HURRICANE RUSSIAN INFANTRY ATTACKS

RUSSIANS USING DEADLY NEW GAS -- WILSON REJECTS THE MEXICAN DEMANDS

RUSSIANS ARE USING NEW GAS WITH SUCCESS

Austrians Flee in Disorder Before the Hurricane Infantry Attacks Following Gas Clouds.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, June 21.—The Russians continue to advance against the Austrians and have crossed the river Sereth and now occupy the towns of Zadova, Stroginetz and Gliboka.

The Austrian army has been cut in two and is now retreating in disorder. There is uncertainty regarding the situation between the Pripet River and the Galician frontier owing to divergent Russian and German reports. Both war offices claim successes north-east of Kiselin.

The Russians also claim a defeat for the Teutonic Allies south-east of Lokatchi, while Berlin claims that the Russians were repulsed.

175,000 Prisoners.

The Russians have now taken 175,000 prisoners and are using gas followed up by hurricane attacks by their infantry. The composition of the new Russian gas is a secret and there is no known antidote for it, while it is not subject to the uncertainties of the German gases.

The new gas can be launched in a definite direction and carries for miles, while it can be combined with explosive charges for big shells. No mask previously used is of the slightest avail against it.

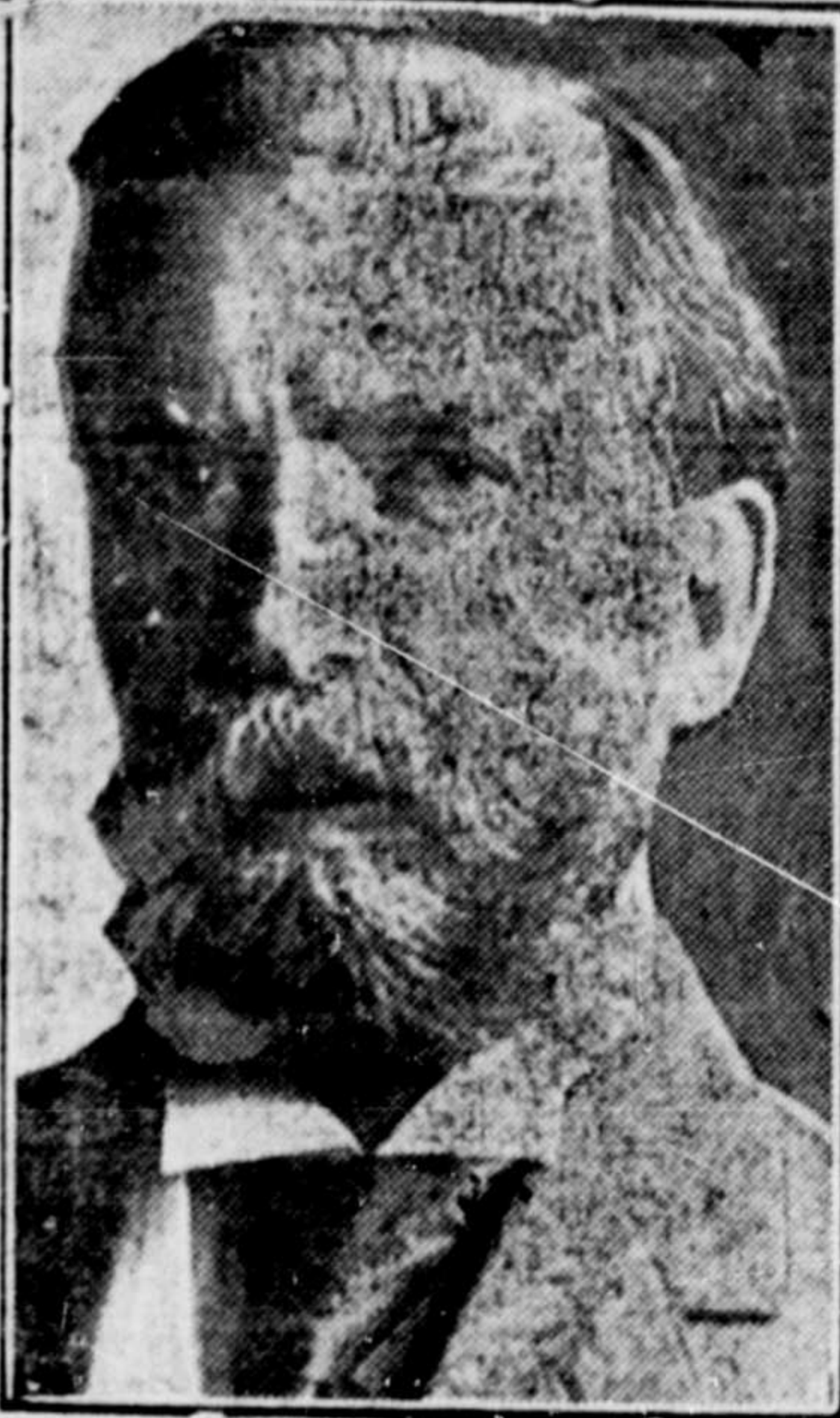

W. P. LYNCH SCORED RAILWAY POLICY

(Special to The Daily News.)

The Bowser meeting at Smithers last night was called for eight o'clock, but did not start until 8:45, when all the ministers but Bowser paraded to the platform in absolute silence. The premier remained at the hotel to rest after the journey from Hazelton.

Harry Smith was in the chair and R. S. Sargent was the first speaker. There were several stormy passages at the outset and the speaker advised the audience to reserve their questions for the ministers.

Dockerill was the next speaker. He said nothing of particular interest to the residents of Omineca and his speech was received in indifferent fashion.

W. P. Lynch was the next speaker. He dealt at length with the government's railroad policy, showing that the P. G. E. has already absorbed more capital per mile than the average capitalization per mile of all American railroads in the year 1908, including the amount invested in rolling stock and stations, etc. Mr. Lynch's speech was greatly appreciated and the speaker was frequently applauded. He denounced the policy of the government in the most trenchant fashion and the ministers showed that they were decidedly uncomfortable, continually conferring with each other while Mr. Lynch was speaking.

Hon. W. R. Ross spoke next and dwelt for fifteen minutes on the efficiency of the land department. At this point, the premier entered the building and proceeded to the platform, the party henchmen applauding.

