SENSATIONAL EVIDENCE AT FUSE ENQUIRY --- IMPORTANT LETTERS PRODUCED

FRENCH FORCE TAKES STRONG HUN POSITION

Terrific Bombardment on Verdun Correspondence Produced Show-Front-French Take Guns and Prisoners-Italians are set Back.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 1 .- The French turned to the offensive against the Germans and have enemy position on the slopes southwest of Le Mort Homme. The French captured seven machine guns and two hundred and twenty-five prisoners.

Heavy Bombardment.

The town of Avocourt and Hill 304 and the immediate vicinity are under a heavy bombardment by the Germans, who are using shells of extra large calibre.

Bombardments are also in progress north of Verdun from the Meuse to Fort Vaux and from the Vosges mountains to the Hartmanns and Weilerkopf regions.



A GOVERNOR WHO GOVERNS

The Hon, Frank S. Barnard, Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, evidently needs a sharp reminder from Ottawa that his part in the constitutional plan is to sign laws, not to make them. It is reported that he has refused to permit the Bowser government, which must go to the country by effluxion of time at the end of the month, to send the prohibition question to the electors to be settled by a plebiscite unless some provision for compensation is attached to the measure. Unless the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia owns a brewery this is a most extraordinary position to take. The Globe can scarcely believe that Mr. Barnard has been so ill-advised as to attempt to hold up the proposed temperance measure on so untenable grounds.

The Lieutenant - Governor would clearly be within his right in refusing any longer to retain Mr. Bowser as his premier in face of the recent election returns in Vancouver and Victoria. 
