WHOLESALE SURRENDER OF AUSTRIANS

"BRAVE CANADIANS" HAILED BY LONDON CITIZENS -- TWO HUN CRUISERS GONE

EUROPE AMAZED AT RAPIDITY OF RUSSIAN MARCH

Austrians Have Lost fifty per cent of Force—Unable to Cope With Terrific Russian Drive.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 16.—The Teuton losses in the big Russian offensive from the Pripet River to the Rumanian border are estimated at three hundred thousand men. The supply of cartridges captured in the Stripa trenches was sufficient to have lasted the Austrians for several weeks.

Europe Amazed.

Petrograd, June 16.—The Austrians have evacuated Czernowitz and the Russian advance along the entire southeastern front is astonishing Europe because of its rapidity and force.

Except in the centre of the Russian front, the Austrians are quite unable to resist the terrific drive and have already lost fifty per cent of their forces.

Complete units are surrendering and military trains containing field equipment in wholesale quantities have been abandoned. The Russian losses are small.

MRS. HUGH DUNN HEARS OF HER BROTHER'S DEATH

Mrs. Hugh Dunn yesterday received by wire the sad news that her brother, Alex. F. Quinn, had been killed in action on June 3rd. Mr. Quinn left for the front with the first contingent from Vancouver and saw some strenuous fighting in the early stages of the war. He was wounded at Festubert and, on recovering from his wounds, was offered his discharge from the forces, but preferred to go back to the front. He met his death in the terrific battle which raged around Zillebecke on June 2nd and 3rd. The sympathy of all citizens will go out to Mr. and Mrs. Dunn in their bereavement.

MEXICANS CROSS AMERICAN BORDER

(Special to The Daily News.)

El Paso, June 16.—Mexicans have again crossed the border in the vicinity of St. Ignacio. Several of the bandits were captured and many were killed.

Two thousand refugees have arrived at Juarez. Famine conditions are prevailing around Torreon and the civil population would welcome United States intervention as it would relieve the danger of starvation, which is the newest issue.

THE TORIES ADVANCE ON ANYOX DEFENCES

Napoleon Bowser, with his staff, arrived on the Prince Rupert this morning on his northern campaign. He was supported by a battalion of politicians from the south, including Hon. Dr. Young, Hon. W. R. Ross, Hon. Wm. Manson, D. N. McIntyre, Pearl Fleming and Messrs. Blue and Brown, representing the Matson press and the Vancouver Province respectively.

Evidently the commander-in-chief reckoned that his forces were not strong enough to carry the trenches at Anyox for strong reinforcements were taken on at Prince Rupert, along with a stock of liquid fire. With such a display of strength, it is hoped that the Anyox defences will crumple up at the approach of Napoleon and his army.

As was fitting in such a chief, Napoleon himself did not show up while the transport Prince Rupert lay at this port, but remained deep in study of his campaign in his state-room. His staff attended to the shipment of the reinforcements. The transport left the wharf with the bugler playing "And You'll Remember Me." Nothing could have been more appropriate than the bugler's selection; Prince Rupert and B. C. surely will remember Bowser.

LONDON HAILS CANADIANS AS YPRES HEROES

Citizens Display Banners Bearing Words "BRAVE CANADIANS"—Heavy Bombardment at Verdun.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 16.—The citizens of London are displaying banners bearing the words "BRAVE CANADIANS," in recognition of the victorious action by the Dominion troops in the vicinity of Ypres. Imperial officers are making highly complimentary statements in regard to the splendid conduct of the Canadian soldiers on the field.

There is intermittent shelling along the British portion of the western front and the situation of the Canadian line remains unchanged, the troops from the Dominion occupying the trenches which were regained from the enemy yesterday.

Verdun Front.

Paris, June 16.—Intense artillery fighting continues at Deadman's Hill and at Hill 304. A German trench and one hundred and fifty prisoners have been captured.

The Germans continue their violent bombardment of the French positions north of Souville. Souville is the key to the inner defences of Verdun itself.

