Ottawa, May 31.—The most interesting part of the fuse enquiry has been the cross examination of Sir Sam Hughes. At the outset of today's proceedings, the correspondence which passed between the Shell Committee and D. A. Thomas, representing the Minister of Munitions, was produced.

The following clause from a letter to the committee from D. A. Thomas is eloquent as to the reason for his visit to Canada:

"As I have already intimated to you, the Minister of Munitions considers that the prices allotted to the Shell Committee in the past have been too high, and had indicated his view that the alloca-* tion of further orders to Canada * will depend on the extent to which * Canadian prices can be brought in line with others."


