## GERMANS ARE GAINING ON VERDUN FRONT

### HUGHES DEFENDS COLONEL ALLISON -- LAST TORY ATTACK ON MACDONALD

#### GERMANS MAKE FURTHER GAIN ON WEST FRONT

Advance on two mile Front Near Cumieres—British Progress in East Africa—More Steamers Sunk.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 31.—The French positions, on a front of approximately two miles, extending from the southern ridge of Le Mort Homme to the village of Cumieres, northwest of Verdun, have been captured by the Germans, according to the Berlin official communications.

The Teutons again pressed forward in Thioumont wood, north-east of Verdun, and added to their line in the east. These gains are partly admitted by Paris.

#### In East Africa.

The British are invading German East Africa from the south-east and have penetrated for a distance of twenty-eight miles into German territory, between Lake Tanganyika and Lake Nyassa.

#### More Steamers Sunk.

Two British steamers, the Southgarth and the Delegarth, have been sunk. Twenty-two of the crew of the Southgarth have been picked up but the fate of the crew of the Delegarth is not stated.

#### Russians Repulse Germans.

On the Russian front the Germans essayed an offensive, north-east of Augustenoff, but were repulsed by the Russians.

#### BERLIN DEFENDS THE INVASION OF GREECE

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 31.—According to Berlin reports, the Germans are with the Bulgarians in their invasion of Greek Macedonia. Berlin declares that the advance has been made as a protection against a surprise attack which the Entente Allies were planning.