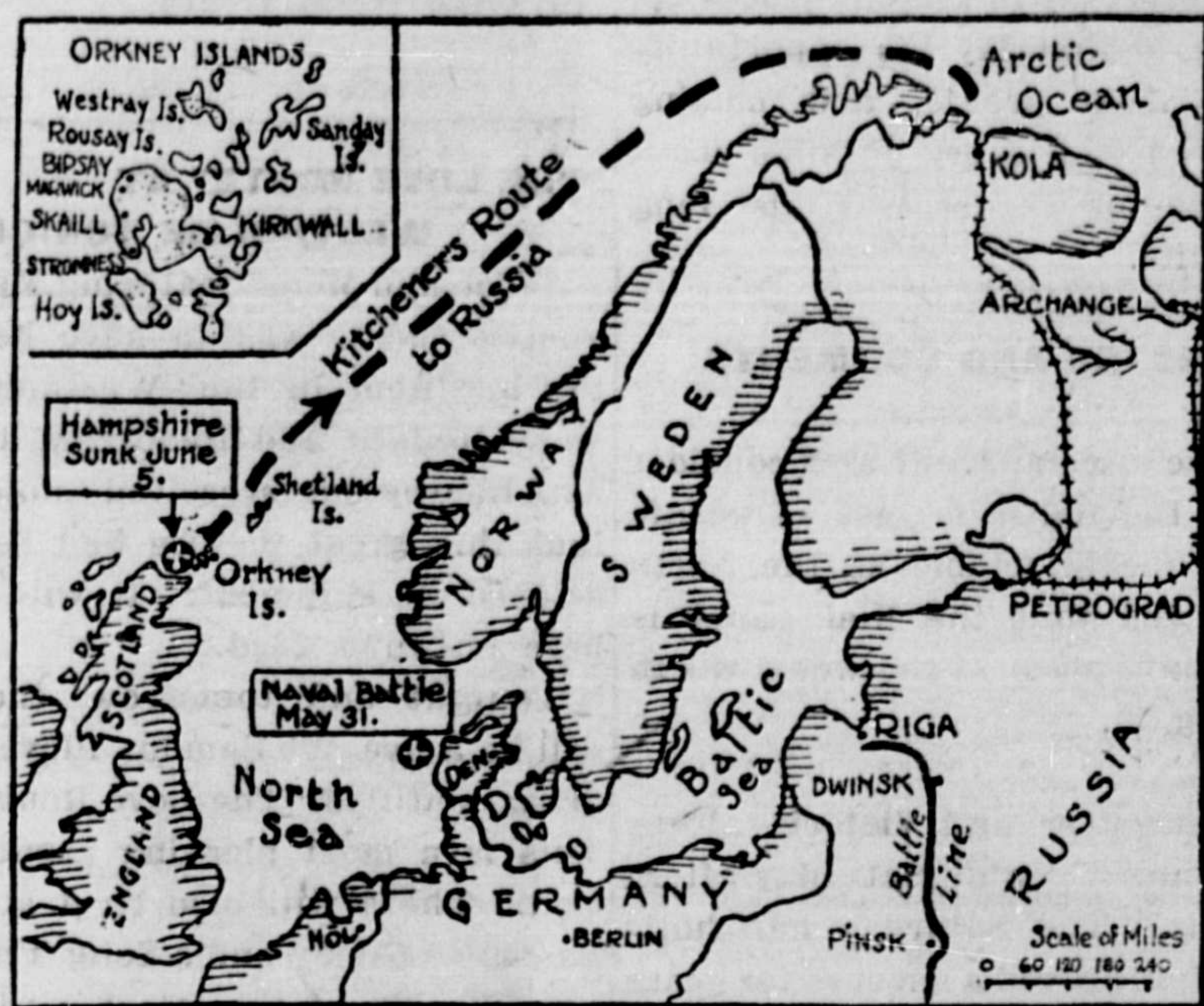
SPLENDID CONCERT AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

DEMOCRATS NOMINATE DR. WOODROW WILSON

W. J. Bryan, formerly Secretary of State, endorsed the methods of the present administration and approved of Wilson's attitude in the Mexican situation. Bryan advocates that the United States remain non-participant in the European conflict.

