

ENEMY PUTS UP FIERCE FIGHT ON EASTERN FRONT

All Attempts to Stop the Russian Drive Fail-Terrible German Losses at Verdun-German Ship Torpedoed.

(Special to The Daily News)

Petrograd, June 20 .- All attempts to stop the Russian advance upon Lemberg fail. Three thousand prisoners were taken when Czernowitz was occupied. The Russians are generally on the offensive, but the Austro-Hungarians and Germans are fighting fiercely to try and prevent a further Russian advance.

The Russian drive in Volhynia brings the Russian armies within twenty miles of Vladimir-Volynski. From Czernowitz the Russians are driving the Austrians . towards the Sereth river and the Carpathian Mountain passes.

London, June 20 .- The German losses in the battle of Verdun are estimated at 415,000 and the Germans are making no further headway with the attack.