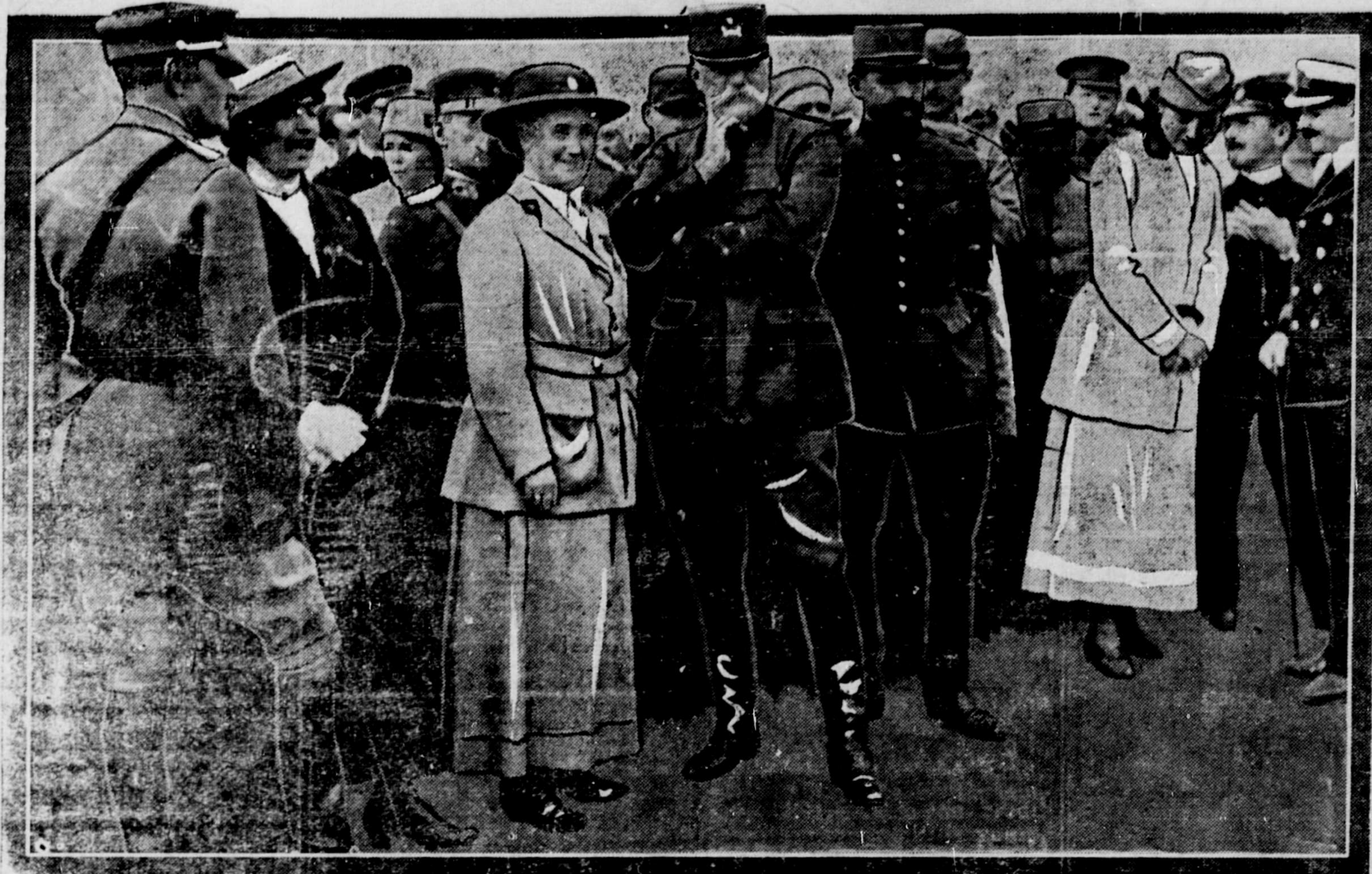

#### DESPERATE EFFORT AGAINST MACDONALD

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, May 31.—The term of the British Columbia legislature expires tonight.

At the Vancouver elections enquiry, Herbert Pearce, who was assistant to J. T. Scott, testified yesterday that M. A. Macdonald paid for the accommodation of impersonators at the Robson Rooms. Pearce also claimed that Macdonald had ordered him to leave the country at once.

M. A. Macdonald on the stand gave a flat denial to Pearce's story.

#### Sworn Statements of White and Clancy

Victoria, May 26.—Both John Clancy and "Monte" White, whom John L. Sullivan swore, before the "investigating" committee, had sent men to plug for the Liberal candidate in the Vancouver by-election, have sworn that the statements are not true that they sent men to act in the interests of Mr. Macdonald. White declares that he was threatened with being "jugged" if he did not give evidence favorable to Sullivan and his friends. Two affidavits follow:

John Clancy, first being duly sworn, deposes and says: I live in the city of Seattle, State of Washington, and am the same John Clancy referred to by various witnesses testifying before the committee of investigation now sitting at Victoria, B. C. I further state that it is not true, as inferred from the testimony of various witnesses testifying before said investigating committee, as published in the public press of British Columbia, that I gathered together or sent to Vancouver any man or men to vote or otherwise act in the interests of one Macdonald, or instigated any man being so sent.

Monte White, being first duly sworn, deposes and says: I am the same Monte White who was in the city of Vancouver, B. C., on the 26th day of February, 1916, and the Monte White referred to by various witnesses testifying before the committee of investigation now sitting at Victoria, B. C. I further state that it is not true as stated by various witnesses testifying before said committee, that I hired or instigated any man to vote at the Vancouver election of February 26, for any candidate named Macdonald. I further state that I have full knowledge of the various things occurring at said election, and referred to by said witnesses, as having occurred in said city on said date. And that I do not know of any man or men voting for, or hired, or instigated to vote for said Macdonald, with two exceptions. I further state that, on the 4th day of May, 1916, at Seattle, in the State of Washington, I was offered a sum of money to go to Victoria and testify, before said investigating committee, that I instigated or hired certain men to vote for said Macdonald, and was promised immunity from punishment for so doing, which I refused to do. I further state that I was told at the same time that unless I so testified, I should not appear at Victoria at all, and that if I did so, I would be jugged.

I further state that I am willing to appear before said investigating committee and to disclose fully and truthfully such facts as I know of and concerning said election, if given full immunity for all offenses that I may have committed in British Columbia.

#### SULLIVAN WIRELESS MESSAGES PRODUCED

Victoria, May 26.—The following are copies of the wireless messages which John L. Sullivan sent to F. W. Welsh, the Vancouver Conservative, in order to "have the pluggers stopped."

Welsh, Conservative Club, Vancouver—"About ten on the Adelaide; young, well dressed." (No signature.)

Welsh, Conservative Club, Vancouver—"Bunch on Great Northern morning train." (No signature.)

The first message was sent at 2:22 on Friday, February 25th and the second at 2:46 a. m.

The messages would rather lead one to believe that Welsh knew beforehand what Sullivan had gone to Seattle for, and was expecting advice as to his success.

#### SIR SAM HUGHES STILL BOOSTS FUSE COLONEL

British Agents in League Against Allison, Says Hughes—British Government Turned Down Allison.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, May 31.—At this morning's session of the Meredith-Duff enquiry the cross-examination of Colonel J. W. Allison was concluded and Sir Sam Hughes took the stand.

