GERMAN NAVAL DISASTER IN THE BALTIC

TWELVE MERCHANTMEN AND CRUISER SUNK -- RUSSIANS CROSS THE DNIESTER

TWELVE GERMAN MERCHANTMEN SUNK IN BALTIC

Russian Destroyers Smash Hun Merchant Fleet and Sink Cruiser—Canadian Success.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Nykoping, Sweden, June 15.—Thirteen German merchantmen from the north, convoyed by an auxiliary cruiser, torpedo boats and armed trawlers, were attacked by a squadron of Russian torpedo boats, destroyers and submarines near Hevringe, on the Swedish Baltic coast. The Germans lost twelve merchantmen, one auxiliary cruiser and one destroyer.

Canadian Success.

London, June 15.—The British and Canadian line on the western front has again been straightened out, our troops occupying their former positions. At Ypres yesterday, the Canadians retook the greater part of the ground lost on June 2nd, including the positions in Armagh wood and along Observatory Ridge, while the British troops along the front line have returned to their original location. The German losses in the fighting for this ground were heavy.

British in Persia.

General Sikes with a British column has entered Kerman, in southeastern Persia. This movement has been taken with a view to restoring order in British Persia. There have been minor disturbances in this area, the trouble being attributed to the activities of German and Turkish emissaries.

ASSEMBLY FAVORS UNION OF CHURCHES

Winnipeg, June 14.—The final vote on the question of church union, in the Presbyterian General Assembly, stood at 406 for and 88 against. A proposal to delay the proceedings for twelve months was voted down almost unanimously. This attitude on the part of the Presbyterian Church is a remarkable change from what has been in the past.

