SPEED OF ZEPPELINS FORTY MILES AN HOUR

"Not so many years ago a British engineering expert calculated that the Zeppelin could not attain a speed of thirty miles an hour, as he proved by figures that the ship would collapse under the air "Zeppelins and Super-Zeppelins,"

Today the tendency is to attribute too high a speed to the vessels. In still air it is doubtful if a higher speed than sixty-five miles an hour can be reached, and by the most careful calculation Mr. Hearne has come to the conclusion that the average speed of the modern Zeppelin in war

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber byloaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product-soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.
