BIG NAVAL BATTLE IN NORTH SEA TODAY

GERMANS HAVE CHANGED TACTICS AT VERDUN—TURKS ARE ON THE OFFENSIVE

GERMANS HAVE ALTERED THEIR LINE OF ATTACK

Terrific Fighting Continues—The French Hold Huns Except at One Point—Austrians Are Repulsed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 2.—The Germans have switched their offensive from the region of Le Mort Homme, northwest of Verdun, to the sector between Thiamont farm and Fort Vaux, northeast of the fortress.

They have succeeded in entering the French first line trenches between Fort Douamont and Vaux pond. The attack, which was made over a two-mile front, was preceded by violent artillery preparations.

The French met German onslaughts with machine guns and succeeded in holding back the enemy forces everywhere except between Douamont and the Vaux pond. Heavy losses were inflicted upon the Germans.

Austrians Repulsed.

The Italians have repulsed the Austrian attacks along the Tyrol front. Severe fighting has taken place in the regions of Rosina Torrent and southeast of Arsiero, where the Austrians have either been stopped or repulsed in disorder.

Lively artillery duels continue in the Lagarina Valley and between Rosina and the Upper Astorio River.

POLITICS IN TRENCHES WOULD BE DISASTROUS

In discussing the Canadian idea of holding political elections in the trenches, the Daily Chronicle says: "Some commanding officers hold strongly to the conviction that it would be disastrous from the point of view of discipline and harmony on the firing line to sow the seeds of political discord on domestic affairs among the battalions."

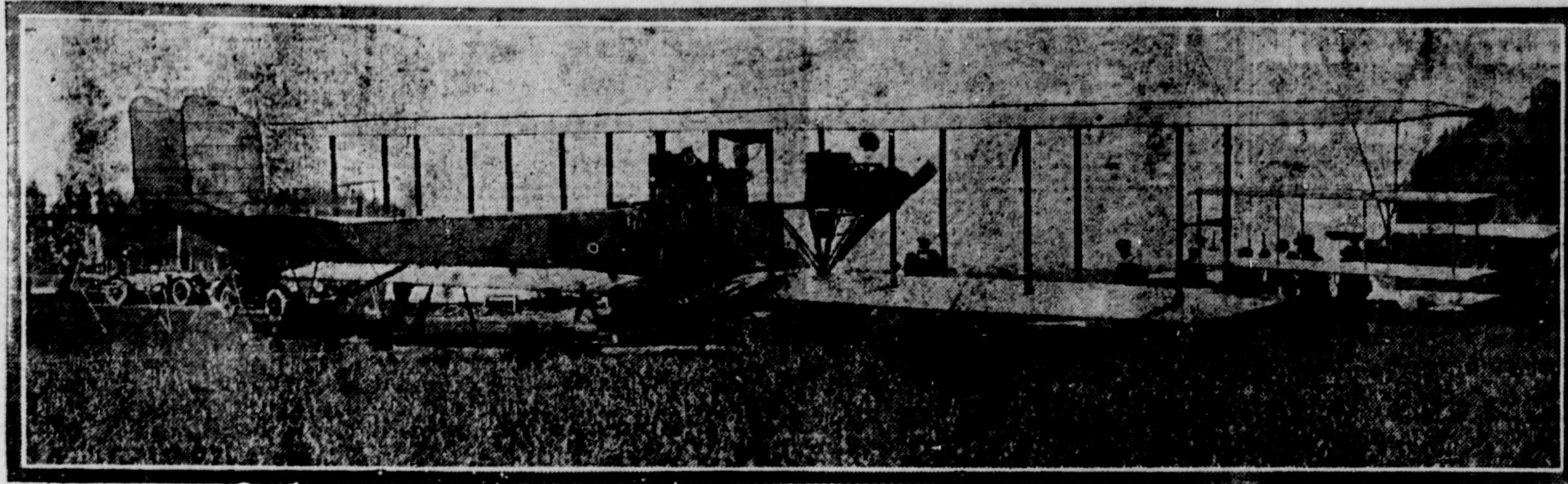

BOWSER'S POSITION SIMILAR TO ROBLIN'S

Editor News, Prince Rupert,

Sir:—Now that the legislature has dissolved I would like to say a word to the people of this district as to the attempt of the Bowser machine to paint the Liberal party as black as every thinking person in the province knows the Bowser machine to be.