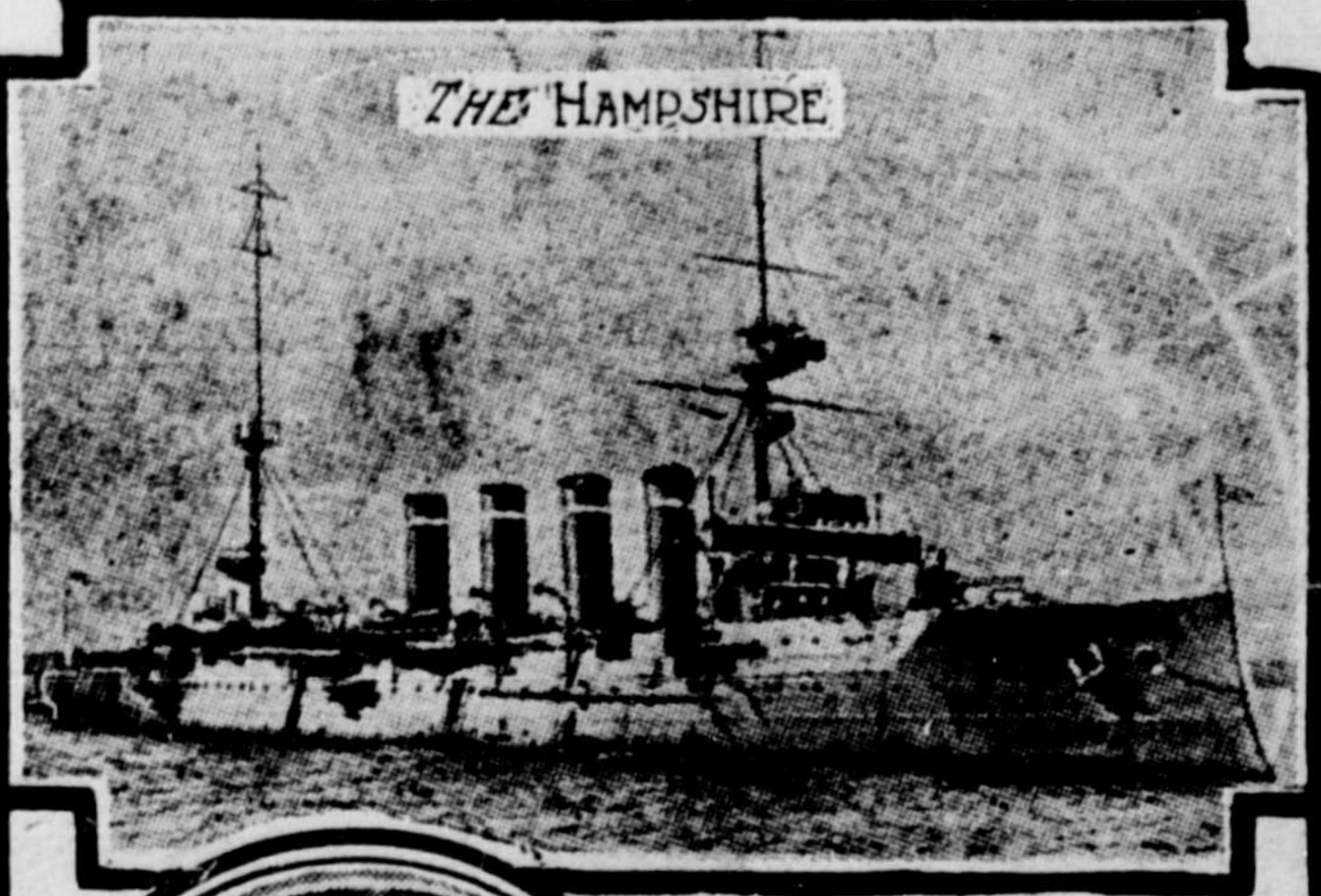

London, June 15.—There are fierce food riots in Vienna and Bohemia is shaken by revolt. Starving Austrians are fighting with the police. There has been street fighting at Prague. The rioters were mostly women and they fought the police with great violence.

SATURDAY HALF HOLIDAY POPULAR

Vancouver, June 14.—Vancouver today voted in favor of making Saturday the weekly half-holiday by three votes to one. A vote taken in Victoria on the half-holiday question showed an overwhelming majority in that city in favor of the half day being taken on Saturday also.

KING CONSTANTINE MAKES SAFETY MOVE

London, June 15.—King Constantine of Greece has left Athens for Larissa as a precautionary measure in case of revolution breaking out in the Greek capital. From Larissa he will be able to seek refuge in Monastir in the event of any disturbance in Greece.

MANUAL TRAINING FOR SCHOOL BOYS

The school board, at its regular meeting last evening, decided to inaugurate a system of manual training next term. The matter has been under consideration for some time. The board has taken a lease of the gymnasium of the Methodist Church at \$180 per year, and will advertise for an instructor. Benches to accommodate twenty pupils will be ordered, a class of twenty being the largest which the instructor will be able to handle at one time. There are about 180 boys in the various grades who will be qualified for the course and each boy will receive a half day's instruction per week.

WAR NIGHTS AT WESTHOLME

The management of the Westholme Theatre announce that every Tuesday night will be war night. 40 per cent. of the takings on that night will be given over to the various war funds in turn. M. C. Drew, of Victoria, is visiting in the city.

BALFOUR'S OPINION OF THE NAVAL ACTION

Mr. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, speaking yesterday before the Imperial Council of Commerce in London, said: "Anyone who imagines that the relative strength of the two fleets is the same as it was before the battle has made the most profound mistake. The German navy is relatively and absolutely less powerful than is the British navy." Mr. Balfour added that the dream of a German invasion of Great Britain would be dissipated forever by the action, and that the blockade could now be tightened. Mr. Balfour is exceedingly cautious in his use of words. His statements can be accepted at their face value. When he says "Great Britain not merely obtained the honors of the battle, but also gained the substantial fruits of victory," the people of the Empire will accept his judgment unreservedly. The Kaiser, in continuing to brag of victory while concealing Germany's losses, is merely making himself ridiculous.—The Toronto Globe.

The handsome brass flag-staff, made by Mr. Akerberg, will be raffled on this occasion. LLOYD GEORGE MAY BE WAR SECRETARY

London, June 15.—It is understood that the Secretaryship of State for War has been offered to the Hon. David Lloyd George, who is regarded as the strong man of the government. It is believed that he will accept the portfolio but will not sever entirely his connection with the Ministry of Munitions.

