RUSSIAN DRIVE HAS BEEN INTERRUPTED

FIERCE FIGHTING ALONG STRIPA -- ALLIED NOTE TO GREECE -- WELSH SUCCESS

RUSSIANS AND HUNS MEET IN FIERCE BATTLE

Russian Drive Interrupted—Grim Fighting on British Front and French Success At Verdun.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 23.—The Austro-Germans in Volhynia have stopped the Russian drive westward along the Stokhod River, west of the Stry and around Mylsk.

Sanguinary engagements are progressing on the Stripa and the Russians have taken portions of the Teutor trenches near Gaworomka. The Germans have been driven to the southward and the Russians have captured Radautz.

British Front.

Under cover of the explosion of a large mine, followed by a bombardment of the British trenches at Givenchy, the enemy has entered the British trenches. The troops of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers delivered strong counter attacks, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy and driving him from the positions gained earlier in the day.

Verdun Front.

Paris, June 23.—The Germans are heavily bombarding the French positions on the Verdun front and have made fierce attacks upon Hill 304 and Deadman's Hill. By counter attacks, the French captured a number of German trenches.

COMPLETE CHANGE OF PROGRAM TOMORROW

ALLIES DEMAND BIG CHANGES IN GREEK CABINET

Greek Army Must Demobilize and German Element in Government Ousted—Athens Accepts.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 23.—The text of the recent note sent by the Allies to Greece has now been made known. It demands the immediate demobilization of the Greek army; the immediate replacing of the present Greek cabinet by a business cabinet having no political color; the immediate dissolution of the Chamber of Deputies followed by new elections, and the replacement of certain functionaries whose attitude, inspired by foreign influence, has facilitated attempts against peaceable citizens and insults against the Allied Legations.

The note is the result of recent happenings in Athens, the chief of which was a demonstration against the Allied Legations, carried on at the instigation of certain members of the Skoudoulis government, the authorities making no attempt to restore order or apologise to the Allied representatives for the indignities offered.

Athens Despatch.

An Athens despatch states that the Greek government has acceded to all the Allied demands.

MANY GERMAN PAPERS ARE OUT OF BUSINESS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 23.—Since January twelve hundred and fifty newspapers and periodicals in Germany have gone out of business, making a total of three thousand which have closed down since the beginning of the war. Scarcity of paper and shortage of efficient labor, coupled with military rule, have caused this big slump in the publishing business.

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HUGHES' FIREWORKS AT SMALL ARMS ENQUIRY

When the small arms ammunition inquiry was resumed yesterday, Mr. Hudeson, government counsel, stated that the sitting had been called in order to give Mr. Hartley Dewart, opposition counsel, an opportunity to cross-examine Sir Sam Hughes.

Trouble blew up as soon as the cross-examination of Sir Sam began.

Mr. Dewart asked him if he had given evidence before the Davidson commission on May 13th.

Sir Sam said he gave the evidence, but he could not remember the date.

Mr. Dewart referred to "Col. John Wesley Allison's memory," which caused Gen. Hughes to remark that he did not want any insinuations about Col. Allison. He was "a cleaner man than Hartley Dewart," he added.

Sir Sam maintained that the ammunition was sold to Vickers, Limited, and not to the Admiralty.

"Have you looked at the evidence to see that it was sold to Col. Allison?"

"I do not intend to do so," said the minister.

A moment later Sir Sam told Mr. Dewart not to quibble and referred to his methods as "pettifoggery."

Sir Sam stated that Allison had told him that he (Allison) had been appointed the agent of Vickers, Limited.

"You accepted his word?" "I would accept Allison's word when I would not accept Hartley Dewart's oath," said Sir Sam.

Rebukes Sir Sam.

Sir Charles Davidson at this point suggested that the examination should be conducted with less ascerbity.

Asked if he still adhered to the views that the ammunition was sold to Vickers, Limited, Sir Sam said he did. "We sold it to the Vickers firm for \$20. It was none of our business what the Admiralty paid for it," Sir Sam said.

"That is not the evidence," said Mr. Dewart.

Sir Sam—I do not care what the evidence is. I am telling what I know. It was none of my business if the Admiralty paid \$50 or \$1,000 for the ammunition.

PALESTINE UNDER HEEL OF GERMANY

An article in The Algoma Missionary News throws interesting light upon the situation in Palestine. Jerusalem and Lebanon are described as the two most favored spots in the Turkish Empire today and in both places the poor are in pitiable plight, many dying of starvation. Palestine has become practically a German province. There are more than 4,000 German officers and officials in the country and the number is growing.

