## SIGNIFICANT SPEECH MADE IN REICHSTAG

### BRITISH SUCCESS NEAR YPRES CANAL -- THE ITALIANS REGAIN LOST GROUND

#### GERMANY MIGHT HOLD OUT A FEW MONTHS LONGER

Significant Statement by German Chancellor at Secret Session in Berlin -- Allied Air Attack.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, June 28.—At a secret session of the Reichstag in Berlin, Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the Chancellor, made the statement that the situation in Germany is bad, but that they might be able to hold out for a few months longer. He added that, if the people did not look for too great results, Germany might hold out until March, 1917. The statement was published in the Paris Journal, and is looked upon as being highly significant.

**Allied Air Attack.**  
A fleet of Allied aeroplanes has made an attack upon the Belgian coast, dropping sixty-five bombs upon German ships.

**Two Steamers Sunk.**  
Marseilles, June 28.—The French steamer Fournell and the English steamer Cardiff have been sunk by a submarine in the Mediterranean.

**Britain and Sweden.**  
London, June 28.—The British and Swedish governments have agreed to submit to international arbitration after the war the question of the legality of the British seizures of postal parcels.

**HALIBUT ARRIVALS**  
There were seven halibut boats in last evening with average fares. They were the Stranger, 12,000; Dolphin, 9,000; Mayflower, 8,000; Liberty, 30,000; Bravo, 10,000; Nellie, 8,000, and the Nautilus, 10,000. The Liberty is one of the Seattle boats which has been tied up by the strike and is now being operated by a crew of captives.

#### BREWSTER'S REASONS FOR ISSUING WRIT

Interviewed in regard to the construction put upon his issuing of the now famous writ against Premier Bowser, H. C. Brewster made the following statement to the Vancouver Sun:

"My political opponents," said Mr. Brewster, "are intentionally omitting any mention of the vital facts affecting the public interest contained in the other branch of the action which I have instituted. These were made public over my own signature some time ago, and I take the liberty of repeating some of them here:

"1. Contrary to law, the entire \$25,000,000 share capital of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway has been handed over to the promoters without cash payment.

"2. Contrary to law, the entire proceeds (\$18,000,000) of the securities guaranteed by the government has been paid over to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company, although the line is not nearly completed.

"3. Contrary to law, the promoters of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company have been permitted to award the contract for construction to one of their number without competition, and at exorbitant prices, which have caused a loss of several million dollars to the province, or at any rate to good morals.

"4. Contrary to law, or at any rate to good morals, the attorney-general has continued to be a member of the legal firm acting as solicitors for the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

"The Liberal party has for its fundamental doctrine the protection of the public interest. My only reason for being the leader of the party is the belief on the part of its members that I can be absolutely relied upon to abide by that fundamental doctrine.

"There is a political ideal and a party ideal for Liberals, and it does not permit of any waiver of law and right in exchange for the political support of corporation promoters.

"Liberals will not permit the party to be railroad owned or railroad controlled, or, if returned to power, to be represented by a railroad owned or railroad controlled government. For years British Columbia has been the milch cow of railroad subsidy promoters, and has assumed a burden of liability more oppressive than is borne by any other province in Canada. To this source may be ascribed very largely the political corruption and administrative evils from which the country is now suffering.

"From my seat in the legislature I did everything in my power to rescue the province from the burden of debt which she has been forced to assume through the illegal acts of the attorney-general as a member of the McBride government and as premier in the present administration. On May 12th I brought the facts before the legislature by a resolution calling on the attorney-general to

#### CARRANZA AND VILLA ARRANGE TO JOIN FORCES

Wilson Gives Carranza Until Tonight to Release Prisoners -- War Now Seems Certain.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Washington, June 28.—Unless Carranza surrenders the twenty-three American troopers, who are held prisoners at Chihuahua, before tonight, President Wilson will ask Congress for authority to rescue them by force.

Pending the release of those prisoners the United States will not consider any measure of mediation. General Carranza has not yet acknowledged the American note.

