GERMANS ADVANCE AT ENORMOUS COST

FORT DOUAMONT RE-CAPTURED—AUSTRIANS CLAIM FURTHER BIG SUCCESSES

GERMANS MAKE PROGRESS AT A TERRIBLE COST

Terrific Slaughter When Germans Press Home Attacks Along Western Front—Douaumont Taken.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 25.—There was a terrific German attack along the Verdun front; in the Champagne district, and also on the British lines at Cumieres yesterday.

Furious fighting is still progressing near Verdun and the Germans have re-captured Fort Douaumont. The French are retreating the immediate approach.

By the use of gas, the Germans attempted to occupy the French lines in the Champagne district, but were driven back to their own trenches.

On the west bank of the Meuse, the Germans undertook a powerful offensive and managed to penetrate the village of Cumieres, where they entered one of the British trenches, when terrific hand to hand fighting ensued. The Germans secured this piece of territory at a tremendous sacrifice, proceeding with the attack utterly regardless of the number of lives taken.

On the east bank of the Meuse, the Germans advanced for a short distance, but at the cost of terrific slaughter to their troops.

Mr. McLaren is making arrangements with P. G. Shallcross, the insurance adjuster who is now in town, to go up to Granby to adjust the loss as soon as he is finished with his work here.

Mrs. McKinnon, the proprietor of the hotel, is well known in Prince Rupert, having conducted a bakery here in the early days. The hotel is covered to the extent of \$10,000.

PROHIBITION BILL IS PRESENTED TO THE HOUSE

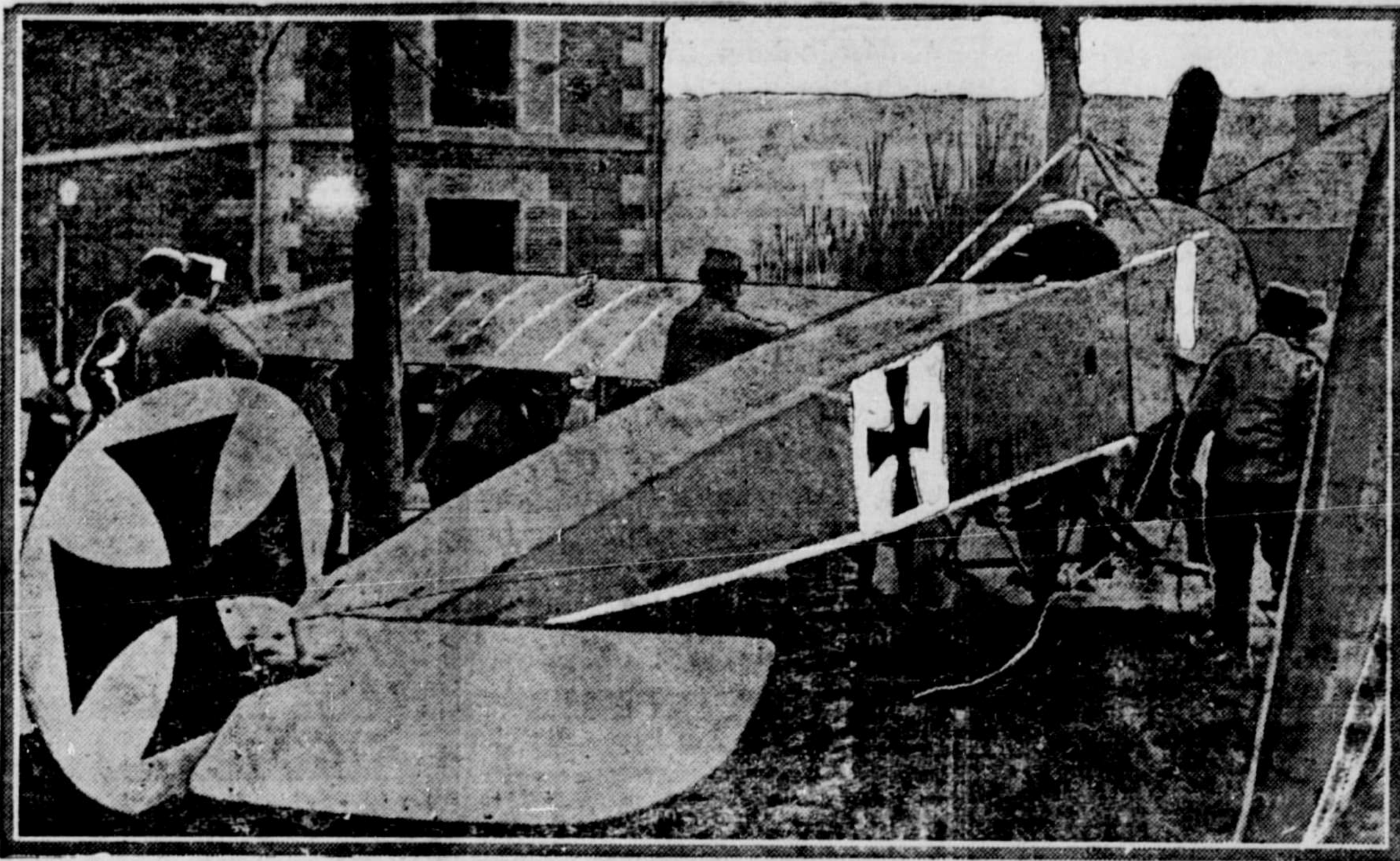
Vancouver, May 25.—The Prohibition Bill has been presented to the Legislature, containing the signature of the Lieutenant-Governor. The compensation proposals will be presented at the second reading. The measure will prohibit the sale of liquor in hotels, retail stores and clubs, and the government will regulate the sale of specified quantities through doctors, druggists, dentists, veterinaries and hospitals.

