## DESPERATE FIGHTING CONTINUES IN ALPS

### DUTCH REFUSE TO ACCEPT GERMAN VERSION OF THE TUBANTIA INCIDENT

#### BIG BATTLE IS DEVELOPING ON ITALIAN FRONT

**Austrians Strongly Re-inforced by Men and Guns—Italians Rush Enemy from Strong Positions.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, May 23.—Desperate fighting is progressing among the snow-capped mountains of the Alps. The Austrians have been heavily re-inforced with both men and guns and strenuously endeavoring to prevent Italy from aiding the Allies on the French front, while the desperate action on the part of the Austrians is expected to paralyze the action of the Allies at Saloniki, by keeping away re-inforcements.

#### Strong Defence.

The Italians have formed strong defence lines across the mountain passes and on the peaks, and are successfully arresting the attempted Austrian forward movement.

#### Austrians Dislodged.

The first offensive rush of the Italians resulted in the Austrians being dislodged from several of their strategic positions.

#### SHELL COMMISSION DODGING BAD POINTS

Ottawa, May 13.—As far as one can make head or tail of it the British War Office considered that the Bertram Shell Committee was a group of four Canadian manufacturers who accepted war contracts and filled or sub-let them as they chose, while the Bertram Shell Committee considered itself a public institution of Canada, and to some extent a trustee of the British Government.

In the words of the lawyers, the Bertram Shell Committee in the opinion of the British War Office acted in a contractual relation while in its own opinion it acted in a fiduciary relation. As a matter of fact, it acted sometimes one way, sometimes the other way, sometimes both ways. Generally speaking, it followed the Scriptural injunction and like a perfectly good piano-player did not let its right hand know what its left hand was doing except that both hands were kept busy. Moreover it was always fiduciary in the sense that it had perfect trust in itself and fixed prices about as it pleased. To thine own self be true, thou canst not then be false to any man—that was the way the Bertram Shell Committee operated.

It transpires that the Bertram Shell Committee is very anxious to keep the contractual and the fiduciary relation separate and while it has no objection to making a clean breast of its fiduciary virtues it would much rather keep its contractual transactions under cover. To put it plainly, it is dreadfully opposed to submitting a list of the contracts it made and the prices it fixed to the inspection of Mr. E. F. B. Johnston, K. C., and his associates in the inquiry. In fact Mr. Johnston had a run in with Government counsel on this very matter which led Carvell, M. P., at Chief Justice Meredith's suggestion putting a resolution on the order paper of the House of Commons for a widening of the inquiry to get at the real facts. How this resolution will fare at the hands of the Borden Government does not need more than one guess.

So far Government counsel have utilized the Royal Commission as a means of making as many good points and dodging as many bad ones as possible. Whenever the watchdog barked too near home, the scope of the inquiry was invoked to shut the noise off. Naturally Mr. Johnston and Mr. Carvell have got tired of this and are now demanding a show down. Meanwhile it is fairly clear that the Bertram Shell Committee allowed the contractual relation in the long run to get the better of the fiduciary one. In other words the four manufacturers could not forget that they were manufacturers and that the best part of the manufacturing business is making profits. Wherefore they made a profit of anything from \$41,000,000 down, and a great virtue is now being made of it that this profit is to be hand-

#### BARNARD DECLINES TO SIGN PROHIBITION BILL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, May 23.—Lieutenant-Governor Barnard declines to sign the Bowser Prohibition Bill, which the premier had intended to introduce at the session of the Legislature this afternoon.

The Lieutenant-Governor's refusal to sign is because the compensation provisions have been omitted from the bill.

The situation is described as being extremely delicate. Bowser has conferred with the prohibition executive and is now discussing a compromise to allow the bill to stand as it is and have a separate plebiscite taken on the question of compensation. Bowser's future action depends upon the attitude of the Lieutenant-Governor.

#### Later.

Vancouver, May 23.—Bowser is introducing Prohibition Bill this afternoon. There was some fear yesterday that the Lieutenant-Governor might provoke a crisis by refusing to sign the draft bill, but he has re-considered the matter. It is understood that the premier intends, at the second reading, to introduce provision for the appointment of a commission of three judges for the purpose of examining the claims for compensation.