Naval Battle in the North Sea

London, June 2.—The British Admiralty announces that a naval battle occurred in the North Sea today between the British and German fleets. The official message admits that the British lost four cruisers and one battleship, while the Germans lost three battleships and some torpedo boats.

HARRY PRICE BOUGHT THE ELECTION WHISKY

Victoria, May 30.—Denial of the story told by Harry Price, a Conservative worker here, who claimed he had nothing to do with ordering the liquor for the blind-pig, was given this morning by A. J. Morton, former sales manager of the Hudson's Bay store. He said that on the day before the Victoria by-election the soldier, McBride, came and said he had been sent by Price to order six gallons of whisky. Morton decided to see Price. He did so and told him about McBride. Price said: "Oh, six gallons is too much; make it two gallons."

Later he raised the quantity to four. The witness afterwards to the committee characterized Price's denial of having anything to do with the liquor as a lie. This was relative to Price's statement that the company had no right to charge the liquor to him. He said McBride had bought liquor from the company before and there had been trouble in collecting for it. McBride distinctly said that Price sent him for the whisky. McBride was never billed, the bills were sent to Price. Morton thought McBride was only a messenger. Morton said he did not have the slightest idea then what the liquor was for.

BUSH FIRES STILL RAGING IN INTERIOR

The bush fires which have been raging along the line of the G. T. P. for the past few days still continue and the company has had a strenuous time in saving several of their stations from being wiped out. Special trains of fire fighters were sent from various points to help the men of the forestry department in fighting the flames. It was discovered last night that fire had wiped out the bridge on this side of Lake Kathryn and a special party of bridge men was rushed from Prince Rupert. It is expected that they will have the bridge rebuilt today in time to allow of the passenger train from the east getting through.

DRASTIC ACTION BY THE LIBERAL LEADER

Victoria, June 2.—H. C. Brewster, the Liberal leader, yesterday afternoon issued a writ asking the Supreme Court to issue an order proclaiming illegal everything transacted by the Legislature of British Columbia since March 15th, when the term of the Legislature was extended.

Mr. Brewster is also requesting that action be taken to compel the premier to make restitution of some thirty million dollars which he charges has been illegally spent on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

INTERESTING LIQUOR CASE IN WINNIPEG

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, June 2.—The Hudson's Bay Company refuses to close its retail liquor store and has displayed liquor for sale contrary to the Prohibition Act.

The government has accepted the challenge and the attorney-general's department has ordered the confiscation of the stock of liquor amounting to one thousand dollars. Instructions were also given forbidding the wholesaling of liquor by the company.

It is understood that the Hudson's Bay Company invited action by the government as a test case, involving the question of the privileges of the company to trade without interference.

The company hold that they are acting within their rights according to the deed of surrender of 1870. The company will take action against the government in the civil courts for interfering with their rights. No matter which way the decision goes the matter will undoubtedly go before the Privy Council.

HEAVY SALMON ARRIVALS FROM ISLANDS

The Lillian M. came in last evening with 14,000 pounds of spring salmon and a deck load of 4,000 pounds of halibut. The halibut was bought by the Atlin Fisheries, as also were the fares of the Alliance, with 10,000; the Annie St. Leon, with 7,000, while the Zorra had 10,000. The price was 7% cents.

The Virtue B. brought in 6,000 pounds of spring salmon from Dundas Island. None of the salmon has yet been disposed of, but sales will be effected this afternoon.

This morning, the Niagara brought in 11,000 pounds of halibut; the Thelma, 24,000 and the Lincoln 12,000.

TURKS ARE NOW ON OFFENSIVE IN ASIA MINOR

Russians Evacuate One Position But Repel Other Attacks—Turks Strongly Reinforced by Germans.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 2.—The Turks are now taking the offensive in Asia Minor and have brought the Russian advance to a standstill. All the Turkish attacks have been repulsed except at Mamakhatum, forty miles west of Erzerum, which has been evacuated by the Russians.