The prohibitionists are satisfied with the measure and the liquor interests, headed by A. E. Tulk are very busy over the matter of compensation.

AUSTRIANS ARE CLAIMING MORE BIG SUCCESSES

Report Twenty-five Thousand Men and Many Guns Taken in Big Offensive—Italians Retreat.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 25.—The Austrians are continuing their violent offensive against the Italians at Lake Garda and in the Val Sugan region. The enemy claims to have captured twenty-five thousand Italians, and a large quantity of cannon, machine guns, bombs, etc. The retreating Italians destroyed whatever artillery they were unable to withdraw.

Italian Report.

Rome, May 25.—The Austrians are fiercely engaging the Italians with one hundred cannon on each mile of a twenty mile front.

Von Buelow's Mission.

Prince Von Buelow, former German Chancellor, is reported to be proceeding to Washington on a special mission. It is understood that he will become German Ambassador to the United States in place of Count Von Bernstorff.

SPANISH SHIP OWNERS ASK TO BE PROTECTED

German Submarines Still Make War on Neutrals—Conscription Passed by the Upper House.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, May 25.—Madrid complains that neutral shipping is still suffering heavily from the continued German submarine attacks. The Spanish government points out that, not only have British, French and Italian ships been sunk, but that many Norwegian, Spanish, Greek and Danish vessels have been sunk and several members of their crews killed and injured.

Spanish ship-owners are appealing to the government at Madrid for protection against this submarine warfare.

Conscription Passed.

London, May 25.—The Compulsory Military Service Bill has been passed by the House of Lords and is now being presented for the Royal signature.

Ottawa, May 25.—Premier Borden will request the Commander-in-Chief of the British army to furnish a statement concerning the merits of the Ross rifle as an active service weapon.

CLUTCHING STRAWS

The situation at Victoria becomes daily more like a Gilbertian comedy. After the Vancouver election, Bowser took thought, or rather fright, and grabbed the coat tails of the prohibitionists. In the Victoria election, he found that he had made some serious mistake, and, ever since, he has been angling to get the support of both the prohibitionists and the liquor men. While he could not let go of the coat tails of the prohibitionists, he entertained hopes that the liquor men would grab his coat tails and they would all swing along together, with Bowser in the middle. As the hero of the prohibition bill, he fought desperately to get the measure through a strong opposition in caucus and then comes the Lieutenant-Governor's refusal to sign the draft bill, because it contains no compensation clause. Here is where the liquor men are expected to grab. A compromise is to be effected by the Lieutenant-Governor insisting on a thorough examination of the question of compensation. A Lieutenant-Governor is a "very present help in time of trouble," and he has stepped into the breach very neatly. The spectacle of a premier clutching at straws to save his political life is not an elevating picture, but what can the poor man do when he has to make some kind of an effort to get all the votes he can. This is another example of the "bluff honesty" of Whitney.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Quebec is always Liberal, but on this occasion it evidently thought it well to emphasize the fact. Recent happenings in Ottawa in connection with fuse contracts doubt-

less had a good deal to do with the result.

The ex-mayor makes one more effort to vent his spleen by accusing Mayor McCaffery of "galivanting all over America" at the public expense. The public is thoroughly satisfied that Mr. McCaffery is attending strictly to city business, and at the minimum of expense, while it remembers a certain or very uncertain trip which the ex-mayor made to Montreal at considerable cost.

It is satisfactory to know that the council will not have to wire to New York to find out just what kind of a deal the mayor made, as a former council had to do in regard to the historic trip to Montreal.

