RUSSIAN VICTORY WAS OVERWHELMING

FORTY THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN -- AUSTRALIAN SUCCESS ON WEST FRONT

OVERWHELMING VICTORY ON THE RUSSIAN FRONT

Forty Thousand Men, Nine Hundred Officers and Large Quantities of Guns and War Material Taken.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, June 8.—It is officially announced that the Russians, in their big new offensive movement on a two hundred and fifty mile front, extending from the River Pripet to the Rumanian frontier, have thus far captured nine hundred officers, forty thousand men, seventy-seven big guns, one hundred and thirty-four machine guns and forty-nine bombthrowers, besides a large quantity of searchlights, telephones, field kitchens. In addition to these, the Russians have become possessed of large quantities of arms, war material and great reserves of ammunition.

Caucasus Front.

On the Caucasus front, where large bodies of Turks have been determinedly attacking the Grand Duke's army in the vicinity of Erzivan, the Russian artillery has been successful in stopping the offensive of the enemy.

Austrian Admissions.

The Hotel Rupert bulletin says that the Austrians admit that the Russian offensive is overwhelming.

LEADERS SQUABBLE AT CHICAGO CONVENTION

(Special to The Daily News.)

Chicago, June 8.—The Republican and Progressive Conventions assembled today but there is no marked change in the situation.

The leaders held a conference but failed to agree on a candidate who would receive the support of both factions. There are rumors of peace, however.

Some republican leaders felt today that the Convention might not proceed with the nominations until Friday or even later.

If Hughes is nominated, it is believed that Roosevelt will himself become a candidate, as he is opposed to Hughes.

AUSTRALIANS TOOK TRENCHES AT WAR OFFICE

Small German Success at Village of Hooge—Australians Took Prisoners at Boisgrenier—Berlin Report.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 8.—There is a continuance of the heavy artillery bombardment by both sides at Ypres. In the fighting yesterday, the enemy captured our front trenches running through the ruins of the village of Hooge. Other attacks by the Germans were repulsed.

Australian Success.

The Australian troops, who distinguished themselves in the Gallipoli fighting, have entered the German trenches east of Boisgrenier, inflicting losses on the enemy and capturing prisoners.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, June 8.—An official statement issued by the German war office says that Fort Vaux, one of the defences of Verdun which has been the cause of many days of bloody fighting, has been captured by the Germans. What remained of the French garrison finally surrendered.

The French made an effort to relieve the fort on Tuesday, which resulted in the capture by the Germans of seven hundred unwounded prisoners.

FUNERAL SERVICES OF EDWARD VENN

The funeral services for Edward Venn, the young organist of St. Paul's Church, Metlakatlah, took place at his native village on Tuesday, and were conducted by Major Morrison.

The choir, which was in deep mourning, rendered a special anthem and all the villagers were present. Deceased was one of the most highly respected and deeply loved young men of the district. He was an ardent church worker, never missing a service, while he was also a great help in conducting the Sunday School. He willingly gave his services as organist without fee or any expectation of reward. He is greatly missed by all, his death having cast a deep gloom over Metlakatlah.

LIEUT. W. S. MARSHALL AT COL. MARSHALL'S FUNERAL

Lieut. W. S. Marshall was able to attend the funeral of his brother, Colonel Marshall, who was killed recently at the front. The eastern exchanges contain long accounts of the burial services, which must have been very impressive. Officers and men of all ranks and all units of the Canadian forces were there. The pipe bands played the march and the firing party was made up of men from the various Canadian battalions. The late Col. Marshall won the D. S. O. for his gallantry at the earlier battle of Ypres.

SERGEANT NEVILLE LOOKS FIT AND WELL

Sergeant "Jimmy" Neville arrived from Victoria on the Prince George this morning, looking remarkably fit, though he still walks with a slight limp.

"Jimmy" is no stranger to warfare, having had experience before in several parts of the world. He now carries on his left breast an added strip of ribbon, the new piece being made up of the colors of the Allies. The exact ribbon for the medal for the present war has not yet been decided upon, but meantime, it is a combination of the French, Belgian, Russian, British and Italian colors.

The sergeant states emphatically that Captain "Don" Moore is dead and that there is no possibility of his having been taken prisoner by the Germans. He is certain that "Don" sleeps peacefully in the orchard at Festubert.

"Jimmy" saw Crippen just before he was killed. He says "Crip" passed him, carrying a supply of bombs and that shortly afterwards, the gallant little "Crip" blew up a German machine gun. His bombs disposed of, he dug in for shelter and almost immediately was killed by a rifle bullet.