**Mexican Report.**  
El Paso, Texas, June 28.—It is reported that General Villa, in a note to the Carranzista General Trevino, has offered to muster his followers to fight against the United States, if he is granted an amnesty.

It is reported that General Trevino has granted Villa a general commission and will place him at the head of five thousand men.

#### ITALIANS ARE DRIVING BACK THE AUSTRIANS

All Lost Ground Regained in the Trentino Region—Germans Bombarding Russian Northern Line.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 28.—The Italians are still driving back the Austrians in the Trentino region and are rapidly re-taking the positions lost in the recent set-back.

Posira and Ariero are again in the possession of the Italians, while the region lying between the Adige and Brenta Rivers, including numerous peaks and mountain positions, has been recaptured from the enemy.

**Northern Russia.**  
The first news from the northern Russian front for weeks is contained in a short despatch stating that the Germans have bombarded the Russian positions unsuccessfully.

**200,000 Prisoners.**  
On the southern portion of this front, General Brusiloff's army captured 200,000 officers and men between June 4th and June 24th.

**Barbarian Turks.**  
The Marquis of Crewe stated in the House of Lords that the Turks are exercising the greatest tyranny over the Syrian nobles. Twenty have been condemned to death, while many others have been exiled. The Turks are starving the inhabitants of Lebanon.

#### SEATTLE FISHERMEN RESENT SKIPPERS' ACTION

There was a little excitement around the wharf yesterday afternoon when some of the Seattle fishermen sought to have an argument with the skippers who are operating the schooner Liberty, which arrived yesterday with 30,000 pounds of halibut. The mayor and police arrived on the scene and things quieted down. Earlier in the day, one of the crew of the Liberty encountered some of the fishermen on Second Avenue and there were threatenings of trouble but the authorities kept the situation well in hand.

#### TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

The Trades and Labor Council last evening discussed the half-holiday question. The clerks and store assistants have been recently organized, and they, along with the Retail Merchants Association, favor a Saturday half-holiday, while some of the merchants favor Wednesday. A committee was appointed to interview these merchants and also to interview the city council with a view to having the city bylaw changed to make it compulsory to close on Saturday afternoons.

A report from the laundry workers was submitted. The council decided to defer action in regard to the report, leaving further action in the hands of the union.

Correspondence from the B. C. Federation of Labor in regard to representation on the Royal Commission to enquire into compensation to the liquor trade was submitted. The Federation is taking the matter up.

The question of Oriental labor is still being gone into, and the matter of having the firemen's uniforms made by white labor was discussed. A committee was appointed to go into the matter. It was reported that the city council had decided to have the suits made by union labor.

Arrangements are well under way for a smoker on July 1st, a good program having been prepared.

#### BRITISH ENTER HUN TRENCHES ON WEST FRONT

Many German Casualties—Prisoners Taken—Intense Bombardment Continues—Air Combats.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 28.—The British have repulsed a German attack near the Ypres-Menin Canal. All along the front patrols are active and the British troops have entered the German trenches at several points inflicting many casualties upon the enemy and capturing prisoners.

**British Attack.**  
The British artillery bombardment of the German positions is terrific in its intensity and the Germans are rushing big guns and reinforcements to this part of the western front, in the fear that a tremendous offensive will begin shortly.

**Air Combats.**  
Five British airships encountered four Fokkers on the enemy's side of the firing line and succeeded in bringing down two of the German machines. One British vessel is missing.

**Medals for Women.**  
King George has ordered that the military medal in future may be awarded to women who have shown bravery and devotion to duty while under fire.

GOOD NEWS

From yesterday's despatches it would appear that something in the nature of a general offensive has begun. The Italians seem to have quite recovered from the recent setback and must now have an ample supply of big guns and ammunition, as they have carried out a successful attack along a fifteen-mile front.

On the western front, the British seem to have started a general artillery attack which will naturally be the prelude to an infantry rush on the German positions. It is no secret that the munitions factories in Britain have been working day and night to produce record quantities of munitions for the big advance, and the time set for the great attack was "when Britain has a preponderance of heavy guns and munitions over the Germans."