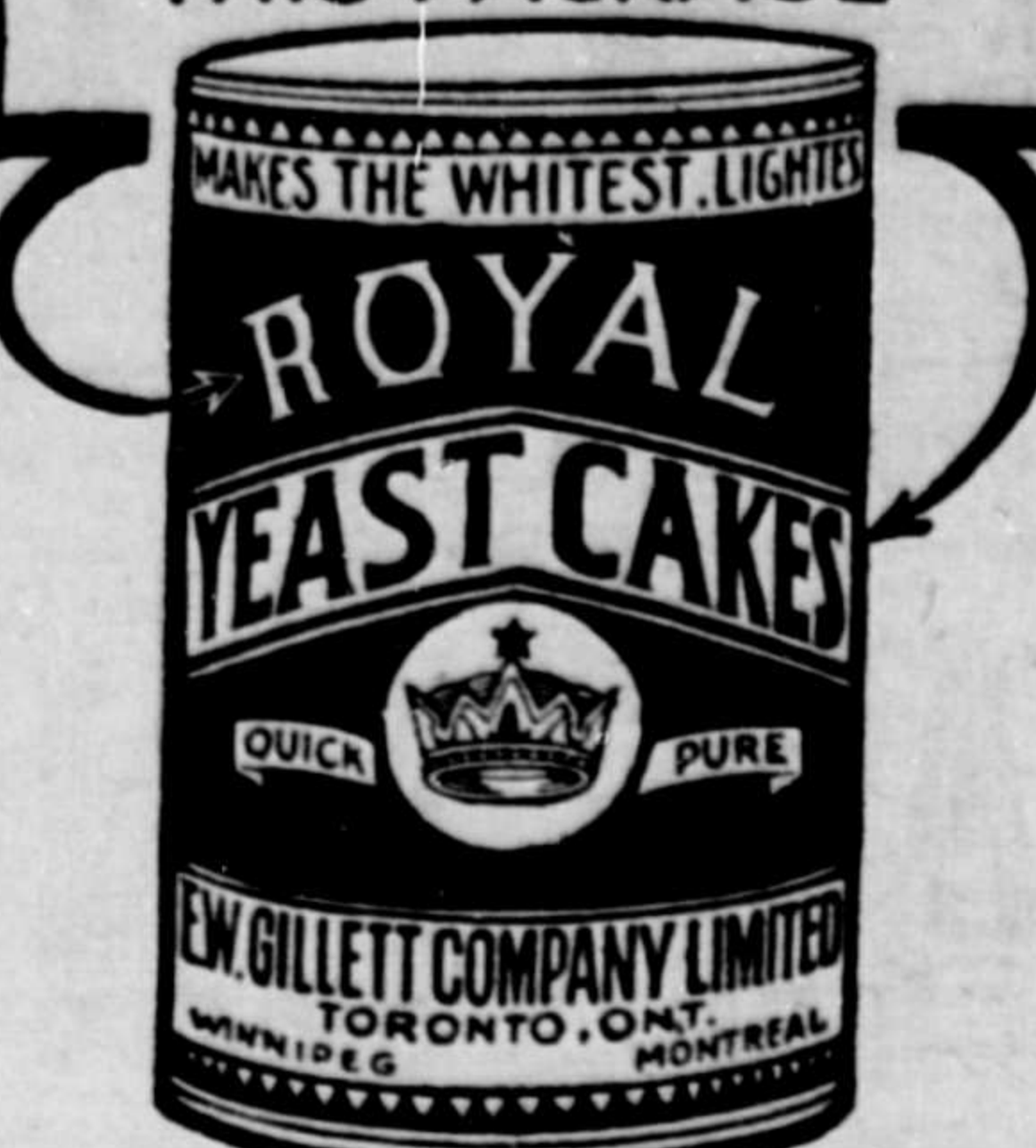

SALMON RIVER VALLEY LANDS TO BE OPENED

A new colony in the Salmon River Valley district of British Columbia will be opened by the government of that province on June 20. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, on whose line the colony will be, is now arranging for excursions, which will be commenced shortly.

Large numbers of easterners are expected to settle in the new colony, which consists of 31,360 acres. This is sufficient for 196 homesteaders. Germans, will, however, be excluded.

Already four cars of settlers effects have arrived at Prince George, the Salmon River district being just north of that city. Other cars are now on the way, and according to reports received by the railway there is likely to be a considerable rush for homesteaders.

The settlement will be officially opened by the Government of British Columbia on June 20th, at the government land office at Prince George.

level and more open than any now available in British Columbia. The country is rich in all kinds of grains and grasses, it being possible to harvest three crops of Alfalfa yearly.