Hon. William Manson wandered along aimlessly for fifteen minutes, the audience being decidedly unsympathetic and restless. He defended the railroad policy of the government and spent some time explaining that importing goods meant "bringing goods in."

H. B. Thomson spent ten minutes in an attempt to abuse W. P. Lynch and make fun of his speech but the audience was in no humor for humbug and clearly showed it.

LIBERALS ARE AGAIN ELECTED IN NOVA SCOTIA

Opposition Leader among the Also Rans—Liberal Majority is Increased by Four Members.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Halifax, N. S., June 21.—The Liberal government has been returned by a larger majority than it held in the previous Legislature and the Hon. C. E. Tanner, Opposition leader, has gone under.

Premier Murray and all the members of his government have been re-elected and the Liberal majorities were in many cases high.

The government now enters upon its thirty-fifth year with 31 Liberals and 12 Conservatives in the House, as against 23 Liberals and 16 Conservatives in the previous House, there being four new seats.

The Tories put up a great fight, having imported prominent speakers from Ottawa and Toronto in an effort to defeat the Murray government, but the Allison business proved too strong for them and nothing they could say or do had any effect on the electorate who returned the Liberals with a bigger majority than ever.

BREAD RIOTS IN FOUR GREEK TOWNS

Athens, June 21.—Bread riots are reported at Patras, Aigina, Malias and Argirion in Greece. The Greek government has been unable to demobilize its three army corps in Macedonia, owing to the holding up of the ships requisitioned for their passage home by the Allied blockade.

Petrograd, June 21.—There has been an indecisive battle in the Black Sea between four units of the Turkish fleet and a Russian warship.

French Losses.

Geneva, June 21.—The French losses on the Verdun front which extends for thirteen miles, number 165,000 to date.

Ottawa, June 21.—The Canadian casualties since June 12th amount to 4,600.

WILSON REJECTS MEXICAN DEMANDS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, June 21.—President Wilson has sent a note to the Mexican government conveying his rejection of the demand that the United States troops be withdrawn from Mexico and warning that government that an attack upon the United States troops will lead to the gravest consequences.

President Wilson accuses General Carranza of having brought matters to the verge of war by his hostility to the United States and his failure to safeguard the lives of American citizens from the lawless elements amongst his own countrymen. It is believed that the next forty-eight hours will decide the issue either for war or peace.