Attempts by the Turks who have been heavily reinforced by the Austrians and Germans, to drive back the Russians near Baiburt and Diarbekr have failed.

Russian Front.

Artillery engagements and rifle work by the infantry is in progress along the entire Russian front, but there is no change in the positions of the respective armies.

New York Report.

New York, June 2.—It is reported that British warships have bombarded the Greek port of Nauplia and that part of the city has been destroyed by fire.

The Greek government has protested to the Allied governments. Nauplia was at one time the capital of Greece and its fortifications were considered impregnable. No explanation has been given as to the cause of the bombardment.

UNITED STATES WILL NOT WITHDRAW TROOPS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, June 2.—The United States will not withdraw its troops from Mexico until the Carranza authorities are able to demonstrate that they have sufficient control of the situation to be able to protect citizens of the United States along the border.

POLITICAL CRIME

The report of the Vancouver election enquiry committee has been brought down, and, like the public accounts committee report, it is presented in the best Tory style. The most important part of the business depends upon the outcome of the Gosden trial, but, meantime, the authorities are in duty bound to follow up the evidence given at the enquiry and take proceedings against the men who are really responsible for the paying of money to the men from Seattle.

The enquiry, of course, was not carried on in the interests of clean politics, but simply with the intention of black-guarding the Liberal party and particularly M. A. Macdonald. Now that the enquiry is over, the real work of cleaning up should start, and the first proceeding should be the taking of extradition proceedings against J. T. Scott, who is reported to be in Seattle.

If, as Bowser claims, there is sufficient evidence against Scott to warrant his being tried on a criminal charge, every effort should be made to bring the culprit to Victoria to stand trial. Far more important than the political aspect of this matter is the slur which it casts upon the province of British Columbia. Throughout Canada this province has earned a most unsavoury reputation in the past few years, and it is up to the authorities to leave no stone unturned to get to the very root of the matter. The evidence of the Seattle "pluggers" and their friends is merely the surface showing. At the bottom of the whole despicable business are the men who put up the money for the scheme. These men, no matter how high up they may be, should be brought to justice and sentenced to the terms

they have earned. If the matter is left as it is, with nothing done in the way of punishment, excepting the sentence passed upon Annance at the instigation of the Liberals, the slur will remain on the fair name of British Columbia so long as there is a government in this province.

Bowser has talked loudly of his pride in the fair name of the province of British Columbia. Let him show, by the work of his department, that his talk is not political piffle. Let him set the law to work to ferret out every tittle of real evidence in connection with the dastardly affair, and to bring the real miscreants to the dock. Justice demands it: the fair name of the province demands it; the people demand it, and the Liberal party demands it, for they are not afraid to face the truth, knowing that their skirts are clean.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The great Tory bombardment of the Liberal positions is over and the infantry attacks are about to begin. Their own record being indefensible, they have made up their minds that attack is the only safe means of defence. The Liberals are firmly entrenched behind the ramparts of honesty; the people are behind them, and they are certain of the verdict.

T. D. Pattullo, in a letter in this issue, hits the nail on the head when he says that Scott was a Tory traitor in the Liberal ranks.

The Tories carefully omitted to find out where the money to pay for the Seattle pluggers came from. The Liberal Association treasurer proved that it was impossible for it to have come from Liberal party funds, as the party had no funds, but Miller cut off

BISHOP DU VERNET IN NECHACO VALLEY

Bishop Du Vernet has been visiting the Nechaco Valley and last Sunday held service and administered the Holy Communion in the new church at Chilco which has been built largely through the efforts of the settlers who gave freely of their time and labor in getting out logs and erecting the building. While there is still more to be done before the building is completed, it was a great pleasure to the people to gather together in this first church building for white people in the whole of the Nechaco Valley.

It is now about two years since the Rev. Edwin Gillman, who is in charge of this church, settled in the Nechaco Valley. Then the settlers were very few and far between, but now there is quite a large and growing settlement, perhaps the most promising farming community in Northern British Columbia. Forest fires have been raging in various parts of the Nechaco Valley, also along the Stuart river, and some of the settlers have been fighting to save their cabins. A few dwellings and many miles of fencing have been destroyed.