The profit, as I said before, was anything from \$41,000,000 down. The amount is vague. Carvell, K. C., found a mistake of \$12,000,000, and Hellmuth, K. C. found another mistake of \$10,000,000. One way and another it appears to be disintegrating, but \$41,000,000 is enough for advertising purposes and we can afford to let it go at that. The real questions are these. How did they make the profit? How does it happen that this large sum of money, so large that it makes ordinary people nervous, was not turned over to the British War Office long ago?

#### JAMES J. HILL IS IN CRITICAL CONDITION

St. Paul, Minn., May 23.—The illness of James J. Hill, the railway magnate is causing grave concern to his friends. Mr. Hill has been in poor health for some time and complications have now developed, the condition of the famous railroader being regarded as critical.

James J. Hill was born in Canada, but went to the United States in his youth, when he entered a railroad office in St. Paul. His first step as a railroad owner was made in conjunction with the late Lord Strathcona, when he was a partner of the great Canadian in buying out the Dutch stockholders in the railroad between St. Paul and Winnipeg. Later in life he attained fame as the genius behind the Great Northern Railway.

#### BYLAW REPEALED

A bylaw repealing bylaw 257, covering local improvements on Claude Street, was introduced at the council last evening and read a first time.

City Solicitor Peters intimated that the inspector of municipalities and he did not agree on the matter of repealing bylaws, but he was satisfied that the new bylaw was quite in accordance with the act, being entirely different from a money bylaw.

#### DUTCH REFUSE TO ACCEPT THE BERLIN VERSION

**Tubantia Incident Not Closed—Heavy Fighting on Western Front—Food Shortage Acute in Austria.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 23.—The Dutch government, after holding a thorough investigation into all the circumstances, refuses to accept the German version of the sinking of the Dutch liner Tubantia in the North Sea.

#### Western Front.

Severe fighting continues between the French and the Germans in the region of Verdun, the struggle west of Deadman's Hill being terrific. The Germans have been forced to abandon several block-houses in the vicinity of Avoncourt wood.

There is also heavy fighting between the British and the Germans in the vicinity of La Bassee.

#### 570 Fishing Craft Gone.

Britain's enemies have sunk 570 fishing craft since the start of the war.

#### Food Shortage.

The food shortage in the Central Empires, especially in Austria, is becoming so acute that the people are verging on a state of famine. Emperor Franz Josef, of Austria, is protesting to the Pope to intervene.

#### Canteen Privileges.

The introduction of canteen privileges amongst the workers in the munitions industries is considerably reducing the drink evil in Great Britain.

#### SWEEPING LIBERAL VICTORY IN QUEBEC

Montreal, May 23.—The Quebec general elections resulted in a sweeping victory for the Liberals. The government carried 74 seats while the Conservatives managed to retain only 7. In the last Legislature there were 57 Liberals and 24 Conservatives.

## ACCESSORIES

The Tories, through their friends from Seattle, have endeavored to make a lot of party capital out of the Vancouver election enquiry. It has become so much of a party political move that the Conservatives have entirely overlooked the criminal aspect of it. John L. Sullivan, who paid all the expenses of the gang under a promise that the government would refund him the money, stated quite gaily the other day that F. W. Welsh, Tory candidate in Vancouver; C. E. Tisdall, late Tory candidate in Vancouver; Joe Hoskin, of the Conservative Association and Secretary Love of the Conservative Association, all knew about the pluggers coming from Seattle several days prior to the election.

John seems to have been able at any time to lay his hands on his Seattle friends, who had come north to vote for the "wet" candidate. Now "plugging" is a criminal offence just as house-breaking is. Suppose those worthy Tories had been warned that a gang of house-breakers were on their way from Seattle to commit a burglary in Vancouver on a given date, at a given place and at a given time, and the Tory gentlemen omitted to inform the police, where would they be today?

Suppose some John Sullivan entered the witness box and stated that F. W. Welsh and Company knew all about the prospective burglary some days before it happened, matters would look rather serious for the "gentlemen who knew all about it" but did nothing to prevent it, though they knew it to be criminal. The Tories clearly knew far too much about the Seattle deal and the evidence has proven that the Liberals at the head of affairs knew nothing at all about it. Monty White, the man who is supposed to have paid the pluggers, seems to have been a close friend of the Tories, while the Liberals know nothing of him whatever.

