## RUSSIANS RE-CAPTURE DUBNO FORTRESS

### HUNDRED THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN -- HEAVY CANADIAN CASUALTY LISTS

#### RUSSIANS TAKE OVER HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN

Dubno Fort retaken and Austrians are Retreating Westward—Austrians Reinforced by Germans.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 12.—From the Wod region in the southwest of Russia to the Rumanian frontier the Russians are keeping up their tremendous offensive against the Austro-Hungarians, who have been reinforced on several sectors by Germans.

The Russians under General Brusiloff, in the week which has just elapsed, report that they have captured one hundred and eight thousand officers and men and have forced back their antagonists from their organized lines in the region of the Volhynian triangle and along their entire front to the Rumanian border.

#### Dubno Taken.

Having previously taken Lutsk, the Russians have now retaken Dubno, the second of the Volhynian triangle of forts held by the Austrians since last summer, and are now pressing hard on the retreating Austrians who are travelling westward.

In yesterday's fighting on the Volhynian and Galician fronts the official Russian statement says that they took four hundred officers and thirty-five thousand men and also captured thirty guns and enormous quantities of booty.

#### Stubborn Resistance.

The Austrians are putting up a stubborn resistance all along the eastern battle front, especially east of Lolki, north of Lutsk, where they have forced back the Russian advance parties across the Sty River, and in the region of Torgovitsy, on the Sty, south of Lutsk, where a bloody battle is in progress.



#### CANADA'S GREATEST CRIMINAL TRIAL—THE MANITOBA PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS GRAFT CASES

The trial before Mr. Justice Prendergast and a jury at the Winnipeg assizes, commences this week, of three ex-ministers of the Manitoba cabinet, Contractor Kelly and Lt.-Col. (Dr.) R. M. Simpson (who is not in the above group) on charges of conspiracy to defraud Manitoba in connection with the construction of the new Parliament Buildings in Winnipeg. The charges are that Contractor Kelly "overclassified" his work in the Parliament Buildings to the extent of several hundred thousand dollars, and the ex-ministers are charged with conspiracy to defraud. When the charges were brought up the Roblin government resigned. Contractor Kelly awaited trial in jail and the ex-ministers were out on \$50,000 bail each. Hon. Mr. Coldwell is now paymaster of a Brandon overseas battalion and Dr. Simpson, who will be tried at another court at the same time, is now chief medical officer at Camp Hughes. Hon. Dr. Montague, who was also a member of the Roblin government, has died since the charges were laid.

#### ITALIAN CABINET TENDERS RESIGNATION

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 12.—The Italian cabinet, headed by Premier Salandra, has resigned. The action resulted from the failure of the Italian Chamber of Deputies to pass a vote of confidence in the government following its presentation by the Minister of the Interior.

#### SCHOONER ARCTIC ARRIVED SATURDAY

The Arctic, a new halibut schooner which was built at Tacoma last winter, arrived on Saturday with 45,000 pounds, which went to the Atlin Company at 8 cents. The Arctic is under charter as a cannery tender for the summer and is on her way south for that purpose. She is commanded by Captain Sarnes, who is also part owner.

"Teddy" received the Progressive nomination for the presidency by acclamation and received 18 1/2 votes in the third ballot at the Republican Convention in Chicago on Saturday. Justice Hughes was nominated by the Republicans. The Progressives and Republicans were unable to settle their differences and taking the two parties together, Roosevelt has really more supporters than Hughes, but until Hughes has made an announcement regarding his platform "Teddy" will make no statement as to his intentions.

#### ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY MEMBER IS KILLED

St. Andrew's Society has lost the first of its members, killed in action, in the person of John S. Watt, familiarly known as "Jock" Watt. He was one of the draft which was rushed from Vernon to England last year and served with the Pioneers. "Jock" was one of the most popular of the Scotch boys in town and his death will leave a gap in the ranks of the society.

Amongst the wounded appears the name of David McCullough. "Dave" was formerly employed with the Pacific Cartage Ltd., and was well known in the district. He was drafted from the C. M. R. last year. It is hoped that his wounds are not serious.

#### MAQUINNA TOUCHED A ROCK LAST VOYAGE

The Princess Maquinna which left here for the south last night, will have to dock for over-haul and repairs. On her last trip north she struck bottom in "The Slue", one of the shallows in the North Skeena passage, denting several of her plates. She was examined before leaving for the north this trip and it was found that none of the plates were punctured and that she was quite seaworthy, but a more searching overhaul is desired by the company.

#### POLICE COURT

J. C. Gavigan, of the Rupert Table Supply, was fined \$2.00 this morning for keeping open after six thirty in the evening.

George P. McColl was called on a similar charge but brought a witness to prove that the store was closed at six thirty and that the customer who left shortly after that hour had entered the store before closing time. Judgment in this case was held over until tomorrow.

#### THOMSON PROVIDES POLITICAL PUZZLE

Victoria, June 6.—A new political puzzle has developed here. It is this: "What is H. B. Thomson after?" Thomson has turned down the premier's offer to make him minister of finance. Thomson is anti-prohibition, and fought the premier tooth and nail on this question in caucus. It is unauthoritatively stated that Thomson has demanded, in return for what influence he may bring to the Bowser machine after almost ruining things by his anti-Bowser activities, that he will go back with the bunch for nothing less than a senatorship.