The Russians continue to hold the situation on the eastern front and it seems as if Lemberg were already within the grasp of the bear. With the southern passes through the Carpathians in the control of the Russians there will be a wild rush for the Dukla Pass when Lemberg is surrounded.

There is no news from the northern portion of the Russian front, and, in this case, no news is good news as it means that the Germans have been unable to spare enough rein-

forcements from the other fronts to start anything in the way of a counter to the big Russian offensive to the south. Germany has still a big advantage in being on the inside of the circle and able to rush troops from one front to the other, but things are getting so tightly drawn in the west that it should be impossible for the Kaiser to release any troops from that quarter even for a single day, as the Allied air fleets must be watching every move. There is a big possibility of much decisive fighting in the near future and it is unlikely that the German lines at the end of July will be so far-reaching as they are today.

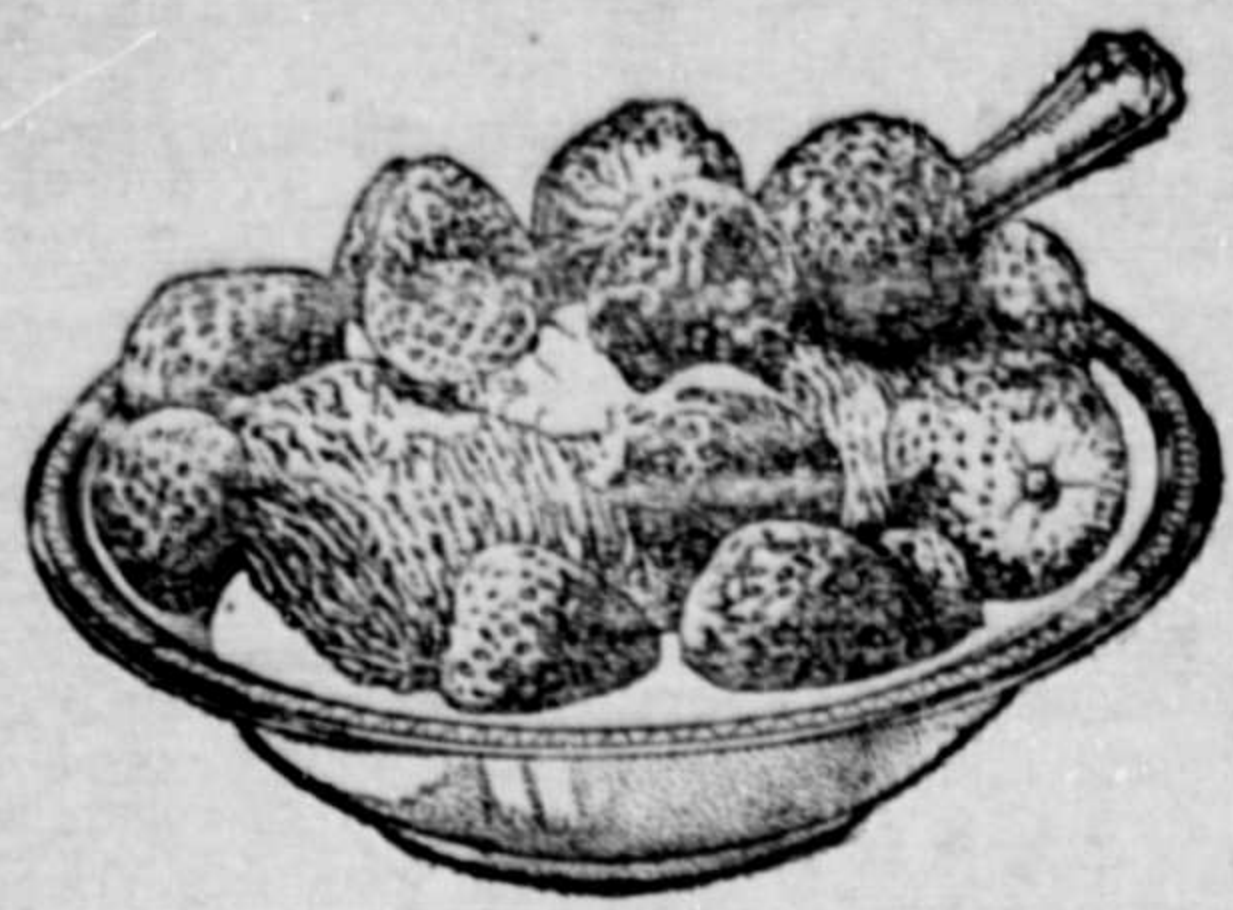

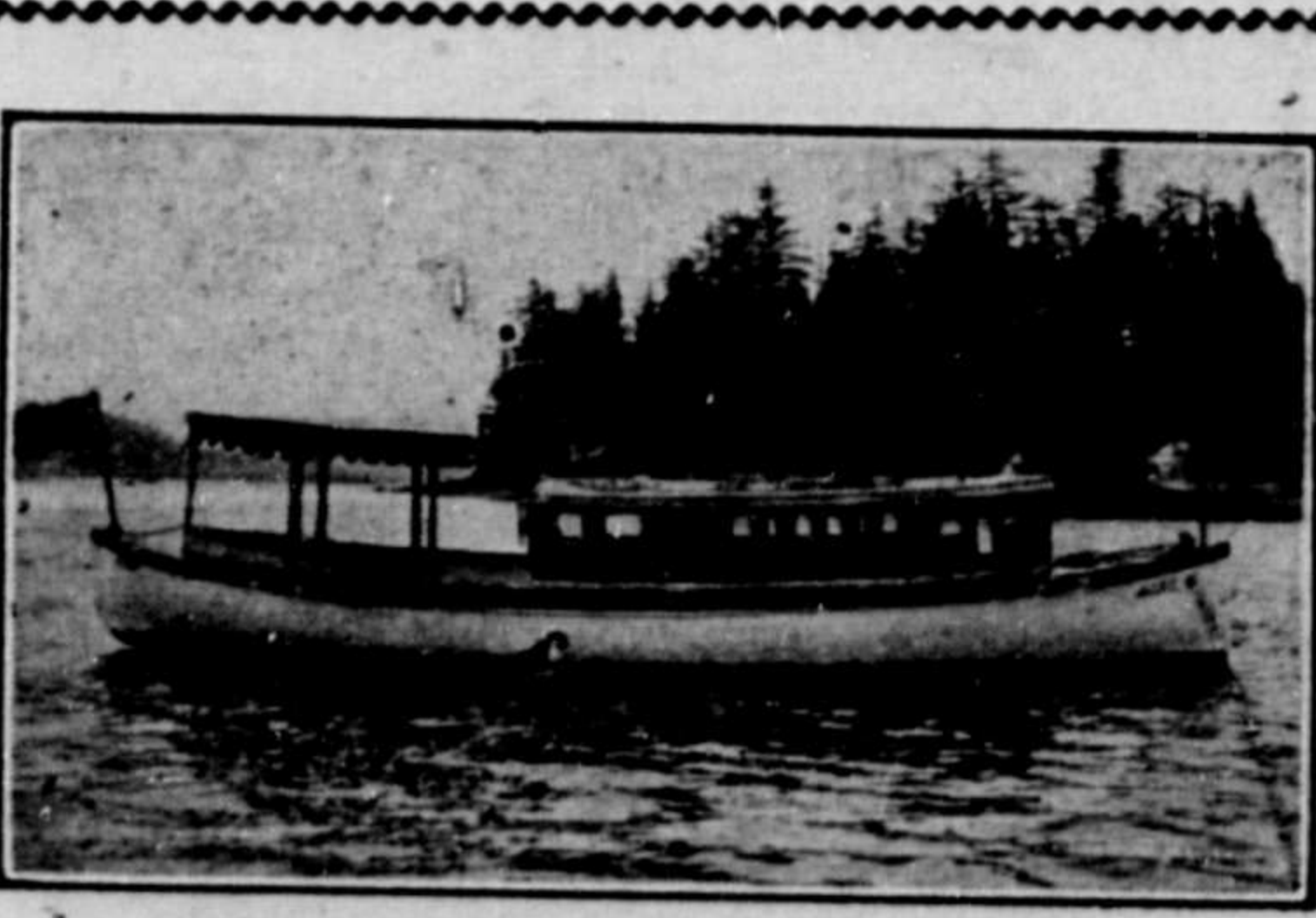

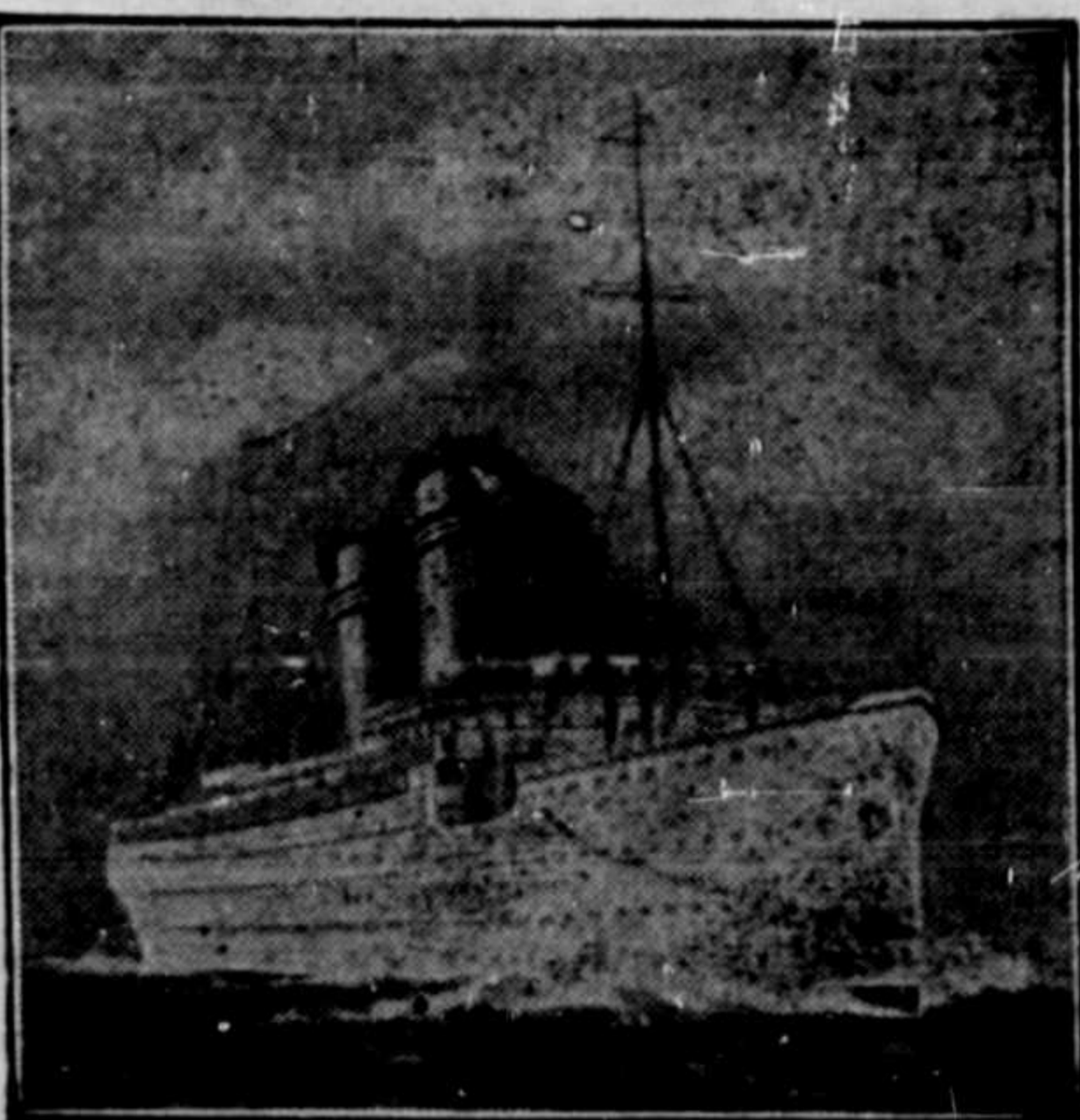

# BREWSTER'S REASONS FOR ISSUING WRIT

(Continued From Page One.)

prosecute all persons concerned in this maladministration of provincial funds. The members of the Opposition supported the resolution which was defeated by a vote of thirty to four. On May 19th I moved for a royal commission to investigate the same facts which was defeated by a straight party vote. Immediately afterwards I laid the situation before the Lieutenant-Governor, asking for his interference on the ground that he had been deceived by his ministers, who in the order-in-council stated that their action had been taken in accordance with the provisions of the Pacific Great Eastern subsidy legislation, whereas it was in direct contravention of those provisions. My petition to the Lieutenant-Governor elicited no favorable response. All these steps were necessarily taken without consultation with the Liberal party at large, but all and singly, they received, I believe, the vigorous support of every Liberal in British Columbia. Having been foiled in my efforts on the floor of the legislature by the attorney-general and his subservient majority, and failing to procure the intervention of the Lieutenant-Governor on behalf of the province, I was forced either to allow the attorney-general to ignore the laws of the province and plunder the treasury at will, or to resort to the courts of justice in a last effort to prevent an expenditure of the public moneys which the attorney-general himself admitted to be illegal. My action was but a culmination of a series of acts which had received the warm approval of the whole Liberal party. It involved no change of principle, no deviation from the course which had

