## BERLIN STILL DISCUSSES EARLY PEACE

### ALLIES PLAN TERRIFIC SMASH AGAINST THE TURKS--FRENCH HOLD GERMANS

#### EARLY PEACE IS STILL SUBJECT OF BERLIN TALK

Hoped That Colonel House Will be Peace Messenger—Italians Now Supplied with Heavy Guns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 27.—Berlin continues to talk of a possible peace being arranged shortly. It is hoped that, should Colonel E. M. House, who recently visited the capitals of the belligerent countries as representative of President Wilson, make another visit to Europe, he will come as a harbinger of peace.

Berlin suggests that arrangements for the restoration of the Belgian Kingdom and the return to France of the provinces captured during this war are within the bounds of possibility, but that, on no account, would Germany give up Alsace and Lorraine, which were taken from the French in 1871.

#### Austrian Opinion.

Rome, May 27.—The prevailing opinion in Austria is that "peace cannot be concluded without first giving a deserved lesson to the Italian traitors."

#### Italian Reverses.

The Italian reverses on the Trentino front were due to a shortage of heavy cannon with which to cope with the big Austrian guns which were supplied by Krupp. The French have come to the rescue of Italy by supplying her with heavy artillery.

#### DESPICABLE TORY NEWSPAPER TACTICS

Victoria, May 23.—Speaking to a question of privilege in the House tonight, Mr. H. C. Brewster, leader of the Liberal party, said that the News-Advertiser article of Sunday, referring to M. A. Macdonald, was "an absolute tissue of falsehood, and when a paper had to go so far afield to make up a falsehood out of whole cloth it was time to draw it to the attention of the public." Mr. Brewster said that had it referred to him he would pay no attention to it. The article in question had said that Mr. Brewster was being deluged with letters frantically calling for the dismissal of Mr. Macdonald as president of the Provincial Liberal Association. Mr. Brewster said he had got not one solitary letter of the sort.

#### ALLIES PLAN TO ELIMINATE THE TURKS FROM WAR

Terrific Smash Will Be Delivered From Saloniki—Destruction of Turkish Power First Peace Stroke.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 27.—A terrific smash will soon be delivered by the Allies to eliminate the Turks from the war. It is believed by experts that this will be the first great stroke towards peace.

Heavy allied attacks from Saloniki and in Mesopotamia will be followed by a tremendous offensive against the Austro-Germans in an attempt to carry the war to a successful conclusion before next winter sets in.

#### Advance on Bagdad.

London, May 27.—The Russian Caucasian army, under the Grand Duke Nicholas, is pressing on toward the Turkish stronghold of Bagdad, and are throwing back the Turks as they go.

#### Washington Protests.

Washington, May 27.—The United States has notified Great Britain and France that it cannot any longer tolerate wrongs to American citizens through interference with the United States mails. The United States Government will press its claims against both government for the losses already sustained.

J. W. Stewart, of the railroad contracting firm of Foley, Welch & Stewart, has been invited to take the command of a battalion of railroaders for overseas service. Colonel Stewart is now in Ottawa making arrangements.

Cecil J. Clayton, son of Charles Clayton, of Port Clements, Q. C. I., has gone to Toronto to take the aviation course at the Curtiss School of Aviation, his ultimate object being to join the Royal Flying Corps. Mr. Clayton has been on the staff of the Victoria Colonist for some time.

Now that the worries of passing the Conscription Bill are over, the Hon. David Lloyd George goes fishing. Compulsory military service had its most forceful advocate in the "little Welsh attorney," who is regarded by many as the most powerful man in the British Government. He has returned to London refreshed and ready to tackle the arduous task of conciliating the conflicting elements in Ireland, the greatest task which has ever been shouldered by any British statesman.

#### BREWSTER'S BILL TO STOP ILLEGAL VOTING

Victoria, May 23.—Speaking on behalf of his election bill designed to make it impossible for the illegal manipulations of the election in past years, H. C. Brewster, the Liberal leader, in the House this afternoon declared the present system lends itself to illegal practices. "It appeals to me that a simple remedy is to hand," he said. "In Victoria we have nearly 16,000 names and only some 7,000 votes were cast. In Vancouver some 35,000 were on the list, and only some 15,000 voted.