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

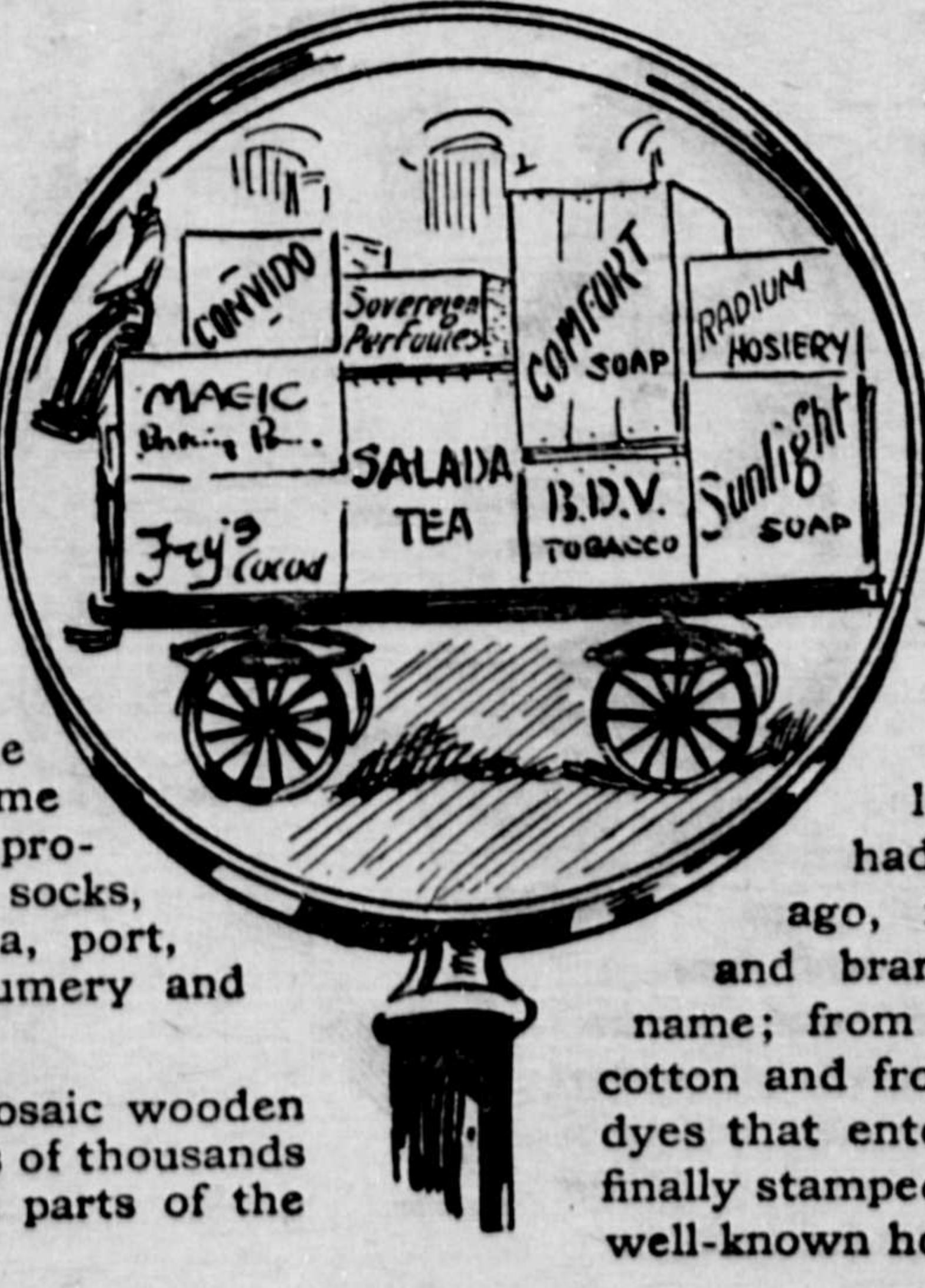
There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months.