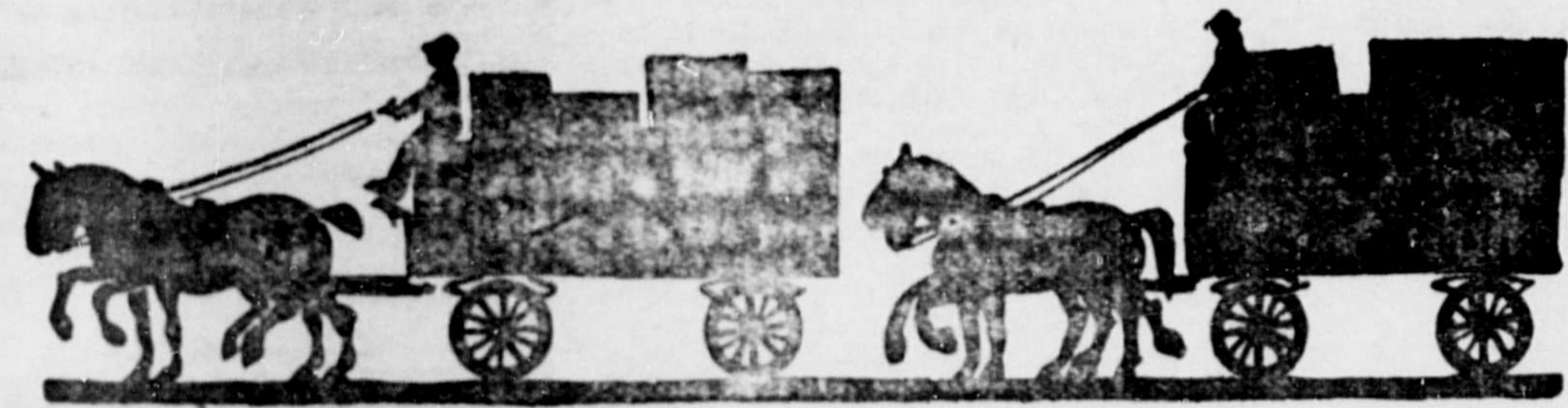

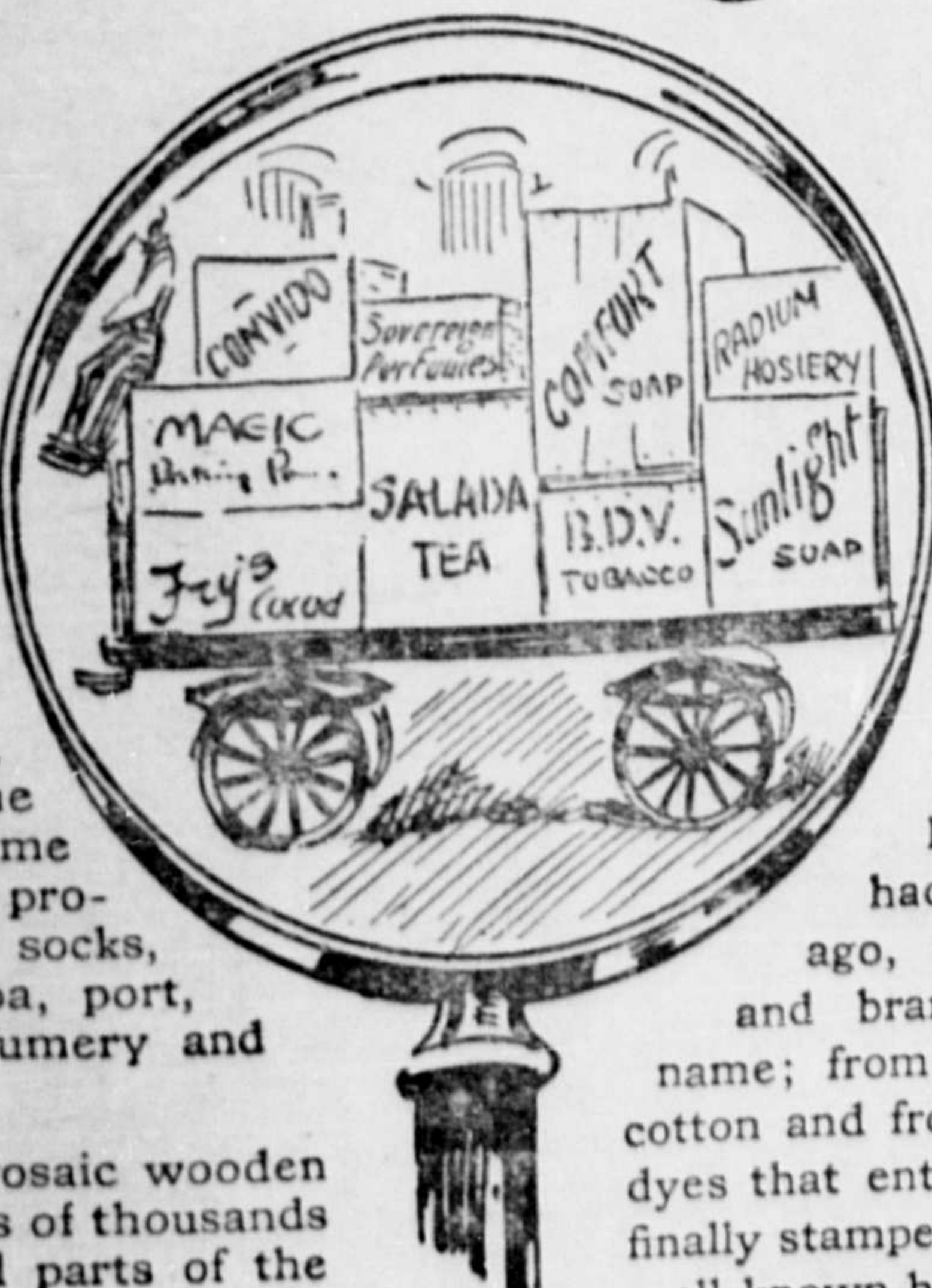
# The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.