W. J. Guiney, of Hazelton, accompanied Sergeant Neville north. Mr. Guiney was wounded at Festubert and Givenchy.

LIEUT. GERALD PETERS IS REPORTED MISSING

City Solicitor Fred Peters has received official notice that his son, Lieut. Gerald Peters, is missing. Gerald just recently earned his Lieutenantcy and must just have returned to the front shortly before the recent heavy action. I am sincerely hoped that he will yet be reported safe, even if a prisoner.

BOWSER SPOKE AT NANAIMO LAST NIGHT

Vancouver, June 8.—Premier Bowser, speaking at Nanaimo last night, stated that the writ issued by H. C. Brewster would undo the work of the Legislature. He said that if the writ were successful it would result in the perpetuation of a dictatorship worse than Russia. He, Bowser, would be the absolute dictator of the province.

GOSDEN CASE

Victoria, June 8.—The Gosden perjury case went to the jury at seven o'clock last night. There was no verdict at midnight, when the jury was locked up for the night.

NATIONAL MOURNING

Ottawa, June 8.—All the officers of the Canadian Forces will wear mourning and all flags on military buildings in the Dominion of Canada will remain at half-mast up to and including the 14th of June, in memory of Lord Kitchener.

WHY?

The Royal Commission now sitting at Ottawa is investigating only four contracts let by the late Canadian Shell Committee to United States firms; only this and nothing more. A contract with the International Arms & Fuse Co. for 2,500,000 fuses. A contract with the American Ammunition Co. for 2,500,000 fuses. An alleged or abortive contract with the Edwards Valve Company of Chicago for cartridge cases.

A negotiated contract or negotiations with the Providence Chemical Co. of St. Louis, for supplies of picric acid. These contracts amounted to some \$22,000,000. The Canadian Shell Committee handled altogether contracts amounting to over \$300,000,000. The scope of the Royal Commission is restricted rigidly to these United States contracts—LESS THAN ONE-TWELFTH of the total business of the Shell Committee.

By the terms of its commission from the Borden government, it can not and must not go any further. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's demand was for Parliamentary investigation of ALL business of the Shell Committee. Voted down by the Borden majority in the House. A later demand by Liberals for extension of the scope of the Commission; also voted down.

ASQUITH HAS TAKEN CHARGE OF WAR OFFICE

Premier Conducts Affairs Until Appointment is Made—Derby Would Give Satisfaction, Says Graphic.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 8.—Premier Asquith has temporarily taken personal charge at the war office. There is reason to believe that Field Marshal Sir John French has been offered the position of Secretary of State for War in succession to Lord Kitchener.

The Daily Graphic declares that the new war minister should be a civilian and that Lord Derby, the former director of recruiting, would give most satisfaction.

German East Africa.

Brigadier-General Worthey's column has pursued the East African Germans to New Utengula, capturing booty and prisoners. The German commandant has been taken prisoner.

The natives, who had become completely demoralized, extended a hearty welcome to the British force.

HOW SIR SAM HUGHES INFLUENCED ORDERS

Ottawa, May 31.—The most interesting part of the fuse enquiry has been the cross examination of Sir Sam Hughes. At the outset of today's proceedings, the correspondence which passed between the Shell Committee and D. A. Thomas, representing the Minister of Munitions, was produced.

The following clause from a letter to the committee from D. A. Thomas is eloquent as to the reason for his visit to Canada:

"As I have already intimated to you, the Minister of Munitions considers that the prices allotted to the Shell Committee in the past have been too high, and had indicated his view that the allocation of further orders to Canada will depend on the extent to which Canadian prices can be brought in line with others."

Sir Sam produced a lengthy written statement as to the services rendered by Colonel Allison to the Empire, but the Commissioners did not admit it as evidence, as it had no bearing upon the case on hand. Sir Sam handed the statement to the press. After denying all knowledge of the letters and telegrams from Colonel Webb, offering to make fuses for \$3.50 and \$3.75, Sir Sam went on to state that he had never interfered in the slightest in the placing of contracts by the committee.

HUGHES-ALLISON

It is an encouraging sign of the rise of public indignation against war profiteers that the Conservative press generally refuses to follow the Toronto News in seeking to pillory Messrs. Carvell and Kite for bringing about the fuse inquiry. The endeavor of Col. Allison and his friends to spread abroad the idea that Mr. Carvell had been employing pro-German law firms in the United States to pry into the secrets of munition making has failed. The prompt serving of notice of libel actions upon the papers which assisted in the work of slandering Mr. Carvell has brought about a change of tactics. Messrs. Kite and Carvell are now declared to be lacking in patriotism, in that they are diverting the time and attention of the Minister of Militia and the leading officials of his department from the work of organizing Canada's overseas forces to the safeguarding of their own honor before the court of inquiry.