"The bill I submit will stop illegal practices and requires no additional machinery nor expense. I believe it would eliminate the commonly-called pluggers. The object is to force each elector to sign his name and it is very simple. The application forms are the basis of the lists and these in sections are placed at the polling places. The only difference is that the original application is placed at the polling places. When a voter comes to the poll his signature can be compared. If they do not compare it would be necessary for him to offer proof. By such a method an illegal voter would be unable to plug. It would have the effect of once and for all doing away with the fraudulent practices.

#### Not in Country.

"The system would not apply in country districts where it would be impractical. I claim," went on the Liberal leader. "It would make impossible the election frauds which it is believed have been carried on for years. It might eventually be introduced in another way to apply in rural districts, but I am not sure how it would work out. It has been adopt-

#### GERMANS STILL AGGRESSIVE ON VERDUN FRONT

Huns Fail To Drive French From Douaumont Approaches—Big Offensive on Riga Is Planned.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 27.—Heavy fighting still continues in the region of Verdun, with the Germans still in the role of aggressors. There are no new changes of any importance.

Following up their capture of Fort Douaumont, the Germans have striven ineffectually to drive the French from the approaches which they hold. The Germans have suffered very heavy casualties.

#### German Message.

Geneva, May 27.—It is reported that the Germans are preparing for a strong military offensive in the Riga region of Russia, with the assistance of the Kiel fleet, which will attempt to force the Gulf of Riga.

This is looked upon as another German inspired report, issued in order to mislead the Allies, who have obtained so much assistance from the Russians on the western front.

#### Submarine Warfare.

The British steamer Australia; the Italian steamer El Argentino and the Italian ship Gornigliano are reported to have been sunk by the enemy.

**THE PLOT EXPOSED**

We gather from J. L. Sullivan's evidence in the plugging enquiry the following facts:

1. J. L. Sullivan had been told by Sullivan, Sr., four or five days before election day, that the "pluggers" were coming to Vancouver.

2. On the following day he received a letter from his friend Carroll stating that he had been asked to "get men to vote for Macdonald," and asking him what he thought of it. Strange to say, he "DID NOT ANSWER THE LETTER," but "took steps to stop any plugging."

3. His first step was to forward the letter by James Reed, license inspector, to the Conservative executive, whereupon he was called upon by F. W. Welsh, who informed him that the matter had been discussed with the premier and Mr. Tisdall and "they would stop the men at the border." But, strange to say, although the premier and Mr. Tisdall had all the powers of the Provincial and Dominion Governments at their backs, THEY DID NOT STOP THEM AT THE BORDER. They did not ATTEMPT TO STOP THEM AT THE BORDER.

4. On Feb. 24th he returned to Seattle and met Carrol and White, who were both his friends, and who told him that one was handling a gang of men, and the other the money. IF HE HAD NOT BEEN IN LEAGUE WITH THEM HE WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN GIVEN THE INFORMATION.

5. At the boat in Seattle he saw Monty White and fifteen others and sent a wireless to F. W. Welsh. If the object was to have them stopped or arrested on arrival, it is strange that NO EFFORT WAS MADE TO PREVENT THEIR LANDING IN VANCOUVER.

6. An elderly man having

told him that more were going to Vancouver by train that day, another wireless was sent to Welsh. NO EFFORT WAS MADE TO ARREST THIS BATCH AT THE TRAIN.

7. On Friday afternoon, the day before the election, he heard from his brother Pat, that more men were coming by boat and train. He carried the news to Mr. Reardon of the Metropole hotel; Mr. Egar, secretary of the Hotel Keepers' Association, and on Friday night he and Reardon WENT TO THE TRAIN TO MEET THE ARRIVALS. THEY DID NOT HAVE THEM ARRESTED.

8. Sullivan got into touch with Joe Hoskin, an ex-alderman in Vancouver (a vice-president of the Conservative Association), and also Secretary Love of the Conservative Association, notorious in connection with the Price-Love vote buying correspondence. As a result Sullivan went to Westminster and met the night train and saw Carroll and others. Joe Hoskin met the train in Vancouver. NO ONE WAS STOPPED. NO ONE WAS ARRESTED AT EITHER TRAIN.

9. They went up to the Irving hotel; Sullivan and Waller and Stewart were there, also Monty White. THE IRVING IS SULLIVAN'S HOTEL AND GAMBLING JOINT, FAMOUS AS THE ONE TIME HOME OF DEAF MICKEY and the BIG NUT. IT IS ONE OF THE HOTELS THE MACHINE APPOINTEES OF THE GOVERNMENT THINK THE POLICE SHOULD NOT INTERFERE WITH.