He said that Colonel Allison was the best man he knew to get information in regard to prices, etc., and had effected savings of large sums of money. The price at first demanded for fuses was between \$5.50 and \$6.00. He believed that the reduction of the Harris price to \$4.50 was due to the entry of Cadwell, Yoakum and Bassick as competitors.

Speaking of the opposition men in New York, General Hughes declared that there was a ring of British agents in New York which set to work to defame everybody who would not deal with them.

He stated that Colonel Allison's services had been refused by the British government at a time when Allison had options which would have saved the British government one hundred million dollars.

#### ANOTHER REBEL GETS LIFE TERM

Dublin, May 31.—Professor John McNeill, president of the Sinn Fein volunteers, has been found guilty of complicity in the Irish rebellion. He was sentenced to imprisonment for life.

#### MRS. BLANCE STOPPED FIRE AT HAYS CREEK

While crossing Hays Creek bridge, she noticed fire smouldering between two of the planks and discovered that it was spreading along underneath. #### WHITEWASH

The report of the Bowser public accounts committee is just exactly along the lines expected. The evidence is neatly side-tracked and the report reads like a Tory platform oration. The Liberal charges in connection with the Parliament Buildings contracts were proven up to the hilt, McDonald simply being the go-between for the "hand-out" committee. The squandering of \$75,000 of the public money by Joe Matson, \$35,000 of which went to two of the Matsonian papers, also turned out just as the Liberals claimed. Matson was unable, or unwilling, to say where much of the money went. The Kitsilano deal was shown to have been carried through with an utter contempt for the laws of the province and the Dominion, while the Read rake-off of \$80,000 needs no further comment.

In short, the affairs of this province have been conducted in typically Tory fashion and the public are thoroughly aware of the fact, no matter how much white-wash may be spread by the Tory majority on the committee. One can easily imagine what a report by a Roblin committee on the Manitoba scandals would read like, and the Victoria report is exactly of the same character. A Roblin committee would have followed the same old plan of ignoring the evidence and would have reported that Mr. Kelly had made a remarkably good job of the Parliament Buildings, and considering the high cost of material and labor, the people of the province should congratulate themselves that the work had been done so cheaply. Now that Kelly, Roblin and the rest of the bunch are in different circumstances, the case is entirely altered.

#### ELECTION ENQUIRY

The session is drawing to a close, and the Tories are greatly relieved that they have been able to keep the Liberals from bringing Clancy and White to Victoria. However, the Sullivan wireless messages to Welsh are very eloquent in what they tell of the knowledge Welsh must have had of the transaction. Sullivan, in his evidence, said that he wirelessed Welsh to have the pluggers arrested, but the messages do not bear this out. They simply indicate that Sullivan had carried out his part of the bargain and it was up to Welsh and his associates to finish the job.