ALTERATIONS IN SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The school board last night considered a report drawn up by City Engineer Lorenzen relative to the proposed changes in the school buildings. The report dealt chiefly with safe-guards against fire. It has been decided to place a picket fence along the cliff at the Borden Street school and also to make a few other alterations deemed advisable.

An increasing number of pupils taking the high school course has created a demand for another teacher and the board will advertise for an additional teacher, who will devote most of his time to science and mathematics.

The board has received the resignation of H. Anderson of the teaching staff. Miss Tallander has notified the board that she has completed her course at the Normal Training School.

AUSTRIANS ARE DRIVEN ACROSS RIVER DNIESTER

Russians Forging Ahead and May Cut off Austrian Right Wing—Rumania May Come in.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, June 15.—The prisoners captured by the Russians in their big advance now number one hundred and twenty one thousand. The Russian army has crossed the Dniester River and has driven the enemy to the left bank of the Pruth. Along the entire line the Austro-Hungarians have been driven back.

The Russians now hold complete command of the Dniester, and, following the capture of Zalceszyki and Horodenka, their next objective is Kolomea. Unless there is an unlooked for change in the strategic position of the enemy only a prompt retreat will prevent the complete cutting off of the Austrian right wing.

Rumania Watching.

The prospect of Rumania joining the Allies in the war against the Central Powers is growing daily with the advance of the Russians into Bukovina.

Italians Repel Austrians.

Rome, June 15.—The Austrian attacks along the Posina line in the southern Tyrol have been everywhere repulsed by the Italians. Austrian seaplanes have raided Venice, killing one woman and injuring four civilians. The damage to property was slight.

MRS. PETERS SENDS NEWS OF PRINCE RUPERT FOLKS

City Solicitor Peters has received a letter from Mrs. Peters, who is in England, stating that Gerald had just left for the front. He must have been just a few days in the trenches when the heavy fighting took place, after which he was posted as missing. The letter also states that "Major" Gibson, who had been in England recovering from wounds, had returned to France on the same day. Mrs. Peters mentions having met many from Prince Rupert and also says that she had received a letter from Theo. Collart, to whom she had written regarding her son Jack, who is still unaccounted for.

GERMAN CASUALTIES

The German official lists of casualties up to the end of May is:—Killed, 734,412; wounded, 1,851,652; prisoners and missing, 338,522, making a total of 2,924,586. These figures do not include the German colonies.

WILL HE ACCEPT?

Strenuous protests have been raised by the government press since Mr. Brewster filed his now famous writ against Mr. Bowser. It is a wail of anguish, in which the premier and members of his cabinet join heartily, for in this writ demanding an accounting they cannot but see their doom.

Unable to attack Mr. Brewster on the main point involved which has already been admitted by the premier, the cry is raised that the Liberal leader is merely seeking to try a political trick. They claim that the case cannot be tried until after the next election and that it is, therefore, shown to be a dodge of Mr. Brewster's to cause trouble.

In answer to this lament, which is by no means sincere, Mr. Brewster's lawyers have written a letter to the attorney-general's department offering a solution of the difficulty. There need be no delay if this suggestion is adopted. The following letter was sent by Mr. H. C. Hall, counsel for the Liberal leader, to Mr. Bowser.

"Re Brewster vs. attorney-general.

"We have been instructed by the plaintiff to communicate with you for the purpose of asking your co-operation in securing an early determination of the questions raised in this action.

"The evidence bearing on these questions is contained in the official records and in the journals of the house, in the parliament buildings, Victoria.

(Then follows a list of statutory provisions).

"My instructions are to support any steps which will get the action before the courts for early determination. To attain this object I am prepared to consent to any of the following courses:

"(1) Agree on a statement of facts compiled from the official records and submit the case on a motion for judgment.

"(2) Serve a statement of

claim and abridge all notices so that the trial can be held within a few days.

"(3) Agree to a reference of all the questions to the court of appeal for determination under the statute for the reference of constitutional questions.