GERMANS LOST TWO CRUISERS IN THE BALTIC

Russian Flotilla did Effective Work—Kitchener Stood on Bridge Calmly Chatting as Cruiser Sank.

Copenhagen, June 16.—In the battle between the German convoy and the Russian flotilla of destroyers and submarines in the Baltic yesterday, the Russians sunk the German cruisers Herzmann and Konig Von Sachsen; two armed trawlers and ten of the merchantmen.

Hampshire Survivor's Story.

London, June 16.—Survivors from the cruiser Hampshire declare that a mine was responsible for the disaster. They say that they last noticed Earl Kitchener standing on the bridge chatting with the captain as if nothing had happened.

In East Africa.

Havre, June 16.—The Belgian Expeditionary Force in German East Africa has been pressing forward so strenuously that it has compelled the enemy to retreat.

SUBLIME HEROISM OF FRENCH AVIATOR

The following story of the sublime heroism of a French aviator in an air fight which took place above Muelhausen is recounted in the Paris Matin.

As soon as the French machines had been signalled above the German lines the enemy squadrons stationed in Haute-Alsace, as well as those of Fribourg, were on the watch, and immediately went up. The squadron stationed at Habsheim comprised a Kampfflugzeug, a bi-motor with two mitrailleuses, whose hundredth flight had just been celebrated that evening. The Kampfflugzeug, which had ascended quickly, saw a French aeroplane above it, and, profiting by its superiority in speed and armament, it attacked the French machine, and after a stiff fight, pierced the petrol tank.

At once the petrol went in flames. Seeing that he was inevitably to die, the French pilot thought that his death might as well be a useful one, and in a circle of fire he darted straight at the Boche machine, and, grappling with it, dragged it with him in his fall.

FUSE PROFITS

Now that the fuse enquiry is closed and all that is to come is the finding of the Commissioners, it may be not out of place to review the chief points brought out in the evidence. The fact that Colonel Allison and his friends netted a commission of \$1,000,000 on the contract let to the American Ammunition Company is fully admitted, and the fact that Allison, the close friend and trusted adviser of Sir Sam Hughes, should have shared in any such huge commission was reason enough in itself for the holding of an enquiry. It is ridiculous to suggest that this sum was ever earned by these gentlemen.

One other outstanding feature was the letting of a contract for fuse fuses at \$4.00 each to a mushroom Allison company without giving Canadian or legitimate American firms an opportunity to tender. The price of \$4 was given, in spite of the fact that fuse fuses were being manufactured at the time for \$2.40 by Cadwell, the man who really undertook the work, assumed all responsibility and shared a million dollars' commission with Youkum, Allison and Besick. Fuse fuses are now being made for \$2.00 each, exactly half the price paid to the Allison outfit.

In his summing up of the evidence, Fred. Carvell, K. C., said that the minister of militia had connived at and endorsed the taking of a huge commission by Allison, this money being stolen practically from the British treasury. It is clear that Allison did not appear in the deals until the British war office ordered fuse fuses. These fuses, being of simple construction, can be manufactured cheaply, but Allison stepped in and grabbed the contract at \$4.00 each, a price which would have been adequate for time fuses. The price of \$4.00

was fixed without making any enquiry.

Hughes claimed that Allison brought prices down, but the evidence shows that Allison got two prices for fuse fuses, and, on the face of it, Allison's interests lay in keeping prices up, as in that lay his opportunity to make profits, and making profits on every possible occasion or excuse was his long suite.