Settlers who take up homesteads this year will probably devote their time to clearing and possibly some vegetables will be grown. Next year, however, mixed farming is expected to be taken up and developed to a considerable extent.

It is proposed to take up settlers of different nationalities, facilities being provided for them to come from all parts of Canada, but it is possible that a large number will be Mennonites.

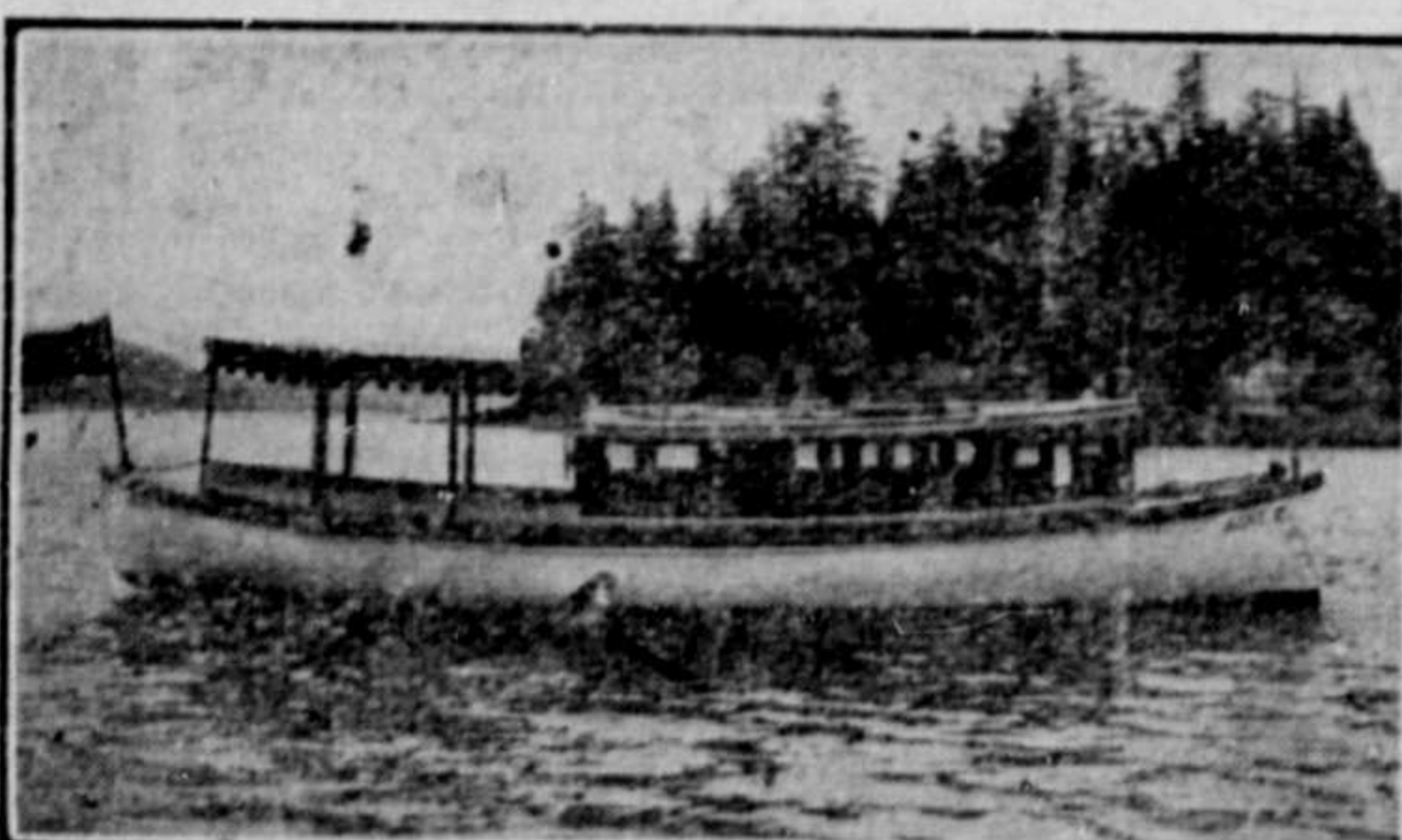

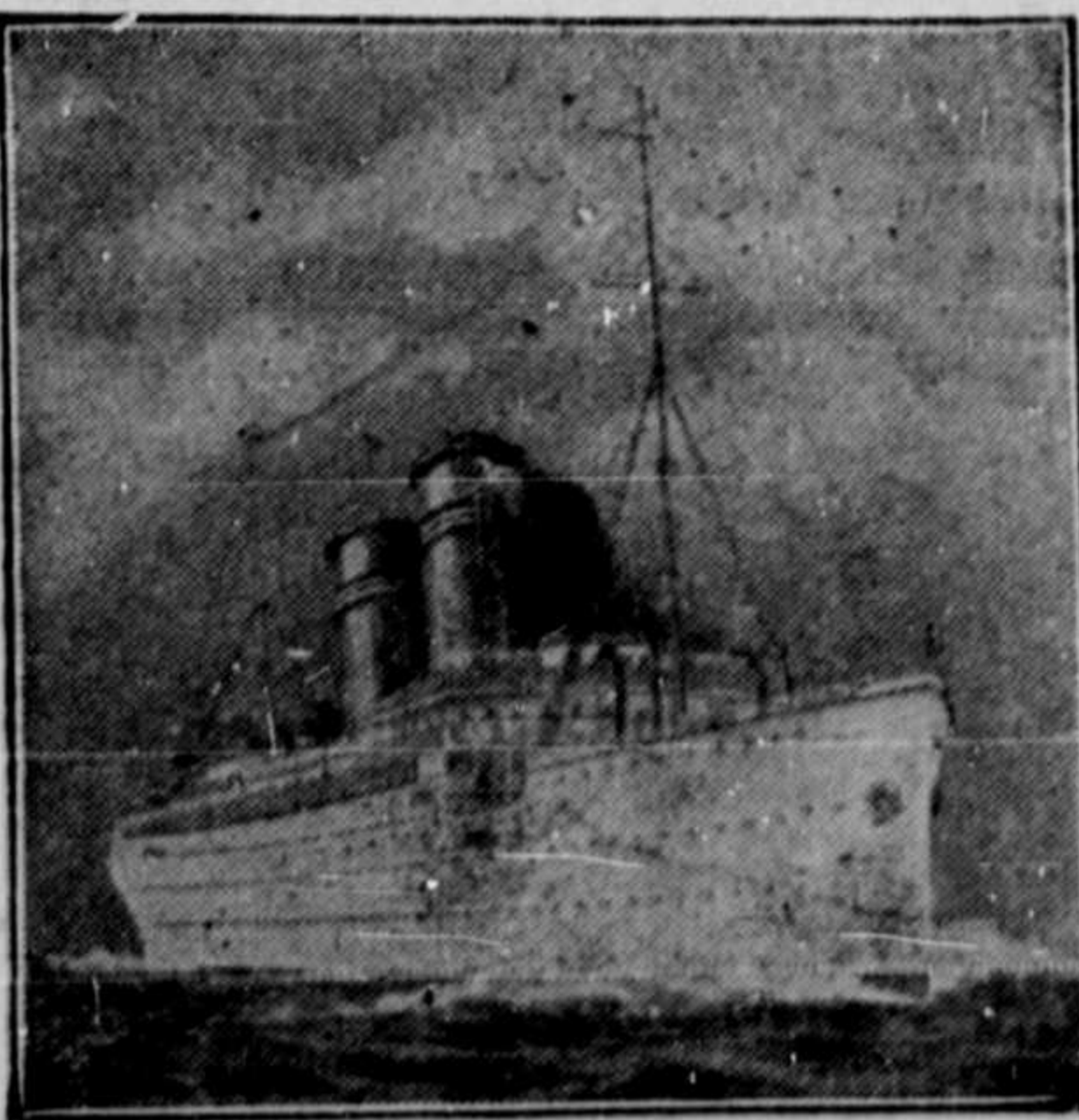

FIRE-FIGHTING

Editor, Daily News,

Dear Sir,
The following suggestions are made in good faith, and with no desire to pass criticism upon any person or persons.

It almost invariably happens that, at any serious outbreak of fire in Prince Rupert, there is on hand quite an army of willing volunteers, some of whom do good work and incidentally spoil some clothes. My suggestion concerns Third Avenue business section chiefly, but might be carried out in other districts also. These are days of economy and retrenchment; most of the business men are under-insured; some carry no insurance and I don't know of any who are over-insured.

The fire chief might take say ten of twelve men who are employed in this particular locality; instruct and drill them in the use and handling of fire and chemical hose, and any other fire-fighting implements, at the same time imparting instruction that would tend towards a smoother working in an emergency, such as we had the other day. Those men, having a previous knowledge of the position of the various hydrants in their section, could be depended upon to be at their posts on the alarm being rung. This would, I think, save a good deal of overlapping and would help the chief along the lines of getting a good start, which after all is one of the main essentials in fire fighting. I put this forward for what it is worth, and hope that something may mature from it.