"(4) Agree to a reference under the 'Public Enquiries Act' to a board consisting of the chief justice of British Columbia, the chief justice of the court of appeal and such other members of the court of appeal or of the supreme court bench as you may select.

"In view of the urgent necessity for an authoritative and final determination of the question raised in this action, at the earliest possible date, my instructions are to ask you for an early reply."

Surely this leaves Mr. Bowser little upon which to base his claim that the Liberal leader seeks to evade trial until after the election. The premier now has every opportunity of meeting his chief opponent in the courts, to decide once and for all the status of the attorney-general with reference to the money given to the Pacific Great Eastern.

If he does not accept Mr. Brewster's offer, it will be made plain that he fears an impartial trial. He insisted that the question be thrown out when introduced in the legislature, although he admitted at the time that there might have been some technical irregularity. Most people would call it something stronger than that. Six million dollars must be accounted for and Mr. Bowser is responsible.

Mr. Brewster is playing the game. It is not his intention to delay the trial unduly nor to take advantage of his opportunity. He wants but one thing—honest government. As a representative of the people of British Columbia, he is trying to safeguard them, and that is no more than his duty.—Vancouver Sun.

SPEED OF ZEPPELINS FORTY MILES AN HOUR

"Not so many years ago a British engineering expert calculated that the Zeppelin could not attain a speed of thirty miles an hour, as he proved by figures that the ship would collapse under the air pressure! At the time this speed had been actually exceeded by a Zeppelin," says R. P. Hearne, in "Zeppelins and Super-Zeppelins," (John Lane).

Today the tendency is to attribute too high a speed to the vessels. In still air it is doubtful if a higher speed than sixty-five miles an hour can be reached, and by the most careful calculation Mr. Hearne has come to the conclusion that the average speed of the modern Zeppelin in war trim is about forty miles an hour with full load.

"Of course," he says, "with a favoring wind the ship may often be running at over sixty miles an hour, and the difficulty of gauging wind speed often causes erroneous estimates of Zeppelin speed by observers on land. In the upper regions where an airship is moving there may be a strong current, whilst near the earth there is a calm."

It is well to note that for a short period a Zeppelin can climb faster than an aeroplane. By throwing out ballast, going full speed ahead, jamming the tail down and shoving the nose up, a Zeppelin jumps a thousand feet or so in about half a minute. This rate of climb, however, cannot be maintained.—Ex.