Large numbers of Jews have been expelled from Palestine with relentless cruelty and the majority of them have taken refuge in Egypt, and those who remained behind are in dire straits. United States warships brought relief funds for the Jews, but fifty per cent of the funds found its way into Turkish pockets. While Palestine is under the heel of Germany, the Russian government, so often accused of being the persecutor of the Jews, contributed 500,000 rubles to the Petrograd Relief Fund for the aid of Jewish sufferers from the war.

Miss Rosa M. E. Scott, second daughter of the late Mr. P. W. Scott, of Prince Rupert, was married in Calgary on June 15th to Mr. Alfred Ward, of Delia, Alberta. Many friends of the bride and groom attended the ceremony which was performed by the Rev. Alexander Esler in Grace Presbyterian Church.

The bride was attired in an all white street costume of velvet corduroy and was attended by Miss Leslie Ward, niece of the groom. The wedding luncheon was given at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Ward, of Calgary, Mr. A. W. Ward being a brother of the groom. The young couple will make their home in Delia, Alberta.

FRENCH BARQUE SUNK

SITUATION IN MEXICO MORE REASSURING

Both Governments Hopeful of a Peaceful Outcome—Japs Cannot Handle Any Munitions.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, June 23.—Reports on the Mexican situation are more reassuring this morning. Both Washington and the de facto Mexican government hope that the Carrizal affair will not be considered of sufficient importance to precipitate general hostilities. Many of the United States officers look for a peaceful outcome of the negotiations and it is reported that the Carranza government is inclined to seek a peaceful way out of the difficulty.

Japs Reply.

The Hotel Rupert bulletin says that the Mexican government has asked Japan to figure upon an ammunition contract, but the Japs replied that they had as much business as they could handle in supplying munitions to the Allies in Europe.

The miners are requesting a war bonus of ten cents per ton on all coal mined and also demand that white labor be substituted for Oriental. No agreement has yet been reached on either point.