LIBERALS HAVE UNBOUNDED CONFIDENCE IN MACDONALD

GREAT DEMONSTRATION WHEN M. A. MACDONALD IS RENOMINATED IN VANCOUVER—LIBERALS PRESENT SOLID FRONT AND ARE CONFIDENT OF VICTORY

That M. A. Macdonald is more strongly in favor with the Liberals of Vancouver than ever is evidenced by the following resolution passed at their meeting last week:

"Be it resolved that this executive of the Vancouver Liberal Association, in meeting assembled, do herewith reaffirm its unbounded confidence in our member, Mr. M. A. Macdonald, and his associates of the Vancouver City Liberal ticket, and to place on record our high appreciation of the untiring services rendered by Mr. Macdonald to our respected leader, Mr. H. C. Brewster, throughout three strenuous months of sessional activities, in their endeavors to promote sane legislation for the future, correct much faulty enactments of the past, while at the same time exposing the unprecedented maladministration of the late top-heavy Bowser-McBride government in its awful extravagancies of the hard pressed taxpayers' monies and the exploitation of the natural resources of this richly-endowed province.

"And be it further resolved, in view of the tremendous majorities given our leader and his able lieutenant at the late by-elections in this province, we are encouraged to await in confidence the coming appeal to the provincial electorate and hereby renew our pledge of our unceasing efforts to the end that we place in control of our provincial affairs men holding the public confidence of those outside as well as inside the boundaries of British Columbia."

Faith in Nominees.

With ringing cheers, as they

stood in a splendid front of harmony, the executive of the Vancouver City Liberal Association last night passed unanimously a vote of confidence in Mr. M. A. Macdonald, the Liberal member in the legislature, against whom the Bowser machine engineered a gigantic conspiracy, and reaffirmed their unbounded faith and confidence in the whole Liberal ticket. If anybody had been misled by the efforts of the government press bureau to inspire an opinion there was to be a split in the Liberal ticket, their minds would have been thoroughly disabused of the illusion had they been in attendance at last night's session, which was remarkable not only for the harmony displayed—and Liberal meetings are not as a rule so harmonious—but for the strength of the demonstration of enthusiasm for M. A. Macdonald when his name was mentioned.

Accorded Reception.

When the maligned member was called upon to speak applause greeted him which for a continuous demonstration some said exceeded anything ever heard in this city at a political gathering; while for noise, when he concluded a speech full of fight and confidence, the demonstration was only limited by the number there.

The resolution of confidence was offered immediately following the conclusion of the fighting speech. It was by far the most splendid speech Mr. Macdonald ever made in this city. Those who knew his quiet, collected speech-making form, were carried away with the change in him, for he was not only eloquent but fiery in a terrible denunciation of the methods which had been used in an effort to besmirch his character. His remarks were frequently interrupted by bursts of applause.