The Montreal Mail, the managing director of which is a very strong Conservative and a half-brother of the Minister of Finance, refuses to "sand-bag" Messrs. Carvell and Kite at the suggestion of The Toronto News. It says: "The Daily Mail has no particular use for Mr. Kite, who made the charges, and it has still less for F. B. Carvell, who is exploiting them. The fact remains that enough has already come to light at the Meredith-Duff inquiry to prove that Mr. Kite would have done the country a disservice if he had failed to bring to the attention of Parliament and the country the information which was placed in his hands. Enough has been brought out to lend credibility to his charges and to the inferences which the public drew from them. The disclosures thus far have proved the imperative necessity of delving deeper into

the Allison transactions. That is enough to warrant Mr. Kite's action in putting his case before the House. It is not enough to justify positive or sweeping conclusions one way or the other. The case is still 'sub judice,' and it is strange that the party press is permitted to draw such positive conclusions which have no other object than to mislead and bewilder the public."

The truth is that the appearance of Col. Allison in so many transactions between the Shell Committee, the Militia Department, and the seekers for war contracts has led the public generally, irrespective of politics, to believe that, in the opinion of would-be contractors, Allison's "pull" was a marketable commodity. If the Minister of Militia persists in sticking to his "Intervener-General" the people will assuredly demand at the close of the inquiry that a new Minister be appointed. A continuation of the Hughes-Allison dictatorship will not be tolerated.—Toronto Globe.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Once more the German attack on Verdun has failed. If they just keep this sort of warfare up long enough there will be no need for a general Allied offensive on the western front, as the Germans will soon batter themselves to pieces.

Sam Hughes, instead of giving evidence before the Meredith-Duff commission, seemed to think that a lecture upon the high qualities of Colonel Allison as a price-getter was sufficient. Sam came to earth with a thump when some of his own correspondence was produced.

The Canadians seem to have defended their lines with the utmost bravery in the recent Ypres fighting, but there is no mention of their having brought machine guns to play upon the advancing

RAILROAD BATTALION IS NOW BEING FORMED

Arrangements are now well under way for the recruiting of the B. C. Railroaders' Battalion for active service. Col. J. W. Stewart, who is now in Ottawa completing arrangements, will take active command of the battalion. J. B. L. Macdonald, the well known contractor, has charge of recruiting and he hopes to be able to enlist a full battalion of 1,200 men from the various railroad centres in the province, including Prince Rupert.

Mr. Macdonald states that track layers, graders, bridgemen, trainmen, engineers and men of practically every line of railroad work will be needed. The battalion will be engaged in construction and operating work in connection with transportation lines at the front.

HOW SIR SAM HUGHES INFLUENCED ORDERS

A most convincing reply to this evidence was brought out in the form of letters from General Hughes himself to General Bertram requesting favorable consideration to particular individuals in the placing of orders. Among the persons recommended to General Bertram for an order was General Hughes' own brother-in-law, Dr. MacAlpin, of Lindsay. In another letter to General Bertram he wrote: "This will introduce to you Mr. Charles Burgoyne, of Fenelon Falls, in my riding. He is desirous of securing a contract for the manufacture of boxes for shells. I wish you would give him full plans, specifications and prices complete for said boxes. He is thoroughly reliable in every sense. Thanking you for your goodness. Faithfully, (signed) Sam Hughes."

Sir Sam's reply to the reading of the above and several other letters asking for consideration for friends in the granting of shell orders was that letters had been stolen and that men had "broken into our offices." He said he had affidavits to prove this statement, but did not offer to produce any proof.

Messrs. Carvell and Markey, against whom he directed the charges, indignantly denied the charges and asserted that all the documents had been got legitimately, many of the letters having been sent to them through the mails by anonymous senders. "A satisfactory explanation," said Sir William Meredith.