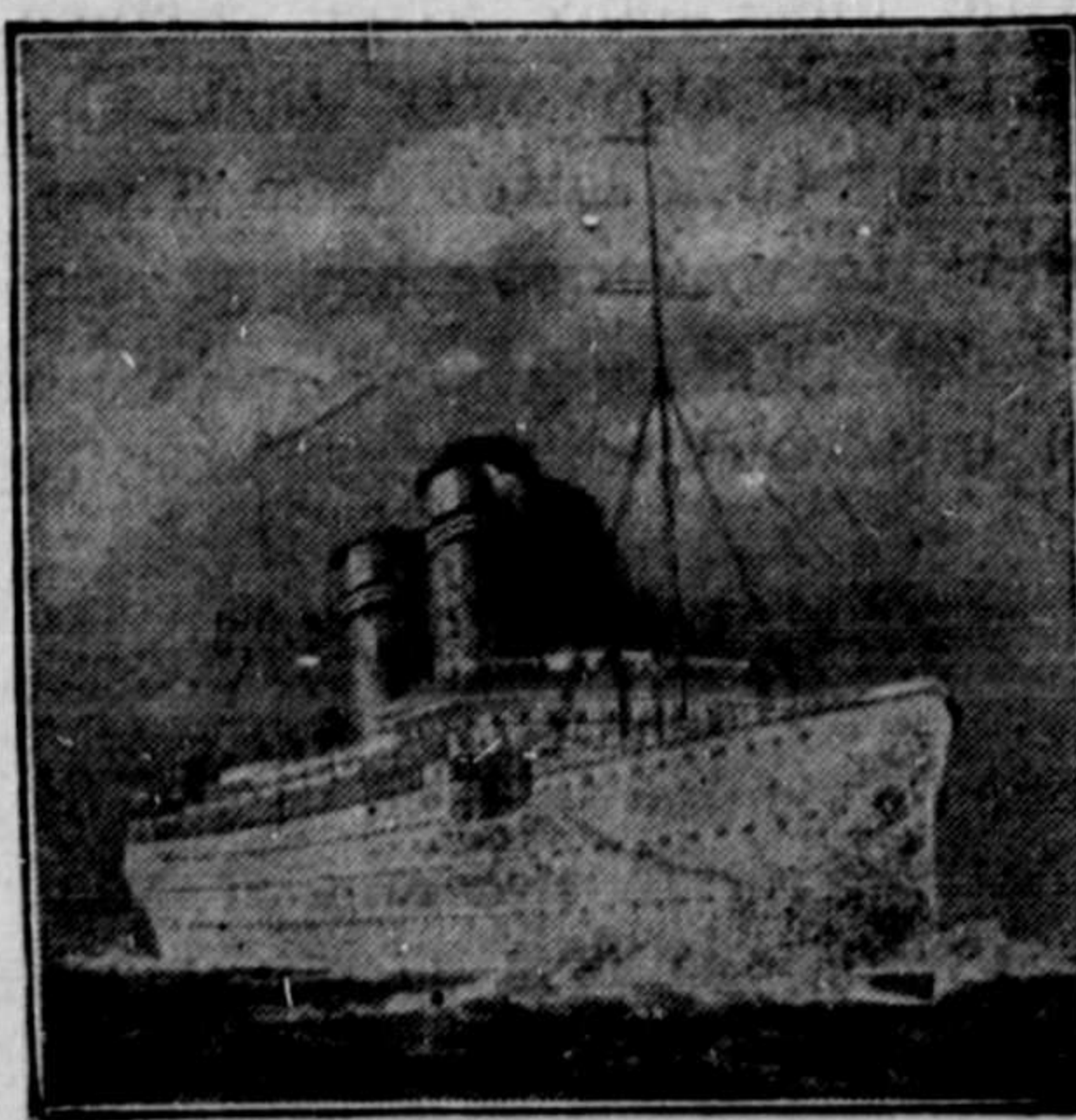

HOW THE GERMANS TREAT AGITATORS

The grim penalty meted out to German agitators in the trenches is referred to by Private J. Taylor, K. O. R. L., in a letter to his sister in Manchester. He writes:

"A few weeks ago, about 300 yards away, we used to see small groups of the enemy at various times evidently engaged in heated discussions. Of course, we fired on them, and those that did not go down from our bullets took to their heels. But another party would come, and another, and another, and still we kept making them pay the penalty. The remarkable thing about it was that they always seemed to be unarm-

ed. One night we ambushed a German patrol, consisting of seven men, not far from the same spot, and when we got them safely to our lines one of them told us how badly treated any of them were who dared to say a word against the war or the German method of conducting it.

The chap who told us the story said he was the son of a teacher of languages who at one time had many pupils in England. He also told us that great discontent prevails not only in the German army but throughout the whole of Germany at the war not being over long before now and the Allies completely crushed.

At the outset the Germans were so confident that they simply thought they were going to have a walk over. 'They dreaded the English navy,' he said, 'but they did not reckon much of her army.' Now that the army has been increased they are beginning to wake up to what is in store for

them, and they honestly rue the day they declared war.

He also told us that in one of the German trenches a number of the men were fond of arguing about the merits and demerits of Socialism and its bearing upon the war. One of the men said that if he could only communicate with every man in the German army he would suggest that they should lay down their arms and cease fighting.

Several of the listeners applauded the speaker, and after the meeting had broken up half-a-dozen of the leaders were met by a number of their officers, and without more ado shot like dogs. These meetings were composed of the men we used to see hang-

ing around the corners of the trenches arguing the point with one another.