The Tories do not seem to have considered "plugging" as a crime, since they took no measures to prevent it, though they knew all about it. According to the evidence of Sullivan, F. W. Welsh, Joe Hoskin and several other Tory leaders are in grave danger of being arrested as "accessories before the fact."

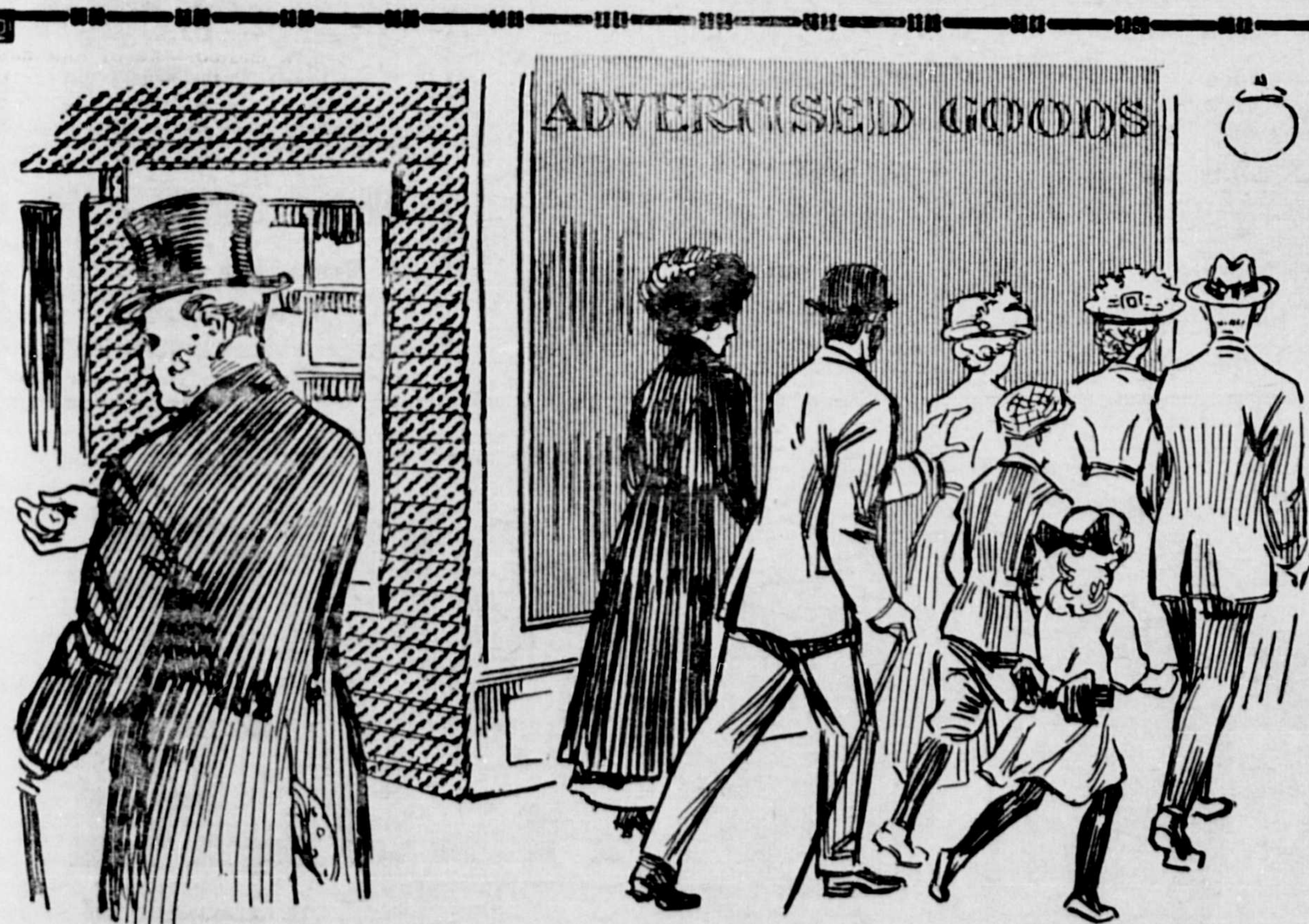
