PROHIBITION BILL IS PRESENTED TO THE HOUSE





In the Letter Box

FIRE-FIGHTING

Editor, Daily News, Dear Sir,

The following suggestions are made in good faith, and with no desire to pass criticism upon any

It almost invariably happens that, at any serious outbreak of fire in Prince Rupert, there is on hand quite an army of willing volunteers, some of whom do good work and incidentally spoil some clothes. My suggestion concerns Third Avenue business section chiefly, but might be carried out in other districts also. These are days of economy and retrenchment; most of the business men are under-insured; some carry no insurance and I don't know of any who are over-insured.

The fire chief might take say ten of twelve men who are employed in this particular locality; instruct and drill them in the use and handling of fire and chemical hose, and any other fire-fighting implements, at the same time imparting instruction that would tend towards a smoother working in an emergency, such as we had the other day. Those men, having a previous knowledge of the position of the various hydrants in their section, could be depended upon to be at their posts on the alarm being rung. This would, I think, save a good deal of overlapping and would help the chief along the lines of getting a good start, which after all is one of the main essentials in fire fighting. put this forward for what it is worth, and hope that something may mature from it.