10. All the various gangs remained in Vancouver during election day. Sullivan was not only acquainted with nearly all of them, but knew them intimately. NOT ONE WAS MOLESTED.

11. Although the premier, the Hon. Mr. Tisdall, the Con-

servative executive, F. W. Welsh, the prospective candidate; Joe Hoskin, a vice-president; Secretary Love of the Conservative Association, the secretary of the Hotel Keepers' Association and other prominent Conservatives—all of whom were burning with a desire to land the "pluggers" in jail—knew of their movements, they were, one and all, allowed to conduct their nefarious operations throughout election day, and to depart in peace to their haunts and lairs in the Seattle underworld. The attorney-general, the chief law officer of the crown, whose duty it was to arrest and prosecute these drones of alien rascality, had been told by Sullivan what was in progress, BUT MADE NO ATTEMPT TO TAKE A SINGLE CRIMINAL INTO CUSTODY.

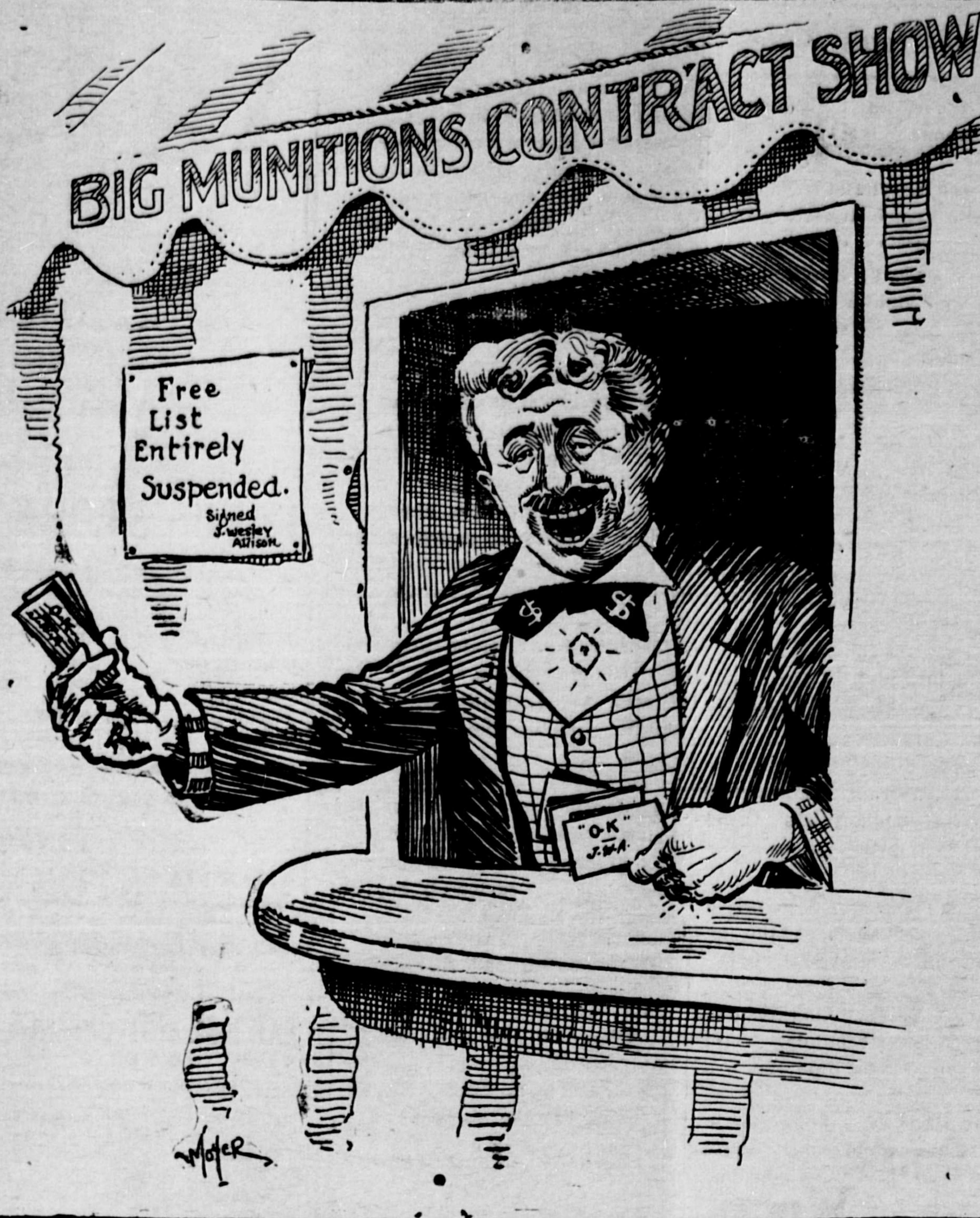

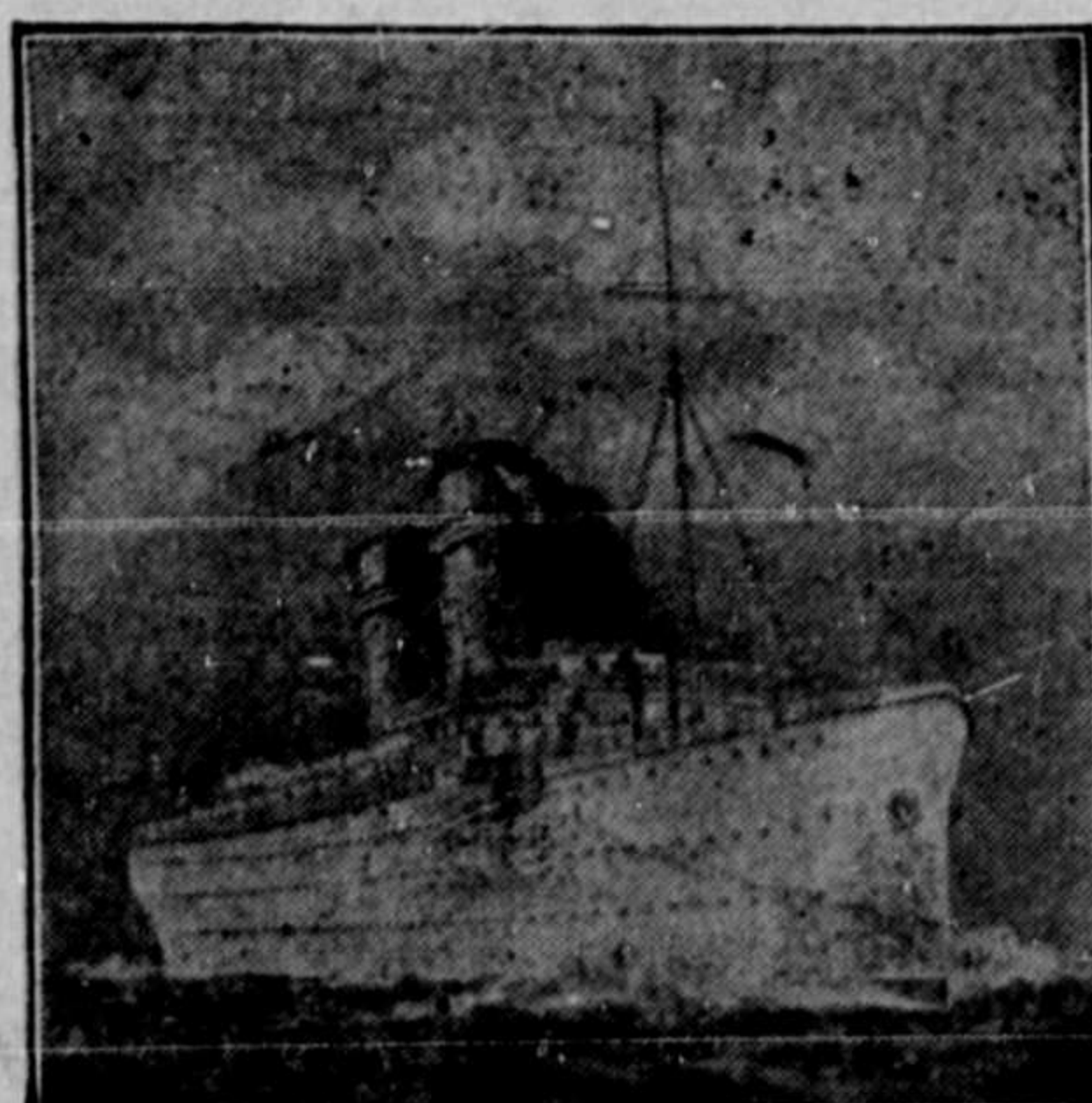