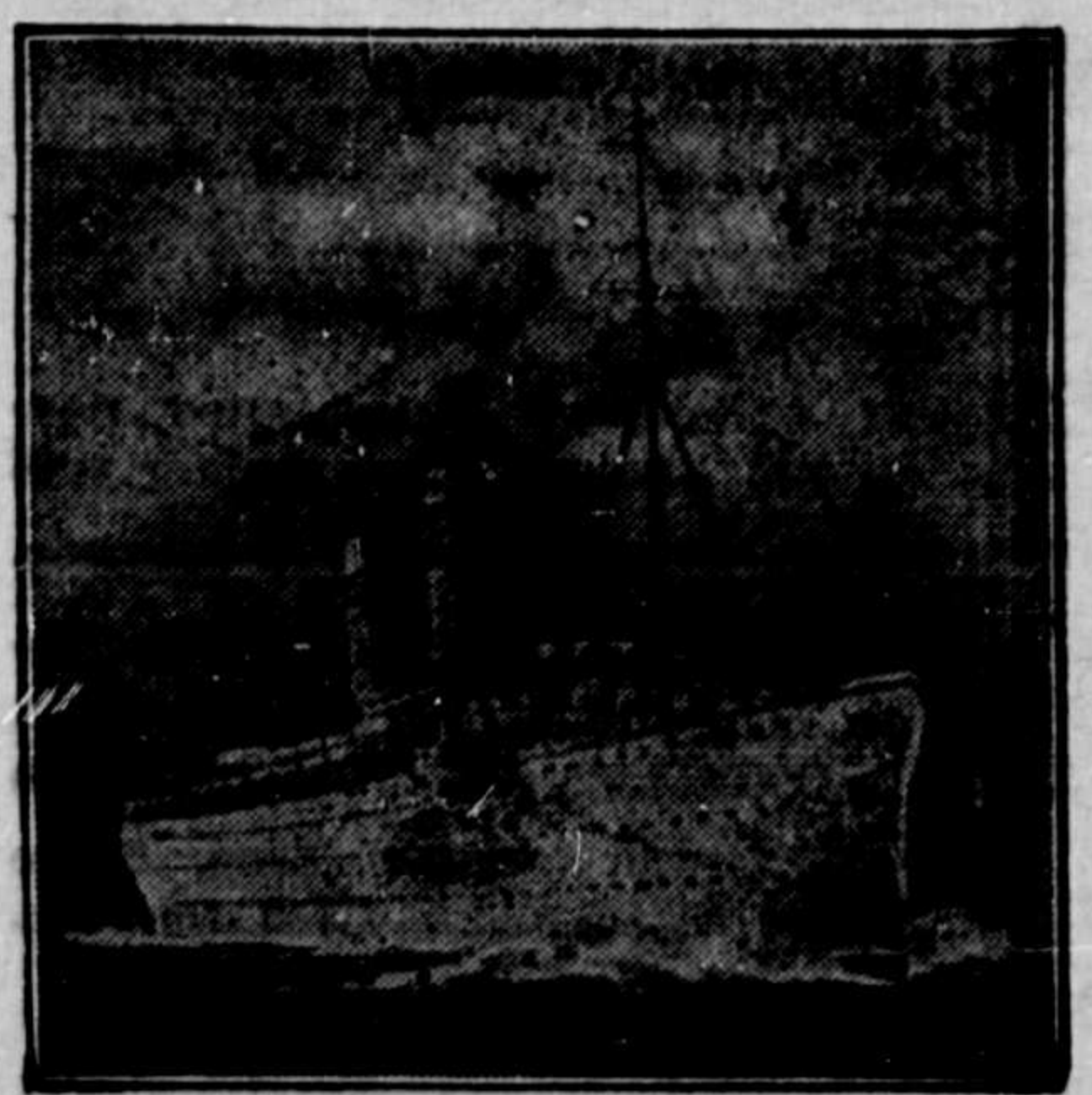

and his associates, Sir Sam said he had heard of it as a matter of hearsay, and had made some enquiries when in London. The advance in price, however, was not a matter "which interested him particularly."

Mr. Dewart asked a number of questions in regard to the application for an order-in-council authorizing the sale of an additional two million rounds to Allison.

Sir Sam said he had paid no attention to details. General Macdonald had full authority to sell the ammunition. He had made no enquiry in regard to the matter.

"Do you not think it is a matter of public importance?"

"I do not give a snap whether it is a matter of public importance or not. I have something more than little piffing things like this to think of—matters that I have not time to attend to," said Sir Sam.

Sir Sam was asked if he would undertake to produce orders-in-council covering the whole transaction.

"I will not, but if General Macdonald says that such an order-in-council was prepared, I will take his word for it. I always sign anything he brings up to me."

Not His Business.

Mr. Dewart drew the attention of the minister to the fact that Col. Allison had denied that he represented Vickers, Limited.

"I said that I understood that he represented Vickers, Limited," said Sir Sam.

Mr. Dewart then referred to Sir Sam's statement in Parliament that he would find some means of

reaching the attorney-general and false or dishonest. They acted as honest men so far as I have ever learned.

Mr. Dewart asked the minister if he did not think that the advance in prices was of sufficient importance to call for an enquiry by his department.

"It is none of my business, and I do not know that it is the business of the Dominion," he replied.

Asked who had given him the assurance that no commissions had been paid, Sir Sam said that he had been so informed both by Col. Allison and a member of the firm of Vickers, Limited.

