DUTCH REFUSE TO ACCEPT THE BERLIN VERSION

Tubantia Incident Not Closed-Heavy Fighting on Western Front-Food Shortage Acute in Austria.

London, May 23 .- The Dutch government, after holding a thorough investigation into all the circumstances, refuses to accept the German version of the sinking of the Dutch liner Tubantia in the North Sea.