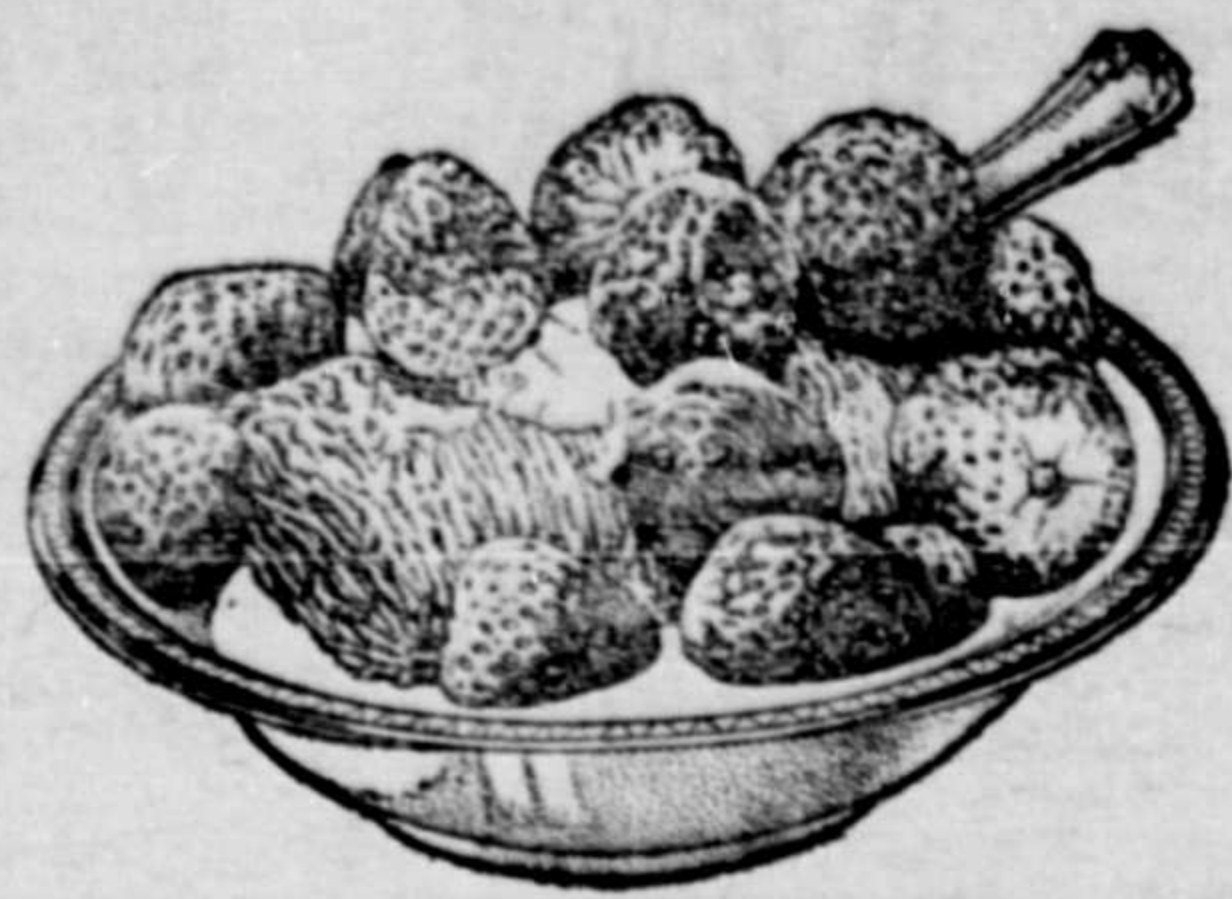
The affidavits of White and Clancy also tell much, though, naturally, the Bowser chairman, Miller, did not allow them to be taken as evidence. That was not the kind of evidence that the Bowserites wanted, therefore it could not be admitted. It is most unfortunate that Welsh destroyed the Sullivan letters, as, in conjunction with the wireless messages, they would have made interesting reading. The people of Vancouver are thoroughly conversant with the why and the wherefore of the whole business, and they know just exactly Sullivan's position in the matter. When the people of Vancouver are called upon to express an opinion on the Bowser government, they will speak still more emphatically than they did at the by-election.

No shell reaches the trenches without passing before the eagle eyes of one hundred or more observers, while behind all the lynx-eyed, alert, and active testers stands a silent, imperturbable figure.

This man, says Frederick A. Talbot, in an article entitled "The Man Behind the Shells," in the latest War Budget, is the Government inspector. He is the warden of the man fighting in the trenches, and it is up to him to see that the soldier secures the very best material that human activity can contrive in the form of ammunition. His word is final; there is no appeal from his decision.

The work of the inspector commences from the moment the contract is placed. The official watches the "run," and when the metal is cold a small sample is snipped off and passed on to his chemist for analysis. Every successive stage through which it is passed is dogged relentlessly by the representative of the government. The safety of the fighting men hangs upon his verdict.—Exchange.

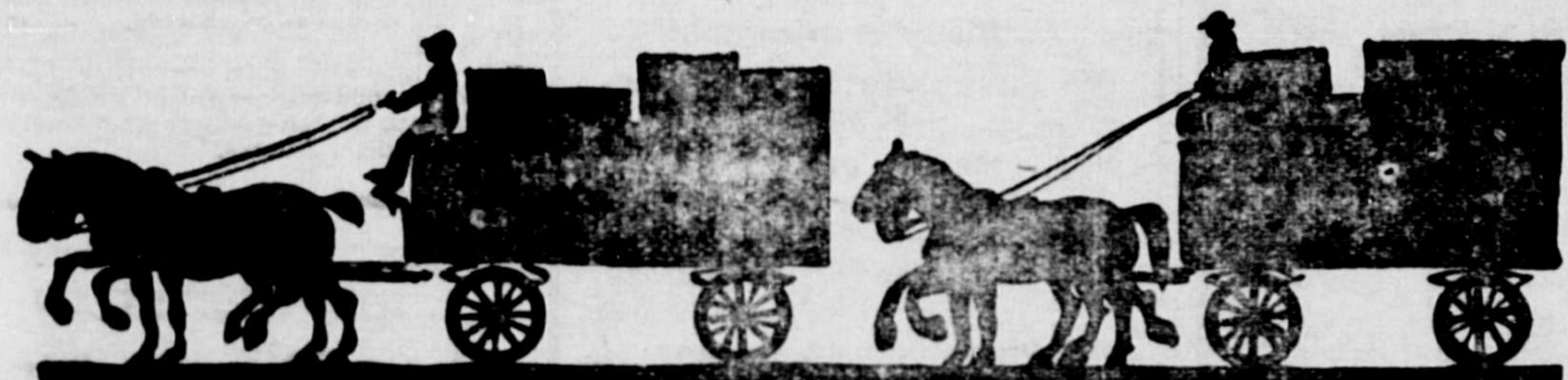

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the home of the consumer.