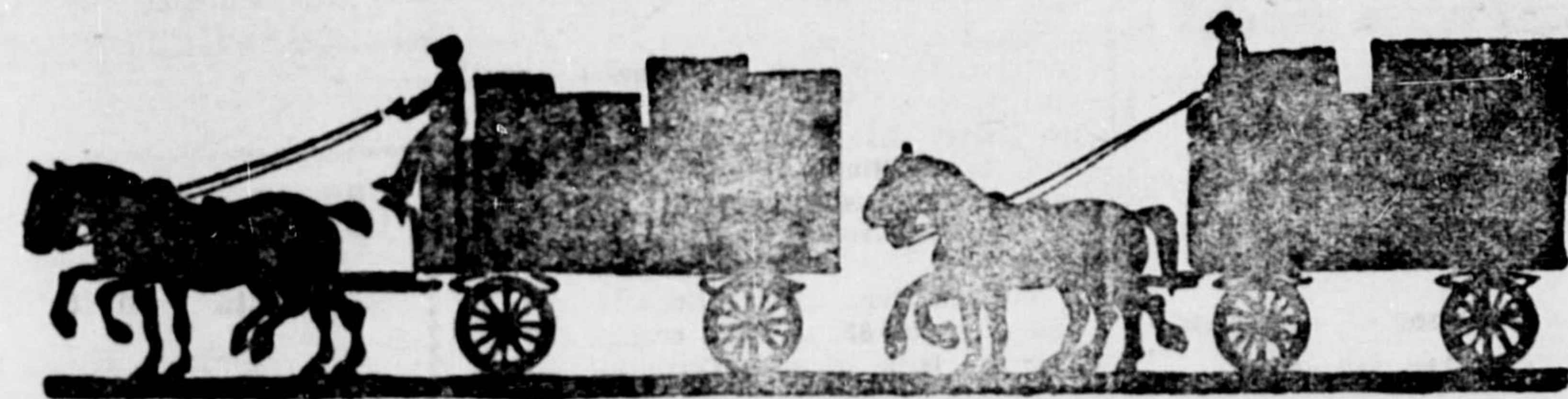

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

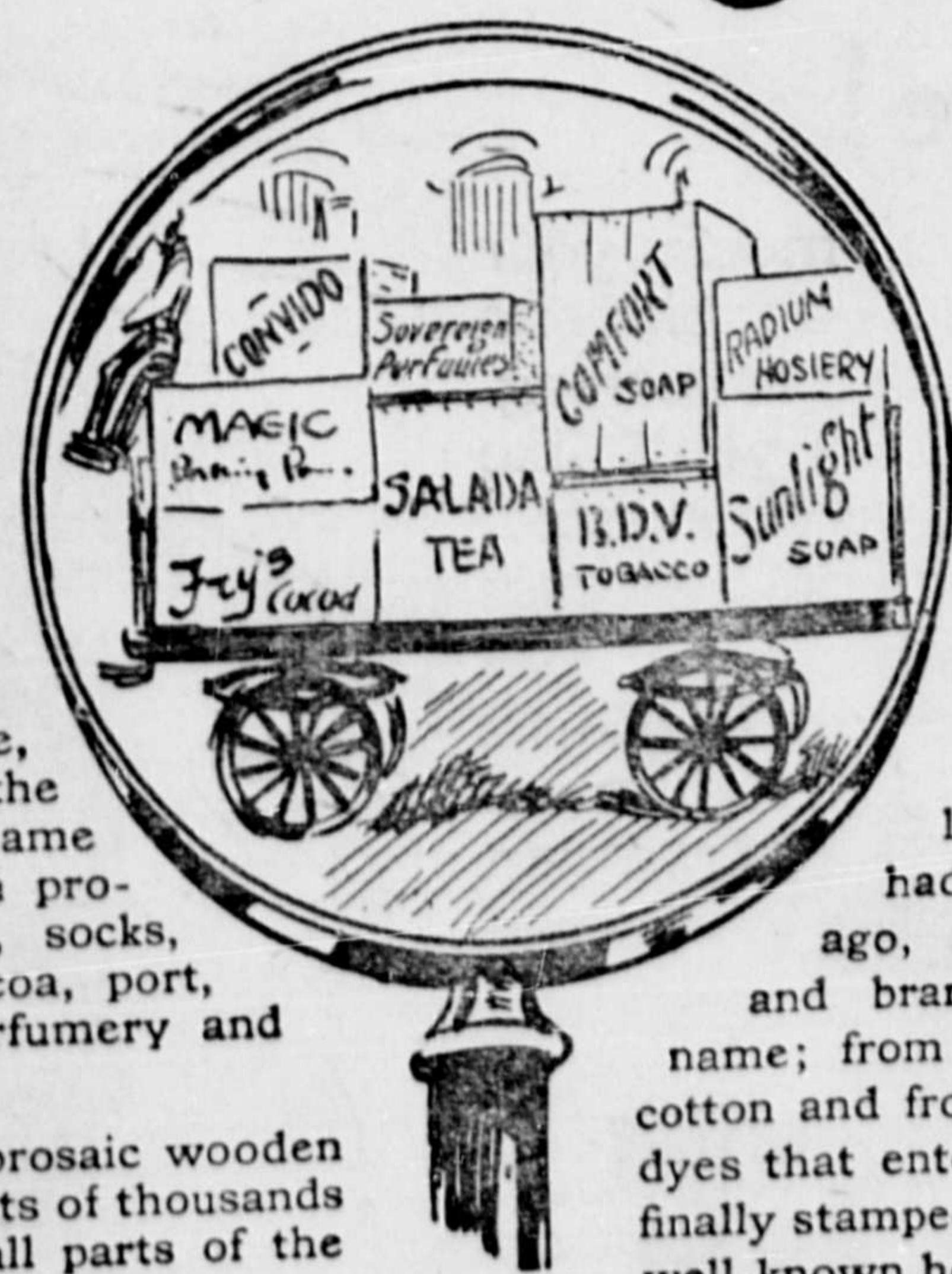