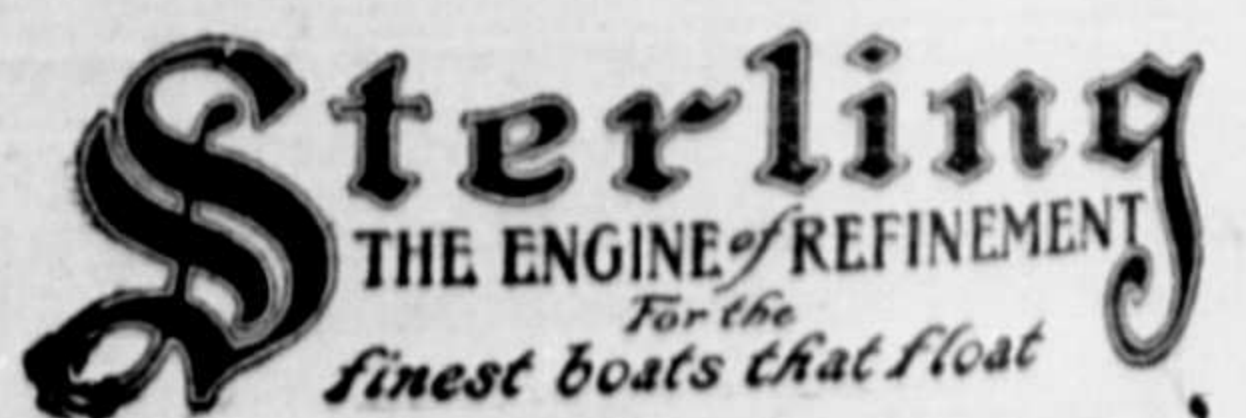