Toronto, June 8.—In the following resolution the Laymen's Association of the Toronto Methodist Conference in session in the Carlton Street Methodist Church yesterday, condemned in plain straightforward terms the graft and corruption committed in connection with the administration of public affairs:

Whereas the conduct of public business throughout our Dominion has in the recent past disclosed instances of greed and dishonesty that are startling in their number and extent:

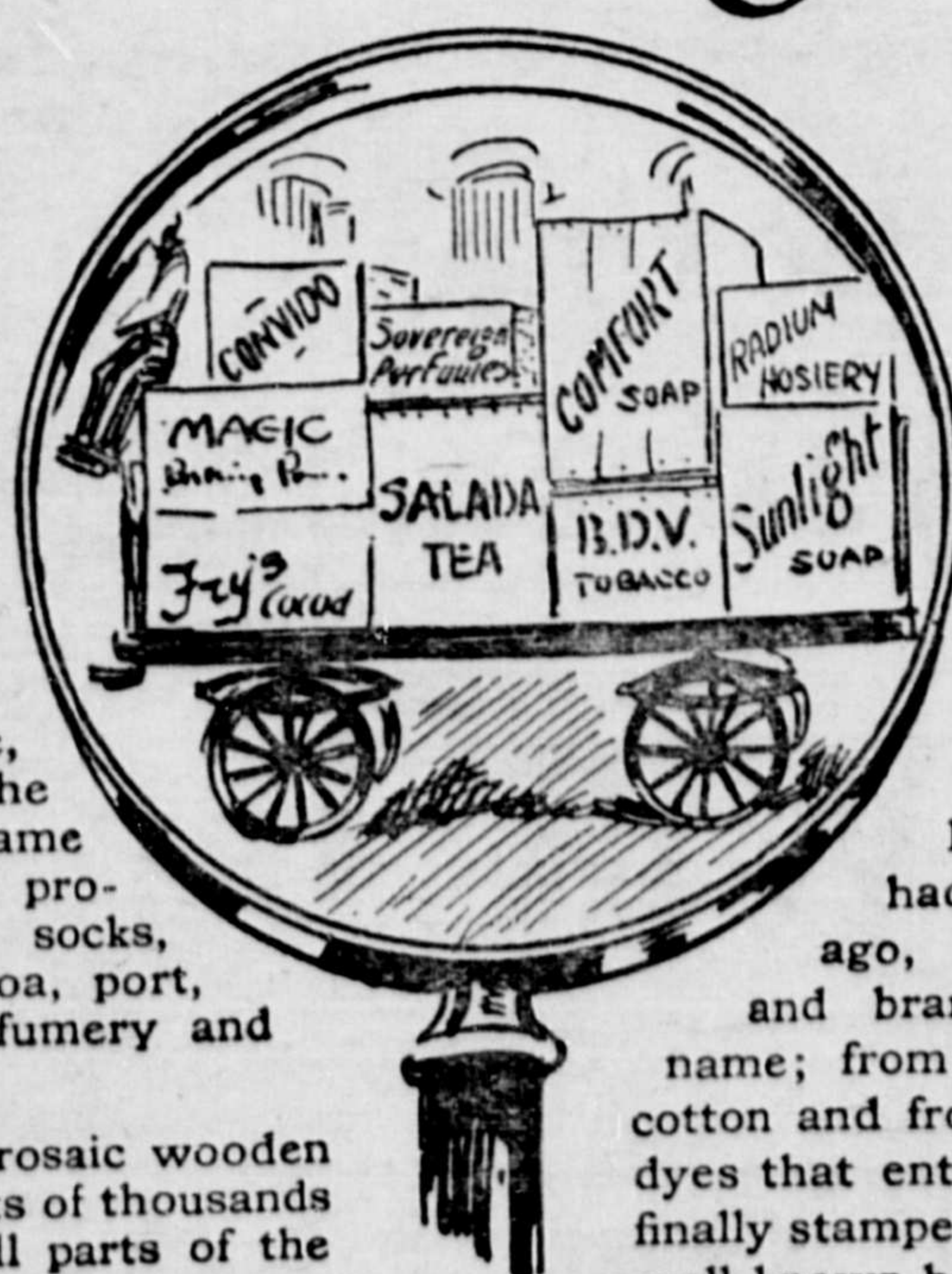
The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can get there, can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.