It is reminded that it was a senatorship Dr. G. A. McGuire, of Vancouver, was after. He didn't get it, but was made provincial secretary. Thomson is said to be the most powerful Tory in this city, and feared by the premier. So, as the premier is ready to give Thomson about anything he wants, it would occasion no surprise if it should be announced he was selected for a senatorship—always provided, of course, he will agree to deliver up the liquor vote to the government.

#### FIGHTING PARSON AMONG CANADIANS

As details of the terrific fighting on the Canadian part of the western front come through, the fierceness of the conflict is more apparent. In the struggle in Sanctuary Wood, Captain Rev. R. H. M. Wilkins, a western man and Chaplain with the First Mounted Rifles, seized a rifle when the Germans pushed the front trenches and fired away at the advancing enemy. Later he used the bayonet to good purpose and finally discarded the weapon and went at the Germans with his fists and fell fighting like a hero. The story is told by an eye witness.

#### OTTAWA ISSUES A RECORD LIST OF CASUALTIES

Vast Majority on List are Wounded—Heavy Fighting at Ypres—Huns Again Repulsed on the Verdun Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, June 12.—Yesterday, the Canadian militia department issued its biggest casualty list since the war began. It contained a total of 581 names. Of these thirty-six were killed in action; nineteen died of wounds; one died from sickness; nine were seriously injured; thirty-six missing, and four hundred and eighty wounded.

#### Fighting at Ypres.

The British lines have been heavily bombarded, the Ypres salient, where the Canadians did such desperate fighting some days ago, being the chief scene of activity.

#### Verdun Front.

Paris, June 12.—The French official report says that three German infantry attacks against the French trenches on Hill 304 and positions east of that elevation in the Verdun sector have been completely repulsed.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, June 12.—The Italian official statement says that Austro-Hungarian forces, twelve thousand strong, yesterday attacked in mass formation the Italian positions on Montell Mirle, but were repulsed with very heavy losses. The Italian offensive recently started between the Adime River and Brenta is making progress at several points.

#### VOLANTE TOWED OUT OF PORT LAST NIGHT

The derelict Volante, which was brought into port last winter by the local halibut schooner Tuladi, was towed out last evening by the tug Tenshaw, of Ketchikan. All claims against the vessel have been settled. She has been taken over by K. L. Steberg, of Petersburg, Alaska.

**GETTING FROM UNDER**

There is a story told of an old colonel in the American civil war, who, when his men were cornered badly and were getting short of ammunition, told them to stay with it as long as they had a shot left, and added quietly "I'm a trifle lame, so I had better be going now."

That story pretty well sums up the situation in the Tory camp in British Columbia today, with this exception, it is the rank and file who are experiencing the "lameness" with its accompanying desire to "beat it." The surest indication of what is coming in this province is in the long list of retrials from the Conservative fighting forces.

Bowser, assisted by the well-fed party press, has done his utmost to put a bold face on matters and is fighting to the last ditch, but many of his former stand-bys are going while the going is good. There is a general rush for cover among those who prefer a whole skin or a job to last ditch fighting. Of course they are trying to make the retreat as orderly and gracefully as possible, but there is all the evidence of hurry in their movements and it would take very little to turn the retreat into a stampede.

Anything that looks like a comfortable salaried berth has been greedily snapped up and Sir Richard must be complacently smiling to himself as he reads the long list of defections. Since those fatal by-elections in Vancouver and Victoria, Sir Richard McBride must be congratulating himself that his luck is still with him so far.

Anything that looks or talks like Bowserism will be given a wide berth in British Columbia for years to come. Bowserism has sunk to such a level that even the men who have been feeding upon it are seeking new pastures new. There is a new era coming in British Colum-

bia; an era of clean, honest government, in which the province will be freed of a political growth which has befouled the very atmosphere, and in which British Columbia will get away to a new start industrially and commercially.



## SCANDINAVIANS TO MEET AT SPOKANE

In the May issue of "The Scandinavian Fraternity Review," the official organ for The Scandinavian Fraternity of America, appears a notice of a meeting to be held in Spokane, Wash., on the 29th inst.

The consolidation of the three large Scandinavian fraternal organizations, The Scandinavian Aid and Fellowship Society of America, The Scandinavian Brotherhood of America, and Skandinaviska Brodreforbundet af Amerika, was completed last summer. The new organization consists of eight Grand Lodges, of which Grand Lodge No. 7 and Grand Lodge No. 8 cover the western States and Provinces. As within the jurisdiction of each of these Grand Lodges there are lodges belonging to the other Grand Lodge, it is thought beneficial to the organization and the best interests of the new order to reorganize the Western Districts, and the meeting between delegates representing all interests, now called for the end of this month to be held in Spokane, is to decide and adjust these matters.

The B. C. district of the new order is to be represented at the meeting by John Dybhavn, of Prince Rupert, District President, and Emil Carlson, of Phoenix, District Secretary.

It is thought that this meeting will assign the Western lodges of Grand Lodge No. 8 to Grand Lodge No. 7, and that this Western Grand Lodge will be divided into two District Lodges, one for the coast, taking in Alaska, British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, and probably California, and one for the inland lodges in B. C., Idaho, Washington, Oregon and probably Montana.

## The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.