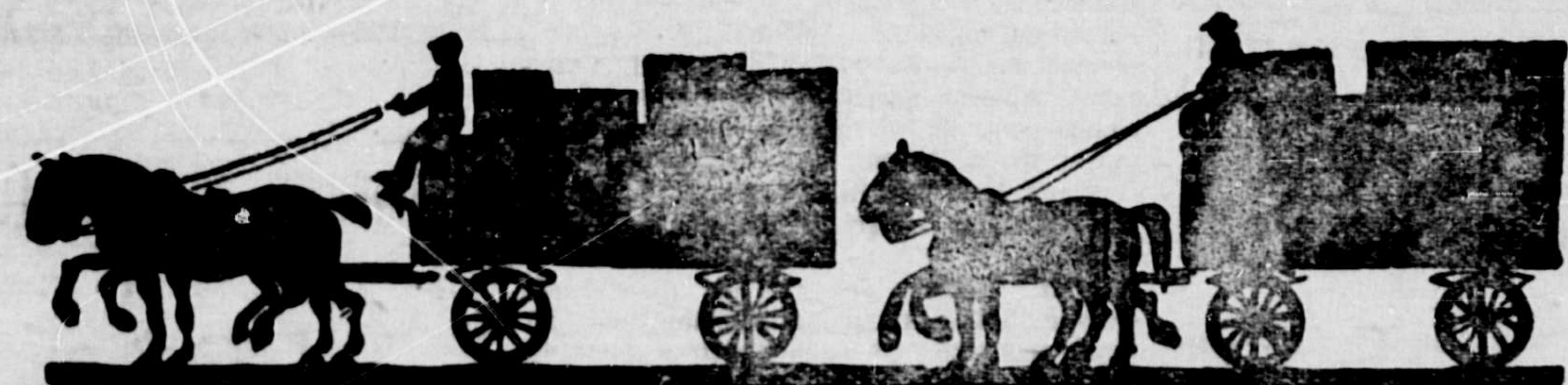

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

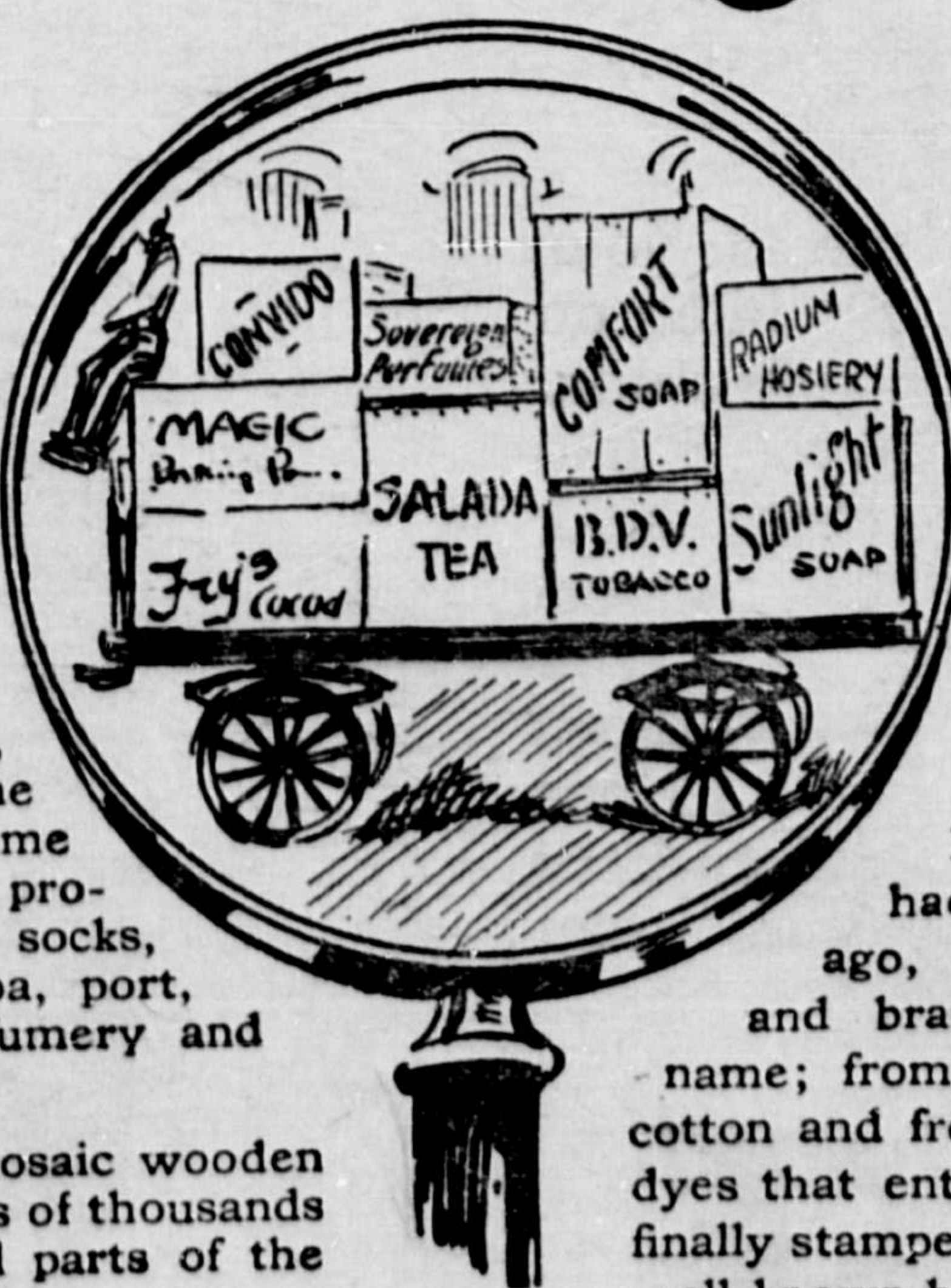
There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