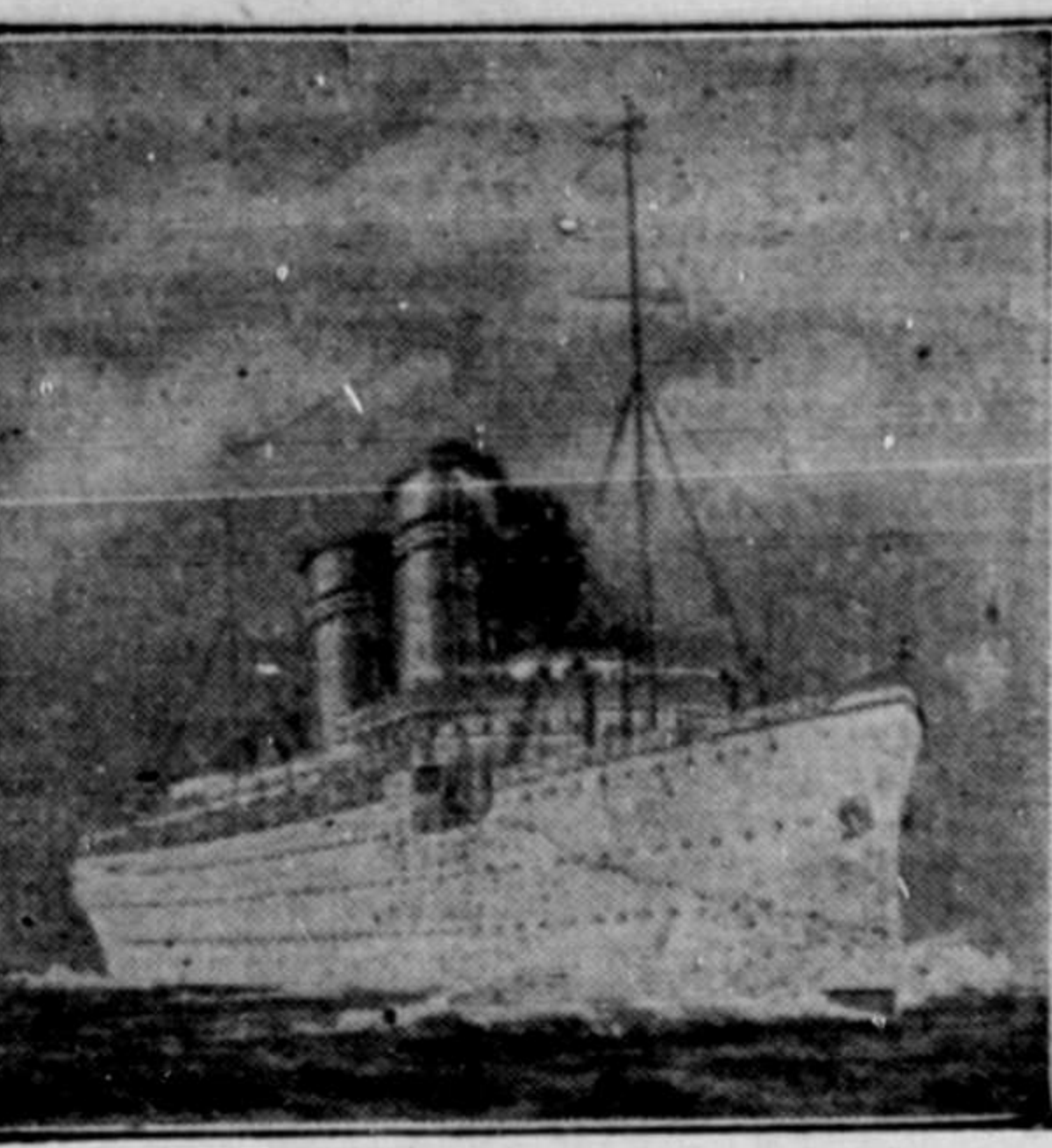