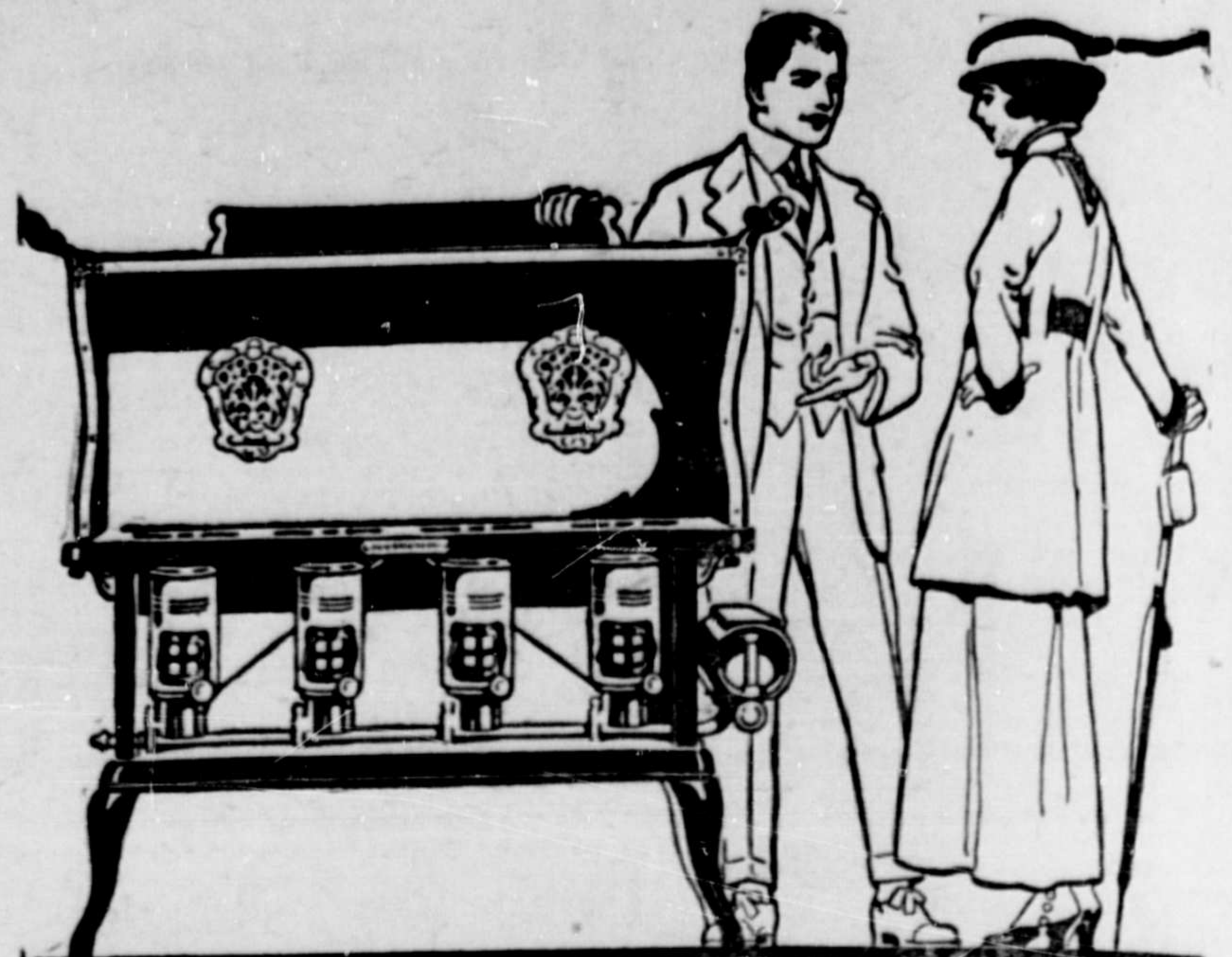