You never saw such ragamuffins in your life as the patrol we captured. They were practically in rags, and were footsore and weary. They looked as if they hadn't had a wash for weeks and for want of a shave appeared as if an amateur gardener had gone over their faces with a pair of pruning shears.—Scotsman.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

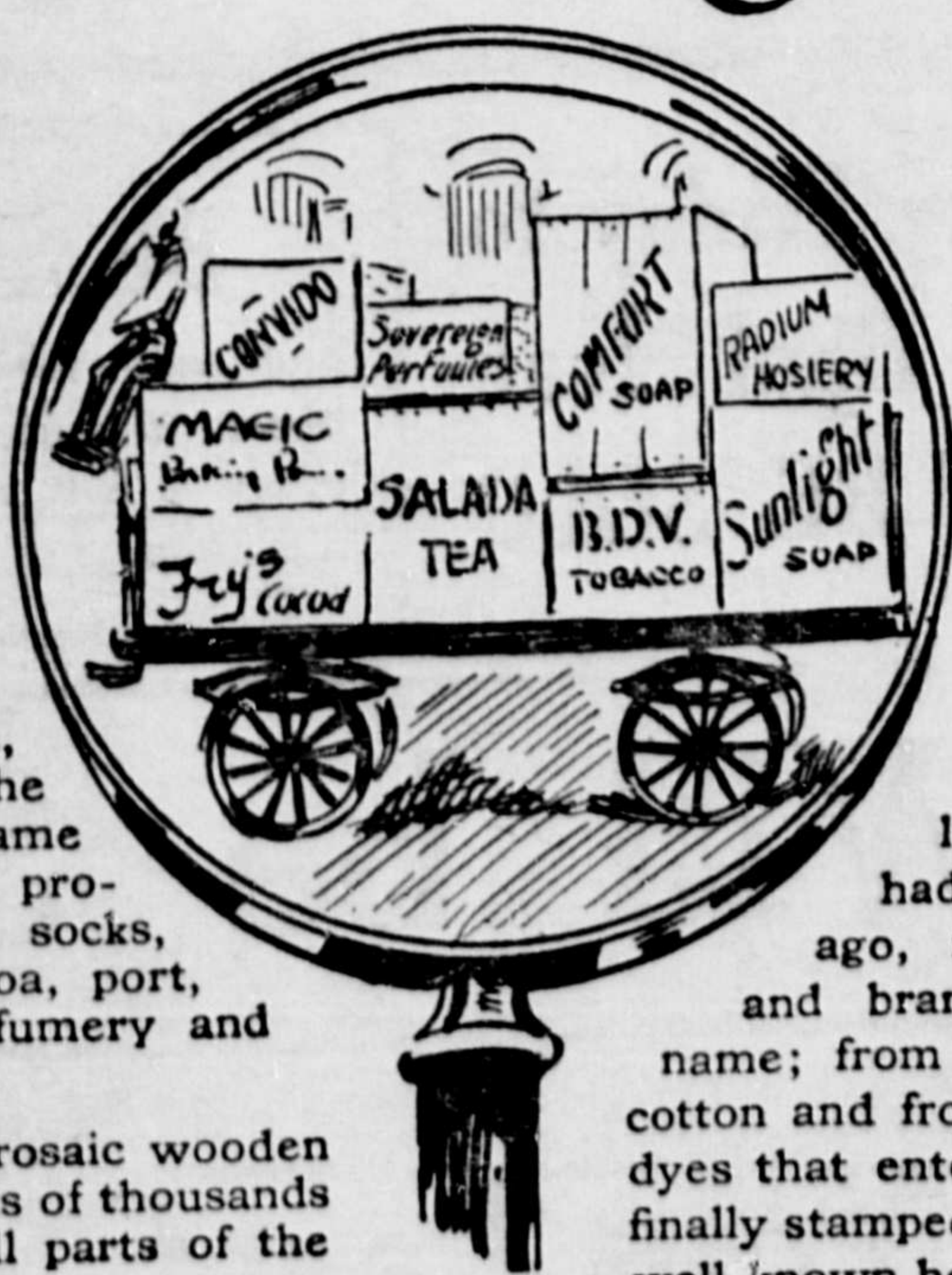
