving acute domestic and military problems is matched, at least in this instance, in Italy. The new fuel, in the preparation of which thousands of children are concerned, is called "coal paper," though "paper coal" would do as well.

You know that paper can be compressed to such a solidity that car wheels have been made from it. Such a consistency of material should burn like coal, and, though information is lacking as to the specific quality of the emergency "coal," the compression is sufficient to render it excellent slow-burning fuel.

In all the big cities of Italy there have been organized bands of boys and girls who go round and collect all the papers they can find. These are brought to establishments where other boys and girls, under the direction of women teachers, turn these papers into solid rolls and sections, afterwards cut into chunks.

These are packed into individual bags and distributed among the soldiers in the bleak mountains. In case a soldier desires to have a little hot soup or coffee he takes out three or four pieces of "coal paper," and his hot meal is soon ready.—Ex.

**RELIEF FOR SHACKLETON**

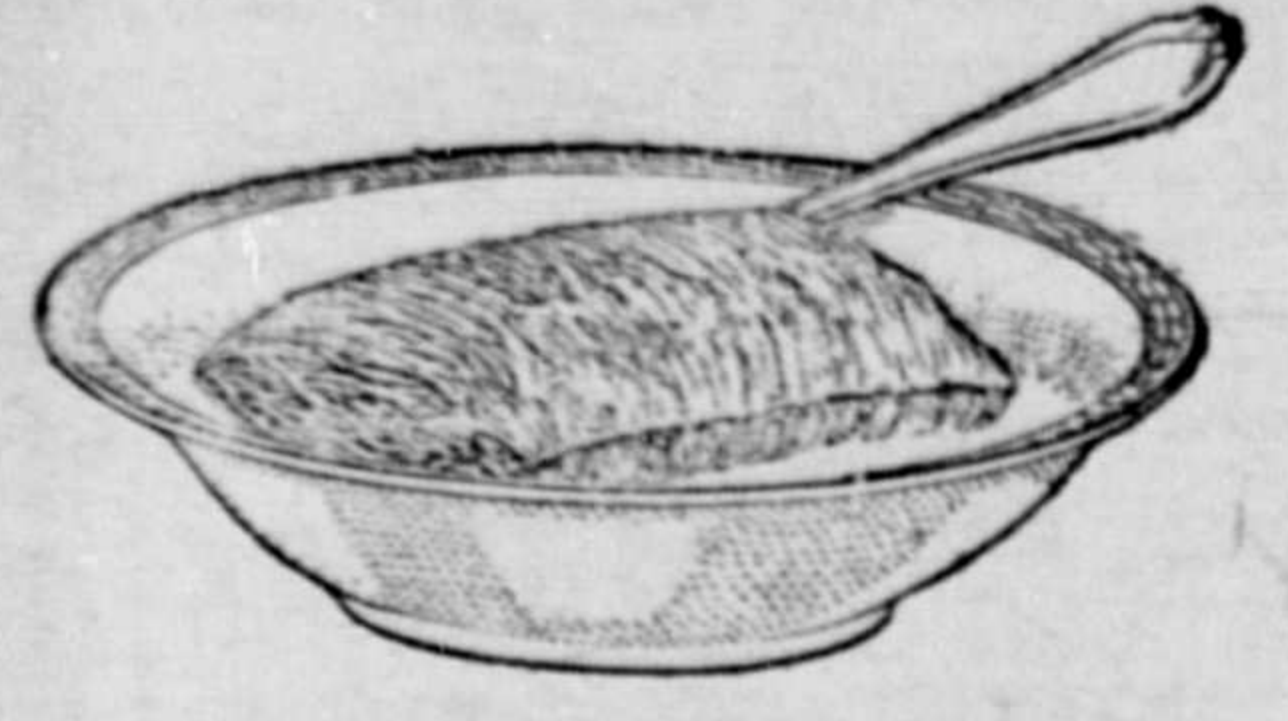