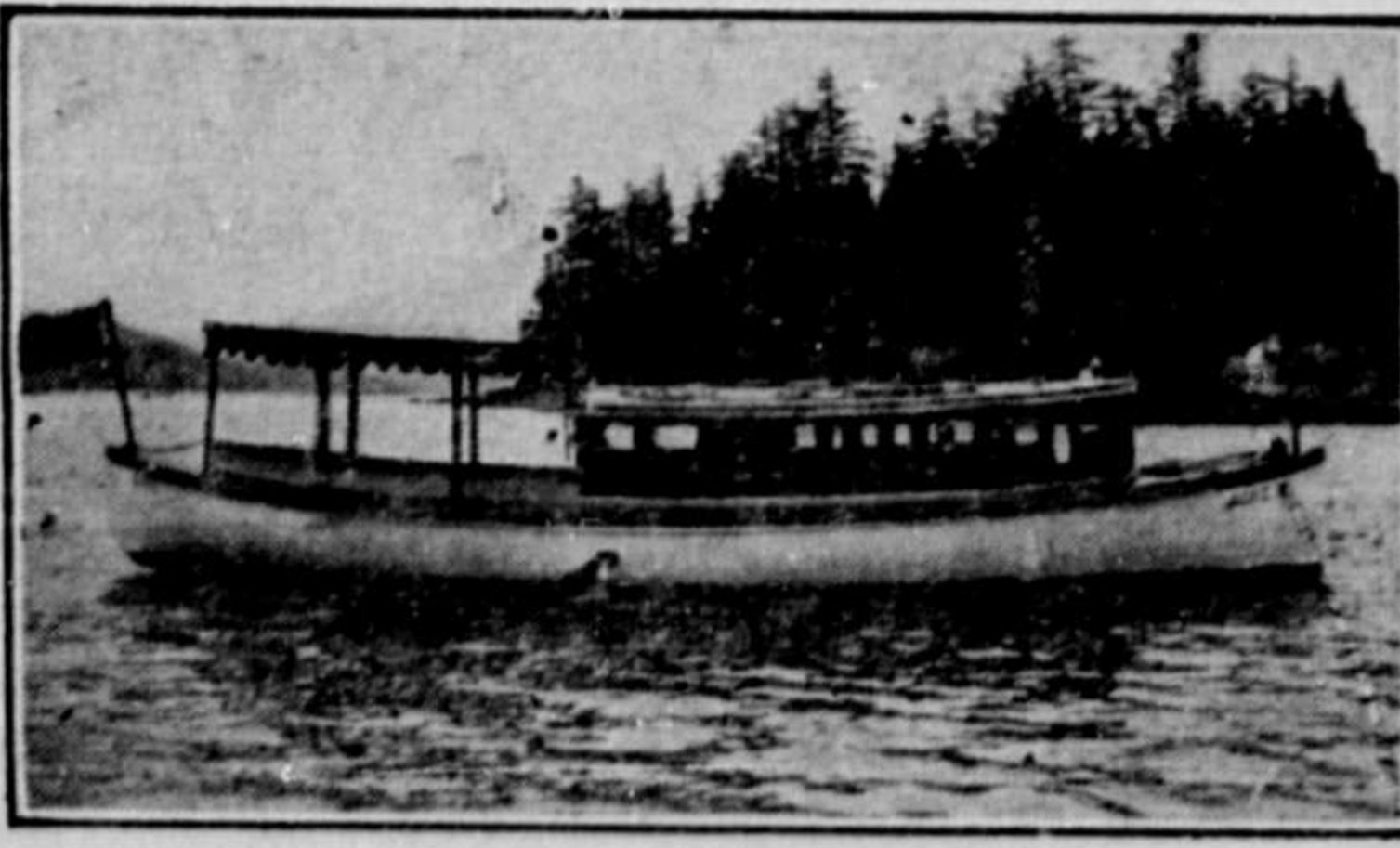

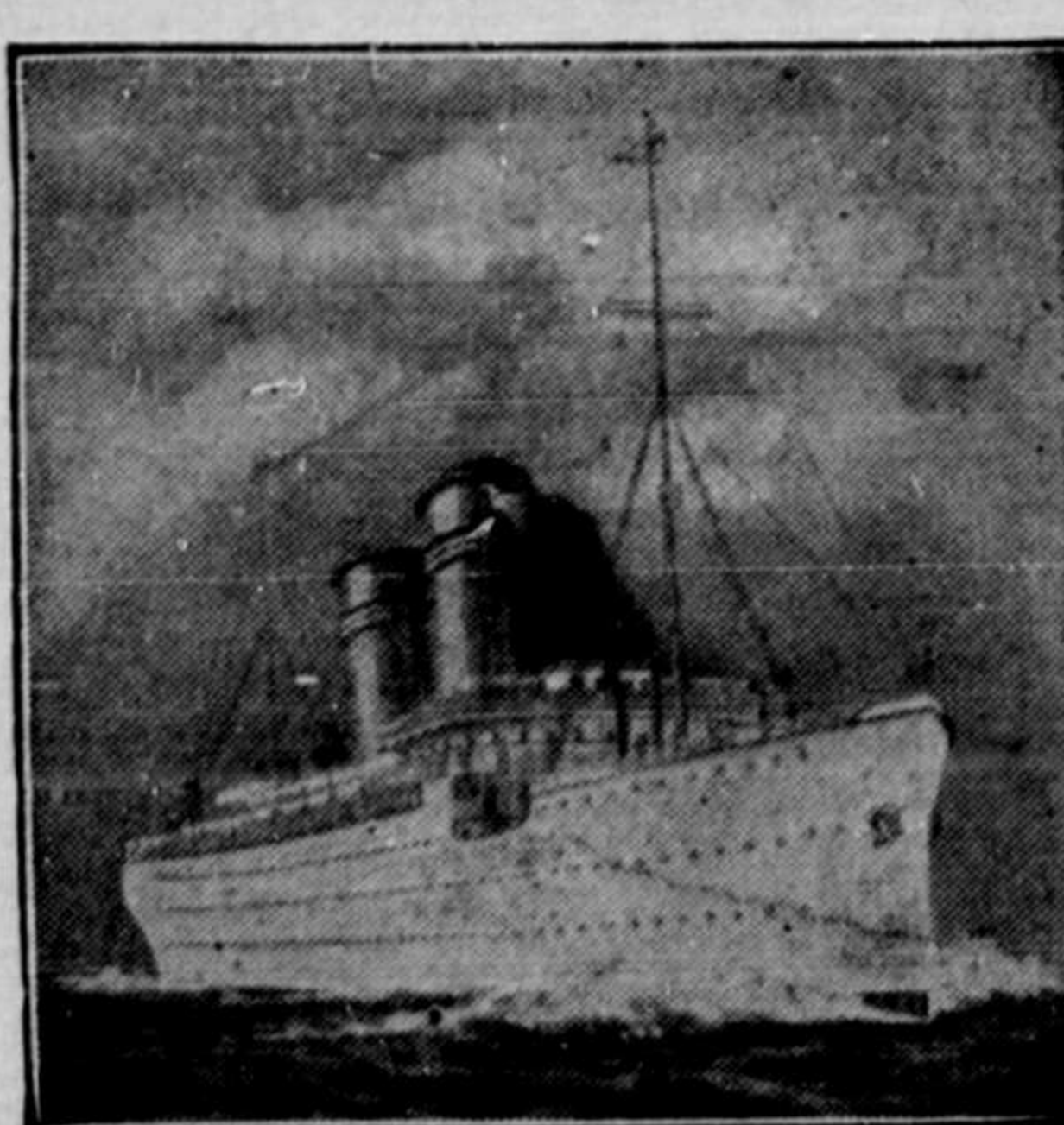
